

SANFORD - Ladies, you thought you had a tough labor? hist be thankful you're not a porcupine.

last week, the Central Florida Zoological Park celebrated the birth of Saby Doe Porcupine. (Actionally, the zookeepers do not nanie their animals so we will remember that the animals are not pets.) The baby is the first South African Crested Porcupine to be born in the zoo's new exhille.

The exhibit, which opened Dec. 20, is designed to emulate the natural habitat of the porcupines which are found in southern and central Africa.

According to Erin McCarty.

primate keeper for the 200, the new exhibit hopefully will promote even more successful captive breeding. The Central Florida Zoo is one of only a handful of facilities with a successful breeding program for the prickly creatures.

Baby porcupines are generally about 10 ounces at birth, with

soft short quilis. Within a shor, time, however, the quills stiffen and grow into a formidable defensive weapon. In the wild, they are able to defend themselves from predators such as lions and hyenas.

The porcupines can be seen at the Central Florida Zoological Park, which is located on U.S. Highway 17-92, just north of downtown Sanford.

Today is a big day in profes-sional boxing history. On Feb. 25, 1964, (my gosh, that's 33 years ago). Cassius Clay became heavyweight boxing champion of the world. He was 22 years of age when he defeated Sonny Liston.

Later changing his name to Muhammed Ali, he wa known for both his fighting ability and his style. His most famous saying ws. "I am the greatest!"

In 1967 he was convicted of violating the Selective Service Act and was stripped of his title for refusing to be inducted into the armed forces during the Vietnam War. He cited religious convictions however, and in 1971 the 115 Supreme Court reversed the conviction.

won the heavyweight boxintg title three separate times. He defended that title nine times. Now in failing health, he turned 55 years of age on Jan. 17.

Here's a tragedy. Today is the anniversary of the Hebron Massacre. On Feb. 25, 1994, American-born Jewish settler Baruch Goldstein, in Hebron, Israel, entered a crowded mosque, part of a complex sacred to both Jews and Muslims, as it is believed to contain the bomb of Abraham and his wife Sarah.

Goldstein opened fire with an assault rifle, anmd out of approximately 400 Muslims gathered for morning prayer, 29 were killed immediately and 150 others were wounded. Others were crushed during the panic caused by the shooting, in-cluding Goldstein himself.

The act almost prevented peace talks between Israel, the

Palestinians, Jordan and Syria. People in the United States hear about such things as the St. Valentine's Day massacre and believe it was a true tragedy. But in that event, on Valentine's Day in Chicago in 1929, gunme shot only seven members of the "Bugs" Moran gang.

A celebration of life

SANFORD - As a young girl, Breanne Anderson was forced to face her mortality so the celebration of her 16th birthday was not just another coming of age par-

It was a celebration of life. Those who attended the party said it was a tribute to the indomintable spirit of a very special young woman.

"She's really something special," said Jim Shupe. principal of Lakeview Middle School in Sanford, who got to know her when she was a student there. "I admire her so much."

For most of her young life, Shupe said, Breanne was locked in combat with the deadliest of adversaries:

She was badly weakened by massive doses of chemotherapy and she lost

"She never experienced what we know as childhood," Shupe said. "At an early age she demonstrated a wisdom far beyond her tender years, for she had no certainties, no gurarantees."

Shupe said that during the time she was at Lakeview, he said, she refused to wallow in self-pity and succomb to human frailty.

When she was bald. Breanne wore a beret.

"For me, that beret was symbolic of her fighting spirit and of her inner courage," Shupe said.

Breanne is now in her third year of remission from the deadly disease because of a successful bone marrow transplant. Eva Wells, one of her

favorite former teachers, was in attendance at the recent birthday party.
"She's my hero," Wella

said of the young lady.


The incidents occurred be-

Dale is keeping his promise

When Larry Dale campaigned for mayor of Sanford last year, he was one of several seeking the post. There were a number of public forums held and candidates were well represented in the pages of the Sanford Herald during two months prior to the

During public appearances, Dale constantly stressed what he believed to be one of the important issues giving the city a problem. Midges. There were people who snickered at the concept. Some felt it was impossible for one person, even in the position of mayor, to do anything to resolve a problem which has plagued the city for decades.

