

Unemployment rate drops

WASHINGTON — Unemployment drupped slightly in October to 5.3 percent, the government said today, providing evidence of a continuing economic expansion that has been heralded by the presidential campaign of Republican George Bush

In the last unemployment report before the presidential election in four days, the Labor Department said unemployment dropped to 5.3 percent in October, compared to 5.4 percent in September.

Soviets stop Afghan withdrawal

MOSCOW — The Soviet Union has suspended the withdrawal of its troops from Alghanistan because of recent rebel successes and will not resume the pullout until the situation stabilizes a senior official said today.

Deputy Foreign Minister Alexander Bessnermylds said the US backed rebels had builded 550 attacks in Soviet positions since the May 15 start of the withdrawal inflating casualties on Soviet forces.

The Soviet Union, which invaded Afghanistan in Desember, 1979, to support a communist government threatened by internal leads and Moslem rebels, signed a pact in Geneva April 14 pledging to withdraw its 100, 100 troops by Erb. 14



District 5 candidates offer contrasting styles

SANFORD — The District 5 Seminole County Commission rate offers a difference in styles between its two candidates.

Democrat Art Davis 47 of unmeriporated west Santond is a county critic noted for his aggressive forays into such issues as the Yanker Lake schage treatment plant and problems

within counts departments. Republican Jennifer Kelley 52 of Santord, uses a less confrontational approach in her politicking and admits her most active involvement in county government began when she decided to seek the office late last year.

Dayls has owned his own plumbing contracting business for 12 years and is a member of the Seminole County Democratic Executive Committee He has a high school degree.

This is Davis first attempt at elected office although he currently serves on the county Code Enforcement Board and previously served on the county Parks and Recreation Board, the Alcohol Drugs and Mental Health Council, and other

public committees and boards.

Kelley, was a humanities and english teacher in Seminole County schools for 18 years. She also has worked as office manager of her and her husband's architectural firm in Sautord. She has been active in the Republican party, serving as president of the Sautord Women's Republican

Chih and is an associate member of the Florid. Federation of Young Republicans

Kelley has a bachelor's degree from Barry University and has studied towards a post graduate degree in administration and business management

Both candidates see problems in county government that they said they would address as commissioners, both cite problem solving as one of their main goals in seeking the office.

Dayts and Kelley point to problems in county staff—particularly—in the senior management positions as county administrator

Tornado rips through Fort Myers

FORT MYERS — A ternado ripped a quarter-mile path through a residential area Friday, ripping off roofs, downing power lines and uprooting trees, the Lee County sheriff's office

There were no reports of any injuries, but sheriff's deputies were going from house to house to be sure no one was hurt.

Sgt. Alan Bromley said the tornado hit at 1:15 and was about a quarter of a mile wide at one point. He said it was about a

half-mits long. Fower was knocked out in a small area.
"There is extensive damage to the residential area." Bromley said. 'Trees were uprooted and roofs are partially missing or completely missing. We expect to be out there all day assisting Florida Power & Light and other cleanup crews."

Heavy rain has swept through sections of south and southwest Plorids in the past 48 hours, but officials say they are concerned about a lack of moisture in the area now and the resulting fire danger.

Disney unions reject contract offer

LAKE BUENA VISTA - The Services Trade Council. a aix-union coalition representing about 12,000 workers at Walt Disney World, voted overwhelmingly Thursday to reject a new three-year contract.

Only a small number of those eligible to vote actually cast ballots at the Contemporary Hotel, where union members were said to be furious with the company's proposal. The vote total was 1,775 against and 101 for the contract.

The current contract was extended until inidnight Monday and Disney and union negotiators are to return to the bargaining table Friday.

A Dianey spokesperson says the company would listen to the union desires, but Dianey had made what it considered its best

Trade Council president Harvey Totazke said the contract rejection should not be considered a strike vote, and admitted the unions never before have rejected what Disney considered

The Disney proposal provides wage increases totaling 13 percent over the next three years. However, the trade council was more concerned with raising the pay grades of certain workers, such as bus drivers, rather than overall wage

Workers earlier this week overwhelmingly rejected Disney's first proposal.

Student attendance reports criticized

TALLAHASSEE - Florida Department of Education officials need to improve their efforts at tracking the enrollment level of ludents in state public schools, according to an audit released Thursday by Auditor General Charles Lester.

