Fourth Of July Holiday Is Good Time To Practice Safe Driving

Are you making plans now for a Fourth of July holiday trip?

In 1908 there were 466 fireworks deaths in the United States. Last year there was only one. Quite a record of progress.

Back in 1908 a rather ridiculous looking machine was just sputtering into being. Last year that machine—evolving from the ungainly horseless carriage into the sleek and powerful modern automobile—claimed 407 lives during the Fourth of July holiday.

Thus the net gain in our efforts to avoid holiday self-destruction seems to be about zero. Yet there is a lesson to be learned here.

Fireworks deaths on the Fourth have been almost eliminated because thinking persons revolted at such senseless killing, and state by state the sale and use of dangerous fireworks were prohibited.

No one, of course, is advocating that the sale or use of automobiles be banned. But we strongly urge the outlawing of their misuse.

Most people want to use their cars safely. But in every society there is always a minority of reckless and irresponsible drivers who turn a deaf ear to all appeals for prudent and commonsense behavior.

It is for this group that the National Safety Council and the International Association of Chiefs of Police have jointly recommended a rigid law enforcement policy by all police agencies during the Fourth of July celebration.

We strongly support this recommendation. A traffic accident emergency faces this country, with a new all-time high death toll in prospect.

It is time to stop temporizing with this problem. The Fourth of July holiday is a good time to start getting tough.

Modern Policemen

In vaudeville days the fat and stupid policeman was a stock figure whose mention was always good for a laugh. Some of this type may still hang on from earlier days, but today's policemen are of a different type. They are more likely to be lithe and athletic than overweight and befuddled. A better class of men is being recruited.

An indication of this is the fact that at this year's college commencement 37 police officers from the suburbs of a large city received college degrees. New York City, for instance, not long ago reported a sergeant who had just received a doctorate of philosophy from a local university.

The oldtime vaudeville cop could never have mastered the special techniques of crime investigation that are taught to police forces today. The modern policeman is expected to be intelligent and well informed, and often he is.

And that leads us to say that the modern policeman should be well paid—paid so that he can pursue such endeavors as that of a better education, a more complete knowledge of his duties—and that he may live in surroundings commensurate to the importance of his position.

Yes—we do have modern policemen—but do they receive modern salaries?

Denver Breathless From Climb

DENVER, W. — This Rocky Mountain area is still a little breathless today about its rapid climb in the last 15 years. And now it is finding something new: industrialization has tied its close to the East and to the up and down here, from which the Denver area once was fairly remote and insulated.

"It takes a good back East

and people there don't lose confidence because of President Eisenhower's illness," a Denver banker says, "we'll do all right out here."

"If payrolls hold up around the country," says a cattleman, "we'll be able to sell our cattle."

"If industrial production in the Midwest and Northeast holds at its present high level," says a mining spokesman, "our mining outlook is okay."

Traditionally Denver has been a distribution center — the biggest place between San Francisco to the West and Kansas City and Omaha to the East, between Dallas and Fort Worth to the South and Canada to the North. As the mid point in this vast area Denver has played wholesale and broker to a steadily growing economy.

Industrialization is relatively new. Davis Mears, president of the First National Bank of Denver says some of the industries came because rising transportation cost and the growth of Western population furnished a market that could be supplied cheaper by making products here than by shipping them long distances.

Other plants here make products where freight costs are a small item — example, Denver's large fishing tackle industry—and ship them across the nation.

Some factories here supply parts to Eastern manufacturers—one that makes fan belts for cars has felt the pinch of the Detroit automotive slowdown.

Retail trade has been holding up well. Home building has slowed a little this year from its record pace, but commercial building has more than taken up the slack.

Not all the new ties here are with the East. Trans America Corp. has come out of California to buy up banks in Montana, Wyoming, Utah and Colorado and

Your doctor probably will advise a second tablet if the pain is not relieved within eight minutes. But don't take any more on your own. If two tablets don't check the pain, summon your doctor right away.

Future Attacks

There are also things you can do to help guard against future attacks. If you develop angina after a hot bath, restrict your bathing to tepid water.

If your attacks begin after walking, be satisfied with short, slow jaunts in the future.

Sometimes attacks follow eating. If this is your case, try frequent small feedings instead of one or two large meals.

Smoking might be a contributing factor. If you've had several attacks, it might be a good idea to give it up for a while to see how you feel.

Angina and Anger

A. S.: What would cause persistent vomiting in an infant 15 months old?

Answer: There are many causes for this difficulty. It may be due to a feeding problem or a stomach ailment.