Others thought the midges were the least of the city's problems, and asked why should a candidate even bother bringing them up for discussion?

Yet midges invade our waterfront area carrying over several blocks. They frighten our visitors and cause many people to stay as far away from the waterfront and its businesses as possible. Anyone who hapbeen here for at least one year can testify to that situation.

"We have to get rid of those midges," Dale said time and time again. "We can't really develop our waterfront area successfully, and can't hope to continue having our city and county offices near the lakefront unless and until we get rid of those midges." Hopefully, the citizens of Sanford see that Dale is absolutely correct.

It's exceptional, in this day and age, to see a winning politician do what he or she promised during the campaigning season. Too often, locally, statewide and nationally, we find political candidates who seem to have a terrible loss of memory as soon as they win election.

Dale however, is clearly a pusher.

Monday evening, at the Sanford City Commission meeting. Dale moved to continue his war against midges by asking the commission to approve a resolution urging the Central Florida Legislative delegation to support testing of alternatives for midge control. The matter was approved unani-

Dale has already been in contact with various organizations regarding the midge problem, and can be expected to continue

Midges aren't just a problem along the Sanford waterfront. They have a direct effect on the entire city population as well as the county and surrounding Central Florida area, through their existence in other area lakes.

The resolution asks for funding in the amount of \$100,000 to pay for full-scale testing of various midge control alternativies

We not only commend the members of the Sanford City Commission who approved but urge that they give Mayor Dale all the support possible toward eliminating this problem.

We also believe citizen support will be val**uable as well.**

Midges aren't very big, but unless we start doing something to control them, they could cause unlimited destruction.

prostitution, not murders." When asked by Rabbi Merrill Shaptro of Beth Am Congregation whether police were doing

anything to solve the problem. Williams replied that. " the police say they are doing their best, but I'm not convinced." Williams praised certain aspects of the

community, particularly Crooms Academy, which she said has produced some of "the finest doctors, preachers, teachers and pilots to come from the area." She also said that "schools today are not producing the kind of quality that Crooms did" in its heyday.

Williams also mentioned that the community is proud of its churches. "We have churches on almost every other block. They are very important, churches are one of the five institutions of society." She also had kind words for Habitat for Humanity which she said has built several houses in the area and for Mother Blanche Weaver Bell who runs a homeless shelter on 13" Street.

When asked whether the new city council was prepared to help bring about changes in the area. Williams replied that the council, 'realizes the urgency of addressing these problems." She went on to paraphrase Martin Luther King Jr., saying: "if not now, when? If not this city commission, who?"

Johnell Jackson, a community activist. stated that he doubted the new city commission would do much to help the area. He said the community does not have a strong tak base and without that, 'you can't get serious consideration from the commission." He added that drugs are the most productive money makers in the area, and that, you can't even get a pizza delivered down here."

As the tour bus rolled through the Georgetown area, Jackson commented, "I don't think much of the Sanford City Commission. with the exception of Commissioner Williams she's different. On a scale of one to 10, I'd give them a zero." (Williams left the tour after the Goldsboro segment.) In reference to Sanford Mayor Larry Dale, Jackson said, "I don't favor the man." But Turner Clayton, president of the Seminole County NAACP, responded that it was too early to tell whether Dale would be responsive to the needs of the community.

David Ritt wanted to know what local churches were doing to solve the problem. Jackson responded that the churches were doing their best, but that they don't have the clout they need to deal effectively with the city commission and other governmental bodies because of their lack of financial resources.

Ben Chisolm, who led the Midway portion of the tour, is a lifelong resident of the area. While emphasizing the need for change, he also spoke highly of the area. "Midway is a family oriented neighborhood, I love it. I wouldn't want to live anywhere else."

Chisolm spoke about the history of Midway, which he said used to be on the site of

the Banford-Orlando International Airport. He said the town was moved in the 1920's and 30's to make room for the navai base.