"Although substantial improvements have been made by the Department to eliminate the backlog of full-time equivalent membership reviews ... we continued to note instances where these reviews were not performed in a timely manner," state auditors wrote.

Florida statutes require the Department of Education to conduct periodic reviews of the state's 67 school districts to determine the number of full-time equivilent students in the classroom

That figure is used to determine the level of state appropriations for basic operations, a school district's cost differential, quality guarantee allocations and the amount of local funding needed.

The figure also helps determine what adjustment, if any, a district will receive for funding it received in the previous school year and financial assistance provided in cases where a district's enrollment is declining.

The audit found that from 1982-87, full-time student examination reports "were issued for only 33 of 67 school

Astronauts poke fun at secrecy

SPACE CENTER, Houston - The Soviet Union's new space shuttle appears to be an "outright" copy of its U.S. counterpart, says the skipper of the shuttle Atlantis, which is scheduled to blast off at the end of the month on a secret military flight.

"It sure does look like they copied ours," veteran ahuttle commander Robert "Hoot" Gibson said in an interview Thursday at the

Johnson Space Center.

Gibson and his four crewmates — co-pilot Guy Gardner, Richard "Mike" Mullane, Jerry Ross and William Shepherd — are scheduled to take off aboard Atlantis around Nov. 28 on the second post-Challenger flight, a classified mission to launch a secret py mtelite.

In two previous classified Defense De-partment ahuttle flights, interviews with crew members were forbidden because of the hush-hush nature of such missions. But the Air Force made an exception in the case of Atlantis's crew, although no missionspecific questions were allowed.

In any case, when the astronauts showed up for their interviews Thursday, they were sporting black Lone Ranger-style masks. apparently poking good-natured fun at the secrecy surrounding the 27th shuttle

Gibson said he believes the Soviet Union's new shuttle, called Buran, is a ripost of NASA's overall design and that if the outline of one was placed atop the other a near-perfect fit would result.

The Soviets attempted to launch their first shuttle on its maiden voyage Saturday, but trouble with ground equipment forced them to delay the unmanned, two-orbit flight until later this month. In all likelihood, Buran will take off before Atlantia.

"We either have to feel we were really brilliant when we developed ours because they did it completely independently and

came up with the same answer, or we have to think they're no dummies and why spend all that money and all that time developing something ... when they could just copy something that was out there?" Gibson

"One of the Soviets' well-known mottos is 'better is a severe enemy of good enough." So why develop something that might be better than ours when ours is good enough and they can just flat outright copy it? And I

tend to think that's what happened. With Atlantis on a launch pad at the Kennedy Space Center and with Buran on its pad at the Balkonur Cosmodrome in Soviet Central Asia, interest in shuttle activity is at a fever pitch.

The precise launch time will not be known until nine minutes before liftoff, the landing time will not be revealed until 24 hours before touchdown and no radio transmissions or television pictures from the shuttle will be released.

Couple's dream is ecological disaster

PIERSON - Melvin and Janine Rutkowski of East Detrott. Mich., dream of a retirement home with a lake view and abundant wildlife all around

But their ignorance of Florida's fragile ecosystem and laws to protect it has dropped them in the middle of an environmental nightmare that could end with a large fine and time behind bars.

Mechanical engineer Ruthowski. 63. and three men who worked for him are charged with filegal dredging and filling to build a road through a swamp in the Lake George wetlands in rural Volusta County west of Daytona Beach.
"I can't believe they'd go after

us for a tiny little road," said Janine Rutkowski, a 56-year-old school psychologist.

"This is the worst nonpermitted destruction of wetinnds, beautiful pristine wetlands, I've ever seen," said Assistant State Attorney Mac McLeod, who filed charges late Wednesday against Rutkowski and his workmen.

McLeod characterized the

project as "rip and tear" and vowed to press the case.

A canal 400 feet long and 60 feet wide now anakes through the undeveloped area that acts as a natural filtration system for the lake's wetlands. Dozens of mature cypress and hardwoods were felled in dredging the soil to build the adjacent road.

The Florida Game and Fresh Water Fish Commission discovered the project and halted it before the full 2.200-foot road could be completed through the 17.4-acre tract the Rutkowskia purchased earlier this year.

"I'd have to say this is probably the most flagrant illegal wetlands destruction I've ever seen myself," said commission Lt. D. Gray Leonhard.

