## Controversial school site may be dumped

#### Confrontation alternatives

Lt. P.J. Miller of the Orlando Police Department and the GFWC Semoran Jr. Woman's Club, a nonprofit community service club, are offering a free program to help women of all ages in the event of a physical confrontation.

#### WalkAmerica

Seminole Community College, again this year, is the site of the Seminole County March of Dimes WalkAmerica. Four thousand Central Floridians participate in the Walk against birth defects each year; 25 percent of those will be walking with Seminole Community College.

According to Kris Faren, community director for the March of Dimes, 800 community members representing 50 teams will be lacing up their shoes this Saturday to help the March of Dimes in their journey toward the eradication of all birth defects.

"Serving this great community and helping to meet the many needs of such a diverse area is what SCC is all about," said SCC President E. Ann McGee. "Hosting this worthwhile event serves to emphasize that 'community' truly is our middle name."

SEMINOLE COUNTY - School Board members today will consider another site for a middle school to be built in Oviedo after one member raised safety concerns, backed by an opinion from the head of the state health department.

The board had been scheduled to make a recommendation on the purchase of a 35-acre site near the Iron Bridge Water Reclamation Facility. A special exception to build on the site had been denied by Seminole County's Board of Adjustment and an appeal had been filed by school officials, with the Board of County Commissioners.

Commissioner Grant Maloy said today the school board had asked for a continuance on the appeal and Chairman Barbara Kuhn confirmed that the board would be considering a new site at school board meeting scheduled for 3:30 p.m.

The district owns 60 acres

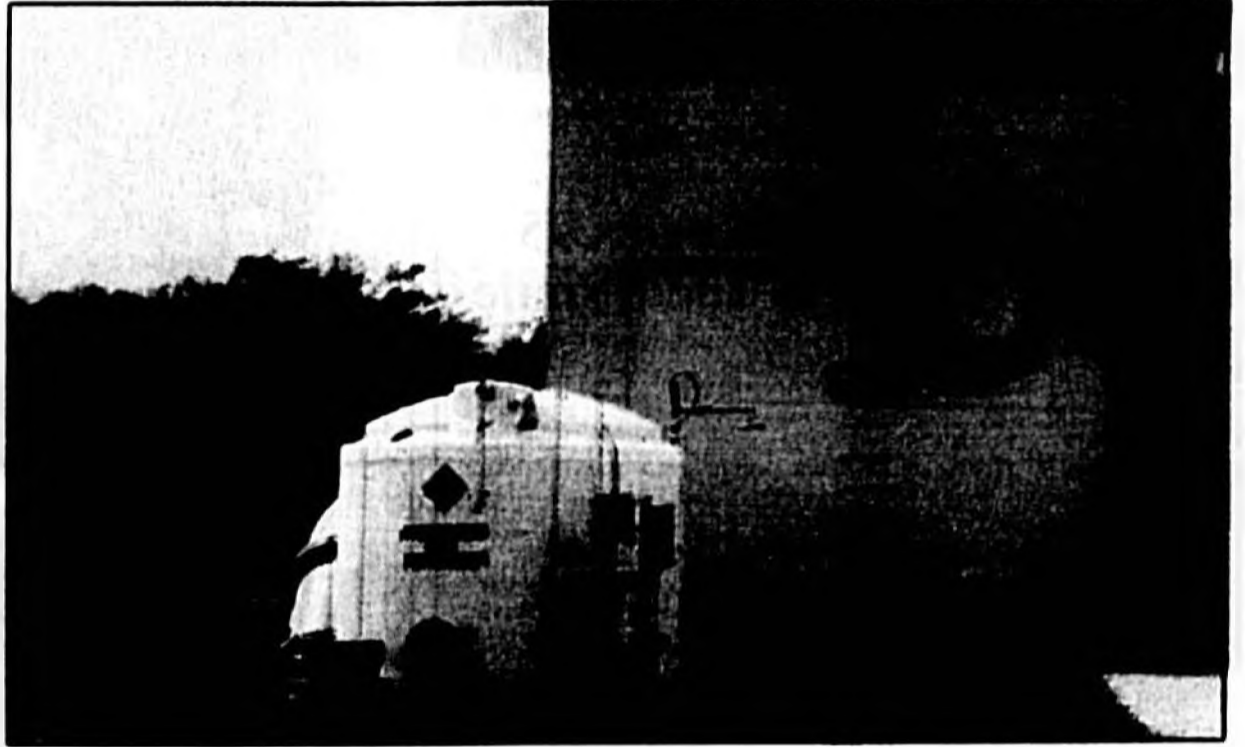
across from Carrillon Elementary on Lockwood Boulevard in Oviedo. The site had been earmarked for a future high school, but is now being considered as an option for a middle school, needed to relieve crowding at Jackson Heights Middle School.