Chisolm also said the Midway community is often by-passed when it comes to receiving county funds, pointing out that only half of the area's 50,000 feet of roadways are paved. "In fact. Midway just got its first sidewalk this year. The walkway was paid for by a block grant from the federal government, and was supposed to extend from 21st St. where it begins, to Midway Elementary School. As of today, the sidewalk only extends for a few blocks. According to Jackson, the money ran out because too much of it was spent on studies and administration.

In response to a question from a tour member, Chisolm responded that the new airport had not provided any real benefits to the community and that unemployment in the area is still high. Jackson blamed Spanish Americans and Mexican migrant workers for the problem, saying, "They will work for five dollars an hour less than local residents." He said transients had taken a lot of jobs in farming and factories once held by locals.

Jackson also supported the idea of annexing Midway into Sanford. Former Commissioner Bob Thomas initially supported the idea in his unsuccessful run for mayor of Sanford. He later rejected the idea saying that a majority of Midway residents he spoke with were against the idea. Jackson said, Sometimes in hare be force changes on people, whether they like it or not. Sort of like seat belts."

A number of people on the tour appeared to be upset by the conditions they witnessed. Robin Shapiro, wife of Rabbi Shapiro from Congregation Beth Am, said she was 'appalled by the conditions in Midway and Goldaboro. I couldn't believe the open drainage ditches and lack of sidewalks. It's not right for kids to have to walk to school without providing sidewalks. I was surprised to learn that the people hanging out on the corners were not locals. It makes me question the sheriffs department, that they won't do something about it."

Robin Shapiro also said she thought the tour itself was fantastic and she was thrilled that some people brought their kids. The people we met were fantastic, I was really impressed by Commissioner Williams."

Jordan Tepper, 15, vice president of the Youth Social Action Group at Beth Am. was surprised by the conditions he saw on the tour. "I have heard stories about the area, but I was really surprised by the way some people are living. It makes us feel lucky we are living the way we are in Longwood."

While no formal announced, Robbin Shaptre said. " no doubt the two groups will be getting together again soon. We can help each other and our communities."

Continued from Page 1A which had been formed to study ways to reduce aviation noise in residential communities.

Lake Mary City Planner Matt West made the presentation, pointing out that the airport is expected to continue expanding with increased cargo flights, increased charter flights and overseas flights. "It's going to be a matter of how big the airport wants to be and how effective the noise abatement committee will be," he said.

He explained that the ILS (instrument landing system) is located in Lake Mary near to Rinehart Road at the Timecuan entrance. "It is from that area where planes making their approach are coming in," he said, "and at approximately 1,700 feet."

West said most of the complaints heard by the Noise Abatement Committee pertained to the larger aircraft. "Small plane complaints were only about one out of every seven," he said.

Sanford Mayor Larry Dale, the city's linison with the committee as well as a private pilot, explained, "Sanford's airport is a driving force. and is going to keep growing. Even if we get funds to build a new iLS system to the east of the airport, the planes will have to take off over Lake Mary, so it isn't going to be the complete answer to the problem.

Dale said most airports where he has flown and knows about have Noise Abatement Committees. "They are very successful," he said, "and I can assure you, pilots take this very seriously."

"What the resolution of this noise situation is going to take," added Mayor Mealor, "is complete cooperation between our two cities, Seminole County, the school board and the State of

Jack Dow, director of operations at the airport also made a presentation. "We are using the noise abatement policies established at Orlando International Airport as our guidelines for our committee," he said, "After the Orlando Noise Abatement Committee got to work, what was 200 complaint calls a month went down to about 25. over the 18 years they have been in service."

Regarding flying over Lake Mary and the Timacuan area in making a passenger airliner approach. Dow said new plans are to have the aircraft make the approach turn more over Lake Monroe, which will take it away from some of the residential area.

"We have also made some changes in the speed of the approaching planes," he said. He explained that approach speeds had been limited to 170 knots per hour. That however, means the pilots have to increase the power of the engines in order to slow the aircraft down and let out the flaps." he said. "The basic landing approach to normally 250 knots. Now, we have removed the speed limit restrictions, and planes are coming in at around 200 knots, which has already helped reduce the noise of the retro-firing of the engines.

Regarding noise complaints about the Sanford airport, Dow reported a total of 702 calls in 1996, with an additional 70 calls received in January of this year.