I don't even know what a wetland is. I have no idea," Rutkowski said. "How do you destroy wetlands? All you're doing is putting a house there and putting a road." Officials with the state De-

partment of Environmental Regulation and the St. Johns River Water Management District said they had not issued permits for the project and probably would not have done so if they had received applications.

Appellate panel hears Official English appeal

MIAMI - Opponents of the Official English initiative in Florida are seeking to block next week's vote on whether English should be the state's official tongue in a last-minute appeal to the 11th Circuit Court of Ap-

A three-judge panel from the federal court heard arguments in Miami in the emotional case Thursday, but did not indicate

when it will rule on the issue. Voters are acheduled to decide Tuesday whether to enshrine English as the state's official language and polls indicate the measure enjoys broad support.

"The court expressed today that it would rule as quickly as it could, (but) it is not essential that it occur before the election," said Steve Zalesin, an attorney for those challenging the legality

the legal skirmishing, however Lawyers said an appeal to the U.S. Supreme Court is possible. regardless of the outcome.

In the meantime, opponents continued a campaign to discredit the amendment by seeking to link its backers to extremists. Opponents have characterized the initiative as a slap at the state's large immigrant population.

Jeffrey Browne, a spokesman for Speak Up Now in Florida, which opposes the initiative. said an organization affiliated with U.S. English had received \$370,000 between 1980 and 1986 from the Pioneer Fund.

Browne described the Pioneer Fund as a racist New York organization. U.S. English is a national group that seeks to make English the official language of the United States. in court inuraday, opponents

argued that the petition drive that placed the initiative on Tuesday's ballot violated the Voting Rights Act of 1965. Petitions circulated in support

of the amendment should have been distributed in Spanish in six Florida counties with large minority populations, lawyers

U.S. District Judge James W. Kehoe rejected that argument last week, however, in a ruling that set the stage for Thursday's appeal.

The appeal, brought on behalf by four Spanish speaking residents of Florida, got a boost Wednesday when the U.S. Justice Department filed a brief in support of the opponent's pusition.

Sanford woman injured in accident

LAKE MARY - A 26-year-old Sanford woman suffered chest injuries in a collision of her car with the flatbed of a truck. Her car struck the truck as the truck blocked both lanes of Markham Woods Road at about 6:35 p.m. Thursday.

Sandra Gaye Lanchart, of 211 Sir Lawrence Drive, was treated at Central Florida Regional Hospital, Sanford, following the accident. A hospital spokesman today said Lanchart was released after treatment for chest and arms bruises. The driver of the truck, Anthony D. Vinson, 30, of Eustis, was not injured. A Florida Highway Patrol spokesman today said charges are

pending the outcome of an investigation. The spokesman said Vinson was traveling about 2 mph as his truck, that had just been emptied of a load of trees, pulled

from a jobsight and traveled east across Markham Woods Road to enter that roadway.

Lanchart, who was traveling north on Markham Woods Road in a 1978 Dodge, apparently did not see a man who was trying to stop traffic to allow the truck to block the road, the spokesman said. It was raining at the time of the accident. which occurred just outside Lake Mary.

Charter would help Seminole County

Should there be a home rule charter for Seminole County? This question will be on the ballot Tuesday. It has been the topic of much discussion.

Described by its sponsors as a so-called "starter charter," the basic effect of home rule will be the vesting of many powers now held by the state legislature with the county.

Although well-informed opponents state the document is flawed, no persuasive arguments have been made to make its rejection adviscable. To the contrary, the effect of restoring rights to the county is akin to the basic precepts of states rights, a doctrine as old as our Republic.

Governance by a state legislature is logical when dealing with matters relating to all of Florida. However, the requirement to seek legislative approval in matters exclusively within the domain of Seminole County is comparable to the state asking the U.S. Congress for permission to hold an election.

Attempts to strike the question from the

ballot are ill advised. This is a matter for the people to decide. The charter will give additional powers directly to the people in the form of rights of initiative and recall of officials. It is a point charter proponents are quick to make.

The current proposal does not contain the provisions that other urbanizing counties have favored to help them deal with growth; it does allow the county to impose a utility-user tax on residents of the unincorporated areas. although county officials have said they will not do that.

Seminole County now ranks with the larger counties of the state. Twelve have opted for home rule in varying forms. Citizens of this county deserve the powers inherent in home rule and are quite capable of protecting the rights of cities within the county, and their own individual rights.