There is a disease, known as pyloric stenosis, in which the opening from the stomach to the intestine is closed, which may result in persistent vomiting. It is best to call for your doctor to be thoroughly examined by your physician immediately.

Too Late To Classify

I spent three nights with a Queen last weekend and found the experience quite enjoyable. I couldn't have gotten away with it if I hadn't taken the family with me. It was as a passenger on the "Queen of Nassau" operated by the Eastern Shipping Corporation between Miami and Nassau, B.W.I. and the occasion was a convention of the Florida Press Association.

Over 150 Florida publishers, their families and friends made the trip. We left Miami at 6 p.m., arriving in Nassau the next morning at 8 a.m. It was the first meeting of the association ever held on foreign soil. The best served as our hotel during the weekend excursion, which lasted from Friday evening the 18th to Monday morning the 19th.

Weather was perfect and the sea smooth. Heavy ground swells disturbed the stomachs of a few folks, but everyone was up and ready to go when the boat docked. Native divers entertained the crowd, diving for coles as we waited to disembark, just as they do in Cuba and Jamaica. American money is important, and here as in most offshore ports the natives do their utmost to accumulate as much of it as they can from the tourists who flock to the shores.

Nassau, typically British, is charming and colorful. The ancient and the modern is found intermingled in its architectural make-up. It reminded me a bit of our own St. Augustine, and while the island is rich in historical interest, I would say that St. Augustine has much more to offer. Stores and shops with but few exceptions, lacked appeal. Poorly lighted and poorly ventilated, they contrasted abominably with the pure air and warm sunshine with which the Colony is blessed.

I recall a similar situation in Jamaica when I visited there a few years ago. Unlike the American merchant, the Britisher seems content with things as they were a century ago. They don't go in for modern improvements, air-conditioning, window displays that we in this country have come to accept as good merchandising.

American tourists spend most of their money in the liquor stores where some types of liquor are available at considerable discount. Various Scotchies, Canadian Club, rum, and gin are much cheaper than in the States, but those who prefer Bourbon find that prices are just about the same as at home.

The famous Straw Market, located adjacent to the docks, attracts the ladies who find returning to the ship with armloads of straw hats, bags, and novelties. Jewelry and perfumes are also popular. As far as my family is concerned, most of the stuff brought home from such trips kicks around the house, gathers dust for a time and is finally turned over to Goodwill Industries, the Salvation Army or some other organization. The kick seems to be in buying something away from home.

I enjoyed visits to Nassau's two big tourists hotels. They were our hosts for a cocktail party and a dinner while we were on the island. The Royal Victoria and Emerald Beach hotels offer everything the visitor could ask for in accommodations, cuisine and service.

Points of interest on the island include visits to several ancient forts, the most interesting being Ft. Charlotte, Blackbeard's Tower and the Queen's Staircase. High-

World's Communists Have Problem

WASHINGTON — The world's Communists—particularly in this country, Italy and France—have been having a time trying to get straight on the new line laid down by Moscow.

That line was given by Communist party boss Nikita Khrushchev last February in Moscow in the same speech in which he attacked Stalin as a maniacal murderer.

He said Reds in the non-Communist countries should shift tactics; they didn't need to try civil war if they could take over peacefully, through parliamentary means, by forming united fronts with Socialists and others.

Violence, he said, would still be necessary where united front tactics failed. And he told them, in effect, that if they wanted to gain support from non-Reds in their own countries they'd have to show some independence of Moscow.

The way he put it was that Communism could be achieved in various countries in various ways. That meant they would sometimes find it expedient not to appear to be following the Moscow line.

This sounded simple. But he had actually put Red leaders in the non-Communist world over a barrel by his revelations about Stalin's monstrosities, because during the lifetime of Stalin, they had been Stalin's blind, dumb and obedient yes-men.

How could their judgement be trusted any more. How could they now convince anyone to form a united front with them? In the end the answer may be to give the various parties a new look—that the present leaders may have to step down.

They took time thinking it over. A month after Khrushchev's speech party leadership at a secret meeting decided to shift tactics, seek a united front, and try to give the

appearance of independence of Moscow by criticizing the Russians from time to time.

The program was outlined by the real party boss, Eugene Dennis, who had been a 100 per cent Stalinist. But John Gates, editor of the party's newspaper, the Daily Worker, apparently got his signals crossed.