Lake Mary Commissioner Gary Brender, also a pilot, explained that placing a new ILS system to the east of the airport wouldn't necessarily reduce flights over Lake Mary, "I just wanted you to realize that," he said. "But certainly the most important issue isn't the noise, but safety. Those planes are flying over thousands of residents in our two cities, as well as over two schools, and we don't want to ease up on our concerns now, only to find ourselves faced with a serious problem some time in the future."

Dale told the group that it has been determined a new ILS eastern approach would cost approximately \$2 million. "We've been working on these funds from the federal government." he said. "and while it won't climinate the noise problems, it will hopefully greatly reduce them."

Dow said microphones are to be obtained and installed in the near future at areas considered to be most affected by noise problems. "In this way we will actually be able to determine where the is are the worst and be better able to make plans toward resolving the matter," he said.



It's the season for termites to swarm

It is that time of the year when termites can be seen r warming in and arming houses.

County Extension Services have been receiving many samples of insects awarming around the houses. Many of the samples are termites, some are bees and others are winged ants. The most important are the termites since they can cause a lot of damage to your home.

Termites are separated into two basic groups: drywood termites and subterranean termites. It is important to know which type of termite is present, because their control is different.



The best do not always find way to Cooperstown

SANFORD - Do all of baseball's best players make the Hall of Fame in Cooperstown, N.Y.? Of course not. What the game needs is a second shime - a Hall of Injustice.

Just think of the guys not welcome at Cooperstown, ballplayers we can be proud to accept in the Hall of Injustice. One who comes instantly to mind had a 356 lifetime batting average. Another, an ambidextrous pitcher, won 30 or more games five consecutive years. Then, there's a left-handed hitter with a 349 lifetime average who twice led the National League in

Cooperstown hasn't made room for any of these fellows. So let's bring them to the Hall of Injustice. We'll give them a nice secure spot, where the rest of the world can find them. Cooperstown will call for them sooner or later. Then we'll deal. For each Hall of Injustice player called over (not necessarily up) to the Hall of Fame, the Hall of Injustice receives negotiating rights to 10 more players.

Now to the list of the first ten ballplayers for the Hall of Injustice:

 Shocless Joe Jackson - Barred forever by Cooperstown, Joe is welcome shoes and all. He hit 356 lifetime with a top mark of 408. When Judge Landis booted him out of the game - without allowing an honest appeal - Jackson had just hatted 382 Poor Joe. An illiterate who was wronged. You say he threw the 1919 World Series? Hey. Shocless Joe litt .375 in eight games and didn't make an error in the outfield. C'mon in. Joe. Welcome to the Hall of Injustice.

• Gil Hodges - A magnificent player who drove in 100 runs seven consecutive seasons for Brooklyn, he hit 14 career grand slams and 370 overall. Had four homers in one game. Although he joined the Dodgers as a catcher, Hodges became perhaps the best right-handed fielding first baseman ever. His hands were so big he didn't need a glove. He was the New York Mets miracle manager in 1969; Hodges died 25 years ago in West Palm Beach one day shy of his 49th birthday.

· Larry Doby - This is the 50th anniversary of Doby's debut with the Cleveland Indians. The first black player in the American League, Doby cracked the big-league lineup 11 weeks after Jackie Robinson began play with the Dodgers. Playing centerfield, he helped the Indians win the pennant and World Series one year later, made six consecutive AL All-Star teams. Hit .283 with 253 home runs. Was the second black to manage a hig-league club - second again to a man named (Frank) Robinson, Doby experienced much the same kind of descrimination and abuse as Jackie Robinson, but has been a forgotten man.

 Count Mulane - The Count. Surely, you haven't forgotten him so soon. The suave, graceful Count won the gals' hearts in the 1880s. He also won 285 games while pitching in the big leagues of those days. He won 30 or more games from 1882 to 1887. His best was 35-15 for St. Louis in 1883. He never used any intoxicating drink, never smoked, played all positions and pitched with either hand. If he had a fault, it was turning to umpiring in the NL in 1893.