The plan to build at Iron Bridge was attractive to the district's facilities planning department because the site could accommodate two schools and reduce much of the cost of building. "We had a chance to get the...property at a good price," said Kuhn.

While questions had been raised about the safety of building so close to a site where hazardous chemicals are stored, Kuhn said she was very confident, concluding from her own investigation, that the site was safe. "We had all the bases covered."

School Board member Bob Goff raised the safety issues, including traffic concerns, and the cost of busing a majority of the children into the two

## Jury: Husband guilty of wife's murder

SANFORD - After deliberating for 4 1/2 hours, a jury found carpet layer Michael Stoll, 36, of Sanford guilty of first degree murder of his wife, 35-year-old Julie Stoll, in Nov. 1994.

He will be sentenced to either life in prison or death by electrocution when the jurors return on April 21.

Julie Stoll was found dead Nov. 3, 1994, the victim of a series of attacks that left her neck broken and larynx crushed.

According to co-defendant

Christopher Stewart, 23, who was the state's star witness, Julie Stoll survived five murder attempts that morning only to succumb to the sixth - a knee pressed to the back of her neck that caused her to choke to death.

Stewart got a reduced sentence - 50 years - because he agreed to testify against Stoll, and admits he was the one who choked the last breath from Stoll's wife by pressing his knee against the back of her neck. But he claimed throughout that it was Stoll who was the master-mind of murder.

## Adult club busted, 18 dancers, customers jailed

CASSELBERRY - The City County Investigative Bureau arrested 18 people who were in violation of the Casseberry ordinance on adult entertainment.

Undercover agents went into the Rachel's World Class Mens' Club located at 401 State Road 438 Friday, April 10, to look for any possible violations. The agents watched as several of the club's dancers performed various lap dances in which touching was involved or some

other inappropriate contact. Altogether, 13 dancers were arrested and five customers. The ordinance equally applies to dancers as much as customers. Police have not yet released all the names of those arrested. The preliminary list includes:

## FAA objects to Sanford water treatment plan

SANFORD - Opposition has been noted in Sanford plans for a proposed water treatment facility to be located in the southeast corner of the Orlando Sanford Airport. The suggested plant has been touted as being the best solution the city would have for treating wastewater and helping reduce problems caused by street flooding during heavy rainstorms.

With the utilization of airport property in mind, the city has been developing the plan which would extend water lines

and phase in sewage treatment in the East Lake Mary Boulevard and southeast Airport area. Now however, the city says the Federal Aviation Authority (FAA) is objecting.

The matter was brought up during a Sanford City Commission work session Monday afternoon.

"The FAA is objecting to our plans," said City Manager Bill Simmons. "They want us to have the facility no closer than two miles from the airport."

Simmons said that the FAA may control the aviation aspects to a certain degree but the city still owns the land on

## Fire trashes garbage truck

A City of Sanford garbage truck has gone out in a blaze of glory. The truck was destroyed Friday after some of the items picked up during the daily run, ignited within the unit. Public Works Director Jerry Herman indicated the fire may possibly be started by some burning sawdust which had been loaded shortly before the fire was first seen. The incident occurred when the truck was near U.S. Highway 17-92 on Santa Barbara. When smoke was first detected, the truck was pulled onto a vacant lot where the items were to have been dumped. But the flames apparently ignited other items immediately behind the cab and the blaze was unable to be contained in time to prevent major damage.