The merits outweigh the demerits. The Herald recommends a yes vote to adopt the Home Rule Charter

Seminole County has assumed a leadership role within the state in educational advances. Much of the credit for this rests with a capable, hard-working school board. Two members of that board. Chairman Joseph Williams and Nancy Warren, are seeking re-election to their posts.

Both of these incumbents have been deeply involved in the advances made in alternative education for problem students and in the disposition of funds derived from the school bond issue for school construction. Progress has been made in coping with the distinct problems caused by the population growth of the county, and this experience will prove valuable during the next four years.

The Herald recommends the re-election of Joe Williams and Nancy Warren to their posts on the Seminole County School Board.

Valdes possesses necessary skills

The principal function of the Tax Collector is management. Business and personnel management skills are all important. A hands-on approach to management sounds good when spoken but fails when constitutional officers perform clerical chores.

Ray Valdes has demonstrated intellectual training in business through university studies at Georgia and Northwestern. He gained valuable management skills with three major national corporations and now operates his own business successfully. Mr. Valdes is active in area civic, service and youth organizations which demonstrates his commitment to good citizenship.

The skills which Mr. Valdes has demonstrated should prove valuable to Seminole County residents when applied in public service. The Herald recommends the election of Mr. Valdes to the post of Tax Collector.

Warnings protect producers

BOSTON - Any day now, television will get a warning of its very own. I don't mean one of those stickers alerting us not to drop it into the bathtub. This is about programming, not

electricity. The warning comes from the American Academy fo Pediatrics in the form of a zippy cartoon message for kids: Watch too much on the tube and you may turn into a couch potato. Children will be humorously admonished to "avoid this dread disease; be choosy in what you watch." They will also be told, "Don't just plop in front of the TV cause you've got nothing else to do."

At first glance, it is surprising that stations whould agree to air video ditties urging that viewers tune out. It's rather like an ice-cream store putting up a sign warning customers to eat less ripple fudge to avoid cardiovascular

But isn't that what's going around? A foreigner coming to this country would be astounded by the number of warnings put up like biliboards along the consumer highways. Any number of goods are being marketed aggressively while being warned about artfully.

I suspect the warning binge began in its current form with cigarettes. In the 1970s, the obvious health risks of smoking clashed with the obvious political risks of banning tobacco. A compromise was devised. A public warning was attached to a private product. We let the consumer beware.

The ironly in this approach is that the warning is often better protection for the producer than the consumer, weather it's the producter of cigarettes, movies or sweetners. The eigarette labels didn't stop many from smoking, but they protected the companies from lawsuits. The ratings on movies equally mute the outrage of an audience.

Let a consumer complain and those in charge are sure to say righteously: Hadn't they seen the handwriting on the wall, the printing on the pack, the rating on the marquee?

Warning has become a high art form in the science and medical news. We are confronted daily with danger signs. We are expected to become informed about an extraordinary array of things, from the steroids fed to beef cattle to aodium levels in baby food.

In California, there is a law requiring a warning be posted on anything that poses a "aignificant risk" of causing cancer or genetic injury. In theory (although not yet in practice), people in the market will be faced with a full basket of information.

But even there, the onus is on the individual to make an unending series of health decisions. and risk assessments, merely to get through the day. Where on the shopping list of worries should they place pesticides on the lettuce? Was this grapefruit sprayed with the lead armenate?

We often accept the notion that our health and safety is merely a matter of proper warning and personal choice.

The other day, a woman whose family lives downwind from the Hanford plutonium plant

in Washigton state was interviewed. Radiation had leaked unannounced and unadmitted from that plant for decades while her family had suffered from a host of thyroid symptoms. What did she tell a reporter? "They never told us so we could protect ourselves."

is that all we expect now? A warning on the plant. prominently displayed, so we can choose to stay or leave? A warning about the holes in

form with cigarettes 🖷 the ozone so we can apply sunscreen? A warning about polluted water so we can buy it

It's easy to lose the distinction between the dangers that are a matter of personal choice and the dangers that are a matter of public inquiry and control. We can check our own house for radon, cut back on eggs for breakfast and alcohol during pregnancy. But no person can make his or her choice about the air we breath and the rain that brings acid down on

The television warning lies in the crowded overlapping arena of public and private decision-making. Kids do have the power to turn the tube off. But the admonition that they be "choosy" viewers, picky viaual consumers, is pure hype. A "public-serive announcement" doesn't excuse the fact that television offers kids so little of value.

So this anti-TV commercial is more than a spoof. It's a kind of training film for kids. Soon they'll enter a world where they are treated more like individual consumers than like public citizens.

In this world, warnings are often used as an excuse. Maybe this announcement should carry a label of its own. Caution: Even warnings can be hazardous for our public

by, and the sins of the Kennedys multiply with the generations, the comparison accma ever more apt. "They not only had a lot of money but had never been put to the coarsening trouble of earning it. They made the appropriate cultural noises. They had the right academic and media connections, and could buy more if necessary. They had their own court historians and tame editors. They spoke the liberal vernacular with zeal if not from inner conviction. Most important of all, they exercised, like any other self-assured artistocracy, however ematz, a powerful appeal over the intelligentals, which will always prefer a graceful prince to a self-made man. To the intellectuals, and to the East Coast liberals generally, the 1960 election was between 'us' and 'them,' a Manichean struggle between enlightment and material-

"In fact it was one of the most corrupt elections of modern times, with the Democratic machine forced to play all its grubby cards to get Kennedy elected at all. He won by a whisker in circumstances which will always make the validity of his election dubious...And so it was that Camelot came into being, the glittering antithesis of Nixonian suburbia: in the foreground, cerebral rhetoric, haute coutre, patronage of the arts: in the background, sexual athletics with Mails molis, shielded by a compliant press."

When John Kennedy's life ended by an assassin's bullet in Dallas, he was in fact visiting Texas because he was in deep trouble there politically with a presidential election in the offing. Texas Governor John Connally was telling him that he might not carry Texas against Barry Goldwater in 1964. Kennedy's strength in the national polls was decidely shaky.

One of the jokes of the time was, "Fidel isn't bad, but look out for his little brother Raoul. And Jack's okay, but look out for his little brother, Raoul." Raoul Castro was head of the Cuban KGB.

Lee Harvey Oswald shot Jack Kennedy. He also canonized him.

Hardly anyone ever wanted Lyndon Johnson to be president. But we saw the slow funeral train, the horse with the reversed stirrups, the widow Jackie in a black veil, the tiny child John John, and the eternal flame grave at Arlington.

According to court and county records. River Country Broadcasting purchased the station on Nov. 17, 1987 from Seminole-Orange Broadcasting Co. The transaction included a promissory note for \$12,837 signed by River Country President Bowen. He also signed and guaranteed a note with Metro-Orlando Broadcasters, Inc. for \$178,103 on the same date.

Metro-Orlando had owned the 1.000-watt station from October 1983 to December 1984 when it sold it to Emmet Broadcasting and retained a second mortgage. Emmet, in turn, sold the station to Seminole-Orange about a year

Bowen also agreed to make payments on a Sun Bank first mortgage, originally issued to Seminole-Orange in 1986 in the amount of \$89,000, according to the documents.

When Bowen and his father-in-law, Evert Demster of Lakeland, bought the station last year, they had expressed high hopes for their first ve wire in radio broadcasting.

Bowen's primary experience is in television production. He produced the popular Orlando-based Church Street Station broadcast on The Nashville Network, with Stanton as executive producer, from 1984 to 1967. The pair subsequently produced another TNC program. Rock and Roll Palace, filmed at Little Durlings in Kissimmee.

Bowen is also known as "Grady L.," a comic character he portrays locally and na-

The station's financial picture began to sour and by March 1988, the \$12,837 amount owed to Seminole-Orange, plus interest, was in default, court records shew.

Frank Vaught, former station general manager, said the station was paying out \$12,000 in monthly expenses such as salaries and utilities, while receiving about \$8 0000 in monthly income from advertising and promotion sales revenue.

You feel that it will work." Howen said. "The thing you did not realize is it relies on sales."

Howen attributed much of the station's cash flow problems to inadequate financing, a difficulty in finding adequate advertising

sales people, a difficulty in selling sufficient advertising in the tough Sanford market, and agressive competition from larger, Orlando-based FM stations.

Bowen also blamed himself partially for the company's financial problems. He said he spent too much of his time away from the station pursuing other

Bowen said he and Demster invested thousands of dollars in personal money in the station but he refused to specify the

Vaught said he resigned from the station in February because of the financial situation and one promotion campaign, the "69cent dollar" which he said was a poor business decision.

