










To Flooded Coast According to an announcement made by the Seminole County Chapter of the America Red Cross, the Red Cross has assigned its of its top disaster staff to the West Coast flood areas to assist chapters in emergency operations and follow through with rehabilita-tion. Fifty-seven shelters were in operation over Christmas, housing and feeding more than 20,000 re-fugees. Early estimates are that between four and five thousand families will look to the Red Cross for long-term assistance in setting back on their feet. While these estimates indicate that costs may run between \$4, 000,000 and \$5,000,000. ARC presi-dent Wilsworth Bunker has an-nounced that no special fund cam-paign will be conducted. Chapters are authorized to accept voluntary contributions towards meeting the needs of disaster victims and are asked to publicize this.
