B-r-race for cold! Is it fair to blame the rain on El Nino?

SANFORD Aware Seminole County managers had outdoor team building exercises planned for Thursday, fire chief/department meteorologist Terry Schenk forecasted foul weather early on Wednesday

The exercises were called off.

Few people hereabouts were whistling or singing 'Oh, What a Beautiful Morning And there may be more bleak mornings to follow the area in for a wetter and chill ier winter season. Not necessarily severe freezes but general temperatures couler

than normal. It's going to be cold weekend for Seminole County residents - temperatures dropping to the mid-30s overnight on Saturday and Sunday. Highs will be in the mid-50s.

Some may choose to blame the conditions on El Nino, a change in the weather pattern in the Pacific Ocean that has worldwide impact.

Two months ago, Schenk issued a significant event alert that predicted this would be a wetter winter than normal inthe county.

It was appropriate, he said, to take a setious look at the potential impact of a strong El Nino on Seminole County Previ-

ous El Ninos - occurring in 1972 and 1983 imparted weather across the nation including Florida and Seminole County. The current El Nino was strong enough

for Schenk to lorecast: I) a cooler winter than normal.

2) a wetter winter than normal

3) a more active and severe spring storm season

I) less hurricane activity. 5) less wildlire activity than normal. 'It's hard to attribute what's happening

SANFORD Helping people stay off state assistance has become the inteston of a local businessman, who gave away 21 cars during a special event Wednesday

Urtan Menzies, Jounder of Charity Cars. stockpiles donated used cars, which he repairs and then gives to welfare. recipients with the understanding that they will get jobs within 30 days.

If the recipients go back on welfare or it they are convicted on a drunk-driving charge, the cars, which come with a threeyear lien, are repossessed. Average age on the cars given away is 10 years old.

Menzies has received national attention for his program which he began about a year ago. So far he has given away 60 cars and plans to give out another 300 within the next year. CASSELBERRY - Do you dream of surfing the net? Navtgating the web? But you don't have a computer? Well, thanks to the Seminole County Public Library, now you don't need one. Monday, Dec. I, the Seminole County Library System officially went on-line. They celebrated at the Central Branch Library in Casselberry with an open house.

Seminole On Line didn't happen overnight. The library system has been planning this for almost 3 years. Librarians have been training to use and assist patrons with the system for more than 2 years. Anyone who walks into a Seminole County Library doesn't even have to know how to use a computer. The staff can walk you through every step of using the system.

"We've learned from the mistakes of other library systems." said Suzy Chapman, Technical Support Services Manager. The Seminole County Library computers are laid out in a triangle, near the reference desks. And each has a privacy screen. In other libraries, the computers are side by side without

privacy screens, so it doesn't matter if you're looking up genes or genealogy. YOUR neighbor can see what you're doing.

Computer access is only mildly restricted at the Seminole County Libraries. Because of time constraints, the system doesn't allow chat rooms, musie downloads or logging on to other computers from the library system. For logistical reasons, it doesn't allow direct e-mail. Otherwise, "people should make their own decisions on what to access," according to Jean Rhein, Director of Library and Leisure Services. By not attempting to police access to the Internet, Seminole is saving time, money, and quite a few headaches.

Another great feature is the timer. If a patron leaves the terminal, it returns to the library system after one minute. A great feature for people who forget to log off.

The invention of the printing press? It was a revolutionary event which opened up the world of the written word to the masses. Library access to the Internet is just as revolutionary in opening access to information for everyone, according to See Online, Page 3A

MIDWAY The Seminole County Medical Examiner conducted an autopsy Wednesday on the body of 35 -year- old James Campbell, 2430 Dolarway, Midway: Campbell was shot and killed about 11 p.m. Tuesday.

According to the sheriff's Public Information Officer Ed McDonough, the Sheriff's Office received a 9-1-1 call shortly after 11 p.m. Tuesday that a manhad been shot and was lying on the front porch of a home at 2371 Dolarway in Midway. When Seminole County deputy sheriffs arrived at the house. they found Campbell in a pool of blood. He had no vital signs. The house is owned by 48-

and Campbell had been dating until last April. Young told Shertif's Office linvestigators that Campbell has been threatening her since the breakup of their relationship

McDonough said shortly be-fore 11 p.m. Tuesday, Campbell came to 2371 Dolarway. He stood on the front porch and spoke with Young through the screened window. Young claims Campbell began threatening her with physical violence. When Campbell attempted to enter the house through the window, Mc-Donough said Young fired a 12 gauge shotgun blast at him. Campbell was hit in the chest.

The incident is under investigation by the Sheriff's Office Major Crimes Section. There are no charges against Young at this time.

Injured eagles recover, to be released into wild

MAITLAND-Two Bald Eagles that have recovered from their injuries after receiving treatment at Florida Audubon's Center for Birds of Prey are to be released today, pending weather. One eagle was recovered in Pasco County, while the other was recovered in

Joe Bob, the eagle recovered in Pasco, was originally admitted to the Center in April 1995 suffering from a gunshot wound. It took over a year of rehabilitation before he recovered enough to be banded and released. In October 1997, a witness saw Joe Bob involved in a territorial fight, his talons embedded in another eagle's

chest. When they separated the other cagle flew away and Joe Bob was recovered and admitted to the center. There are no recorded nests in the area, so the interlude may have been an effort to establish new territory. Joe Bob was treated for a fracture of the left radius, and recovered quickly.

