WELFARE PLAN VOTED DOWN BY COUNTY CLUBS

(Continued from page 1.) would rather not go into detail. Miss Crawford then declared she knew why. Whereupon Mrs. Starling rejoined that if she must go into detail, that the local clubs' action was taken because it could not be permitted to do so by the national organization. However, she said, at the recent state conference it was agreed that the various clubs could assist such organizations.

Mrs. Leonardi, in behalf of the county federation, then spoke briefly saying that the county federation was opposed to it and that personally she had been against it since it was first proposed. She further stated that Miss Crawford had misrepresented many things and that she had told Mrs. B. G. Smith, of Oviedo, that last year the project could not have been put into effect because of the county nurse that was here at that time. Mrs. Smith substantiated that statement. Further discussion was limited and a vote taken showed that five organizations were for it, 10 opposed, eight unrepresented and four not represented.

Miss Virginia Smith representing the local chapter of Red Cross, brought forth much applause when she declared that the opposition to the welfare project was brought on purely because of ignorance of the plan and of the conditions that exist in the city and county. She declared that in her capacity, she was better able to observe the situation than anyone else and said that she and the chapter was heartily in favor of the proposed plan.

Others speaking in behalf of the proposed organization were: Mrs. Endo-Curlett, A. P. Connly, Rev. F. D. King, Mrs. F. E. Rounillatt and Mrs. LeRoy Chittendon. The question then arose as to whether or not the matter was to be definitely decided at that meeting. The federation representatives voiced their approval, but the others did not. Mrs. Smith asked if the meeting was to be prolonged to give Miss Crawford an opportunity to secure more support of the project, before a vote was to be taken. She was told that it was not planned to do so. Mrs. Smith further criticized Miss Crawford's alleged misrepresentation of facts in the case. After the vote was taken and announced, the meeting came to a close.

WASHINGTON, Apr. 25.—No official reports had been received

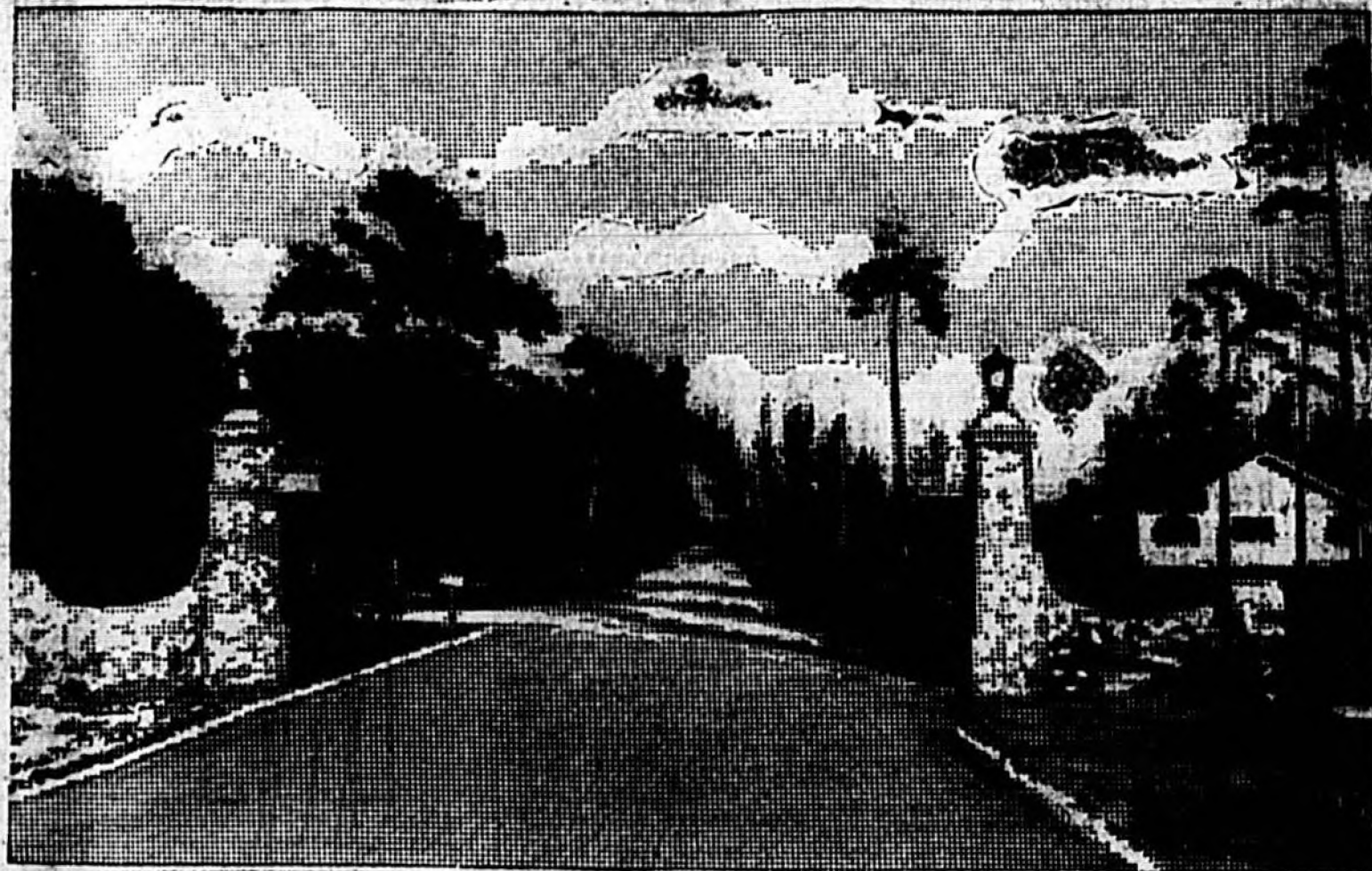

Mail Picked Up in Flight

Mail is being picked up by British airplanes during flight in Mesopotamia. The pilot's attention is attracted by a signaling device used during the war and consisting of pieces of cloth spread on the ground and moved in shutter fashion. The message is attached to a line tied to the top of two poles about six feet high. The observer picks up the line by means of a hook dangled from the craft and the message is delivered as directed.