In return for a fee-paid sponsorship, a company would receive promotions and agree to accept the 69-cent dollars from WKUS listeners who bought them from the station for 69 cents each. The listener could purchase \$1 in goods and services from the sponsor, who would redeem them at the station for \$1.

Vaught said the idea would work if the sponsors advertised heavily, but they did not, and WKUS amassed several thousand dollars in debt from the promotion, including \$8,771 to Winn-Dixte stores.

Of differences between Vaught and other key staffers. Howen said. "We had a couple of people here who differed in the way things should be done.

Vaught returned as general manager in early September in an effort to help revitalize the station. He said he found it in much the same financial condition as when he left. Vaught said he found the station's outstanding debt stayed at about \$45,000 to \$55,000 each month and the average amount owed to the station monthly at about \$18,000 to \$20,000, although less than half that amount was collected.

We had a negative cash flow," he said.

Vaught said he trimmed several staff members, but had little success in curbing the monthly deficit. Employee paychecks occasionally were a week or more late during the period. Employees complained that some of their paychecks were

not honored because of insufficient funds in the station's account at First Union Bank

Valght and other station employees said the station had not paid license fees required to play records on the atr as of Oct. 28. That is when Vaught resigned for the final time.

Even though Seminole-Orange continued to hold the Sun bank note, River Country had agreed to make its monthly payment to satisfy the original \$89,000 debt. the court records show. The records also show Seminole-Orange paid \$15,000 of the debt.

But by Sept. 15, despite the help. Bowen said the financial situation had become "somewhat of a nightmare.

At that point, Metro-Orange President William Masi paid the remaining \$71,510 owed in the Sun bank note, increasing his financial involvement to nearly \$250,000.

After several attempts to get payment. Seminole-Orange foreclosed and on Oct. 13, a Seminole circuit judge agreed to place the station for sale to satisfy the debt, now \$31,205. The amount included the unpaid principal and interest, the \$15,000 Seminole-Orange paid to Sun Bank and court and legal

On Oct. 14. Massi filed a foreclosure action in Seminole Circuit Court to collect \$176,209 owed him and the outstanding \$71,510 debt he paid Sun Bank for the station. No action has been taken on that action.

Vaught and several other employees, still unpaid for five weeks or more, have filed liens against the station to collect a total of \$3.825 in unpaid wages. Vaught said he and three other former employees have also filed complaints with the Federal Wage and Hour Division to collect the money. Vaught estimates the station owes about 20 people nearly \$10,000 in unpaid wages.

If the station is sold to the Orlando couple, Stanton said all the employees will be paid. However, if the station is sold at auction in December, the likelihood of them being paid soon is remote because the liens would be subordinate to the \$31,205 debt.

"The liens were filed too late," Stanton said.

Syria claims satellite-launching ability

BEIR'JT. Lebanon — Syria acquired the technology to launch a satellite into orbit in 1986 but decided the project was not necessary. Syrian information Minister Mohammed Salman said Friday.

Salman, quoted by the state-run Damascus radio, said "Syria had previously considered sending a communication satellite into space, and had the capabilities to carry out the plan two years ago.

"But we dropped the idea after we determined that our present means to gather information were enough," he said.

The information minister downplayed the significance of

israel's launching of a communication satellite Sept. 19.
Israel became the first space power in the Middle East when it successfully launched Ofek-1. Arab leaders denounced the launching, saying Israel would use the satellite for spying.

Soviets mediate between Syria, Iraq

BEIRUT, Lebanon — The Soviet Union is mediating between Syria and Iraq to head off a possible military confrontation between the two Arab foes in Lebanon, a Beirut newspaper reported Friday.

The independent An-Naher, quoting a diplomatic source, and "Moscow is seeking to avert an Iraqi-Syrian war" in the strife-torn Middle East nation.

Recent shipments of arms and ammunition by Iraq to the Christian Lebanese Forces militia in east Beirut has provoked pro-Syrian Moslem factions to reinforce their positions around east Beirut.

Thatcher to meet Lech Walesa

GDANSK, Poland -- Solidarity leader Lech Waless has carefully avoided the issue of Prime Minister Margaret Thatcher's tough handling of British labor unions, one of which urged Waless in cancel his meeting today with the vision leader.