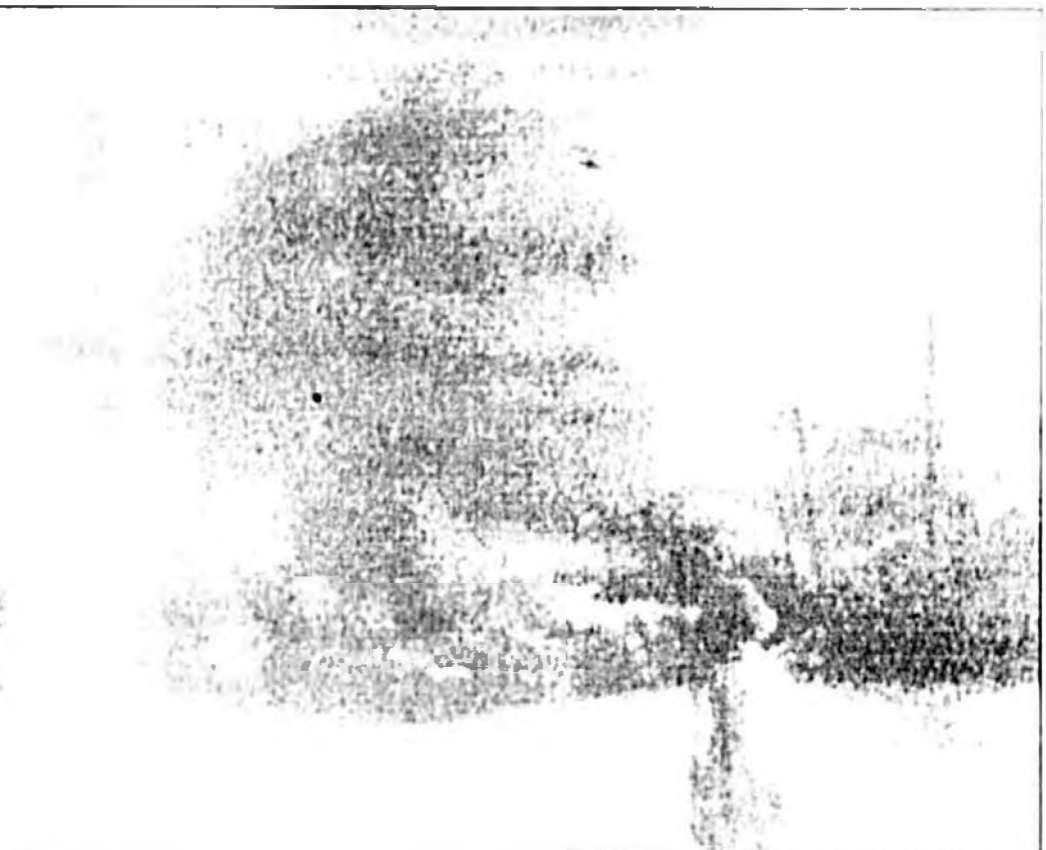

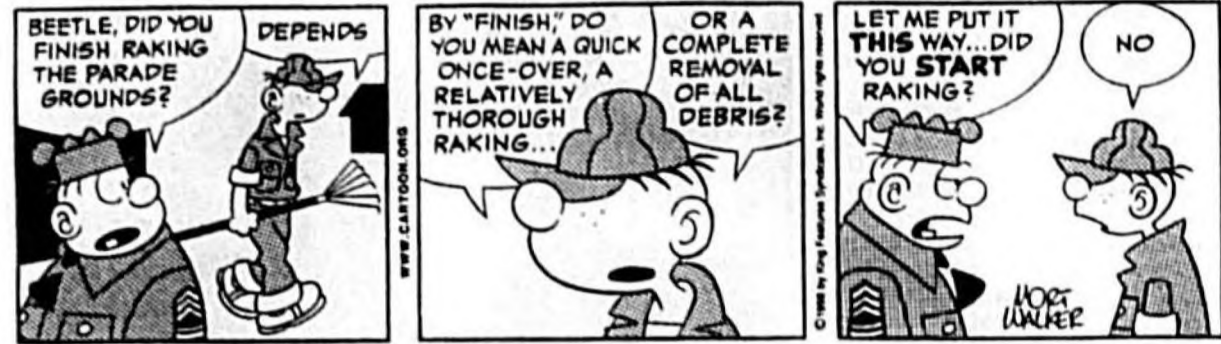

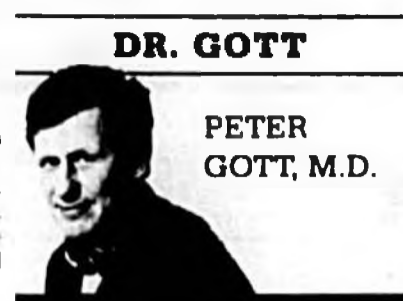

Heed the warning of breast cancer

DEAR DR. GOTT: I'm a 34-year-old mother of two. After discovering a pea-sized lump in my right breast two years ago, I had a mammogram. The X-rays showed a cluster of calcifications in the lump, but my doctor did not recommend biopsy. Instead, he said that I should have annual mammograms. Because my aunt died of breast cancer at age 40, I am worried. Should I be?



