

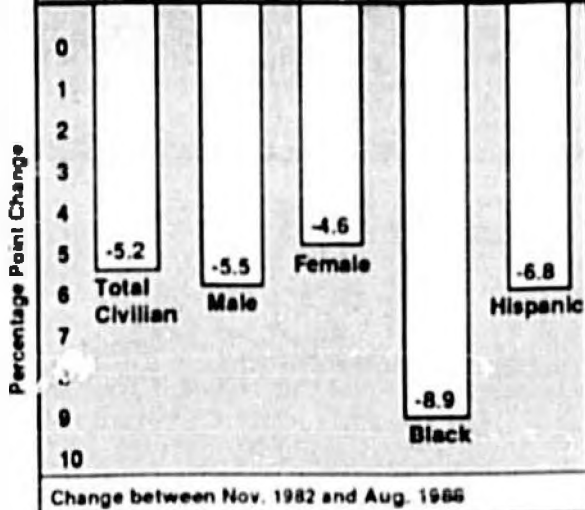

### Unemployment rate drops

WASHINGTON — Unemployment dropped slightly in October to 5.3 percent, the government said today, providing evidence of a continuing economic expansion that has been heralded by the presidential campaign of Republican George Bush.

In the last unemployment report before the presidential election in four days, the Labor Department said unemployment dropped to 5.3 percent in October, compared to 5.4 percent in September.

Payroll employment grew by 323,000 jobs, a healthy non-farm payroll figure within the range forecast by private analysts. The payroll employment figure came almost entirely in the private sector.

### Soviets stop Afghan withdrawal

MOSCOW — The Soviet Union has suspended the withdrawal of its troops from Afghanistan because of recent rebel successes and will not resume the pullout until the situation stabilizes, a senior official said today.

Deputy Foreign Minister Alexander Besmertnykh said the U.S.-backed rebels had launched 550 attacks on Soviet positions since the May 15 start of the withdrawal, including casualties on Soviet forces.

The Soviet Union, which invaded Afghanistan in December 1979 to support a communist government threatened by internal feuds and Muslim rebels, signed a pact in Geneva April 14 pledging to withdraw its 100,000 troops by Feb. 14.

#### 10-year-old shoots bus driver

PORT ARTHUR, Texas — A bus driver continued fighting for her life early today after she was shot in the head by a 10-year-old boy who missed his bus.

Russell Jean Hampton, a former teacher's aide who has driven a school bus since 1983, was in very critical condition this morning and placed on a respirator at St. Mary's Hospital with a gunshot wound to the base of her skull, said Jody Roberts, a hospital spokeswoman.

## Sen. Graham out stumping in local visit

SANFORD — U.S. Sen. Bob Graham doesn't have to run for reelection for another four years but one wouldn't know it from his whirlwind visit to Sanford Thursday, shaking hands and making small talk.

Graham, a former two-term governor, was in town to promote the election of K.G.W. Democrat W.W. "Bud" Gardner to the District 17 state senate seat. But he often trailed behind Gardner on his tour, visiting with city employees, then businessmen and people on the street during a walking tour of the Goldsboro business district.

Graham arrived at the Greater Sanford Chamber of Commerce

building with an aide and Gardner. They received a welcome from assorted Democrats and officials including State Rep. Alzo Reddick of Orlando. Some Republicans also were on hand, including State Rep. Art Grindle and Sanford Mayor Betty Smith.

Graham was scheduled to take a walking tour of City Hall, walk to the County Services Building and tour that building, then return to the Chamber of Commerce building for a meeting with members of the black community.

However, he arrived at City Hall shortly before 5 p.m. and was led on a hasty tour of the building by Mayor Smith and City Manager Frank Faison. Graham stopped to chat with each city employee he

## County's only radio station going on the auction block

SANFORD — Seminole County's only radio station, WFLS-AM (1100), is scheduled to be sold at a county courthouse auction next month to satisfy a \$11,000 foreclosure action against the owner, River Country Broadcasting Inc.

It is one of several civil actions that have been filed or recorded recently in Seminole County against the owners of the county and western music station located at 1500 E. Main Ave.

A second foreclosure action against the record court is for \$250,000.

Litigation by five former employees also were recorded Wednesday in the county clerk's office. They are for wages dating back five weeks. Four former employees have filed complaints with the Federal Wage and Hour Division in Orlando over

pay they seek to recover.

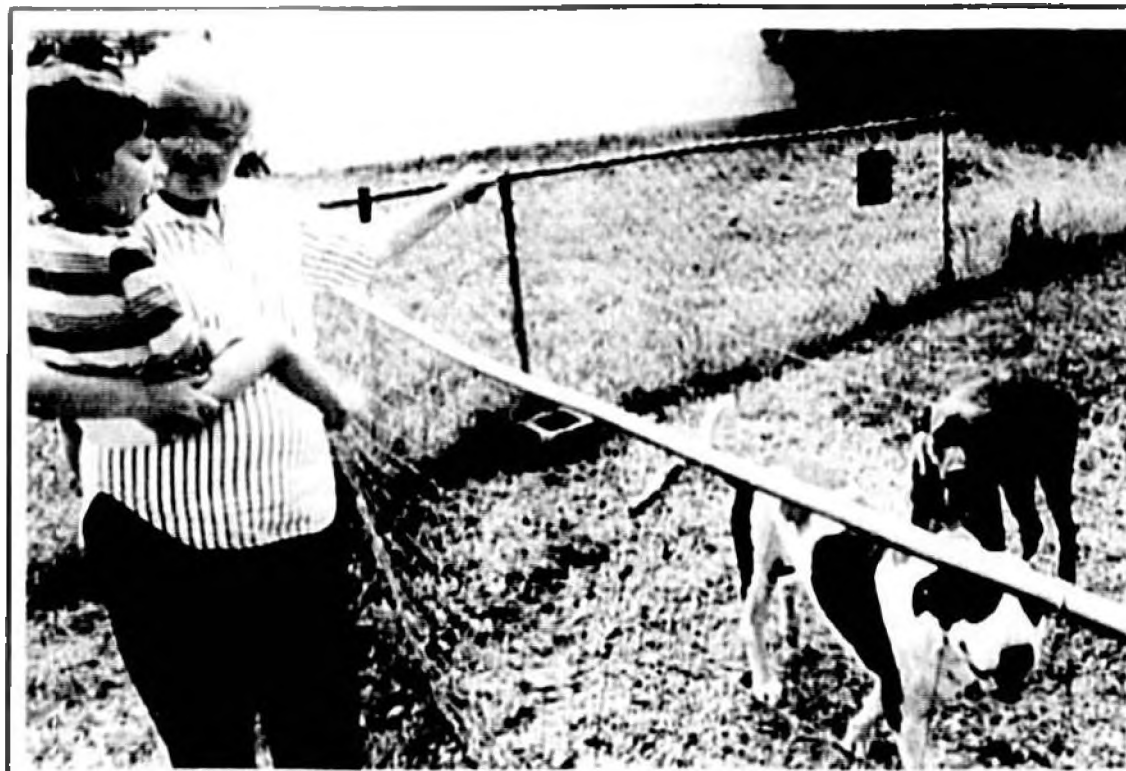
A.J. Stanton, the station's attorney and a reserved River County corporate director, said that before the foreclosure auction can be held, the station will be sold to an Orlando couple for \$417,000.

Stanton said the sale, which requires Federal Communications Commission approval for transfer of the broadcasting license, should enable River Country to pay both foreclosure notes as well as any other debts owed local businesses or wages owed former employees.

Walter J. Bowen, River Country president, also said that money owed by the station would be repaid. "I'm not trying to run away from anybody," said Bowen. "Things will work out."

Bowen said that after the station is sold, he will remain through the winter as a consultant.

## Pit bulls stir controversy

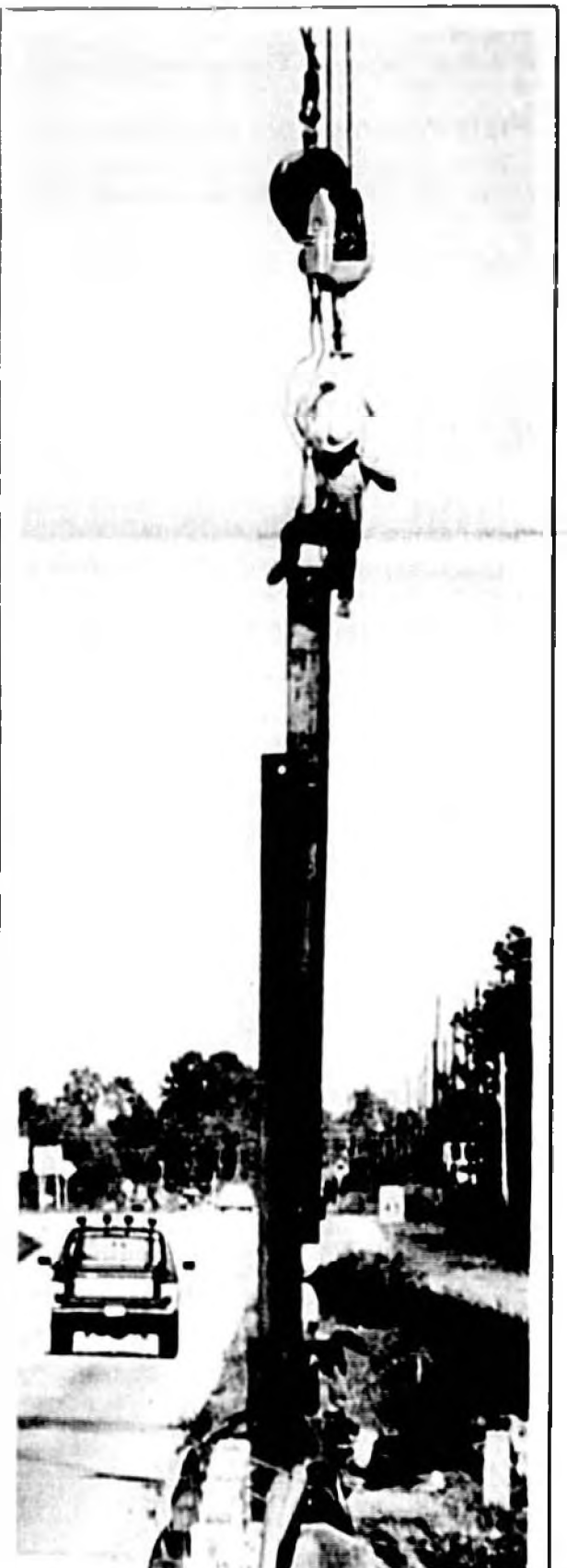
LONGWOOD — Two pit bulldogs seen as a "potential danger" have city officials disagreeing over whether the dogs' owner should be cited for violation of a city ordinance.

City Administrator Gene DeMarie said the dogs are a "perceived danger" and are a

potential liability to the city. But Code Enforcement Officer Cathy Price disagrees. "I just don't see that there is a violation," Price said Thursday.

Price said she was told by DeMarie to cite Pat Hockenberry, 252 Palmetto Ave., for violation of the city's nuisance ordinance. It cited the woman could be required to erect a six-foot fence around her property. No

## District 5 candidates offer contrasting styles

SANFORD — The District 5 Seminole County Commission race offers a difference in styles between its two candidates.

Democrat Art Davis, 47, of unincorporated west Sanford is a county critic noted for his aggressive forays into such issues as the Yankee Lake sewage treatment plant and problems within county departments.

Republican Jennifer Kelley, 52, of Sanford, uses a less confrontational approach in her politicking and admits her most active involvement in county government began when she decided to seek the office late last year.

Davis has owned his own plumbing contracting business for 12 years and is a member of the Seminole County Democratic Executive Committee. He has a high school degree.

This is Davis' first attempt at elected office, although he currently serves on the county Code Enforcement Board and previously served on the county Parks and Recreation Board, the Alcohol, Drugs and Mental Health Council, and other public committees and boards.

Kelley was a humanities and English teacher in Seminole County schools for 18 years. She also has worked as office manager of her and her husband's architectural firm in Sanford. She has been active in the Republican party, serving as president of the Sanford Women's Republican

Club and is an associate member of the Florida Federation of Young Republicans.

Kelley has a bachelor's degree from Barry University and has studied towards a post graduate degree in administration and business management.

Both candidates see problems in county government that they said they would address as commissioners, both cite problem solving as one of their main goals in seeking the office.

Davis and Kelley point to problems in county staff, particularly in the senior management positions as county administrator.

Kelley said she has seen and heard of cases where county staffers have treated the public

# Astronauts poke fun at secrecy

SPACE CENTER, Houston — The Soviet Union's new space shuttle appears to be an "outright" copy of its U.S. counterpart, says the skipper of the shuttle Atlantis, which is scheduled to blast off at the end of the month on a secret military flight.

"It sure does look like they copied ours," veteran shuttle commander Robert "Hoot" Gibson said in an interview Thursday at the Johnson Space Center.

Gibson and his four crewmates — co-pilot Guy Gardner, Richard "Mike" Mullane, Jerry Ross and William Shepherd — are scheduled to take off aboard Atlantis around Nov. 28 on the second post-Challenger flight, a classified mission to launch a secret spy satellite.

In two previous classified Defense Department shuttle flights, interviews with crew members were forbidden because of the hush-hush nature of such missions. But

the Air Force made an exception in the case of Atlantis's crew, although no mission-specific questions were allowed.

In any case, when the astronauts showed up for their interviews Thursday, they were sporting black Lone Ranger-style masks, apparently poking good-natured fun at the secrecy surrounding the 27th shuttle mission.

Gibson said he believes the Soviet Union's new shuttle, called Buran, is a ripoff of NASA's overall design and that if the outline of one was placed atop the other a near-perfect fit would result.

The Soviets attempted to launch their first shuttle on its maiden voyage Saturday, but trouble with ground equipment forced them to delay the unmanned, two-orbit flight until later this month. In all likelihood, Buran will take off before Atlantis.

"We either have to feel we were really brilliant when we developed ours because they did it completely independently and

came up with the same answer, or we have to think they're no dummies and why spend all that money and all that time developing something ... when they could just copy something that was out there?" Gibson said.

"One of the Soviets' well-known mottoes is 'better is a severe enemy of good enough.' So why develop something that might be better than ours when ours is good enough and they can just flat outright copy it? And I tend to think that's what happened."

With Atlantis on a launch pad at the Kennedy Space Center and with Buran on its pad at the Baikonur Cosmodrome in Soviet Central Asia, interest in shuttle activity is at a fever pitch.

The precise launch time will not be known until nine minutes before liftoff, the landing time will not be revealed until 24 hours before touchdown and no radio transmissions or television pictures from the shuttle will be released.

## Tornado rips through Fort Myers

FORT MYERS — A tornado ripped a quarter-mile path through a residential area Friday, ripping off roofs, downing power lines and uprooting trees, the Lee County sheriff's office said.

There were no reports of any injuries, but sheriff's deputies were going from house to house to be sure no one was hurt.

Sgt. Alan Bromley said the tornado hit at 1:15 and was about a quarter of a mile wide at one point. He said it was about a half-mile long. Power was knocked out in a small area.

"There is extensive damage to the residential area," Bromley said. "Trees were uprooted and roofs are partially missing or completely missing. We expect to be out there all day assisting Florida Power & Light and other cleanup crews."

Heavy rain has swept through sections of south and southwest Florida in the past 48 hours, but officials say they are concerned about a lack of moisture in the area now and the resulting fire danger.

## Disney unions reject contract offer

LAKE BUENA VISTA — The Services Trade Council, a six-union coalition representing about 12,000 workers at Walt Disney World, voted overwhelmingly Thursday to reject a new three-year contract.

Only a small number of those eligible to vote actually cast ballots at the Contemporary Hotel, where union members were said to be furious with the company's proposal. The vote total was 1,775 against and 101 for the contract.

The current contract was extended until midnight Monday and Disney and union negotiators are to return to the bargaining table Friday.

A Disney spokesperson says the company would listen to the union desires, but Disney had made what it considered its best offer.

Trade Council president Harvey Totzke said the contract rejection should not be considered a strike vote, and admitted the unions never before have rejected what Disney considered its final offer.

The Disney proposal provides wage increases totaling 13 percent over the next three years. However, the trade council was more concerned with raising the pay grades of certain workers, such as bus drivers, rather than overall wage increases.

Workers earlier this week overwhelmingly rejected Disney's first proposal.

## Fraternity member sentenced in rape

TALLAHASSEE — A member of Pi Kappa Alpha fraternity has been sentenced to 8 1/2 years in prison in the date rape of an 18-year-old Florida State University student who drove him home from a party.

Sean Russell, 23, of Winter Park, will serve another 9 1/2 years on probation following his release from prison under the sentence handed down Wednesday by Leon County Circuit Judge Charles McClure.

Russell received a one-year concurrent sentence for a probation violation. At the time of his arrest for the rape, he was under probation for battery for getting into a fistfight over a former girlfriend.

Russell, a former student at Tallahassee Community College and a member of the FSU Pi Kappa Alpha chapter, was convicted Oct. 4 of sexual battery using force and violence.

Three other members of the FSU chapter of the fraternity still face trial on charges stemming from the March 5 multiple sexual assault of another 18-year-old FSU student in the chapter house on campus.

## Student attendance reports criticized

TALLAHASSEE — Florida Department of Education officials need to improve their efforts at tracking the enrollment level of students in state public schools, according to an audit released Thursday by Auditor General Charles Lester.

"Although substantial improvements have been made by the Department to eliminate the backlog of full-time equivalent membership reviews ... we continued to note instances where these reviews were not performed in a timely manner," state auditors wrote.

Florida statutes require the Department of Education to conduct periodic reviews of the state's 67 school districts to determine the number of full-time equivalent students in the classroom.

That figure is used to determine the level of state appropriations for basic operations, a school district's cost differential, quality guarantee allocations and the amount of local funding needed.

The figure also helps determine what adjustment, if any, a district will receive for funding it received in the previous school year and financial assistance provided in cases where a district's enrollment is declining.

The audit found that from 1982-87, full-time student examination reports "were issued for only 35 of 67 school districts."

## Couple's dream is ecological disaster

PIERSON — Melvin and Janine Rutkowski of East Detroit, Mich., dream of a retirement home with a lake view and abundant wildlife all around them.

But their ignorance of Florida's fragile ecosystem and laws to protect it has dropped them in the middle of an environmental nightmare that could end with a large fine and time behind bars.

Mechanical engineer Rutkowski, 63, and three men who worked for him are charged with illegal dredging and filling to build a road through a swamp in the Lake George wetlands in rural Volusia County west of Daytona Beach.

"I can't believe they'd go after us for a tiny little road," said Janine Rutkowski, a 58-year-old school psychologist.

"This is the worst non-permitted destruction of wetlands, beautiful pristine wetlands, I've ever seen," said Assistant State Attorney Mac McLeod, who filed charges late Wednesday against Rutkowski and his workmen.

McLeod characterized the

project as "rip and tear" and vowed to press the case.

A canal 400 feet long and 60 feet wide now snakes through the undeveloped area that acts as a natural filtration system for the lake's wetlands. Dozens of mature cypress and hardwoods were felled in dredging the soil to build the adjacent road.

The Florida Game and Fresh Water Fish Commission discovered the project and halted it before the full 2,200-foot road could be completed through the 17.4-acre tract the Rutkowskis purchased earlier this year.

"I'd have to say this is probably the most flagrant illegal wetlands destruction I've ever seen myself," said commission Lt. D. Gray Leonard.

"I don't even know what a wetland is. I have no idea," Rutkowski said. "How do you destroy wetlands? All you're doing is putting a house there and putting a road."

Officials with the state Department of Environmental Regulation and the St. Johns River Water Management District said they had not issued permits for the project and probably would not have done so if they had received applications.

## Dry spell in south Florida

MIAMI — Although the rain fell heavy at times in south Florida Thursday, the area has been hit with record low rainfall and the fire season is starting, officials said.

During September and October, only 4.56 inches of rain fell in Miami, the lowest since 1942, when the National Weather Service began keeping records, meteorologists said. Normal rainfall is 53.21 inches.

In Fort Lauderdale, a record-low 3.22 inches of rain fell in the past two months, compared with an average rainfall of 19.75 inches. Last year's total was 51.11 inches.

Ann Overton, spokeswoman for the South Florida Water Management District, said low rainfall in southwestern Florida prompted agency officials to recommend to their governing board that water use restrictions be instituted in Lee and Collier counties. The board meets Friday.

In south Florida, groundwater levels for drinking water are satisfactory, she said. Water levels in Lake Okechobee stand at 15 feet compared with an average of 15 1/2 feet. Levels in the Biscayne aquifer have dropped only 3 inches in the last month, although in some areas on the west coast, groundwater levels are 4 to 10 feet below normal, Overton said.

On Florida's southwestern coast, she said, "Growth is just outpacing the supply of water. It's an ongoing problem."

Water management officials, for example, are working on a program in Cape Coral for residents to not treated waste water for irrigation, instead of potable water, "and it's costly," she said.

The city's permit allowing it to draw water from its aquifer expires next September and officials must have in place by then a program to supplement the city's potable drinking water, Overton said.

Meanwhile, the dry weather might be exacerbating recent wildfires, said John Wagner of the Division of Forestry.

## Appellate panel hears Official English appeal

MIAMI — Opponents of the Official English initiative in Florida are seeking to block next week's vote on whether English should be the state's official language in a last-minute appeal to the 11th Circuit Court of Appeals.

A three-judge panel from the federal court heard arguments in Miami in the emotional case Thursday, but did not indicate when it will rule on the issue.

Voters are scheduled to decide Tuesday whether to enshrine English as the state's official language and polls indicate the measure enjoys broad support.

"The court expressed today that it would rule as quickly as it could, (but) it is not essential that it occur before the election," said Steve Zalesin, an attorney for those challenging the legality

of Tuesday's vote.

The decision is unlikely to end the legal skirmishing, however. Lawyers said an appeal to the U.S. Supreme Court is possible, regardless of the outcome.

In the meantime, opponents continued a campaign to discredit the amendment by seeking to link its backers to extremists. Opponents have characterized the initiative as a slap at the state's large immigrant population.

Jeffrey Browne, a spokesman for Speak Up Now in Florida, which opposes the initiative, said an organization affiliated with U.S. English had received \$370,000 between 1980 and 1986 from the Pioneer Fund.

Browne described the Pioneer Fund as a racist New York organization. U.S. English is a national group that seeks to make English the official lan-

guage of the United States.

In court Thursday, opponents argued that the petition drive that placed the initiative on Tuesday's ballot violated the Voting Rights Act of 1965.

Petitions circulated in support of the amendment should have been distributed in Spanish in six Florida counties with large minority populations, lawyers said.

U.S. District Judge James W. Kehoe rejected that argument last week, however, in a ruling that set the stage for Thursday's appeal.

The appeal, brought on behalf of four Spanish speaking residents of Florida, got a boost Wednesday when the U.S. Justice Department filed a brief in support of the opponent's position.

Mark Dienstag, an attorney for the Official English campaign, argued Thursday that the Justice Department brief should be tossed out because it is "incompetent and misleading."

Dienstag said the brief is misleading because it ignores previous law.

"They managed somehow to write a brief that ignores every case that has come down in opposition to their position," Dienstag said.

The Voting Rights Act requires that election materials be printed in languages other than English in areas where at least 5 percent of the population has difficulty understanding English.

Kehoe ruled that the Voting Rights Act did not apply because the petition drive was initiated, organized and carried out by private citizens, Kehoe said a petition initiated by the state would trigger provisions of the act.

# City receives check for arts center

SANFORD — Sanford received a \$73,000 check from Secretary of State Jim Smith Thursday which will pay part of the costs of renovating the 68-year-old Cultural Arts Center at 119 W. Fifth St. Smith presented the money, appropriated by the last session of the Legislature, to Mayor Bettye Smith in front of the old building.

The city commission appropriated \$100,000 to the project and the state appropriation will enable the project to be completed, according to Bill Simmons, city engineer.

Simmons said about \$16,000 has already been spent to complete plans for the renovation, and a contract for the work will be let soon.

The building was constructed in 1924 as the city's first public library. It is considered an excellent example of the Mediterranean Revival style of 1920s Florida.

The building is believed to have been designed by Elton J. Moughton, a local architect who also designed the former city hall and jail, the Masonic temple, the Forest Lake Hotel, and the building which now houses Sanford Middle School.

The renovation project will restore the building to its original appearance and upgrade it to accommodate public meetings, art instruction and exhibits, and other community functions.

Simmons said the building will be divided into three rooms, each with a separate outside entrance, so each part can be used separately.

## Lake Mary city commission delays hiring administrator

LAKE MARY — City commissioners made a motion to delay the hiring of a recreation administrator but approved the hiring of temporary clerks at their meeting last evening.

A recreation administrator would have been hired in March, 1989 at a starting salary of \$21,500. Staff Coordinator Charles Lauderdale said that such an employee "cannot gainfully be employed until April, 1990."

He said that the city is in the process of developing its recreational facilities, a job which the public works director is capable of doing.

Lauderdale said after the facilities are designed, a recreation administrator will be hired at a salary range of \$21,500 - \$31,000 to design and oversee recreational programs.

The city wants to hire temporaries to help type commission meeting minutes. Mary Campbell, secretary to the city manager, does most of the city's typing and is behind with the minutes. Last night, commissioners approved minutes from the month of May.

Lauderdale said the temporaries would be hired as soon as possible.

"We are trying not to hire permanent staff until absolutely necessary. We need to keep up with the minutes. By the first of

the year, we should be caught up," Lauderdale said.

Also put on hold on Lauderdale's recommendation is the hiring of a personnel specialist at a salary of \$15,000 - \$21,500. Lauderdale said department heads and clerks should get acquainted with the new personnel system manual rather than immediately hire a specialist.

Lauderdale said he finished the updated personnel policies and procedures manual last night. It is a guide on how to administer personnel programs.

In another matter, commis-

sioners approved an appeal by Energy Builders Inc. to allow the Lake Mary company to apply for an arbor permit.

The company said it will remove 22 pine trees and replace them with 7 oak trees before occupancy at 590 Eagle Creek Circle in Eagle Creek Estates, the site where a new home will be built.

The custom-home builders had applied for an arbor permit application Oct. 27. City planners recommended denial of the permit because the company's request conflicts with the city's arbor ordinance, they said.

### Car strikes Amtrak train, no injuries

**Market moderate, prices dip**

NEW YORK — Prices opened lower today in moderate trading of New York Stock Exchange issues.

The Dow Jones Industrial average, which rose 13.51 Thursday, was off 16.36 to 2153.98 shortly after the market opened.

Declines led advances 712-169 among the 1,316 issues crossing the New York Stock Exchange tape. Early turnover amounted to about 10,722,000 shares.

The U.S. Labor Department today reported that unemployment dropped slightly in October to 5.3 percent, providing evidence of a continuing economic expansion. This com-

pare to a jobless rate of 5.4 percent in September.

Despite a sharp pullback in the final hour, stock prices advanced Thursday in moderate trading as takeover stocks, real or rumored, once again dominated market activity.

"It was a relatively quiet session with the exception of the Dow, which was helped along by such consumer stocks as Sears, Woolworth and Procter & Gamble," said Dennis Jarrett, a market analyst with Kidder, Peabody & Co.

"They were generally the driving force all day long. Then in the final hour we had some futures-related selling that brought us back from session highs. Overall, the activity centered on select situations," Jarrett said.

**Dollar opens higher on good job news**

The dollar was higher today against major foreign currencies in moderate trading following a better-than-expected Labor Department report on the nation's job picture. The price of gold slipped.

In early New York trading, the dollar surged high against key foreign currencies in active trading.

Traders in New York said the dollar, which had opened slightly lower, surged sharply following the Labor Department's report showing 323,000 new non-farm jobs were created in October.

The Labor Department reported the nation's unemployment rate dropped slightly in October to 5.3 percent.

According to court and county records, River Country Broadcasting purchased the station on Nov. 17, 1987 from Seminole-Orange Broadcasting Co. The transaction included a promissory note for \$12,837 signed by River Country President Bowen. He also signed and guaranteed a note with Metro-Orlando Broadcasters, Inc. for \$178,103 on the same date.

Metro-Orlando had owned the 1,000-watt station from October 1983 to December 1984 when it sold it to Emmet Broadcasting and retained a second mortgage. Emmet, in turn, sold the station to Seminole-Orange about a year later.

Bowen also agreed to make payments on a Sun Bank first mortgage, originally issued to Seminole-Orange in 1986 in the amount of \$89,000, according to the documents.

When Bowen and his father-in-law, Evert Demster of Lakeland, bought the station last year, they had expressed high hopes for their first venture in radio broadcasting.

Bowen's primary experience is in television production. He produced the popular Orlando-based Church Street Station broadcast on The Nashville Network, with Stanton as executive producer, from 1984 to 1987. The pair subsequently produced another TNC program, Rock and Roll Palace, filmed at Little Darlings in Kissimmee.

Bowen is also known as "Grady Lee," a comic character he portrays locally and nationally.

The station's financial picture began to sour and by March 1988, the \$12,837 amount owed to Seminole-Orange, plus interest, was in default, court records show.

Frank Vaught, former station general manager, said the station was paying out \$12,000 in monthly expenses such as salaries and utilities, while receiving about \$8,000 in monthly income from advertising and promotion sales revenue.

"You feel that it will work," Bowen said. "The thing you did not realize is it relies on sales."

Bowen attributed much of the station's cash flow problems to inadequate financing, a difficulty in finding adequate advertising

sales people, a difficulty in selling sufficient advertising in the tough Sanford market, and aggressive competition from larger, Orlando-based FM stations.

Bowen also blamed himself partially for the company's financial problems. He said he spent too much of his time away from the station pursuing other careers.

Bowen said he and Demster invested thousands of dollars in personal money in the station but he refused to specify the amount.

Vaught said he resigned from the station in February because of the financial situation and one promotion campaign, the "69-cent dollar" which he said was a poor business decision.

