**Courthouse Add Financing Told**

Increase in allocation for capital improvements of 4 mill will be necessary for at least four years under the plan given internal approval by three members of the Board of County Commissioners today for financing of the proposed courthouse jail addition.

The three members, including Commissioners John Alexander, Edward Yarborough, and Robert Parker, voted preferences for the 20-year period for financing as the best of three alternatives presented by D. Kirk Gimby, fiscal agent.

Gimby's report showed millage necessary for the financing would be 3 mill for four years, 4 mill for three years, 5 mill for four years and 5 mill (the current amount being levied) for five remaining years in the life of the bond issue.

Interest rate to be charged, according to Gimby's estimate, would be 4 1/2 per cent. Principal of the issue would be \$2.9 million and \$1,863,078 for interest.

Calculations of estimated millages were based upon 85 per cent collection of ad valorem taxes in each year.

The fiscal agent said the bond issue could not be validated in less than 90 days and suggested the board make bond contracts bid returnable for the same date.

It was also brought out that the county already has \$28,737 in capital reserve fund from current 3 mill levy and will receive an additional \$19,000 in fiscal 1968 for the special fund. This reduced money needed for the courthouse complex from the original \$3.2 million to \$2.9 million.

Commissioner John Fitzpatrick made it clear that if the financing plan is "formally adopted, it does not necessarily mean taxes will be increased. "The money can come from other sources to compensate," Fitzpatrick said.

# Politics, That Is!

## STEP RIGHT UP FOLKS—TAKE YOUR CHOICE



Primary elections are coming. In what state will be considered the opening of a year of such events which will influence the shape of the city, county, state and nation—in fact, the world—in which they will live for years to come.

Following the Second Primary on May 25th, the citizens will have been made aware of the party of the Democratic and Republican parties for the year and the names of those who will contend for the office in the general election on Nov. 5.

There it might be helpful to give some consideration now to ways in which some of the political activity may be witnessed out and about the state.

When the counting of votes is over, the candidates have expanded all the sound and fury of their campaigns, and the voters are left with a choice of candidates to elect. It is a choice of candidates to elect. It is a choice of candidates to elect.

We would state again, however, that in this election year, events alone are of sufficient gravity to those who will be elected and who will emerge as President of the United States for the four years starting in 1961.

Yet there will be the contrary, the sounding of high principles with which most can agree and then the really important phase of the campaign takes over.

However, it can be conceded, waxes peaceful in each party the road to be followed is—in many ways obscure. The voter will need to be alert to discover for himself where the road of high purpose is to be followed and the more the path to peace is mapped out.

No candidate will advocate crime or violence, but this is another issue which will be defined by the actions of each presidential aspirant. It takes place in the summer months, his way to cope with any challenge to law by mobs, his means of striking at the causes of such happenings, his attitude toward the "foggy" and mysterious—should be taken into consideration.

Among the Democrats—Vice President Hubert H. Humphrey and Senator Robert F. Kennedy and Eugene McCarthy—it will be illuminating to see how much or how little of the Johnson administration policies will be supported. Already the Democratic campaign has been muddled by the dislocation of positions which took place when President Johnson forewent partisan politics for himself and removed himself as candidate for a second elected term.

Republicans have, indeed, presented a ragtime of political music. In the background there has been the persistent and inevitable desire of former Vice President Richard M. Nixon for one more chance as GOP presidential standard-bearer, playing the kind of music that neither aroused or offended.

The vacillating position of Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller of New York—finally an independent candidate—has done nothing to provide the substantial background that his record in governmental affairs could provide. He will be watched with critical eyes as his approach to issues becomes clarified.

So we have the national political picture to keep in mind as we get down to brass tacks in our state and our city. More on these when the First Primary has become official history.

## Communist Failure in Laos

VIETNAM, Laos, (NEA)—All U.S. presidential candidates should be required to replace the military men and civilian functionaries they've lost through death, injury and desertion.

The native people in the Red-occupied areas of Laos have been moving out by the tens of thousands. "The longer the North Vietnamese stay in an area," says one former Pathet Lao official, "the more anti-Communists we have there."

It might give them new perspectives, eliminate some of the unrealistic theories some are expounding.

Despite their current military victories in Laos, here, at least, Ho Chi Minh's North Vietnamese Communists seem to be their own worst enemies.

By sabotaging the coalition government of which they were a part, the Communists have won the enmity of left-leaning Souvanna Phouma and have forced him to turn more and more to the United States for support. Originally suspicious of U. S. intentions, Souvanna Phouma's confidence in and respect for this country has been growing steadily. He is no longer a Red.

