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Plans for the Future

The annual Chamber of Commerce membership campaign gets under way Tuesday morning under the capable leadership of H. H. Coleman in an "all out" attempt to increase the quota from \$2,500 to \$4,000. In the light of last year's achievements it is as much as can be done proportionately with the larger amount, Seminole County will be securely and permanently "on the map" by the end of another year, and no one will have cause to regret his bigger contribution.

As President Leffler remarked last night, it is not necessary to dwell on the achievements of the Chamber of Commerce. They speak for themselves. Its program included the location here of the Boston Braves for Spring training, the establishment of a Seminole County Health Unit, the development of the Sanford airport and the construction of a Naval Air Base, an advertising program to place Seminole County before the people of the whole nation and the creation here of a tourist resort, and many similar worthwhile activities. These things have come to pass during the past year.

But what is of much more importance to the Chamber of Commerce now and to the people of this county who support it, is the program for the future. Now that this has been done, what is to be done next? Is the Chamber of Commerce going to rest upon its laurels and twiddle its thumbs for the coming year? Will it crawl back into its shell until the war is over and the danger from bombing is a thing of the past? Not at all. It intends to go forward with a bigger and better program than ever. It will not rest until the coming year but for the readjustment period which will come after the war.

One of the chief objectives on which this group is already working and which it hopes to see achieved in the near future is the construction of a pipeline from Tampa to Sanford. A good deal about this project has already appeared in the newspapers and most residents of this county are pretty familiar with it. But we doubt if many of them even fully realize what this project will mean to our county and to Sanford. It will make this community in truth the port of Central Florida and the oil distribution center for the entire state.

In it lies the possibility of making Sanford the largest commercial and industrial city in the interior of Florida. For oil can be brought safely to Sanford at a time when it is not available in quantity anywhere else there will be every reason in the world for the location here of wholesalers, warehouses, transportation lines, factories, and many other things. Coal made Pittsburgh and oil may make Sanford.

But the pipeline is only one of the projects now under consideration for the development of this section. Better housing, better health facilities, better recreation for our young people, better roads, and if possible, after the war, better water transportation, not only to Jacksonville but also to the East Coast and better accommodations. These are all projects in the Chamber of Commerce program and for which it is prepared to work throughout the coming months.

That is, it is prepared if the necessary funds are forthcoming. It can do little without cash. With a sufficient budget, it can and will accomplish much.

Heart Disease

Heart disease is the country's outstanding medical problem, says the Metropolitan Life Insurance Company, which predicts it will become increasingly serious as increasing numbers of people, handicapped by the lower general mortality rate, attain the advanced ages when the disease is most prevalent.

The number of persons of ages 65 and over is already 9,000,000, and it is estimated will reach 22 millions in 1960. The Metropolitan compares the present situation in heart disease with that which prevailed in tuberculosis 30 years ago and points to the "prodigious" advances that have been made within a single generation in cutting down the ravages of tuberculosis to support their belief that similar progress is possible in the control of heart disease.

A joining of forces by the private physician and the public health officer, which served so well to put down tuberculosis, is necessary, the company says, if heart disease, which is an important cause of heart disease in children and young adults, and at the same time to join in the modification of present medical practices in handling the large volume of chronic heart disease in older persons.

In organizing to combat this most difficult aspect of heart disease, the Metropolitan suggests that the program of the public health agencies should include:

1. Popular health education in the importance of periodic medical examinations for the early detection of the disease.

2. Extension of visiting nurse and medical social worker service.

3. Utilization for cardiac patients of tuberculosis sanatorium facilities which, with the decline of tuberculosis, are no longer fully utilized.

4. Organization of more public clinics to be run by full-time physicians.

5. Use of public funds to carry a major part of the financial burden.

"Heart disease presents many different tasks, responsibilities, and opportunities for public health officers," says the Metropolitan. "But before any large-scale advance can be made, it is essential that the view that heart disease is a proper field of work for them and win over the medical profession to that view. They need also to agree on the respective roles of the private and public physicians."

