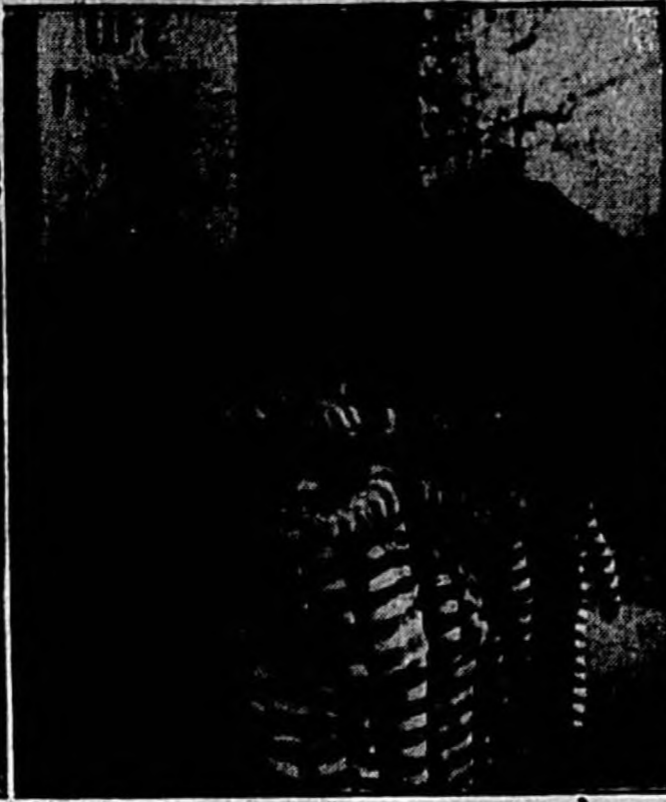

## YOUTH CONGRESS 'SHOOED' FROM WHITE HOUSE 'SIT-DOWN'



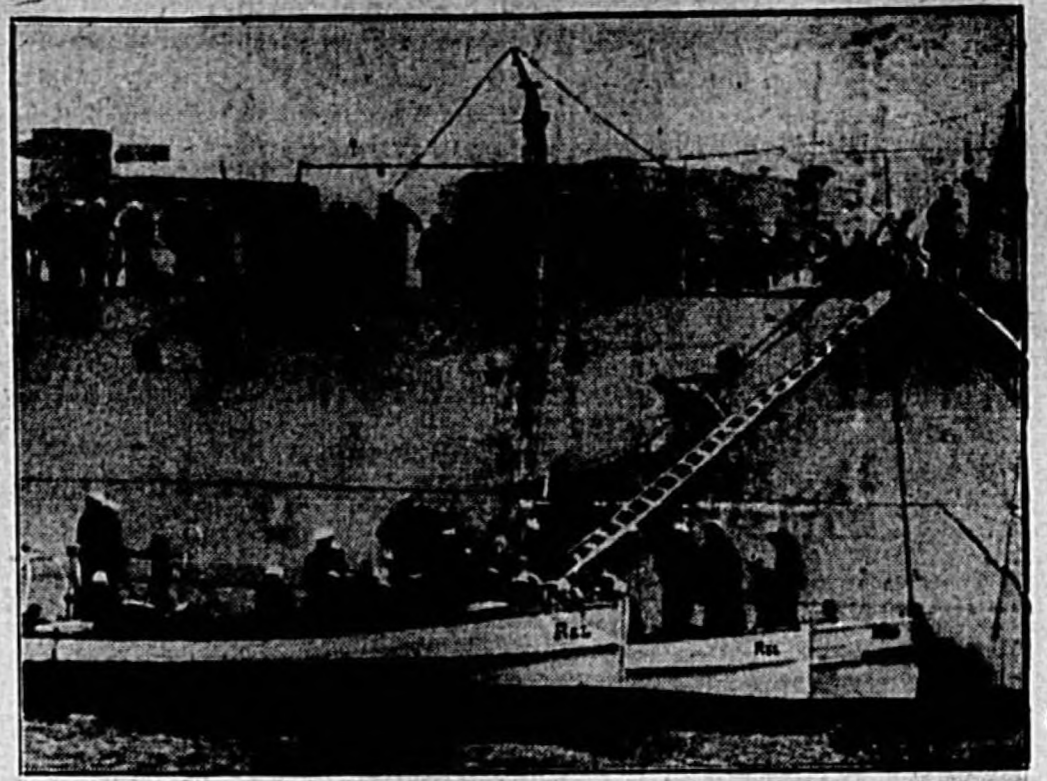

### Spotlights of Sport

A few interesting notes on the football season. . . . The Colony Frosh scored 264 field goals and 106 fouls for a total of 674 points during their 20-game schedule just closed. . . . Their average was 33.7 points per game, just a slight fraction less than a point-per-minute. . . . Their highest score was registered against Winter Park when the locals defeated that team by a 57-0 score early in the season. . . . The greatest margin of a victory was against St. Augustine when the locals defeated here by a 68-12 count, a difference of 56 points. . . . And the closest call in winning came at Tavara where the Sanfordites won out by one point, 22-21. . . . But on the other side of the picture. . . . The greatest score run up against them was made by the Daytona Beach cagers who defeated the Frosh, 35-19 after losing the locals by a 36-18 score here! . . . The 16-point difference in that contest was not their worst licking though for the Orlando Tigers scored a 24-14 win in the second meeting, a margin of 10 points, established against the crippled Sanford. . . . The Tigers also handed the Frosh their first defeat of the season and that by a one-point margin, 20-19, on the local floor.

Incidentally, the same Tigers, state champions last year, folded up like a wet circus tent by losing six straight to finish their season, their record showing seven losses and seven wins for the season while the Frosh were a bit better, winning 16 and losing five.

Billy Zachry and Del Ferguson hold the honor of being the only two on the entire squad to play in every game this season.

