





With justification, we assert that the Chited States of America leads the world in setting the standard for honest and uninhibited communications.

At the same time, however, Americans on the whole do not appear to have given much thought to the fact that their best known federal source of information from the executive branch is, day in and day out, the "official source," or the unnamed "spokesman."

Newsmen, and even members of Congress. are making it plain that they are becoming fed up with the "backgrounder" - a conference conducted by high officials of government who speak directly to contemporary issues, but who do not allow their names to be used to support the statements.

Recent examples that have gained attention include a 1970 statement by a "high source" that the United States might "expel" the Soviet Union from Egypt. The same high source leclared this year that India was the aggressor in Pakistan, and later added that Russia's activity in support of India might cancel the President's trip to Moscow next spring.

All of the statements, it has subsequently been disclosed, were made by Dr. Henry Kissinger, the national security adviser to President Nixon. His anonymity was ultimately removed by Sen. Barry Goldwater and the press. The "backgrounder" is not, of course, a re-

DONNA'S **DELIBERATIONS**

The really big news of 1971 in Seminole County was the construction boom. The year started out with mass construction of new homes, businesses, apartments and all types of commercial enterprises and the building continued right past December 31. Indications are that '72 will be even a bigger and

As predicted in The Herald some months ago, value of new construction in '71 topped the \$100 million mark. In fact the total value of new building in the incorporated and unincorporated areas of Seminole was \$101,001,058.10.

Singury more than half the new construction was in the areas under the control of the Board of County Commission. The unincorp_raied areas had 3,381 building permits issued during the 12-month period for construction valued at \$54,433.016. in the month of December alone, 369 permits were issued by the county's building department for value of new building at \$5,471,411. Emphasis continued on single family homes. In Altamante Springs all records were broken with new con-

struction up over the previous year 600 per cent at \$18,712,234.10 value for the ara sermits issued. This was in comparison with the 178 perm's valued at \$3,016,318.56 in 1970. December alone had 59 permits with value of \$3,521,450.

\$100,000 For Migrants

Job Funding \$\$ Given County

An allocation of \$100,000 to provide employment between harvesting seasons for migrant workers has been approved by the U. S. Department of Labor, it was learned today by Greg Drummond, chairman of the County Commission. The county must find jobs for these unemployed persons.

This new allocation is not to be confused with

the \$89,000 annual allocation to provide steady employment for residents to ease the unemployment situation in Seminole County. Drummond said 16 are presently employed under this (section 6) phase of the Secretary of Labor's discretionary funds,

"We anticipate some difficulty in this matter," said Drummond, "in that we must find migrants who are willing to accept (laboring) jobs. Most would rather wait until the next harvesting season. "We are extremely anxious to carry out this

new program," he added, "because the continued operation of the present (\$89,000) program is based on the new set-up. If the migrants refuse to work and we cannot use up this \$100,000 in new funds we may lose the annual \$89,000 for the steady jobs." A news release from the Atlanta office of the

U. S. Department of Labor quoted Secretary of Labor J. D. Hodgson that the allocation of the final \$42 million under the \$1 billion Emergency Employment Act fulfills President Nixon's commitment to get this job-producing program underway rapidly. The major portion of the funds being allocated

is going to areas of the country having six per cent or more unemployment, Included in the \$42 million allocation are \$31 million from Section 6 of the Act and \$11 million from the Secretary of Labor's discretionary funds under Section 5. (The \$100,000 allocation for Seminole County is from Section 5 funds.) Some 100 areas will receive funds,

Hodgson said that in allocating the remaining EEA funds, which were too limited to permit distribution to more than a relatively small number of areas, an effort was made to provide funds to at least one area in every state that had not previously received some of the Section 5 discretionary money.






