Reserve Squadren Is Training Here

Naval Air Reserve Patrol Squadron (Photographic) 936 has arrived at the Naval Auxiliary Air Station for the annual two weeks training duty which all reserve units undergo once a year. The home base of the squadron is at the Naval Air Station, Willow Grove, Pa., one of the leading naval reserve air stations in the United States.

One of the two photographic squadrons in the naval reserve, VP-936 is the first reserve photographic squadron to train at the Sanford Air Station since its re-commissioning in May, 1951. It is also the first reserve squadron to leave the Willow Grove station for active duty training this year.

Approximately 100 members of the squadron flew in Sanford by a slight company of six specially equipped squadron planes for photographic mapping and three transients, trained by the Fleet Air Reserve Training Command.

The commanding officer of the unit is Lieutenant Commander Thomas F. Grow. When Commander Grow is not busy with naval reserve matters he is a teacher of mathematics and physical education at Ringwood, Pa., where he also coaches championship basketball and baseball teams.

Lieutenant Commander Albert V. Tinner, the executive officer of the reserve unit, is an aircraft maintenance supervisor at Lockheed Aircraft Service Inc., International Airport, New York City. While the squadron is at the

Sanford Air Station, it will conduct the maximum possible flight and ground training and it will be assisted in this by Photographic Squadron 62, Faxon 51 and NAAS personnel. Photographic Squadron 62 is providing a photographic laboratory for its use while in Sanford. Faxon 51 will assist with maintenance problems while the Naval Auxiliary Air Station will provide for the berthing and feeding of the squadron.

At the completion of the squadron's training duty, the men will return to Willow Grove and resume their civilian occupations which were interrupted by the training cruise.