On June 6—after a 25,000-word portion of Khrushchev's speech had been printed in the American press—Gates, also an absolute Stalinist, wrote an editorial which blasted Stalin but also challenged Khrushchev and Stalin's other heirs to explain how Stalin's crimes occurred while they were around him.

It is reliably understood that the party leadership jumped on Gates' neck for going too far. This wasn't the kind of criticism they had in mind. Meanwhile, Dennis put in writing, now published, the American party's new look.

And on June 16 the Italian Communists were heard from but only after, it seems, their losses in the Italian elections last month had shocked them into a realization they had better start talking.

The talking was done by their boss, Palmiro Togliatti, also a complete Stalinist. He praised the new Russian leaders but challenged them, as Gates did in the Daily Worker, to explain their own roles in the period of Stalin's "errors."

Then, following Khrushchev's line, he said Communist parties in the future would have to be their own bosses. This is the same impression the American Communists are trying to give.

But the French Communists were even slower talking than the Americans and Italians. They finally opened up on June 18, two days after Togliatti.

They must still be confused on what to do or say. They issued a statement saying they really couldn't say very much because they hadn't been given the full text of Khrushchev's speech.

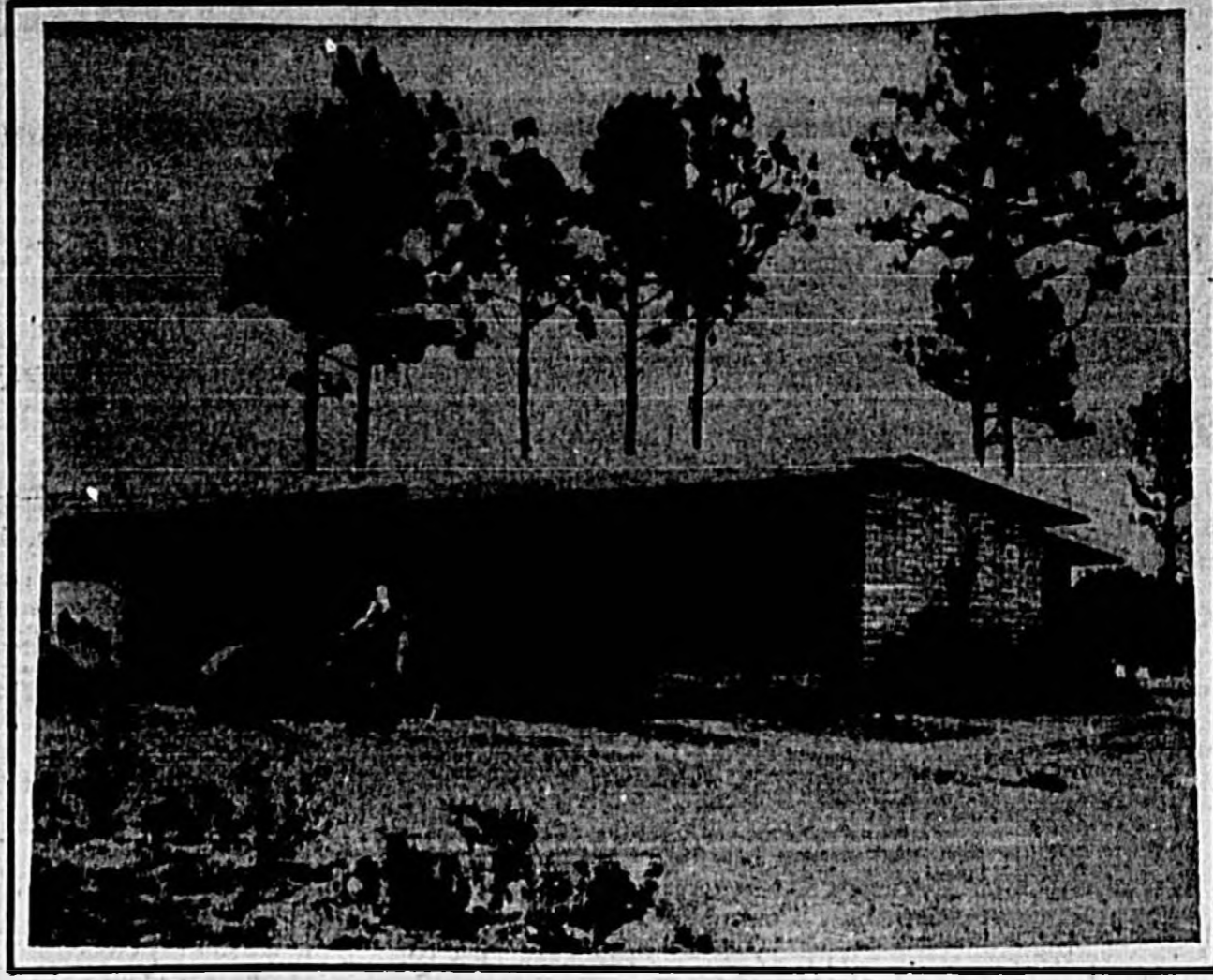
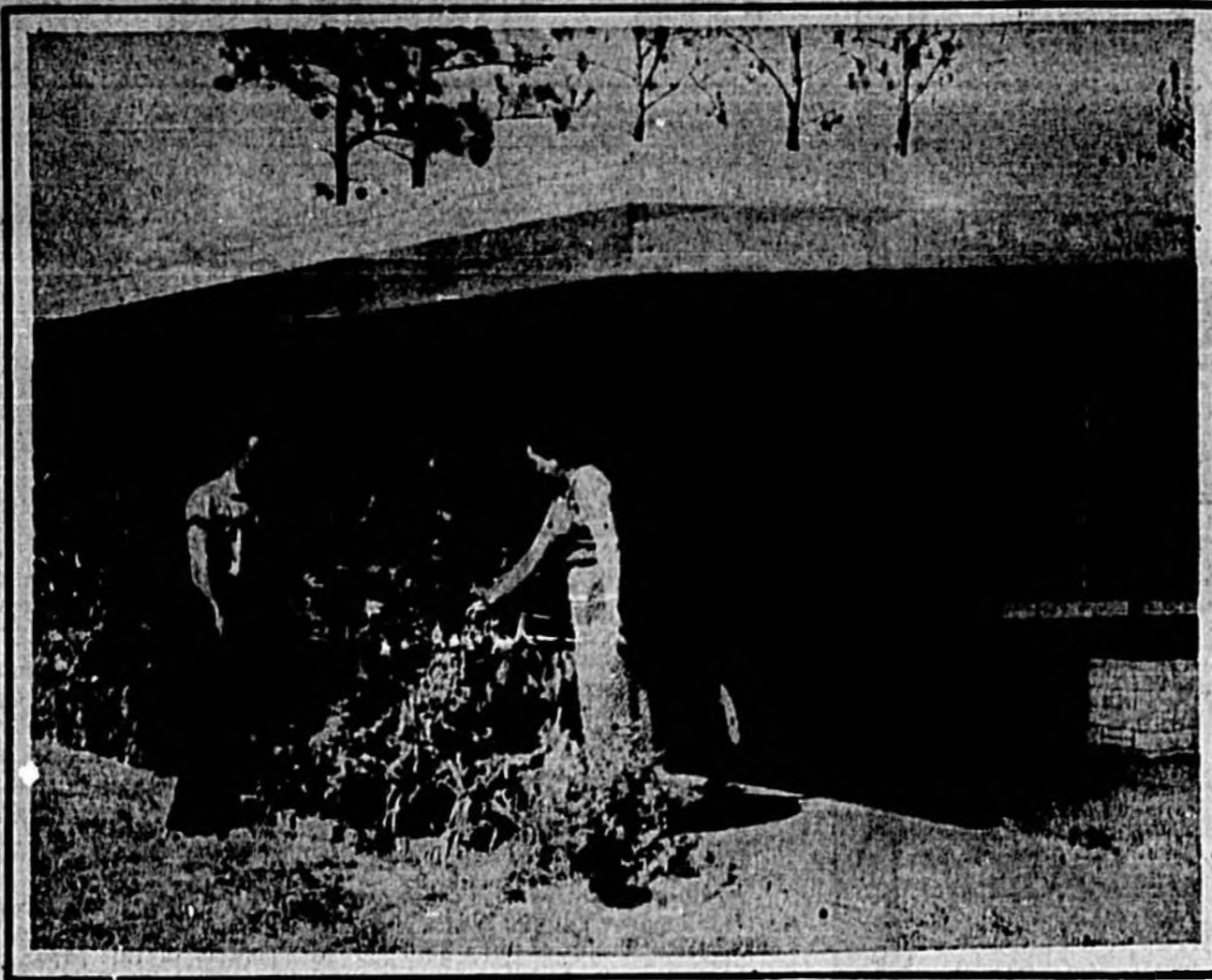
