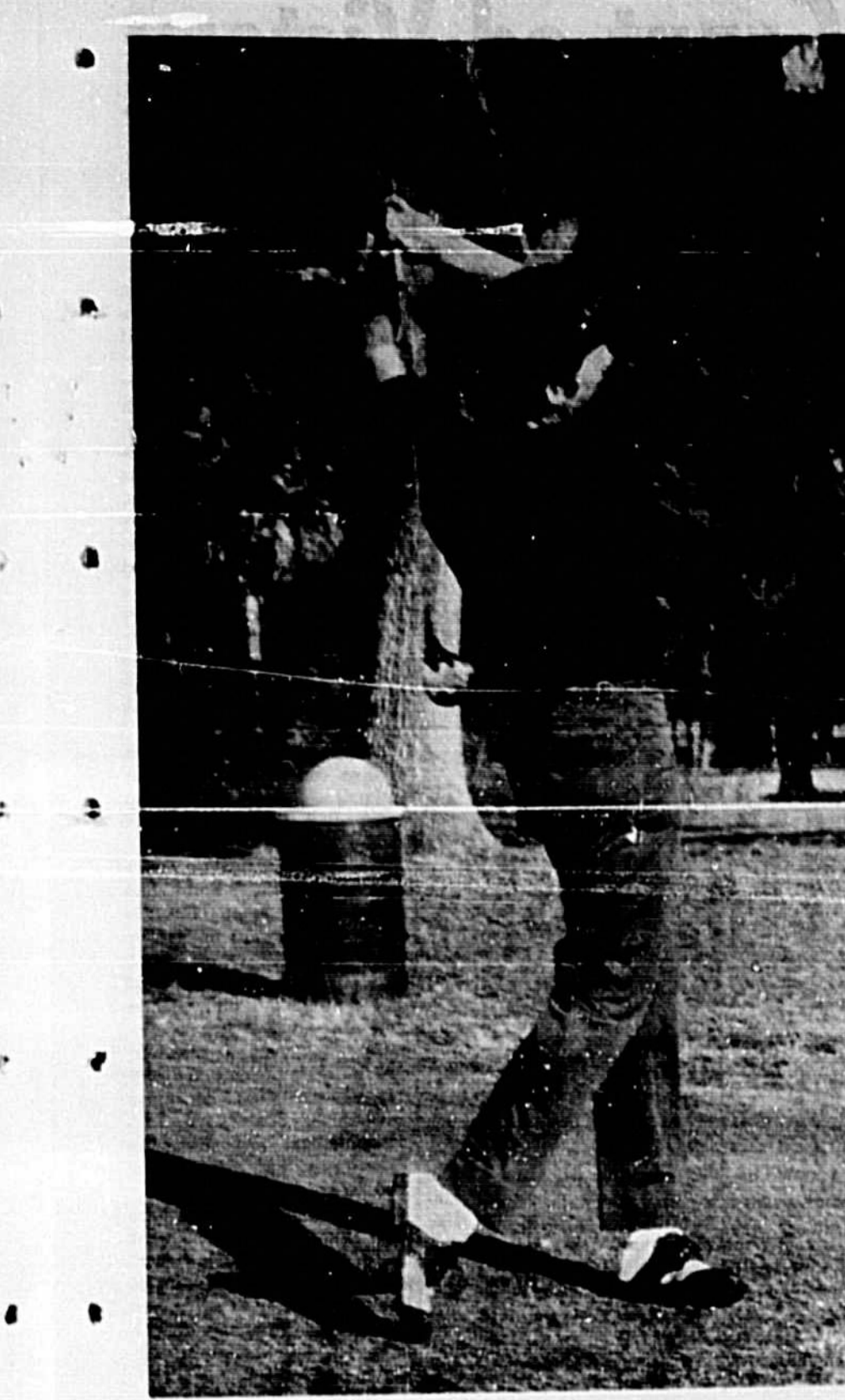

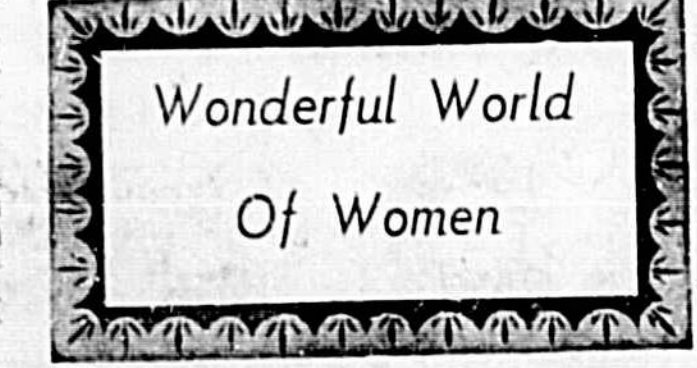

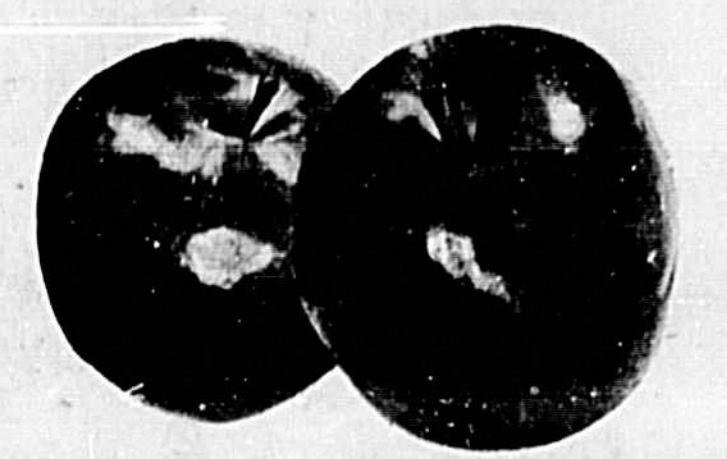

**Dessert Features Fresh Pear**

By CECILY BROWNSTONE

 One of the newest desserts to come off the test-kitchen line is a Spicy Pear Torte. For this sweet you can take your choice of fresh pears—Anjou, Bosc or Fannie.  
 The pears are added to a cake-type batter, but no liquid goes in. The finely diced ripe pears and a few eggs supply the moisture.  
 If you buy firm pears, keep them at room temperature for a few days. When they yield to gentle pressure, they'll be ripe. Ripe pears should, of course, be kept in the refrigerator.  
 We liked this Spicy Pear Torte best when we served it shortly after baking. If you want to follow suit, you'll have to plan your baking and serving schedule.

**SPICY PEAR TORTE**

2 cups sifted flour  
 2 teaspoons baking soda  
 1/2 teaspoon salt  
 1 teaspoon cinnamon  
 1/4 teaspoon nutmeg  
 2 to 3 fresh ripe Anjou, Bosc or Fannie pears  
 1/2 cup (4 pound stick) butter or margarine  
 1 cup firmly packed dark brown sugar  
 1 teaspoon vanilla  
 2 large eggs  
 1/2 cup chopped (medium fine) walnuts  
 3/4 cup raisins  
 Lemon Glaze, see below  
 Grease and flour a 2- to 2 1/2-quart fluted tube pan.  
 On wax paper sift together the flour, baking soda, salt, cinnamon and nutmeg.  
 Wash and dry pears; core but do not peel. Finely dice enough pears to measure 2 1/2 cups.  
 In a large mixing bowl cream butter, granulated sugar, brown sugar and vanilla. Add eggs one at a time, beating well after each addition. Add sifted flour mixture and stir until smooth.  
 Add diced pears, walnuts and raisins. Stir in lightly but thoroughly. Turn into prepared pan. Bake in a preheated 350-degree oven until a cake tester inserted in center comes out with a few moist crumbs adhering to it—40 to 45 minutes.  
 Place torte in pan on wire rack; let cool for about 10 minutes. With a small sharp, browned round-edged; turn out on wire rack.  
 While torte is still hot spread with Lemon Glaze. The heat of the torte will melt the sugar in the glaze and give a transparent look. If you want the torte to have an opaque-looking frosting, spread with the Lemon Glaze after the torte is cold.