In return for a fee-paid sponsorship, a company would receive promotions and agree to accept the 69-cent dollars from WKUS listeners who bought them from the station for 69 cents each. The listener could purchase \$1 in goods and services from the sponsor, who would redeem them at the station for \$1.

Vaught said the idea would work if the sponsors advertised heavily, but they did not, and WKUS amassed several thousand dollars in debt from the promotion, including \$8,771 to Winn-Dixie stores.

Of differences between Vaught and other key staffers, Bowen said, "We had a couple of people here who differed in the way things should be done."

Vaught returned as general manager in early September in an effort to help revitalize the station. He said he found it in much the same financial condition as when he left. Vaught said he found the station's outstanding debt stayed at about \$45,000 to \$55,000 each month and the average amount owed to the station monthly at about \$18,000 to \$20,000, although less than half that amount was collected.

"We had a negative cash flow," he said.

Vaught said he trimmed several staff members, but had little success in curbing the monthly deficit. Employee paychecks occasionally were a week or more late during the period. Employees complained that some of their paychecks were

not honored because of insufficient funds in the station's account at First Union Bank.

Vaught and other station employees said the station had not paid license fees required to play records on the air as of Oct. 28. That is when Vaught resigned for the final time.

Even though Seminole-Orange continued to hold the Sun Bank note, River Country had agreed to make its monthly payment to satisfy the original \$89,000 debt, the court records show. The records also show Seminole-Orange paid \$15,000 of the debt.

But by Sept. 15, despite the help, Bowen said the financial situation had become "somewhat of a nightmare."

At that point, Metro-Orange President William Mast paid the remaining \$71,510 owed in the Sun Bank note, increasing his financial involvement to nearly \$250,000.

After several attempts to get payment, Seminole-Orange foreclosed and on Oct. 13, a Seminole circuit judge agreed to place the station for sale to satisfy the debt, now \$31,205. The amount included the unpaid principal and interest, the \$15,000 Seminole-Orange paid to Sun Bank and court and legal costs.

On Oct. 14, Mast filed a foreclosure action in Seminole Circuit Court to collect \$178,209 owed him and the outstanding \$71,510 debt he paid Sun Bank for the station. No action has been taken on that action.

Vaught and several other employees, still unpaid for five weeks or more, have filed liens against the station to collect a total of \$3,825 in unpaid wages. Vaught said he and three other former employees have also filed complaints with the Federal Wage and Hour Division to collect the money. Vaught estimates the station owes about 20 people nearly \$10,000 in unpaid wages.

If the station is sold to the Orlando couple, Stanton said all the employees will be paid. However, if the station is sold at auction in December, the likelihood of them being paid soon is remote because the liens would be subordinate to the \$31,205 debt.

"The liens were filed too late," Stanton said.

poorly, a problem she seeks to address by holding informal meetings with them and County Administrator Ken Hooper.

She also said Hooper has too much power. She cited a consulting firm she said Hooper urged the commission to hire to study the county telephone system which led to the county paying \$100,000 in what she said is unnecessary costs.

Kelley said she opposes the proposed county charter because it would grant more power to Hooper and less to commissioners.

Davis also said Hooper has been doing a poor job, allowing problems in the Animal Control department and other departments to fester before he addresses them. "As a commissioner, I'll have more of an ability to get the pulse of the county," Davis said.

Davis said that as a commissioner, he would have work days when he would go and work alongside county workers to observe the quality of their work and then meet with the department director and Hooper to discuss improvements that could be made.

Kelley cited a need to resolve the conflicts that result in lawsuits between the county and the cities. She suggested a more cooperative attitude with them, seeking to work with city officials rather than against them.

Davis suggested a similar approach.

Both candidates also saw problems with the county's roads. Davis suggested the county should lobby state officials in Tallahassee to seek new sources

of road-building money, such as fees on license plates, new bonding and a sales tax.

Kelley said the county needs to work closer with cities to accelerate road-building.

"I instructed her (Price) to cite for violation of Chapter 12 of the nuisance ordinance," DeMarie said. "Those dogs and the condition of the backyard constitute a nuisance. The dogs had climbed the fence and did minor damage to the neighbor's backyard. She said that was the only complaint in the three years she has owned the dogs.

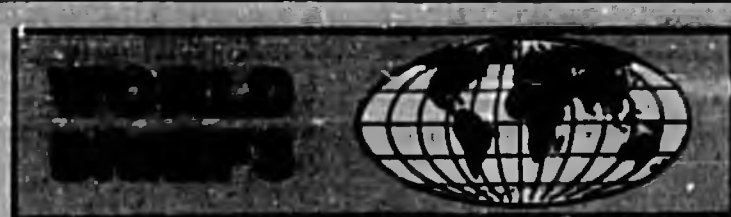

### Syria claims satellite-launching ability

BEIRUT, Lebanon — Syria acquired the technology to launch a satellite into orbit in 1986 but decided the project was not necessary, Syrian Information Minister Mohammed Salman said Friday.

Salman, quoted by the state-run Damascus radio, said "Syria had previously considered sending a communication satellite into space, and had the capabilities to carry out the plan two years ago."

"But we dropped the idea after we determined that our present means to gather information were enough," he said.

The information minister downplayed the significance of Israel's launching of a communication satellite Sept. 19.

Israel became the first space power in the Middle East when it successfully launched Ofek-1. Arab leaders denounced the launching, saying Israel would use the satellite for spying.

### Soviets mediate between Syria, Iraq

BEIRUT, Lebanon — The Soviet Union is mediating between Syria and Iraq to head off a possible military confrontation between the two Arab foes in Lebanon, a Beirut newspaper reported Friday.

The Independent An-Nahar, quoting a diplomatic source, said "Moscow is seeking to avert an Iraqi-Syrian war" in the strife-torn Middle East nation.

Recent shipments of arms and ammunition by Iraq to the Christian Lebanese Forces militia in east Beirut has provoked pro-Syrian Moslem factions to reinforce their positions around east Beirut.

### Thatcher to meet Lech Walesa

GDANSK, Poland — Solidarity leader Lech Walesa has carefully avoided the issue of Prime Minister Margaret Thatcher's tough handling of British labor unions, one of which urged Walesa to cancel his meeting today with the vis. leader.

Thatcher, winding up a three-day official visit of Poland, was scheduled to meet Walesa in the Baltic seaport of Gdansk, birthplace of the outlawed Solidarity trade union.

Walesa, currently locked in a battle with the government over Warsaw's plans to close the Lenin shipyard in Gdansk, was to escort Thatcher to a monument to shipyard workers killed by police in 1970 riots.

## Indian troops patrol capital of Maldives

COLOMBO, Sri Lanka — Indian paratroops combed the Maldivian capital of Male today for stragglers from a mercenary force that fled the Indian Ocean archipelago after failing in a coup attempt, officials said.

The 1,600 elite troops landed in the Maldives hours after gunmen invaded the islands from boats and seized the capital, engaging in fierce battles with security forces that left at least 12 people dead and 100 wounded.

The mercenaries, believed to be Sri Lankan Tamils hired by a close associate of a former Maldivian president, abandoned their struggle and escaped in two ships and a tugboat after learning Indian commandos had arrived, Sri Lankan intelligence sources said. They reportedly took a Cabinet minister hostage.

"No clashes were reported between the Indian army and the mercenaries," a senior Sri Lankan military official said. "The attackers have fled in ships."

Sri Lankan and Indian military aircraft searched the seas south of the Maldives for the three vessels carrying the mercenaries. Sri Lankan Minister of National Security Lalith Athulathmudali said.

Indian Prime Minister Rajiv Gandhi told Parliament today that Indian troops had crushed the coup attempt "without a single Indian casualty," and he hoped troop withdrawal could begin later in the day.