DEAR DR. GOTT: Without a doubt, breast cancer runs in families and the fact that your relative died at an early age of the disease places you at high risk.

Doctors usually diagnose breast cancer in mammograms by the type and distribution of calcium deposits. While yours may be entirely benign, mammograms are sometimes difficult to interpret. Therefore, I urge you to take your X-ray films to a radiologist who specializes in diagnosing breast cancers. You need a second opinion and, perhaps, a biopsy. Don't procrastinate. Breast cancer is curable if discovered early. The presence of a cluster of calcifications in your mammogram may be a wake-up call. Let me know the outcome of your consultation.

DEAR DR. GOTT: I suffer from high cholesterol levels. I take medications, follow a lowfat diet and exercise. Do you know of any tricks that might further reduce my cholesterol?

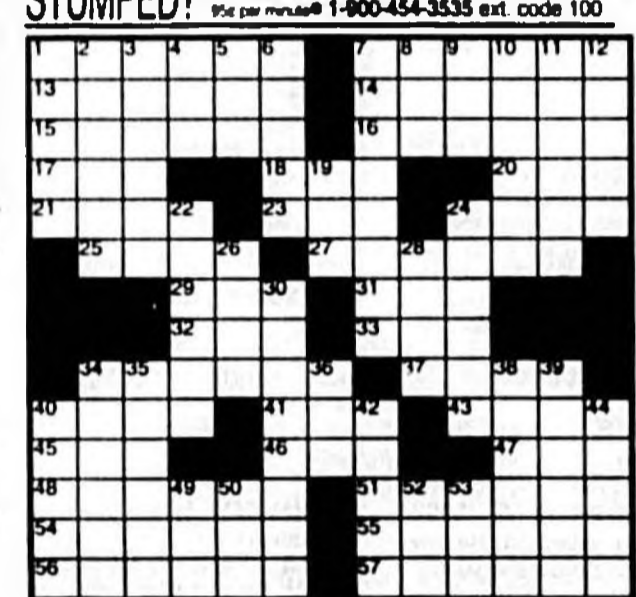
DEAR READER: Psyllium enriched fiber products and breakfast cereals (Metamucil, Bran Buds and others) may, when taken regularly, lower cholesterol levels.

In a recent study in the Journal of Nutrition, researchers reported that such products can reduce cholesterol levels by as much as 9 percent. With this datum in mind, I've altered my breakfast menu and found that the change is quite acceptable. Five days a week, I combine Bran Buds and Mueslix. The dried breakfast cereals (when eaten with skim milk) are quite flavorful and have reduced my cholesterol by more than 20 points. In conjunction with a lowfat diet, this appears to be a reasonable option.

WIN AT BRIDGE

Three choices, two winners

Abba Eban, the former foreign minister of Israel, claimed, "History teaches us that men and nations behave wisely once they have exhausted all the other alternatives." In bridge, though, you normally face few alternatives, so try to consider them all. In today's deal, you reach four spades after East has overcalled in clubs. East takes the first two tricks with top clubs, West discarding a low heart. Now comes a third club honor. What should you do? To jump-raise spades immediately promises four or more trumps. So, North must go through a two-step routine with only three trumps. South, with better than a minimum opening, should rebid three diamonds. Don't re-

bid in your first suit without six unless you have nothing else to do. You seem to have only three losers: one heart and two clubs. Yet there is a danger of a trump loser as well. You have three choices at trick three: ruff high, ruff low or discard. The best play is the last: Throw a low heart (or diamond). If East persists with a fourth club, discard again, letting dummy ruff (or overruff West). Alternatively, if East switches, win and trump trumps. To keep your trump holding intact, you have traded your heart loser for another club loser. With this layout, if you ruff low at trick three, you go down. West overruffs, and you must lose a later heart trick. But you can succeed by ruffing high. Your 10 tricks will be four top spades, two hearts, three diamonds, and a diamond ruff in hand. History teaches us that the loser-on-loser play is overlooked by almost everyone.

## Spring turkey season opens

SANFORD - Spring turkey season just opened and wildlife managers in the state's central zone are anticipating a good harvest again this year on public wildlife management areas (WMAs).

Last year hunters seeking the elusive spring gobbler on WMAs in Central Florida bagged 26 percent more turkeys than during the 1996 season. In all, 302 turkeys were checked in at the 14 areas open for spring turkey hunting in 1997, as compared to 222 from 13 areas in 1996.