**LEMON GLAZE**

1/4 cup confectioners' sugar  
 1/4 teaspoon grated lemon rind  
 2 teaspoons lemon juice  
 1 1/2 tablespoons (about) boiling water  
 Into a small mixing bowl turn the sugar, lemon rind and lemon juice. With a spoon, beat in enough boiling water to give a thin spreading consistency; continue to beat until smooth.

Burger Heroes Mixed Salad Fruit Bowl Cookies  
 BURGER HEROES  
 The filling for these sandwiches is made with beef and cheese.  
 2 pounds ground chuck beef  
 1/4 cup prepared mustard  
 1 teaspoon salt  
 1/4 teaspoon pepper  
 6 slices (each about 3/8 inch square) mozzarella cheese  
 6 individual loaves (each about 5 inches long) Italian bread.  
 Barbecue Sauce, see below  
 Mix beef, mustard, salt and pepper; divide into 6 equal portions. Roll up each cheese slice; place a roll in the center of each portion of meat and shape into rolls, each about 5 inches long. Cook to desired doneness in a small amount of corn-oil margarine in a large skillet. Cut loaves in half; sandwich a burger in each, topping meat with the Barbecue Sauce. Makes 6 servings.  
**BARBECUE SAUCE:** In a small skillet over low heat melt 2 tablespoons corn-oil margarine; add 1/2 cup chopped green pepper, 3/4 cup chopped onion and 1 clove garlic (minced); cook until tender. Add 1/2 cup chili sauce, 2 tablespoons brown sugar and 1/4 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce; simmer for 5 minutes; reheat if necessary before using.

**Raisins Star In Cuisine**

 We've been struck by the unique ways various countries use raisins. Such interesting dishes!  
 In Latin America raisins go into a meat hash called picadillo. For this ground beef is cooked with onions, tomatoes and spices and raisins and pimiento-stuffed green olives are added. The hash is delicious served over rice.  
 In Mexico, picadillo is used as a stuffing for the pastry turnovers called empanadas and as a filling for tamales.  
 Italian cuisine has an inspired way of adding raisins and pine nuts to some of its dishes. Fresh spinach is cooked in a small amount of water and drained. Then olive oil, raisins and pine nuts go in.  
 A Russian cookery uses golden raisins. Niko Starden, author of many outstanding cookbooks, first brought this recipe to the attention of American cooks. We tried it and have been serving it ever since. For the dessert you soak the raisins in water to cover and then drain them. Next you make a water-and-honey syrup and add the raisins and grated lemon rind and simmer for about 10 minutes. Finally pine nuts are added and the complete dish is served.  
 Scandinavian cooks, like those of many other countries, sometimes add raisins to their famous coffee breads. Here's just such a recipe. If you have a yam to bake a yeast bread, but are wary of the kneading process, this rule may appeal to you. The dough is beaten with a wooden spoon; no kneading necessary. Try the recipe on a weekend morning—it needs only an hour's rising—and serve it hot and fragrant for brunch.

**EASY RAISIN COFFEE BREAD**  
 1 1/2 cups sifted flour  
 1/2 teaspoon salt  
 3 tablespoons sugar  
 1-3rd cup plus 2 tablespoons butter or margarine  
 1 package active dry yeast  
 1/4 cup warm water  
 1/4 cup milk  
 1 egg  
 1/2 cup raisins  
 Grease an 8 inch round layer cake pan.  
 Into a medium mixing bowl sift together the flour, salt and 2 tablespoons of the sugar. With a pastry blender cut in the 1-3rd cup butter until particles are fine.  
 In a small mixing bowl dissolve the yeast in the warm water. In a small saucepan heat the milk until it is just lukewarm; add to yeast.  
 To the flour mixture add the yeast-milk mixture, egg and raisins. With a wooden spoon, beat thoroughly.  
 Turn into prepared pan; sprinkle with the remaining 1 tablespoon sugar; dot with the remaining 2 tablespoons butter.  
 Cover with a tea towel; let rise in a warm draft-free place until doubled in bulk—about 1 hour.  
 Bake in a preheated 375-degree oven for 25 to 30 minutes. Turn out of pan; turn right side up onto serving plate; cut in wedges and serve at once with squares of butter.