Zachry came through with the highest number of points scored, amounting for 69 field goals and 49 fouls during the 20 games, a total of 178 points and an average of just a fraction less than nine points per game. . . . Jack Purdon came next with 52 field goals and 14 fouls for a total of 116 points in 18 games while Williams scored 39 field goals and 18 points for a total of 91 points.

## Delay Forecast In War Blockade; Fighting Severe

### France Objects To Details Of Land Patrol; Russians Kick On Sea Duty

### Six Powers Meet For Discussions

### Government Reports Slaying Of 2,500 Rebels In Attack

A delay in effecting a notional blockade of the Spanish Civil war was forecast at London today.

In Spain, severe fighting raged from the Madrid front, especially in the Jarama River section, to the town of Oviada, near the Bay of Biscay.

French objections to details of a land patrol and Russian's objections to her part of the sea patrol complicated the picture as six powers gathered for a neutrality conference meeting in London.

The "sanctity" of the blockade, however, was not in question. It was agreed that the blockade should be maintained as long as the fighting raged within the city itself.

Government troops fought to gain the heights of Pinaron Hill, dominating the road from Madrid to Valencia.

Madrid officials set the insurgents dead in one phase of the battle for the hill at 2,500.

Damage snafus of insurgent-held Oviada, "second Astoria" of the war, reported they stormed the heights dominating Naranco Hill, the last insurgent redoubt on the city's outer rim. Head to head fighting raged within the city itself.

The Club decided to abandon its present schedule of bi-monthly meetings and return to the weekly meetings plan beginning the first Wednesday in March.

Plans were laid for reviving the Junior Baseball League this summer, and Mr. Stewart, E. A. Cobb, James Rowland and Edward Nelson were named managers. Mr. Cobb is in charge of all plans.