"Although the harvest figures were slightly down in a couple of areas, most of the wildlife management areas showed increased numbers," said Mike Abbott, regional wildlife biologist for the Florida Game and Fresh Water Fish Commission (GFC).

Spring turkey season opened on March 21 and hunting continues through April 26 on private lands and on many WMAs. Although quota hunt permits are required in order to hunt on many management areas, several do not require quota permits, but hunters between the ages of 16 and 64 will need to purchase a hunting license, a WMA stamp and a wild turkey stamp. Non-residents ages 16 and older need all the same permits.

There are six areas across portions of Central Florida open for turkey hunting through April 26 that do not require quota permits: **Bull Creek WMA**, **Fort McCoy WMA**, **Georgia Pacific WMA**, **Jumper Creek WMA**, **Relay WMA**, and **Three Lakes WMA**. In **Richloam WMA** quota permits are required for the first nine days only after that it's open to all comers. The areas indicated in bold print have been identified by GFC turkey biologists as having some of the best opportunities in the state.

The biggest increase in numbers of turkeys taken between the 1996 and 1997 seasons was in Three Lakes WMA in Osceola County where 68 were harvested in 1997 as compared to 42 in 1996. In Bull Creek WMA, also located in Osceola County, hunters took 71 turkeys in 1997 as compared to 49 taken in 1996.

"This indicates that some of our management practices are working to produce more turkeys, giving hunters a greater opportunity for success. This is supported not only by the numbers, but also by the fact that although hunting pressure-the numbers of hunters out there-increased only 10 percent in 1997, 26 percent more birds were taken," said Abbott.

Areas that require quota permits but where certain exemptions are permitted are: Caravelle, Flying Eagle and Seminole Ranch. In addition, the following five areas require quota permits and there are NO exemptions allowed, meaning everyone hunting there must have a quota permit: Half Moon, Prairie Lakes, Seminole Forest, Tosohatchee and Ocala/Lake Delaney Unit. There are also two special opportunity turkey hunts areas that require a special permit to hunt and NO exceptions are allowed: Dexter/Mary Farms Unit of Lake George WMA and Triple N Ranch.

Hunt maps and regulations are available at county tax collector's offices and GFC's regional office in Ocala. Hunting licenses and stamps may be purchased at county tax collector's offices or their subagents, or by calling 1-888-HUNT-FLORIDA and using a major credit card.

"Anyone planning to hunt in a management area should pick up a copy of the area regulations since WMAs differ in what sort of firearms may be used, as well as what days they're open," said Joy M. Hill, GFC's public information coordinator.

### SHUPE'S SCOOP

Turkeys have outstanding eyesight, and any movement on the part of the hunter will send them scampering for cover.

### FISHING FORECAST

Bass fishing is still tough due to high water levels. Stick to local lakes for the best action. Shiners are still producing most of the larger bass. Fishing is almost impossible in the river as fish are scattered everywhere.

Snook are hitting at Sebastian Inlet. The best bait is a large live shrimp fished on a bare lead head jig. Work the weighted shrimp around rocky structure for sure strikes. Use