**Trout Dauphine A Treat**

When I was in Paris some years ago, the dining room of the Hotel Monna Lisa was the headquarters of a local group of food lovers like a lodge, thanks to the culinary art of its chef, Lucien Chassegnat.  
A friend of mine who recently stopped at the Hotel Monna Lisa said Chassegnat still is there supervising seven sous-chefs and three assistants in the kitchen.

When the mood calls, Chassegnat can spin yarns by the hour about the good old days before inflation and other modern evils.  
He likes to hark back to the era before World War II when the Grand Salle, a stately room now only used for private functions, was the gathering place for Europe's "Beautiful People."  
Those were the days when King Alfonso of Spain used to frequent the Moures. On one occasion, he ordered lamb chops for himself and several guests, he Spanish ambassador to Paris, a Maurice regular, ordered lamb and potatoes to Chassegnat. The imaginative chef made up the best of a small fool to look like a lamb chop and did such a good job it even fooled the king.

The chef also remembers the grim period of World War II when Adolf Hitler's troops occupied Paris and the Moures was taken over as headquarters for the Nazi High Command. Those were the days when a lovely waitress named Marie Grand Salle was covered with a portrait of Hitler.

My friend says Chassegnat is now telling an anecdote about a memorable night when a handsome Salsadore Dali hosted a dinner at the Moures and brought along his pet ocelot, a nervous animal.  
The best was lying at the feet of its famous master when a waiter brought in a haunch of venison and deposited it in front of the host. The tantalizing odor was too much for the ocelot and lunged for the main dish, bringing down table cloth, silverware and glasses with a resounding crash.

The room was a shambles of scattered food and broken china, but the guests found it all very amusing.  
Monsieur Dali has friends with a rare sense of humor, says Chassegnat with a shrug.  
Chassegnat never tires of cooking, it seems, and spends his days off whipping up experimental dishes for his friends. He also serves longtime favorites like Trout Dauphine, and here is his recipe.

**TROUT DAUPHINE**  
Split and bone six trout and saute the filets in butter on both sides, until about half cooked. Use your favorite recipe for sweetened crepes and make 12 of them about the size of the fillets as the filets. Place each filet on a crepe and top each with 1/4 cup shredded crab meat if canned, soak crab in cold water for about five minutes. Make 2 1/2 cups of a Sauce Mornay and spread two teaspoons full on each filet. Roll up the crepes with the filets inside and place in a large skillet with remainder of Mornay sauce thinned with some white wine. Cook for 10 minutes over medium heat, stir and add remaining crab meat to sauce. Grate Swiss cheese on top of each crepe and slide pan under broiler for 3 minutes to melt cheese.  
Serves six persons. Serve with a chilled dry white wine or a rice.

### Cornish Hens Real Delight

Cornish hens with an herbed mushroom stuffing make an attractive meal that takes little time to prepare. It's an ideal dish for a new bride to add to her beginning repertoire since little (hopefully) can go wrong.

Remember, if the hens are frozen, thaw completely and remove whatever is stuffed into the cavity. Many a new cook gets a red face when she presents an undercooked Cornish hen with giblets in wrappings still intact inside.

**CORNISH HENS WITH HERBED MUSHROOM STUFFING**

1/4 pound fresh mushrooms or 1 can (3 to 4 oz.) sliced mushrooms

4 tablespoons butter or margarine, divided

2 tablespoons parsley flakes

2 tablespoons instant minced onion

1 teaspoon salt

1 teaspoon poultry seasoning

1/4 teaspoon ground black pepper

4 ready-to-cook Cornish hens

Salt

Ground white pepper

Remove, pat dry and slice fresh mushrooms (makes about 1 1/4 cups) or drain canned mushrooms. Heat 2 tablespoons butter in a skillet. Add mushrooms and saute until golden. In a large bowl combine parsley flakes, minced onion, salt, poultry seasoning and skin of hens. Stir in sauteed mushrooms. Rub cavities and skin of hens with salt and white pepper. Lightly fill cavities with stuffing. Close with small skewers or toothpicks. Fold wings back and under. Brush skin of each hen with remaining 2 tablespoons melted butter. Place hens on rack in shallow baking pan. Roast, uncovered, in a preheated 350-degree oven for 1 hour or until done. Makes 4 portions.

**ALMOND MACARON**

An easy-to-make dessert.

1/2 cup unsifted flour

1/2 teaspoon baking powder

1/4 teaspoon salt

1 1/2 pounds (about) apples

1 cup sugar

1/4 teaspoon cinnamon

2 tablespoons butter, soft

1/2 teaspoon almond extract

1 large egg

1/4 cup thinly sliced blanched almonds

On wax paper thoroughly stir together the flour, baking powder and salt; set aside. Pare, quarter and core apples; slice thin to make 1 quart. In a medium mixing bowl stir together 1/2 cup of the sugar and the cinnamon; mix in apples; turn into a 9-inch glass pie plate. Bake apples in a preheated 375-degree oven for 20 minutes; apples will shrink. Meanwhile, in a small mixing bowl cream butter, the remaining 1/2 cup sugar and the almond extract; thoroughly beat in egg; stir in flour mixture and 1/2 cup of the almonds. Spread batter, a little at a time, over apples; sprinkle with remaining 1/2 cup almonds. Return to 375-degree oven and bake until browned—30 minutes longer. Serve warm with vanilla ice cream or whipped cream. Makes 6 to 8 servings.

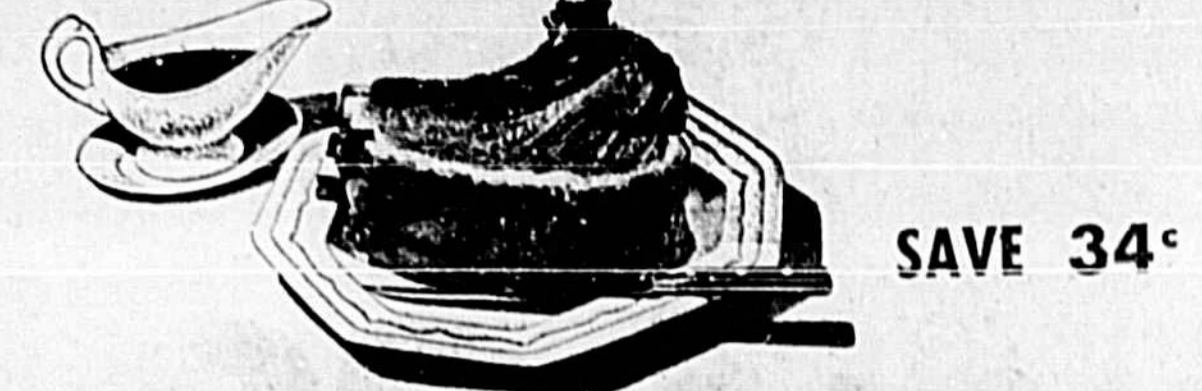

## Yams, Ham Familiar To All

Yams and ham are a familiar combination, one that needn't break the budget apart and one that provides protein from the ham and loads of Vitamins A and C from the yams.

A completely different approach to this basic combination is a ham turnover with yam-orange sauce. Or, an even quicker way to prepare the two is to mix a Ham and Yam hash.

**HAM TURNOVERS WITH YAM-ORANGE SAUCE**

1 1/2 cups ground cooked ham

2 tablespoons snipped parsley

1 teaspoon prepared mustard

1 teaspoon minced fresh onion

1 tablespoon light cream

5 1/2 inch pastry circles

Combine ham, parsley, mustard, onion and cream. Divide ham mixture on half of each pastry circle. Brush edge of pastry lightly with water. Fold over. Press edges together with a fork. Place on ungreased baking sheet. Bake in 375-degree oven 25 minutes.

**YAM SAUCE**

6 medium-sized yams (about 3 1/2 pounds)

2 tablespoons cornstarch

3 cups fresh orange juice

2/3 cup pineapple preserves

1 tablespoon fresh lemon juice

Scrub yams but do not peel. Cook in boiling water in covered pot until tender. Drain. Hold each yam on a fork; peel. Cut yams into 1/2-inch slices. Mix cornstarch with a little orange juice to make a smooth paste. Combine with remaining orange juice and pineapple preserves in medium sauce. Cook over medium heat, stirring constantly, until mixture reaches boiling point. Stir in lemon juice. Gently mix in yam slices. Serve with Ham Turnovers. Makes 6 servings.

2 cups chopped cooked ham

1 cup diced cooked yams

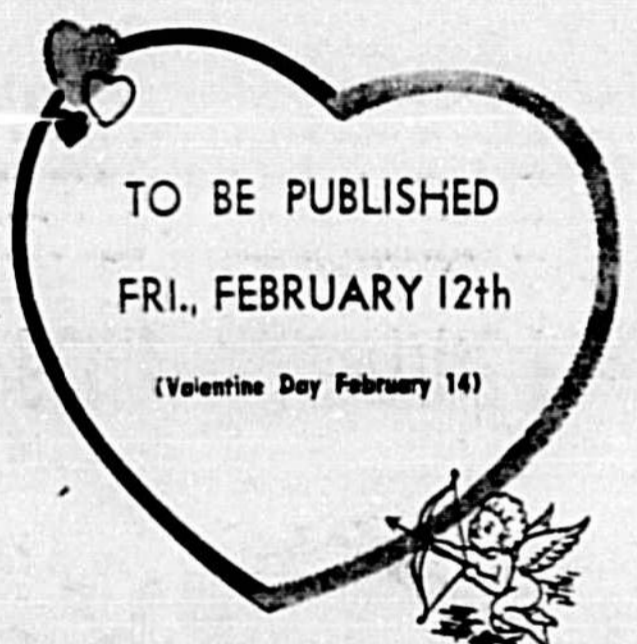

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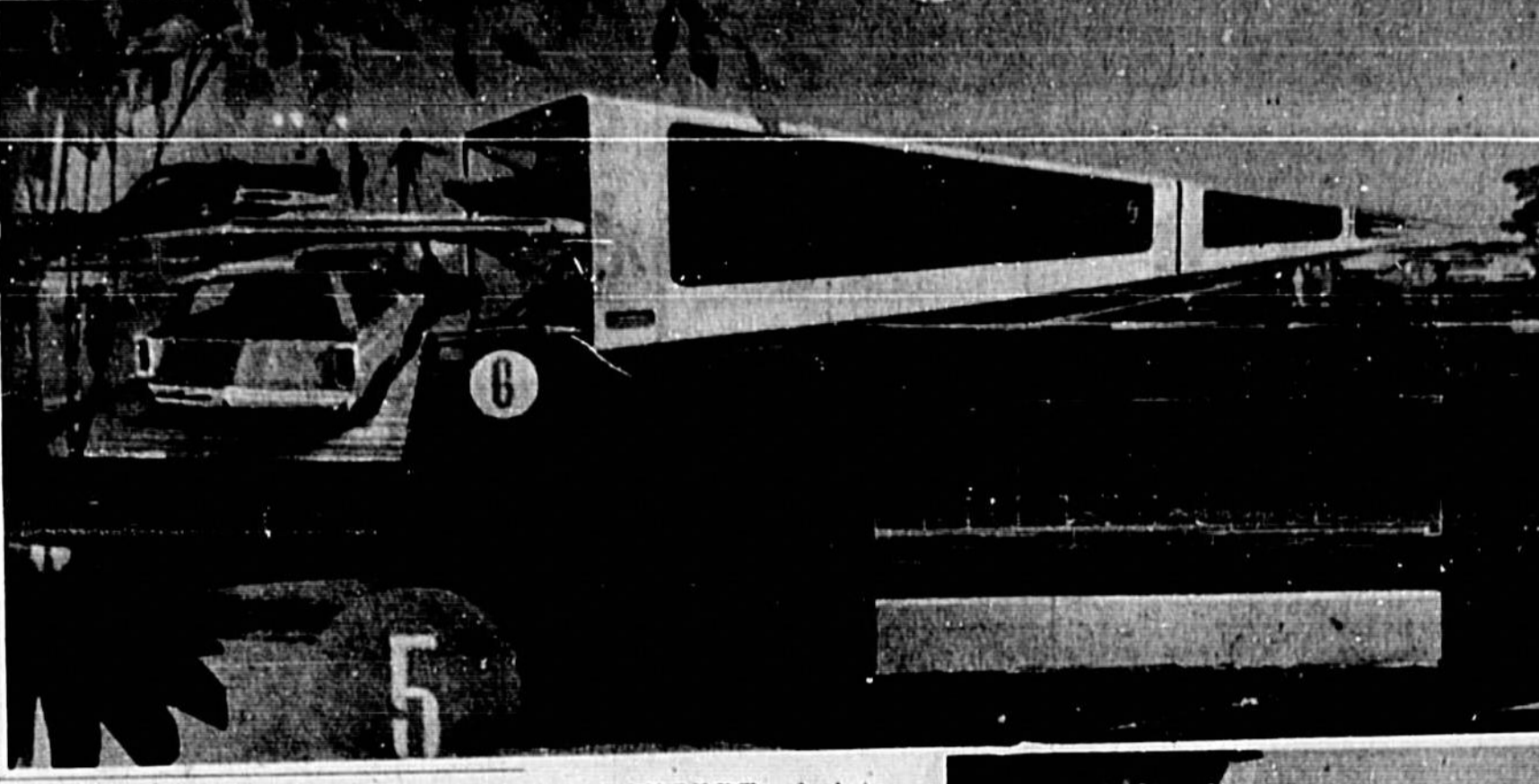