• Wes Ferrell - Only pitcher ever to win 20 or more games in his first four major-league seasons. Ferrell twice won 25. He was the one of the best hitting pitchers ever, hitting nine home runs and batting .319 in 1931. He was often used as a pinch hitter and had a .280 lifetime batting average, one point less than his brother Rick Ferrell, who is one of the catchers in the Hall of Fame. Ferrell had a 198-128 pitching record.

• Ken Williams - The slugger from Grant's Pass. Ore., hit .300 or better 10 times while establishing a reputation as a power hitter. He had 39 home runs, 155 RBI and a .322 average for the St. Louis Browns in 1922 and followed with a .357 average. His lifetime mark was .319. The Red Sox released him in 1929 after he hit .345. Cooperstown's still tooking for him. Past. Ken's coming to the Hall of

· Lefty O'Doul . This pitcher-turned-outfielder hit .349 lifetime, leading the NL with a .398 avcrage in 1929 while with the Philadelphia Phillies and with a .368 average in 1932 for the Brooklyn Dodgers. He's a legend in the Pacific Coast League. collecting 309 hits and driving in 191 runs for Salt Lake City in 1925.

 Nellie Fox - Little second baseman had 187 or more hits eight times and was the AL MVP in 1959 for the Chicago White Sox. Had 2,633 hits and a .288 lifetime average in 2,367 games. Won three Gold Gloves. There's talk the Veterans Committee will get little Nel imto the Hall of Fame when they vote in Tampa-St. Petersburg this week. If they don't, he's safe in the Hall of injustice.







How much calcium is enough?

DEAR DR. GOTT: I'm a \$6-year-old woman who takes 1,000 milligrams of calcium a day to prevent estesperosis. I am also on hormones. How much calcium do I need?

DEAR READER: Most authorities recommend that post-menopausal women take 1,500-2,000 milligrams of calcium a day (along with vitamin D) to prevent or retard ostsoporosis, the loss of bone density that occurs as men and women age.

If you eat many calcium-containing foods - such as milk and choose you can probably reduce the amount of supplemental calcium that you consume. Your doctor can advise you.

Here is the strategy that works for my patients. (I should mention that this is only my approach; other doctors may use different products.)

Take two Os Cal 500 with D a day. This gives you 1,000 mg of calcium plus appropriate amounts of vitamin D. Add to this two, three or four TUMS, Each TUMS tablet provides about 250 mg of calcium, so judge the amount of supplement in relation to your dietary intake of calcium.

The fact that you have been prescribed hormones will further reduce your risk of osteoporosis.

DEAR DR. GOTT: For a 57-year-old man, I'm in pretty good shape. I wa'k iou, waim, bike, bowi and goil, depend ing on the season. Nonetheless, I do have problems: My body seems to exist to make my life miserable. I experience nausea, stomach cramps and muscle pains when I exercise. I sometimes see double. I bleed when I cut myself shaving. I am forgetful.

My body hates my exercising. Why does it want me to be an old man?

DEAR READER: While you may be experiencing some of the consequences of the aging process, I hesitate to blame age for all of your afflictions. For example, double vision and a tendency to bleed are not common in older people; such symptoms may reflect a condition that needs to be addressed, I worry that you might have a circulatory deficiency, diabetes, ulcers, or a bleeding disorder.

In order to sort out what is agerelated and what is not, you should have a complete examination and testing by your family physician. I do not believe that your body is resisting your efforts at being active. More likely, it has served you well all these years and now expects you to take good care of it.

Your doctor should be able to distinguish between signs of normal aging and symptoms that need treatment. Get an exam.

Beware, however, of cut-rate brands that may be substantially cheaper than what you are buying now. These pills may be of inferior



DEAR DR. GOTT: Because of rectal bleeding, I went to my doctor. After examining me, he declared that I have a fissure. What is this?

DEAR READER: A crack. Sometimes without warning — or after a particularly difficult bowel movement - people will experience rectal bleeding from a tear or crack in the intestinal lining. Rather like other cracks in the skin — for example, in the fingers — the lesion is harmless and will heal

Except for suppositories to aid evacuation, no particular therapy is required. Be patient. The fissure will heal and you should experience no long-term consequences from it.