"We are happy to be able to assist a friendly country. An attempt to spread terror and overthrow a democratically elected government has been frustrated," the Indian leader said.

India intervened at the request of Maldivian President Maumoon Abdul Gayoom, who went in hiding when the coup began and appealed for military assistance from India, Pakistan, Sri Lanka and the United States. India is south Asia's greatest military power and has recently sought to enlarge its role as a peace-keeping force in the region.

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## Shamir seeks to dispel fears of Israeli voters

JERUSALEM — Prime Minister Yitzhak Shamir tried to dispel fears that the inclusion of religious parties in a ruling coalition would mean stricter adherence to Jewish law through legislation and the awarding of key Cabinet posts.

Analysts believe Shamir's right-wing Likud Party has the best chance of leading Israel's 23rd government after parliamentary elections Tuesday in which no party gained a majority of seats. But Foreign Minister Shimon Peres, head of the center-left Labor Party, met Thursday with members of three smaller left-wing parties to discuss a possible coalition.

Four religious parties, which won 18 of the 120 seats in the Knesset, or parliament, appear to hold the key to forming any coalition. Both Shamir and Peres met with representatives of the religious parties Wednesday and a Likud negotiating team continued talks Thursday.

### Meatcutters may strike over contract

LOS ANGELES — A spokesman for the union representing 8,000 Southern California supermarket meat cutters and wrappers said a strike against the region's main grocery chains is a "distinct possibility."

D. Whitey Ulrich, president of Local 551 of the United Food and Commercial Workers in Artesia, on Thursday charged that the contract proposed by the Food Employers Council is a series of "take-aways" and predicted that union members will reject a final offer expected at the end of negotiations Saturday.

Negotiations resume Friday with a federal mediator present. The union's contract with the Food Employers Council, which represents seven major grocery chains, expires Sunday.

In a statement, Ulrich said the union plans to submit the proposal to union members Sunday, when the current contract expires, and voting will begin. Ballots will be tallied Nov. 11 and, if rejected, strike action could begin as early as noon that day.

### Massip had no control over actions

SANTA ANA, Calif. — The attorney for a woman on trial for killing her infant son told a jury that the young mother did not have control over her actions because she was suffering from a psychosis compounded by her sickly child and unsupportive husband.

"When you look at Sheryl Massip, is she some thug, some child abuser, or some young woman, young wife, young mother trying to do the best she can?" defense attorney Milton Grimes asked an Orange County Superior Court jury in his closing arguments Thursday.

Massip, 24, is being tried for murder for driving her Volvo over the head of her 6-week-old son, Michael, on April 29, 1987, then throwing his body into a trash can and telling her husband and police that he had been kidnapped.

Grimes said Massip's actions were "beyond her control" because she was suffering from "postpartum depression," a psychosis that afflicts about three in 1,000 new mothers. It is caused by a hormonal imbalance that can sometimes lead to anxiety, abnormal behavior and, in extreme cases, violent acts.

### Marcos, wife could face jail for contempt

NEW YORK — A federal judge again warned Ferdinand and Imelda Marcos they must provide fingerprints, handwriting samples and financial records for their racketeering case or face possible incarceration for contempt of court.

Lawyers for the deposed Philippine dictator and his wife said Thursday they would comply with the order, originally issued Aug. 11 by U.S. District Judge John Walker, unless the Supreme Court responds to their request to stay the contempt citation.

The couple's lawyers asked Supreme Court Justice Thurgood Marshall to block the contempt citation, arguing the Marcos and his wife retain diplomatic immunity and contending the grand jury lacked authority to issue subpoenas seeking evidence.

Walker postponed the contempt order Thursday and gave the Marcoses until 5:30 p.m. Hawaii time Nov. 9 to provide the evidence sought in four grand jury subpoenas. They may comply in federal court in Honolulu or New York.

### Jurors squirm as injuries are shown

NEW YORK — Jurors at the murder trial of accused child killer Joel Steinberg squirmed in their seats as they watched a graphic color videotape showing the battered face and body of Steinberg's former lover Hedda Nussbaum.

Several jurors squirmed and passed their hands over their faces as others strained forward to better see the 5-minute tape Thursday showing Nussbaum's gangrenous leg, broken ribs and bald patches on her scalp where hair apparently had been yanked out.

Prosecutors said they also have videotape of a statement Steinberg made to reporters at the police station and hope to show it to the jury when the trial resumes today. In the statement, Steinberg denied Lisa was bruised, and challenged reporters to check the hospital records themselves.

Jurors Thursday glared at the defendant, who shifted nervously in his seat as Nussbaum's cauliflower ear, split lip and flattened nose were displayed, with a police officer measuring her bruises with a ruler.

# 10-year-old shoots bus driver

PORT ARTHUR, Texas — A bus driver continued fighting for her life early today after she was shot in the head by a 10-year-old boy who missed his bus.

Russell Jean Hampton, a former teacher's aide who has driven a school bus since 1983, was in very critical condition this morning and placed on a respirator at St. Mary's Hospital with a gunshot wound to the base of her skull, said Jody

Robertson, a hospital spokeswoman.

The boy, described by one school official as a "fine student," missed his Thursday morning school bus but was picked up by Hampton after she delivered the other children to school, police said.

Hampton and the boy were the only ones on Port Arthur Independent School District Bus No. 68 when the shooting took place at 8:20 a.m., police Lt. Jerry Fontenot said.

Police later questioned the boy, who was found at his grandparents' house near the scene of the shooting. They said they had no idea why the boy used his parents' gun to shoot Hampton.

The boy, who was not publicly identified, was represented by counsel at a detention hearing at a county juvenile center in Beaumont, officials said, adding that the boy did not admit to shooting Hampton.

"We don't know of any trouble

with the child and her on the bus," said police Sgt. Cedric Clayton.

The boy "has been a fine student and a good helper around the school," said Joe Pitts, superintendent of the 11,000-student Port Arthur Independent School District.

Officer Roy Gaspard, who arrived on the scene about 10 minutes after the shooting, said he found a small-caliber handgun in the second seat behind the driver.

## Communities sue to force changes in 1990 census plan

NEW YORK — In suing the Commerce Department to force adoption of new census counting methods, the nation's two most populous states and three biggest cities hope to reap more federal funds and greater representation for minorities.

New York City, Los Angeles and Chicago joined with California and New York state, the NAACP and others to file a lawsuit Thursday in U.S. District Court in Brooklyn in a bid to end what they called the unfair undercounting of urban blacks and hispanics.

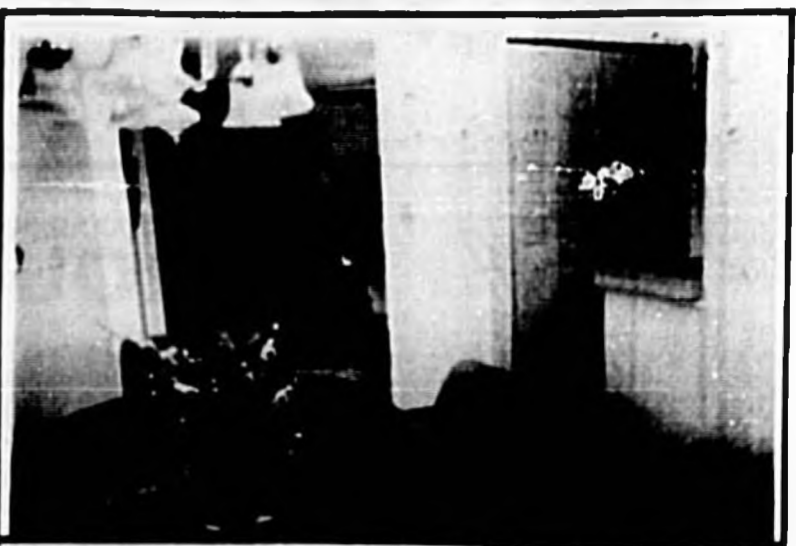
The suit charges that the undercounting of large urban minority populations in the 1980 census cheated cities and states of sorely needed federal funds

and left them underrepresented in Congress and state capitals.