Skunk is Friend of Farmer, Not Hen-Roost Robber

Next to the muskrat, the skunk is now the most important fur-bearing animal in the United States. In 1923, only 18,255 pelts of this little animal were sent to market. Then the supply began to increase until the record number of 1,921,000 pelts was gathered in 1914. Occasionally, the average price was as high as \$2, but in 1922, the top figure was \$3.00. Commercially considered, according to government figures, the skins of skunks mean a total business of about \$3,000,000 a year in this country. Experts of the agriculture department declared that the skunk is the most maligned of all lumb creatures; that, in fact, it is the

most gentle, the most harmless, and most easily domesticated of all wild things that harbor on the fringe of farm lands. It is not true, according to the statement, that they kill chickens, steal eggs, or bother with any of the live things on a farm. Grasshoppers and crickets form a large percentage of their diet.

Gasoline Has Fuel Rival in Vegetable Extract

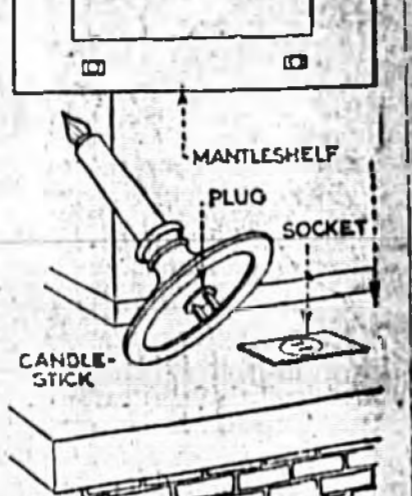
As a substitute for gasoline, "diesel" a vegetable extract, first made in South Africa, is said to produce more power to the gallon when used as motor fuel. Although mostly alcohol, the new fluid contains several other ingredients that give it valuable properties. It is claimed that a fire fed by it can be easily extinguished by water, making it an aid to safety. It has also been said that it will not dilute lubricating oils to the same extent as gasoline and similar solutions will.

Indoor Golf "Green" Returns Ball After Putt

To aid golf players to attain accuracy in putting, an indoor "green" that directs the pellet back to the starting point has been invented by a western man. The toy can also be used as a pastime for any number of persons, and may be set up on a lawn or other flat, smooth surface. When the sphere is struck it passes up an inclined plane, and if it does not drop through the score hole, rolls back to the player. A channel at the side catches the ball, if it falls into the opening, and guides it out.

Wiring Mantel Candlesticks

The appearance of electrically lighted candlesticks on the mantel shelf of a fireplace is usually marred by the lamp that connects the candlesticks to a nearby socket or receptacle. This cord can be eliminated entirely by wiring the mantelshelf in a slightly different form than usual. This is done by providing a flush receptacle directly under the base of each candlestick and wiring the candlestick as shown.



in the illustration, providing it with a cap to fit the receptacle. A hole is drilled in the center of the base to receive the cap, which is first wired and pulled up into position by drawing the wires through the candlestick, and the other ends are then connected to the socket terminals.

Simultaneously photographing the depositor and his signature, a double camera arrangement has been perfected by an eastern inventor for use in banks and business houses to detect forgeries. Upon a special plate the machine at one "snap" registers a picture of the person and of his handwriting, which is affixed to a blank and kept with the photograph for reference in case dispute later arises as to the depositor's identity or his signature.

CONGO TO HAVE AIRPLANE SERVICE

LONDON, Apr. 25.—Designed to fly at 100 miles an hour with 800 horsepower engines, carry 14 passengers and complete the journey between London and Brussels in less than two hours, four giant airplanes of British design are nearly completed at a factory near Brussels. A large type of the same machine is being built with three engines, for a Belgian air service to the River Congo.

\$78,000 OFFERED TO INVENTORS BY BIG INDUSTRIES

Large Offers Made to Induce Inventors to Extend Their Activities in Field of Research and Invention.

CHICAGO, Apr. 25.—Offers totaling more than \$78,000 for labor, time and money-saving ideas and inventions now being sought by manufacturers were announced Saturday by H. H. Windsor, of Chicago, editor of Popular Mechanics Magazine.

Among the many problems to be solved was a plan of traffic regulation for the larger cities, a new musical instrument for orchestral use, a way to salvage lumber waste and an etching process. The awards range in amount from \$100 to several thousand, the closing date being May 31, 1925. It was pointed out in the Industrial Awards Plan in which these offers were listed that many of the greatest inventions have been the work of men having little or no technical knowledge, of which Bell, Morse, Goodyear and scores of others are examples.

By meeting these conditions through the obtaining of closer cooperation between manufacturers and inventors, Mr. Windsor explained that it was hoped that the awards would result in much good to the general public in the way of better products and lower costs and that they would arouse and properly direct the latent inventive ability of the nation.

"Every branch of industry constantly is facing new problems that cry for solution," he declared. "Although scarcely fifty years ago there was nothing electrical in industry, no generators, motors, transmission lines, lights, or traction, today electricity is doing the work of 170,000,000 men.

"Each step forward has opened up new opportunities for service, but to utilize these to the fullest extent, better understanding between the industries and the public and closer co-operation between the manufacturer and inventor is needed.

"America is a nation of inventors, and it is believed the Industrial Award Plan will now make it possible to awaken and utilize this vast latent force as it offers something specific to work on."