Thatcher, winding up a three-day official visit of Poland, was scheduled to meet Walesa in the Baltic seaport of Gdansk, birthplace of the outlawed Solidarity trade union.

Walesa, currently locked in a battle with the government over Warsaw's plans to close the Lenin shippard in Gdansk, was to excort Thatcher to a monument to shippard workers killed by police in 1970 riots.

Indian troops patrol capital of Maldives

COLOMBO, Sri Lanka -- Indian paratroops combed the Maldivian capital of Male today for atragglers from a mercenary force that fled the Indian Ocean archipelago after failing in a coup attempt, officials said.

The 1.600 elite troops landed in the Maldives hours after gunmen invaded the islands from boats and seized the capital engaging in fierce battles with security forces that left at least 12 people dead and 100 wounded.

The mercenaries, believed to be Sri Lankan Tamils hired by a close associate of a former Maldivian president, abandoned their struggle and escaped in two ships and a tugboat after learning Indian commandos had arrived. Sri Lankan intelligence sources said. They exportedly took a Cabinet minister hostage.

"No clashes were reported between the Indian army and the mercenaries," a senior Sri Lankan military official said. "The attackers have fled in ships."

Sri Lankan and Indian military aircraft searched the seas south of the Maldives for the three vessels carrying the mercenaries. Sri Lankan Minister of National Security Lalith Athulathmudali said.

Indian Prime Minister Rajiv Gandhi told Parliament today that Indian troops had crushed the coup attempt "without a single Indian casualty," and he hoped troop withdrawal could begin later in the day.

"We are happy to be able to assist a friendly country. An attempt to spread terror and overthrow a democratically elected government has been frustrated." the Indian leader said.

India intervened at the request of Maldivian President Maumoon Abdul Gayoom, who went in hiding when the coup began and appealed for military assistance from India. Pakistan, Sri Lanka and the United States. India is south Asia's greatest military power and has recently sought to enlarge its role as a peace-keeping force in the region.

Annuals color otherwise desolate winter gardens

The fall gardening season is at hand so it's time to get out of the bummer doldrums and start Thinking about your winter garden. It's time to begin planting cool season flowering annu-Many of the annual flowers

that thrive in Northern gardens han be successfully grown in Florida; however, the season at which they are grown is quite different than in Northern states. During winter, nights are cool with an occasional freeze in Central Florida. In early spring and late fall, nights are cool. while high night temperatures. lheavy rains and high relative humidity are typical during summer and early fall. Careful. attention must be given to these climatic regimes if annuals are to be grown successfully in Florida. Annuals that can be planted in

October include calendula, Dianthus, pansy, petunia and snapdragon. The foxglove and shasta datay grow well and flower under cool night temperatures in the fall in Central Annuals flowers have many

uses in the garden. They are probably best displayed in front of shrubbery borders. By choosing annuals of different heights, deep flower borders can be produced. Plant the taller species at the rear and progressively shorter varieties having different colors. Most often large groups of only one or two colors are much more effective than small beds of many colors.

Many low-growing annuals make effective edging for walks and drives. And don't forget to use annuals for window boxes and porch gardening.

. Annuals can be planted as seeds or obtained as bedding plants, which can be transplated

into the garden. Bedding plants are available at garden supply stores at reasonable prices and offer flowers quicker than growing your own plants from seeds.

When buying seeds, you get what you pay for. Seed or name. varieties of a specified color are more expensive than color mixtures. If possible, plant seeds according to directions on the package. Plant after the worst of the rainy season or small seeds may be washed away. The other alternative is to start plants in flats so they can be moved to shelter during heavy rains. Some annuals such as nasturtiums and sweet peas should be planted directly in the

Keep a careful watch on young annuals. Their roots are shallow so watering is necessary every day or so until they are well established. Pests also must be kept under control.

To produce compact, bushy plants, pinch of the top pair of leaves after seedlings have at least three pairs of leaves. This will produce side branches and better quality plants.

Religious education for public schools proposed

BOSTON - A non-sectarian group proposing to bring religion back into America's classrooms by 1991 said great care will be taken to keep the curriculum within the limits of what is constitutionally permissable."

The Williamsburg Charter Foundation, a non-profit, nonpartisan group devoted to creating a consensus on the place of religious freedom, was formed by a committee representing Protestants. Catholics. Jews and secularists.