The suit alleges the Commerce Department has refused to accept a recommendation from its own Census Bureau that new statistical techniques be adopted, Zimroth said.

While the Census Bureau has long acknowledged it undercounts the population, with estimates indicating it missed about 1 percent of the total in 1980, the bureau believes it undercounts blacks by 5 or 6 more percentage points, citing the difficulty of reaching into minority areas, where many people fail to respond to questionnaires and distrust the government officials.

The Commerce Department referred all questions to the Justice Department

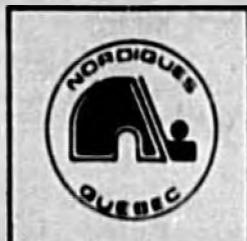

## Annuals color otherwise desolate winter gardens

The fall gardening season is at hand so it's time to get out of the summer doldrums and start thinking about your winter garden. It's time to begin planting cool season flowering annuals.

Many of the annual flowers that thrive in Northern gardens can be successfully grown in Florida, however, the season at which they are grown is quite different than in Northern states. During winter, nights are cool with an occasional freeze in Central Florida. In early spring and late fall, nights are cool, while high night temperatures, heavy rains and high relative humidity are typical during summer and early fall. Careful attention must be given to these climatic regimes if annuals are to be grown successfully in Florida.

Annuals that can be planted in October include calendula, dianthus, pansy, petunia and snapdragon. The foxglove and flaster daisy grow well and flourish under cool night temperatures in the fall in Central Florida.

Annuals flowers have many uses in the garden. They are probably best displayed in front of shrubbery borders. By choosing annuals of different heights, deep flower borders can be produced. Plant the taller species at the rear and progressively shorter varieties having different colors. Most often large groups of only one or two colors are much more effective than small beds of many colors.

Many low-growing annuals make effective edging for walks and drives. And don't forget to use annuals for window boxes and porch gardening.

Annuals can be planted as seeds or obtained as bedding plants, which can be transplanted

into the garden. Bedding plants are available at garden supply stores at reasonable prices and offer flowers quicker than growing your own plants from seeds.

When buying seeds, you get what you pay for. Seed or name varieties of a specified color are more expensive than color mixtures. If possible, plant seeds according to directions on the package. Plant after the worst of the rainy season or small seeds may be washed away. The other alternative is to start plants in flats so they can be moved to shelter during heavy rains. Some annuals such as nasturtiums and sweet peas should be planted directly in the garden.

Keep a careful watch on young annuals. Their roots are shallow so watering is necessary every day or so until they are well established. Pests also must be kept under control.

To produce compact, bushy plants, pinch the top pair of leaves after seedlings have at least three pairs of leaves. This will produce side branches and better quality plants.

The gardeners who learn how to successfully grow annuals can produce beautiful color all winter in their Florida garden.

## Therapist does heartbreak surgery

MINNEAPOLIS — Dr. Stephen Gullo figures he could have changed the course of history had he been able to treat Queen Victoria for "loveshock" after the death of Prince Albert.

He feels the rigidity of the Victorian Age stemmed directly from the failure of the "Widow of Windsor" to cope with the loss of her husband.

Gullo, who practices psychotherapy in New York and teaches at Columbia University, has defined the loss of a loved one—through death or a parting of the ways—as loveshock.

And that is the name of a book he has written with a former patient, Connie Church, a Los Angeles writer who is a divorcee and the mother of two.

They see Great Britain's Victoria as an extreme example of someone who never faced up to the problem of dealing with a broken heart.

"So great was her loss that she put the entire British Empire into loveshock," Gullo writes. "The somber clothing, the austerity, the rigidity—the Victorian Age was in truth an age of mourning, a reflection of Queen Victoria's grief, her own loveshock."

The therapist would have led the queen through six steps, teaching her "how to recover

from heart break and love again."

Whether Victoria could have loved again, she probably would have benefited from understanding the process—from shock, grief and setting blame to resignation, rebuilding and resolution.

In shock, Gullo writes, there is "an immediate sense of numbness, disorientation, and disbelief." During grief there is not just mourning for the loss of the person but mourning for the "unfulfilled promise of a life together."

People next start blaming themselves, the other person or others in general or they may look to their general life circumstances as well to place blame. Gullo says anger is usually the strongest emotion at this time.

Resignation is called the "goodbye stage" and some consider it the hardest to get through. In rebuilding, the person realizes the worst is over and it is time to start dating and "focusing on your own needs for the first time in your life."

During the resolution stage people start "a new life cycle," aware they have "made peace with their emotional pain."

"While I had no cure to offer my patients, I could help them make sense of what they were

experiencing—make them realize that they could endure what they initially found to be unbearable," Gullo writes.

He first treated women who were trying to adjust to living with terminally ill husbands but he later became a sought-after counselor for star-crossed lovers.

Recently, Gullo and Church have been on the talk-show

circuits, promoting their book.

In an interview in Minneapolis, they agreed their effort amounts to "an anatomy of heart break."

Much of the book deals with the loss of a lover or a spouse through divorce.

"I thought I was going insane," Church said, recalling the period after her husband asked for a divorce.

## Religious education for public schools proposed

BOSTON — A non-sectarian group proposing to bring religion back into America's classrooms by 1991 said great care will be taken to keep the curriculum "within the limits of what is constitutionally permissible."

The Williamsburg Charter Foundation, a non-profit, non-partisan group devoted to creating a consensus on the place of religious freedom, was formed by a committee representing Protestants, Catholics, Jews and secularists.

On June 25, the 200th anniversary of the state of Virginia's public call for a Bill of Rights, the group introduced the Williamsburg Charter, which reaffirms the right of freedom of conscience and vows to promote understanding of religious liberty.

"Education without proper attention to the role of religion is poor education," said Os Guinness, executive director of the foundation. The proposed curriculum for public schools was introduced Thursday to about 150 community and religious leaders at a hotel luncheon.

Signers of the document include former presidents Jimmy Carter and Gerald Ford, Chief

## Group addresses issue of religion in public schools

In the frenzied and often intemperate debate on religion in American public life, disputants on all sides of the issue agree on one thing — the nation's historical tradition of religious liberty is a good one.

Increasingly they also find themselves in agreement on another matter — that tradition is not adequately presented and celebrated in the nation's schools.

In order to address that second element, a coalition of national education leaders, headed by Ernest Boyer, president of the Carnegie Foundation for the Advancement of Teaching, and sponsored by the Williamsburg Charter Foundation,

"For far too long, we've had

a remarkable silence on teaching about religion in the nation's public schools."

Boyer, one of the nation's most respected educators and the commissioner of education from 1977 to 1979, told a recent news conference announcing the new project.

"This silence is not because of a conspiracy but because of confusion about what such a curriculum should include and a genuine concern that to discuss religion in the classroom might be viewed as indoctrination, or a violation of the conscience of students, as well as a violation of the fundamental principles of the Constitution," he said.

But the silence, Boyer said, has led to the mistaken belief that public schools "are at the very least, indifferent to religion, or at the very most, actively opposed" to religion.

concentrate on religious history. "It will handle more freely the wider issues of religious liberty," he said. "It's not an attempt to cover the religious waterfront."

He said the curriculum, while maintaining "very careful commitments to being within the limits of what is constitutionally permissible," would address First Amendment issues and the history of pluralism in the United States.