The North Vietnamese armies now barely make a pretense that there's a civil war in Laos. It is an open, cynical, colonial invasion.

The fighting is done with North Vietnamese troops. The quality and morale of the Pathet Lao army units has sunk so low both the North Vietnamese and the Laos people regard them with disdain. North Vietnamese openly give orders to Pathet Lao puppet administrators. Many key Pathet Lao officials are North Vietnamese who have taken Lao names.

## Indiana Blue-Collar Vote

INDIANAPOLIS (NEA)—Sen. Robert F. Kennedy's decision to return to his blue-collar areas in Hammond, Michigan and Indianapolis in the final campaign days may have broken the May 7 Indiana primary battle wide open.

The sectors involved a two-neighborhood where blue-collar workers, most often Catholic, had long been near the European heritage, live close to Negroes. They are supposed to be "prime back-bench" voters, and were assumed to be cool if not unfriendly to Kennedy in his race against favorite son, Gov. Hugh Bradley. But his speech in Hammond and his visit to Indianapolis in the campaign of 1960.

"We were surprised," says one close Kennedy aide. "That's why we decided to go back to Hammond and a few similar places at the last minute and work the vote. That's why we went down East 10th Street in Indianapolis."

The aide said Kennedy had been told beforehand that the area in question would be cold to him because of his strong hold on the growing Negro population. In the case of Hammond, he was, in fact, advised to stay out of the very spots where people swarmed out.

Street crowds are not, of course, voters. But it is no longer merely a vague Kennedy hope that he may win Indiana's northern Lake County, whose industrial cities of Gary, East Chicago and Hammond were first portrayed as sure Brannigan territory.

If Kennedy wins or comes close in Lake, a sweep for him in Indiana is a foregone conclusion. With late April polls already showing him around the 45 per cent mark and leading both

## Congress vs. Supreme Court

In some cases, Congress can overcome the effect of particular decisions by statutory enactment, especially when spelling out the intent of Congress. Also, in the opinion of many constitutional lawyers, Congress could by simple statute establish an age limit for mandatory retirement. Such a law would not necessarily affect the court's philosophy, but it would open up fresh opportunities for control by confirmation.

Other controls would require constitutional amendment. One such amendment could set additional qualifications for Supreme Court Justices, such as a requirement that candidates have had at least five years service in the high-level trial court in a state or on a court with appellate jurisdiction. This would limit membership on the Supreme Court to "experienced judges and prevent purely political appointments.

Constitutional amendments also would be required to limit the term to a set period or to require periodic reconfirmation of Justices. Constitutional amendment can also be drawn to protect specific rights, such as in the fields of school prayer or legislative reapportionment.




I think this is a very good idea. It's one way to get some of the junk off the highways. We've always had a car inspection where we come from. However, I think it should be state operated.









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# GIs Join Saigon Fight

SAIGON (AP)—American tanks and armored personnel carriers joined the new battle of Saigon today, cutting off a Viet Cong attack from the southwest in the third day of hard fighting on the city's fringes.

U.S. troops had not been used inside Saigon since they helped smash the Viet Cong's lunar new year offensive in February. In the latest assault, which began Sunday, the Americans have been outside the capital searching the enemy units which might further threaten the city.

U. S. officers believed the 3,000 to 5,000 enemy soldiers who fought inside Saigon slipped into the city beforehand, the new action is a largely conventional attack from the outside.

The battle which started Monday in the old French military cemetery on the southwestern edge of Saigon, near the airport. In the latest assault, which began Sunday, the Americans have been outside the capital searching the enemy units which might further threaten the city.

U. S. officers reported one enemy force surrounded near Hue and others withdrawing from around Dong Ha after losing more than 1,000 men in six days of close quarter fighting.

The battle in southwest Saigon today began when an estimated 150 Viet Cong tried to push into the city attacked a South Vietnamese outpost near the Binh Doi Canal.

Armored personnel carriers from the U.S. 9th Infantry Division moved in to cut them off. The infantrymen reported killing 35 enemy soldiers, and five Americans were wounded.

The fighting subsided for a time, and the surviving Viet Cong made a break for the bridge across the canal and into the city. But a second company of 9th Division armored personnel carriers got to the bridge first and pushed the Viet Cong into a factory building.

South Vietnamese rangers took up blocking positions east of the factory, and the American armored force moved in on the trapped Viet Cong.

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