### Second In Series Of Entertainment For Tourists Scheduled For Friday

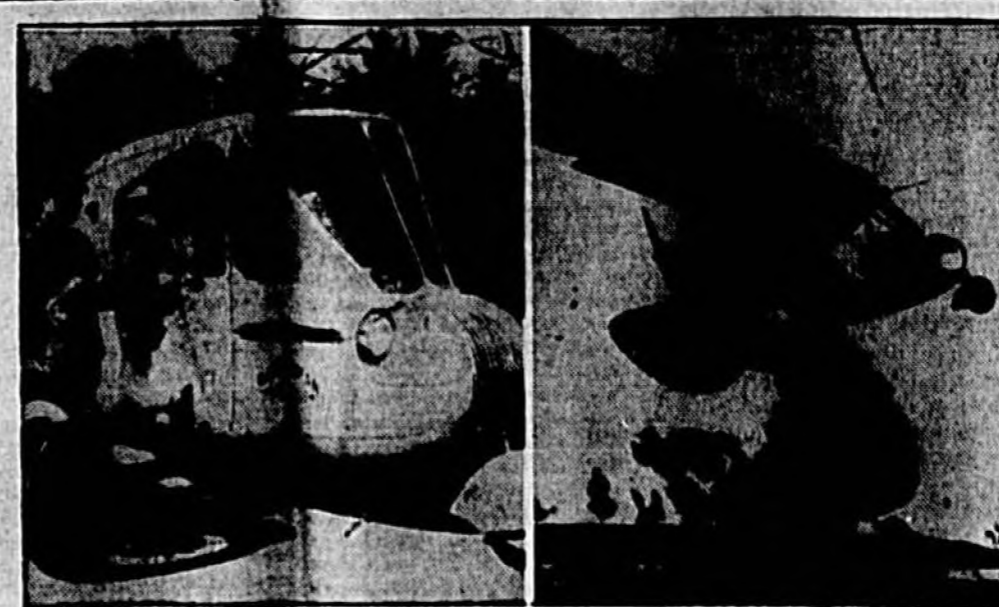

## Cover Crop Payments To Be Made Under Soil Plan

### Dawson Believes 1937 Program Will Draw More Money In Seminole County Than '36 Operation Did

Cash benefit payments will be made to Seminole County farmers for growing cover crops in 1937, C. R. Dawson, county farm agent, announced today in his first extensive explanation of the year's Federal Soil Conservation program.

Two steps are necessary, he said, for agricultural interests to obtain these payments: (1) a work sheet must be filed, setting forth certain data concerning the particular farm involved, and (2) an application for payment must be made.

County Agent Dawson pointed out particularly that neither of the two procedures obligate the signer in any way.

The program this year, he continued, will be administered in each county by the County Agricultural Conservation Committee, the members of which are elected from the County Agricultural Conservation Association.

Mr. Dawson said that all farm owners and farm operators who sign work sheets automatically become members of the Agricultural Conservation Association.

### Hendricks Voices His Opposition To High Court Change

"Little Joe" Hendricks, fifth congressional district representative, informed The Herald today from Washington that he is opposed to the present proposal of the President to reorganize the Federal judiciary system.

The congressman based his opinion on the belief that Roosevelt's "objectives could be accomplished without destroying the dignity and prestige of the Supreme Court."

"I want it clearly understood," he wrote, "that I am not opposing the President. I am opposing what I believe to be a dangerous precedent."

"I would be glad to give Mr. Roosevelt almost unlimited confidence in him, but I am not prepared to say that I would have the same confidence in his successor, or other future presidents."

The congressman said he was in favor of legislation that would benefit the masses, but added that "we have amended the Constitution 21 times, and I believe that is the proper course to pursue in this case."

### City Delegation Is Making Tour Off Trailer Camps

### Site For Tourists Believed Settled On For Sanford

Mayor Ed Higgins, Commissioners W. R. Dupree and M. J. Lodge, Walter Coleman and I. W. Francis left here early today for an inspection tour of automobile trailer tourist camps in Central Florida and the Gulf Coast.

The action was interpreted to mean that City Fathers were well advanced in their plan to establish a camp for Sanford, and it followed several months of communication with cities boasting such tourist facilities.

After much consideration and the study of many probable sites where trailers could be accommodated, the City Commission is believed to be centered on a location between First Street and Second Street just beyond Sanford Avenue. The tract is directly opposite the fair grounds.

There are two principal points under observation. Probably the most important of the two is that relating to sanitary measures and disposition of sewage. The Sanford Avenue plot would be highly satisfactory from this standpoint.

A second fact which the Commission has kept in constant view is one regarding convenience and nearness to town without creating some situation that might become a nuisance to permanent residents. The Sanford Avenue site also qualified in this measure.

Commissioners also have kept a weather eye open toward the possibilities of expansion—when expansion is needed—and believe the tentative location to be satisfactory. (Continued on Page Three)