On June 25, the 200th anniversary of the state of Virginia's public call for a Bill of Rights. the group introduced the Williamsburg Charter, which reaffirms the right of freedom of conscience and vows to promote understanding of religious liber-

"Education without proper attention to the role of religion is poor education," said Os Guinness, executive director of the foundation. The proposed curriculum for public schools was introduced Thursday to about 150 community and religious leaders at a hotel luncheon.

increasingly they also find themselves in agreement on another matter - that tradition is not adequately presented and celebrated in the nation's schools.

in order to address that second element, a coalition of national education leaders. henced by Ernest Bayer, president of the Carnegie Foundation for the Advancement of Teaching, and sponsored by the Williamsburg Charter Foundation.

"For far too long, we've had

a remarkable silence on teaching about religion in the nation's public schools." Bryer, one of the nation's most respected eductors and the commissioner of educa-tion from 1977 to 1979, told a recent news conference announcing the new project.

This stience is not because of a conspiracy but because of confusion about what such a curriculum should include and a genuine concern that to discuss religion in the classroomn might be viewed as indoctrination, or a ylo-lation of the conncience of students, as well as a violation of the fundamental principles of the Constitution." he said.

But the silence. Boyer said. has led to the mistaken belief that public achools "are at the very least, indifferent to religion, or at the very most, actively opposed" to religion.

"Some fundamentalists have signed (the charter), some have refused. Some secularists have signed, some have refused. Some atheists have signed, some have been very hostile," he said.

"The noise was deafening and the effect overpowering, as if to emphasize the helplessness and insignificance of the individual in the face of so much mechanical might."

Suddenly all the outbursts stopped and the master of ceremonies stepped to the microphone and said:

"Perhaps you sometimes say to yourself. 'My job isn't important because it's such a little Job.' But you're wrong. The most obscure person can be very important. Let me show you what I mean."

At that point the great floodlights that bathed every corner of the collseum were turned off. The noonday brightness of the great arena was suddenly turned into total darkness. Then the speaker struck a match and in the blackness the tiny flame could be seen by everyone.

"Now you can see the importance of one little light," the speaker sald. "But suppose we all strike a light."

From all over the vast coliseum came the sound of matches being struck until, faster than it takes to tell, 100,000 pinpoints of light lit up the



Dose of medicine seems to be high

one-third of my husband's stomach was removed because of a bleeding ulcer. Just before being released, he developed anxiety and depression and was hositalized for a week in a psychiatric ward. He has a prescription for 200 mg. Elavil at bedtime. He's so doped up 'he falls asleep at work, can't get out of bed and has the energy of a 90-year-old. I think this is 300 much medicine but I can't seem to get through to his doctor.

DEAR READER: The amount of Elavil (an anti-depressant) that your husband is receiving seems to be high. The usual dose is 25.50 mg a day. The symptoms he is experiencing could certainly be due to over-medication.

If his doctor ignores your concerns, find another one who will be more sympathetic and who will consider reducing your husband's Elavil dose or changing over to another antidepressant.

DEAR READER: Your son may be suffering from an unusual form of Peyropie's disease. This condition, of unknown cause, produces thickening and contractures of the deep covering of the penis. Treatment is varied and consists of surgical

DEAR DR. GOTT: Last year removal of the scarlike tissue, local injections of cortisone and ultrasonic therapy. Some cases

resolve spontaneously. If your son's urologist is unable to help the situation, I suggest regerral to the urology clinic at a teaching hospital.

Here is an example of defensive bridge exotica involving Lew Stansby, frequent North American champion and occasional world champion. Sitting West, he heard the opponents arrive in four hearts after North had made a negative double of West's one-diamond overcall. Let me tell you something about the methods of Stansby and his partner Chip Martel in such a bidding situation. Martel had two ways of showing a diamond raise after a negative double. A simple raise showed support without a high diamond honor. Had East held the ace, king or queen of diamonds with support. he would redouble, which for them has that special meaning. However, none of this has significance for the actual deal, since it is certainly obvious that

Stansby needed only to look at his own cards to know that Martel could not hold a high honor in diamonds.

Still, the seven of clubs was led. East won the ace and returned the three of clubs. West ruffed and made the same play that I suppose you or I would have made, but it still requires a bit of teeth-gritting. He underled the A-K-Q-J-10 of diamonds. Sure enough, his partner had the nine and came back with another club to beat the contract one trick.


