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## ARC Disaster Group Needs Volunteers

The Seminole County American Red Cross Disaster Committee needs volunteers to serve in shelters during time of an emergency, either man-made or natural.

Those who volunteer, and whose services are accepted by the Red Cross, will, of necessity, be away from their homes during storms or other disasters which might occur in our community.

The Red Cross feels very strongly about its obligations to alleviate suffering during these periods of disaster, but it is only through the Red Cross and the cooperation of the citizens of the community that assistance can be rendered to those in need.

To avoid confusion during time of disaster, the American Red Cross has established a disaster committee that is prepared to handle the emergency situation and the rehabilitation necessary after an emergency.

There is a need for shelter workers that may be versed in first aid, dieting, and infant care. There is also a need for clerical workers to help during the rehabilitation period following a disaster.

If you feel that you are qualified in these fields, and you have the time, the Red Cross needs you.

Last year during Hurricane Donna, Seminole County Disaster Committee, in cooperation with the Seminole County Civilian Defense, set up complete warning service, shelters, and housed 750 people during the height of the hurricane. Many emergency calls were handled and families were evacuated to shelters.

Following the emergency, The American National Red Cross contributed \$13,000.00 in grants to persons in Seminole County to help in the rehabilitation of those people suffering damage from the storm.

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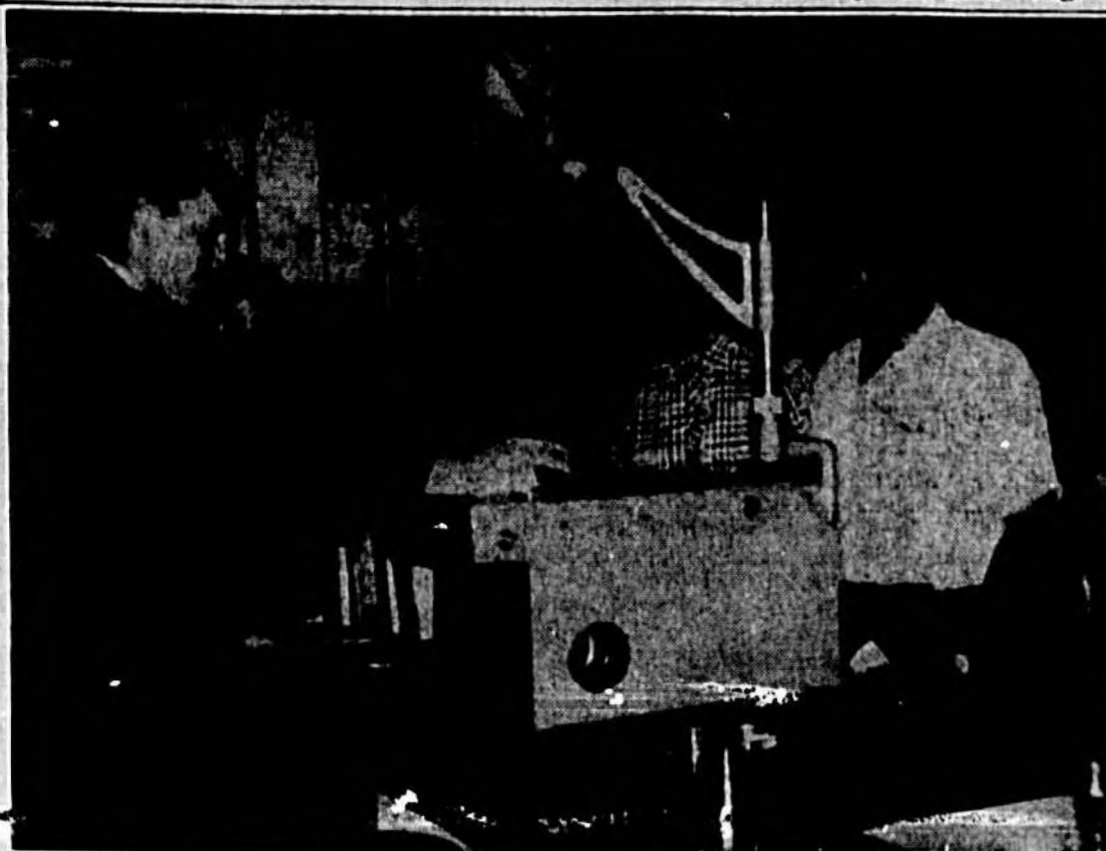

### SHS Parents Go Back To School

The Seminole High School auditorium was well-filled last Thursday with 250 parents of SHS students who came to meet their children's teachers and school personnel and progress through a brief duplication of their child's school schedule.