It will also attempt to teach children how to accept religious differences, and deal with "the coming to America, from the refugees of today right back to the Pilgrims," Guinness said.

"It's amazing the ignorance of the role of faith in inspiring social movements of freedom," he said, referring to the civil rights movement and the women's suffrage movement.

While Guinness acknowledged the proposal has aroused "deep suspicion" among extreme fundamentalists and secularists, he said the foundation has received support from diverse sects.

"Some fundamentalists have signed (the charter), some have refused. Some secularists have signed, some have refused. Some atheists have signed, some have been very hostile," he said.

## Everyone can be a point of light

I am not altogether sure what George Bush means when he talks about "a thousand points of light." But it reminds me of something that happened in the Los Angeles Coliseum one night just after V-J Day in 1945.

More than 100,000 spectators had come to witness a pageant in honor of the city's war heroes. The playing field had been transformed into a terrifyingly realistic battle scene.

Here is one spectator's graphic description of what he saw:

"Exploding land mines shook the earth. Batteries of Army tanks roared across the stadium. A mass formation of B-29s swooped down over the great throng of people.

"The noise was deafening and the effect overpowering, as if to emphasize the helplessness and insignificance of the individual in the face of so much mechanical might."

Suddenly all the outbursts stopped and the master of ceremonies stepped to the microphone and said:

"Perhaps you sometimes say to yourself, 'My job isn't important because it's such a little job.' But you're wrong. The most obscure person can be very important. Let me show you what I mean."

At that point the great floodlights that bathed every corner of the coliseum were turned off. The noonday brightness of the great arena was suddenly turned into total darkness. Then the speaker struck a match and in the blackness the tiny flame could be seen by everyone.

"Now you can see the importance of one little light," the speaker said. "But suppose we all strike a light."

From all over the vast coliseum came the sound of matches being struck until, faster than it takes to tell, 100,000 pinpoints of light lit up the

summer night as everyone gasped with surprise.

In the crowd that evening was a Catholic priest named Father James Keller. As he made his way out through the milling thousands at the end of the evening's program, he found himself thinking about how comparatively easy it would be to bring peace to a heartsick world if only enough of the wonderful people in it would make a constant effort to spread the light of truth and combat the darkness of error.

That was the beginning of the Christopher movement. In 43 years it has enlisted hundreds of thousands of Americans in its crusade to change the world — not through any spectacular

means but by encouraging normal, decent, average citizens to get into mainstream American life and quietly, without fanfare, bring the influence of good ideas.

Anybody can be a Christopher. There is nothing to join. You don't have to be elected. All you have to do is bring Christ into whatever corner of the world you happen to occupy. Christopher means "Christ-bearer."

If a good man does nothing more than fill a job that might otherwise be filled by someone whose personal influence on his

fellow workers would be bad rather than good, he is making a worthwhile contribution. He is a Christopher.

Not many of us are called to be beacons in a darkened world. But each of us can be a pinpoint of light. And if enough of us are, we can illuminate the whole world.

This was the vision of Father Keller that night in 1945 when he saw 100,000 pinpoints of light turn the darkness of the Los Angeles Coliseum into day.

His vision can still be a lamp unto our feet.

**Dose of medicine seems to be high**

**DEAR DR. GOTT:** Last year one-third of my husband's stomach was removed because of a bleeding ulcer. Just before being released, he developed anxiety and depression and was hospitalized for a week in a psychiatric ward. He has a prescription for 200 mg. Elavil at bedtime. He's so doped up he falls asleep at work, can't get out of bed and has the energy of a 90-year-old. I think this is too much medicine but I can't seem to get through to his doctor.

**DEAR READER:** The amount of Elavil (an anti-depressant) that your husband is receiving seems to be high. The usual dose is 25-50 mg a day. The symptoms he is experiencing could certainly be due to over-medication.

If his doctor ignores your concerns, find another one who will be more sympathetic and who will consider reducing your husband's Elavil dose or changing over to another anti-depressant.

Here is an example of defensive bridge exotica involving Lew Stansby, frequent North American champion and occasional world champion sitting West. He heard the opponents arrive in four hearts after North had made a negative double of West's one-diamond overcall. Let me tell you something about the methods of Stansby and his partner Chip Martel in such a bidding situation. Martel had two ways of showing a diamond raise after a negative double. A simple raise showed support without a high diamond honor. Had East held the ace, king or queen of diamonds with support, he would redouble, which for them has that special meaning. However, none of this has significance for the actual deal, since it is certainly obvious that

Stansby needed only to look at his own cards to know that Martel could not hold a high honor in diamonds.

Still, the seven of clubs was led. East won the ace and returned the three of clubs. West ruffed and made the same play that I suppose you or I would have made, but it still requires a bit of teeth-gritting. He underled the A-K-Q-J-10 of diamonds. Sure enough, his partner had the nine and came back with another club to beat the contract one trick.

# Geraldo's nose broken in brawl

**UPI report**

**NEW YORK** — Geraldo Rivera suffered a broken nose in a chair-throwing brawl that erupted during the taping of a show entitled "Teen Hatemongers," as young neo-Nazis from the racist "skinheads" group battled black activist Roy Innis.

The melee Thursday erupted after a woman in the audience asked John Metzger, a 20-year-old representing the White Aryan Resistance Youth, what he was "afraid of" in refusing to answer questions.

Metzger replied he was "sick and tired of hearing the sob stories from liars like you." Then, pointing to Innis, he said "I get sick and tired of seeing the Uncle Tom here sucking up trying to be a white man."

Innis, the head of the Congress of Racial Equality, jumped to his

feet, pounding his fist in his hand, and moved to confront Metzger.

When Metzger began to rise out of his chair, Innis put a hand on his shoulder and then grabbed him around the throat with both hands.

As the two men struggled about 25 audience participants, including several other "skinheads," leaped from their seats and stormed the stage pushing and shoving, sending some participants and technicians scattering in confusion.

During the brawl a man identified by a spokeswoman on the show as a body guard for Metzger hurled a chair into the fray.

Rivera rushed to Innis' defense and was apparently struck from behind by a chair and punched in the nose. Eight security guards then broke up the fight.

The show, titled "Teen Hatemongers," featured Innis, Jewish

# Doctors don't like to take own advice

LOS ANGELES — A new study suggests that less than half of medical doctors take their own advice and see a physician regularly, while college professors with doctoral degrees are much more likely to have their own physicians.

A re-examination of a 1983 survey of physicians' attitudes toward medical care revealed only 44 percent of the doctors surveyed had personal physicians compared to 74 percent of the Ph.D.s who responded to the questionnaire.

"This does not imply that physicians are less healthy," said Dr. Katherine Kahn, a UCLA internist and chief investigator of the study reported in the current issue of the Archives of Internal Medicine.

But the implication is that a substantial number of M.D.s and Ph.D.s do not have a personal physician and that they are less likely to receive good health maintenance and screening.

While the Ph.D.s were more likely to seek routine health care, Kahn said Thursday the fact that more than a quarter of them do not have personal physicians suggests that some of the best educated people in the country fail to realize the importance of routine health maintenance.

The survey involved 144 university-based physicians and 283 non-physician doctoral university faculty. They were questioned on attitudes about regular testing for heart and blood pressure function, cholesterol levels, cancer and other health care matters.

"What we wanted to see in this survey is how well physicians followed the (health maintenance) guidelines compared to the Ph.D.s," she said.

Kahn and her colleagues found that doctors who failed to see personal physicians were less likely to have such routine health maintenance tests as blood pressure examinations, cholesterol testing, rectal examinations for the presence of colon abnormalities and breast and pelvic exams for women.

"Knowing the way physicians interact with their patients is a clue to other attitudes," they may have about health care, Kahn said.