Bald Eagle #567-97, recovcred in Highlands, had minor wounds and a tail injury of unknown origin. Another eagle has been witnessed returning to the area nightly, vocalizing and then flying away.

The center is renown for its expertise in rehabilitating cagles, hawk, owl, falcons, and other birds of prey. This year, a record number of birds have

Floridians say yes to **Everglades tag**

TALIAHASSEE - The Everglades Foundation. the education arm of the Save Our Everglades organizations, and the South Florida Water Management District announced Tuesday they had gathered almost double the number of signatures required to have the Florida Legislature approve the sale of an Everglades Specialty License Flate during next year's legislative session.

The response was overwhelming. We collected over 18,000 signatures in less than 90 days," said Foundation chair Mary Barley. "Everglades restoration is a critical issue to the people of Florida.*

Estimated revenues from license plate sales could exceed \$3 million a year. Proceeds from plate sales will be a continuous source of funding for the Everglades Trust Fund, administered by the South Florida Water Management District.

The Everglades Trust fund, established by voters last year, will use the moneys generated from plate sales to support Everglades restoration efforts and to heighten public awareness of this significant resource.



Many of you will remember when downtown Sanford looked like this. This aerial view was taken circa 1955 and shows several

buildings that are no longer there. Many and varied performances were held in the bandshell (built in 1924); the yacht club, also built out into the lake, was used for dances and civic club meetings among other things; and the Municipal Zoo was a favorite attraction remembered by people from all over the country. City Hall (built in 1925), next to the 200, had an auditorium upstairs used for various performances and was the Celery Craie, a gathering place for SHS teenagers

during the 1940's and 1950's. Behind city hall is the city jail (built in 1926)

Across Park Avenue to the Seminole County Courthouse, built in 1913, and across Commercial Street from it is the Valdez Hotel. my other buildings are recognizable such as Chase and Company at Second and Oak and First Presbyterian Church at Third and Oak.





Suzy Chapman. You don't need a \$2,000 computer. All you need is a free library card.

The total coat of the system was \$360,000, most of which was provided by the State Aid to Libraries. The Friends of the Library of Seminole County contributed \$75,000 and paid for the reception that was held on Dec. 1. Seminole County is already saving money with the new system. The Central branch now communicates with the North branch using the county net, saving \$600 a month in telephone services.

Federal government publications were once a major expense for the library system. Some of the publications, like the U.S. Code, were purchased just for the Central branch, but some, such as the Occupational Outlook Handbook, had to be purchased for each library branch. All those publications are now accessible through the internet, saving money and shelf space.

So, what if someone hacks into the library computer system? No problem says Jerry Tate, Computer Services Coordinator. The system is set up so that if any terminal is "backed" into, it can be easily reloaded. And the current system is expandable. Additional terminals could be added as the need arises and the money is made available. (A terminal costs around \$1800.)

From a child's point of view, the internet is learning made fun. A special kid's page can take children to dinosaurs, holidays, crafts or any number of topics they might find exciting or useful for school. Need help with homework? Britannia On Line, funded by the state, is an on-line encyclopedia.



Space heaters are probably the leading cause of fires during the winter months, according to Jim Ledbetter, director of the Seminole County Service Center of the American Red Cross of Central Florida. We start to see many more fires when the cold starts," Ledbetter said. "People are turning on space heaters and

that seems to be a leading of fires during the cold season." Ledbetter's office deals with the aftermath of many such fires which often leave people homeless and without food or clothing. Disaster volunteers from the Red Cross are alerted by the fire department after the fire and when people need

help. We determine the emergency needs which could range from anything to finding a family a temporary home to providing food and clothing," he said. "If they have no resources then we assist them."

To date this year the Red Cross in Seminole County has assisted 24 displaced families. 11 of these were in Sanford. "Weise been very jucky be-

cause there haven't been any deaths," he said. Ledbetter said people needed

to be extra careful with space heaters and fireplaces this weekend and keep flammables away from heat sources. He suggested residents keep chimneys clean and get regular inspections because build ups could cause chimney fires.

A Sanford family of five found themselves homeless following an early November fire caused

Fire Department. The puppy, whose barking woke the father, was the unsung hero in all this," Robles said.

Based on his investigation. Robles said the fire started with a space heater in the family room where the children were sleeping. However, he said, it's not the appliance alone that causes fires. Leaving the space heaters unattended and close to combustibles is what leads to the fires, particularly in Sanford.

Because of the all the older homes that may not have central heating, space heaters are a quick fix when it starts to get cold, he said.

There's no moisture and ma-

terials such as drapertes and blankets and furniture begin to heat up," he said, "Leaving the heaters too close to these items is the problem."

Robles said people must have accountability when using space heaters and pay attention. Smoke detectors are another deterrent and very effec-tive in preventing full blown fires.

Depending on how cold it stays after this weekend, Robies said there will probably be about five fires reported in the county through January.

"You can't really predict these things," he said. "We could have two this weekend. It all depends."

In 18 of the 22 El Nino eventa since 1875, Florida has had above normal precipitation in the October through March time frame. In the 1983 event, South Florida recorded three times the normal rainfall.

The most ominous part of a strong El Nino event for Florida, Schenk said, is the potential for severe storms that can form in late winter and spring. One of the positive impacts

that result from strong El Ninos are that the Atlantic Hurricane season gets shut down. Strong westerly winds result in a shearing environment which basically keeps tropical cymm (clones.