Principal Andrew Bracken introduced school personnel and parents then proceeded to ten minute classes, with their schedule cards in hand.

Parents who were in charge of giving out the schedule cards and maps at the door were Mrs. J. E. Terwilliger for the seniors, Mrs. Fred Williams for the juniors, Mrs. O. A. Barks for the sophomores and Mrs. Michael Coalo for the freshmen.

In the classrooms the teachers called the roll for each period and briefly outlined what material is taught in each class, including the use of library, audio-visual aids, supplementary reading and field trips.

They explained homework, projects, term papers, oral reports and testing. Also the textbooks, workbooks, magazines and papers used for basic instruction were shown.

# List Primary, Secondary Paving Jobs

County Engineer Carlton Bliss outlined to the County Commission today an anticipated five year primary and secondary road program to cost an estimated \$2 million in paving-of way and construction.

The top priority in the primary program is SR 46 from Mellonville to French Ave. while the top secondary project in the program is Bear Lake Road.

Bliss, in presenting the program, emphasized that "this should help you to fill in the missing links in the county's road program which was adopted last week and to answer some of the criticisms which have been cast at the program."

Recommendations, according to Bliss, are for existing primary and secondary roads and for those new links which will serve to relieve rapidly-developing congestion or fulfill new demands on our road system brought about by the impact of Interstate 4.

Primary project rights of way were estimated at \$525,000 and secondary rights of way and construction at \$1,555,000.

Top priority projects include SR 46, Mellonville to French Ave.; SR 436, Red Bug Rd. to Orange County Line; SR 426, Orange County Line to SR 46; and SR 46, Interstate 4 to Wokiva River.

Secondary projects include Bear Lake Rd.; 25th St. to S-46-A and Grapeville Spur; SR 415, city limits to Cameron Ave.; S-431, SR 436 to Orange County Line; S-427, Hwy. 17-92 to Ginderville; S-13, Econokatchee Bridge to SR 426; S-15, SR 46 to Interstate 4; S-15, Lake Mary to S-46A; S-425 to Grapeville Ave.; S-427, ACL to Hwy. 17-92; S-13-Brumley Rd. to SR 419; S-15-S-46-A to SR 46; Winder Park Drive, SR 436 to Seminole Blvd.; S-13, S-427 to Hwy. 17-92; S-431, S-46-A to Longwood-Markham Rd.; Seminole Blvd., S-427 to Winder Park Drive; Wokiva Springs Rd., S-431 to Orange County Line; Orange Blvd., SR 46 to Interstate 4; Longwood-Markham Rd., S-431 to Douglas Ave.

The Red China issue was behind the applications of Outer Mongolia and Mauritania for General Assembly membership. A third application, from Sierra Leone, appeared certain to be recommended favorably to the assembly.

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The proposed Atlantic-to-Gulf waterway across Florida has become a "must" because of the location of a federal space laboratory in Texas, a moon rocket fabrication plant in Louisiana and the U. S. "moonport" in Florida, said Randolph Hodges, Florida conservation director in Tallahassee today.

His pronouncement followed the approval by a Congressional conference committee yesterday of \$195,000 for pre-construction planning of the Florida canal.

The money will pay for an up-to-date cost and value estimate of the proposed canal, but will go beyond the limited survey proposed by the House. An additional \$205,000 would be needed to complete pre-construction planning of the project, estimated to cost about

\$173 million altogether. Holland explained the bill approved by the conference committee specifically prohibits the appropriation from becoming any automatic assurance for eventual construction of the canal.

The canal would stretch 165 miles from near Jacksonville on the Atlantic coast to Yankeetown on the Gulf coast.

The project's backers, however, emphasized this was no guarantee the canal will be built.

"It may or may not be constructed, it is not a commitment," said Sen. E. Bessard Holland, (D-Fla.).

The conference committee also earmarked \$13,750 million for the Central and Southern Florida Flood Control District and \$1 million for an intercoastal waterway between the Caloosahatchee and Anclote rivers.

Holland and other members of a Senate-House conference committee approved Monday the full \$195,000 requested by President Kennedy and Florida backers of the project for pre-construction planning.

The House had voted only \$50,000 for a new economic study of the long-awaited canal. By incorporating both House and Senate views in the appropriation bill, however, the conference committee assured passage in both houses.

Since the bridge at the west end of Lake Monroe maintains a vertical clearance of 45 feet and a 100-foot channel clearance, we request that you urge the plans of the proposed bridge be equal to the criteria of the bridge now being completed.

# Major Swim-Wear Firm To Build Plant Here

The first factory for the mass production of swim suits in Florida will be built in Sanford with construction to start in the late fall by the firm of Alix of Miami, Inc., internationally known swimwear manufacturer.