# Federal \$\$ Aid Expected By County For Construction, Parks

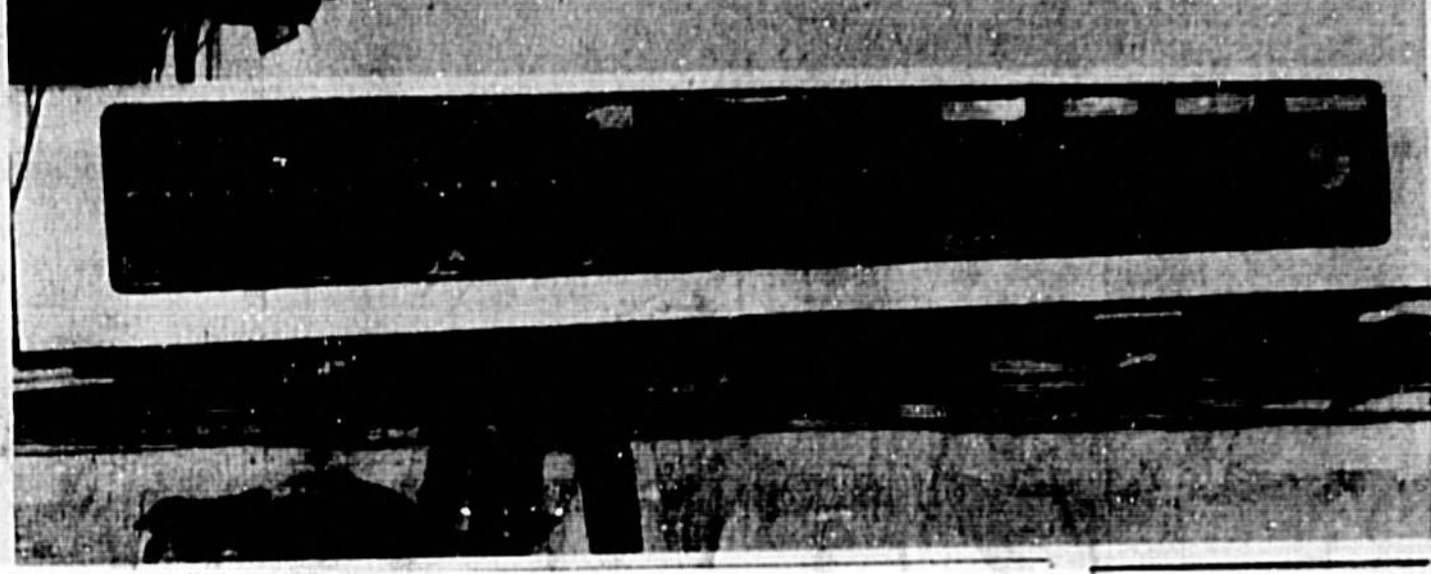

"A fruitful trip" was the terminology used by County Planner David Farr in describing a sojourn to Atlanta seeking federal matching funds for the county parks program, the Mental Health Facility and Juvenile Detention Center.  
Farr told the County Commission that he also conducted other business relative to the East Central Florida Regional Planning Council in its short range water and sewer studies. Another matter undertaken in Atlanta was a conference with the environmental protection agency concerning mission control test devices for motor vehicle inspection stations. Farr said that money will be available at mid-year and allocated to the state for disbursement to individual counties.  
Discussing the federal funding for the parks program, Farr said that there had been policy changes in the U. S. Office of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) with first priorities being placed upon neighborhood parks, which were less than 30 acres located near areas of low or moderate income families. Farr said that this county could establish the neighborhood parks program on a portion of the Lake Monroe site, Rock Lake, Sand Lake and Lake Howell.  
Farr continued that in discussion with the National Mental Health Institute relative to the mental incompetency facility, he was advised funds would be disbursed on a state level through the state mental health facility plan.  
Farr said he spoke with an individual in the Law Enforcement Assistance Agency concerning funds for the construction and equipping of juvenile detention facility. Farr also said that application for federal funds may be made through the grantee crime bill program. He continued that he hoped to receive information on the grantee program and that the county would qualify.

## County Approves Budget Change

County Commissioners have received a request from the State Department of Transportation for the county to adopt a resolution amending its budget relative to additional right-of-way acquisition at the intersection of U.S. 17-92 and First Street. This is necessary, according to the DOT, because it has encountered additional right-of-way costs for a new traffic signal.  
Commissioners approved the transfer of \$1,000 from the county-wide right-of-way acquisition account, deducting the same amount from preliminary engineering. This will leave a balance of \$2,000 in the county-wide preliminary engineering fund. Only negative vote was cast by Chairman Greg Drummond.  