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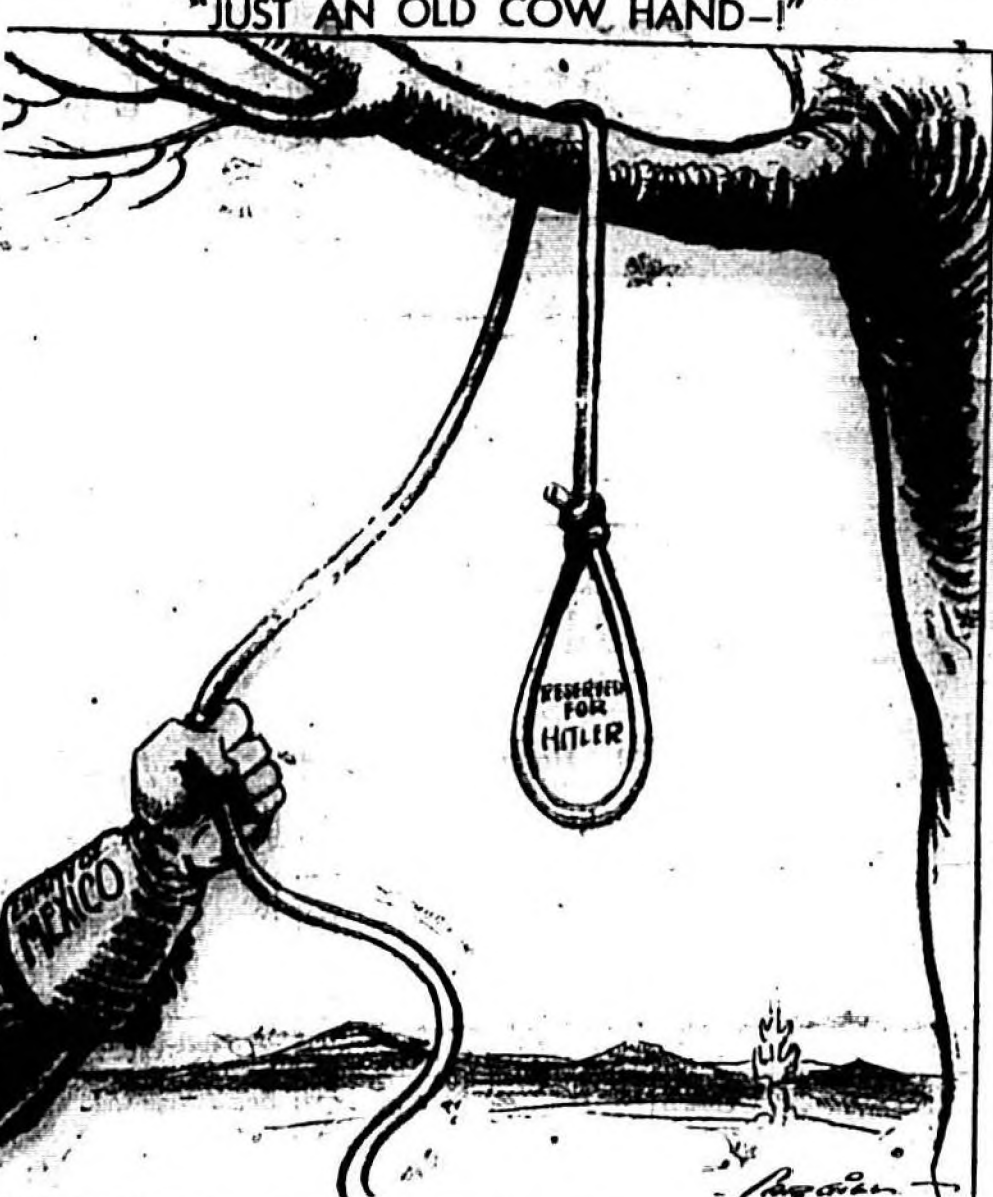

Mr. Coleman explained the plan of campaign for the coming week and revealed the names of the various committees, captains and team members. He said that the drive would start Tuesday morning and urged everyone to get an early start. "If everyone will do a little," he said, "then nobody will have to do too much."

Secretary Higgins expressed his optimism over the prospects for the drive and said, "We have a good record to point to and a fine program ahead of us." Others who spoke briefly in behalf of the Chamber of Commerce were Frank Talbott of Oviedo, Hibbard Casselberry of Casselberry,

and J. A. Bittles of Longwood. The campaign army consists of the following:
