### Gov. Carlton Appoints

The appointment of Robert W. Bentley to a place in the State Road Department and the probability of his subsequent selection as chairman to succeed Dr. Foss A. Hathaway comes as no surprise to those who have followed the campaign of Governor Doyle E. Carlton. The success with which Mr. Bentley conducted the new governor's drive for office merits the honor and responsibility which the chief executive has reposed in him in the promotion to what is perhaps the most important of all the appointive offices at the governor's command.

Mr. Bentley was a successful business man and newspaper publisher prior to identifying himself with the campaign of Governor Carlton. He was formerly connected with the Tampa Tribune in the days of the Stovalls and later became publisher of the Bradenton Herald, which he sold several years ago to engage in other lines of business. When the Governor was casting around for an able man to manage his appeal for public support, Mr. Bentley was recommended by his friends. That he measured up to the claims presented to Mr. Carlton is attested by the latter's well earned victories both in the primary and in the general election.

Those who followed the primary campaign particularly cannot fail to recognize the organizing genius of Mr. Bentley. Mr. Carlton's campaign was easily the most concentrated of all the campaigns. Mr. Bentley overlooked nothing and those who watched him as he handled the hundreds of details from his headquarters in Tampa have marvelled at the dispatch with which he took care of them, and have applauded him for the foresight and good judgment, which he exercised in managing the more important phases of Mr. Carlton's cause.

Mr. Bentley is, therefore, justly entitled to this reward for faithful service. That he will be as successful in his new undertaking as he has been in his past work is our firm belief. Equally as excellent as this appointment is that of W. A. Shanda of Gainesville, who will fill another vacancy on the highway board. Mr. Shanda, long-time citizen of Gainesville, has been an important business figure in Alachua county. With these two men as the first appointees, The Herald feels that Governor Carlton has made a good start. If he exercises the same wisdom in all of his future selections, he will surround himself with as capable a group of assistants and advisors as any preceding executive has boasted.

### Rubber In Florida

The announcement that Harvey Firestone, rubber magnate, is becoming interested in Florida properties and plans the construction here of a great retail distribution center for all his rubber goods comes as interesting news to those who believe that what this state needs is new industries. The possibility of rubber becoming one of Florida's greatest industries is even more evident when one considers that experts have found that the soil here is favorable for the growing of rubber plants.

"Florida is favorable for the growing of rubber," says the Jacksonville Journal. "That is the announcement of the United States department of agriculture. It finds that rubber yielding trees and plants are able to survive and that they will flourish under conditions in Florida. The department is unwilling to go as far as to say that commercial rubber planting is advisable but it is continuing its experiments and the first results are decidedly hopeful."

"That is good news for the state for it may mean the opening of another vast industry. We are sure that some use can be found for the thousands of idle acres in the state. If they can be made to produce rubber in paying quantities we would advise everybody who owns an acre of land to hold on to it. If it doesn't produce rubber, citrus or vegetables some use will be found for it. The fact that some use being made productive will increase the value of all of it."

"Florida as a rubber growing community may not be an immediate probability, this year or next, but that it holds the ultimate possibility is encouraging. It proves what Peter O. Knight so often says that we still have the same climate, soil, natural resources and possibilities" and too, that the future is ahead of us."

### WHY METALS ARE HARD

Even if the new metal, variously known as "carbonyl" or "Cobalt" or by other names, does not make in actual use to be quite as revolutionary as its most optimistic promoters hope, it already provides an opportunity for a travelogue of the microscopic world of metallic interiors. The new metal consists of tiny crystals of nitrogen carbide, one of the hardest chemical compounds known, embedded in and intimately attached to a matrix of metallic cobalt. Cobalt is not by itself a particularly hard metal, but it can be made unusually tough. With the tiny grains of crystalline carbide scattered through its substance, the reinforced cobalt adds a cutting edge to its toughness and even becomes able, tests have shown, to cut a screw thread on a rod of porcelain or of glass. Thus comes to its latest step, although unquestioned not its last one, a process of invention and discovery which began at least with the first bronze.

Virtually no metal is structureless all the way through, like a homogeneous jelly. Inside even such soft metals as pure copper or pure iron the microscope discloses a multitude of tiny crystals. When metals bend it is usually because these crystals are agreeable to sliding a little past each other. Like the cards of a deck spread out sideways in the hand. Sometimes, the necessary slipping takes place inside the individual metal crystals, between adjacent layers of the crystal structure. But unless, slips and slides of some kind take place somewhere, the metal will not bend. It will be like brittle zinc, which breaks in two before it yields. What tin does when it hardens copper to when it hardens iron to make steel, what copper does when it hardens aluminum to make duralumin, is always much the same thing. The foreign metal makes up contributes to the making of a vast number of tiny metallic crystals which get into these slipping planes between the large crystals of the original soft metal and make these slides of crystal over crystal more difficult. The mechanism is almost exactly the same as that of the sand which keeps you from slipping on slippery ice.

For the new tungsten-carbonyl mixture, there is an additional effect. The multitude of tiny grains of the intensely hard nitrogen carbide not only get between the crystals and fibers of
