## DIRIGIBLE WILL FLY TO MIAMI THIS EVENING

Alters Plan Suddenly And Will Visit Magic City Before Returning To Homestead

## To Fly Over Here In All Probability

Adverse Weather Has Prevented Airship From Going South

PENSACOLA, Fla., Jan. 12—(INS)—Making a sudden change in its plans, the dirigible Los Angeles will leave Port St. Joseph, Fla., this afternoon for a trip to Miami before returning to its hangar at Lakehurst, N. J., according to an official wireless message received at the naval air station here today.

It had previously been announced at Washington that the naval airship intended leaving there this afternoon to return to Lakehurst.

In a second message to the International News Service here, Commander L. C. Rosendahl commented his report to an air station by declaring that he planned to leave Bay St. Joseph at 5 P.M. He also said that upon leaving Miami, he would head north over the Lake Okeechobee region, continue over the lands east of possible, and then Jacksonville.

Present intentions are to leave Patoka (Ore.) ship to which the Los Angeles has been moored in Bay St. Joseph this afternoon and be in Miami about A. M. Sunday, 13th. Then cross other Florida cities, as practicable, returning to Patoka by sunrise Monday. Thence to Lakehurst when practicable. During the last 24 hours have experienced severe weather, but ship in antis, fuel, food and crew go good.

The message added that the Washington, was to the effect that the Los Angeles would return to Lakehurst without visiting the Florida East Coast. The sudden change in plans was believed due to the excellent weather conditions prevailing in the state at present.

The Los Angeles has been loaned to the U. S. Patoka at Port St. Asaph since headwinds caused it to abandon its course from Lakshurst to Miami early in the week except for one trip down the West Coast.

DETROIT, Mich., Jan. 12.—So great has been the demand for the new Greater Hudson and the Essex Challenger that the company has been compelled to further increase its already revised breeding production schedule, the amended schedule which has been announced by Courtney Johnson, general sales manager, calls for 27,000 cars in January, 30,000 in February and 45,000 in March or a total of 100,000 cars during the first quarter.

This schedule is the largest ever planned for Hudson-Essex, being far in excess of the last quarter during 1928, which saw the company advanced third place at the National Automobile Show and to top position among the manufacturers of six cylinder cars.

"The demand," says Mr. Johnson, "exceeds over the most optimistic hopes of the company and comes from every section of country."