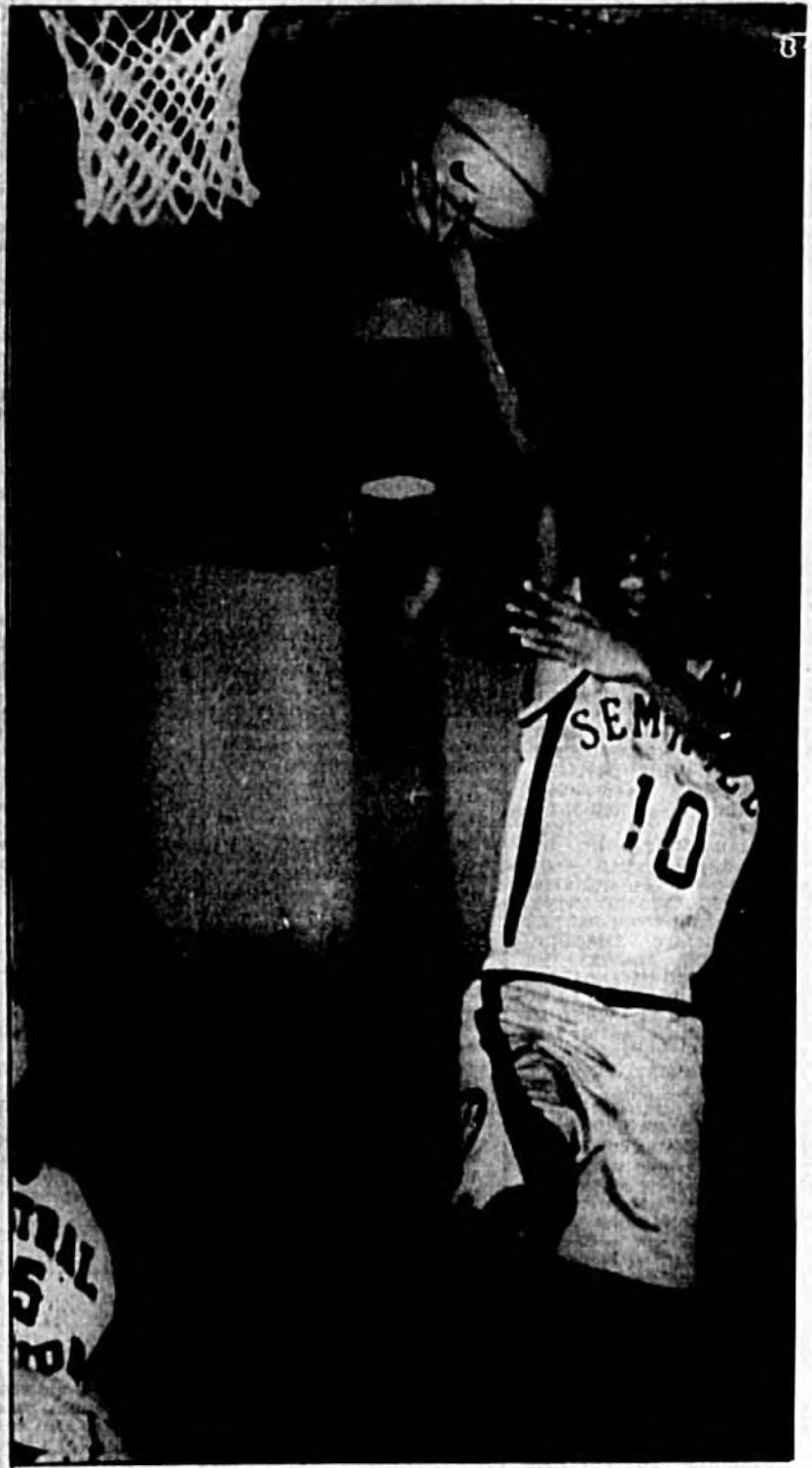

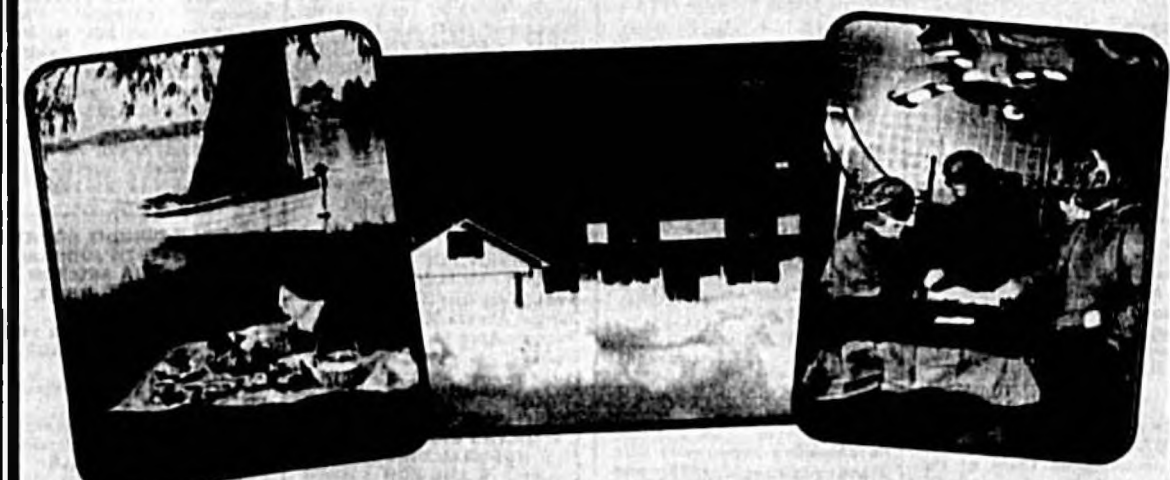