Relative to the DOT, the department acknowledged a resolution passed by the Commission on Dec. 29, requesting an updating of the cost estimates for primary and secondary roads for right-of-way and construction. The DOT informed the commission that information would be transmitted as soon as possible.  
In a related road matter, a request was received from the City of Sanford for extension of Onora Road 100 feet to the interior road system of the Sanford Airport. County Engineer William Bush will report to the Commission upon the matter on Feb. 2.  
Also relative to roads, announcement was made that the School Board had appointed Dr. Stuart Calpurner to the high-way safety committee as its representative.

# State Needs Land For Signal

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## Probe Will Continue

CASELLERY—Probe into the operations of the police department will be continued by the City Council, in spite of the resignation of Chief Donald Brumley.  
Dr. Edith Duerr, council chairman, said today she expects the Council members "to continue as they voted" to investigate the police department.  
Brumley submitted his resignation, effective in 30 days to Mayor Curtis Blaw, yesterday. Blaw had been seeking to oust Brumley for 14 years but the Chief had been supported by the Council.  
With Brumley's resignation there were rumors that others of the 15-man police force would "walk out" but Dr. Duerr said today she anticipates "no walk out. In fact, I have every confidence in the members of the police force."  
Brumley quit after he was censured by the Council for revealing to Gov. Heuback that Blaw had used city laborers on his river camp at Lemon Bluff.  
Blaw was unavailable for comment today.

## Prepay Denied County

County Attorney Harold Johnson has reported to the County Commission on a U. S. Geological Survey statement. Johnson discussed the statement of entering into an agreement with the USGS for a bill of \$4,000. Johnson said that the county was not allowed to prepay. The contract runs through the budget year of Oct. 1, 1970, to Sept. 30, 1971. Johnson said that progress payments could be made monthly but that a lump sum is not allowed.  
The county entered into a cooperative flood study with the USGS in the total amount of \$9,000.  
In another matter, trustees of the state internal improvement fund have requested a meeting with the Commission to discuss the dredging of lakes and waterways. It was suggested that the Water Control and Conservation Advisory Commission also be invited to the discussion which were set for Feb. 8 at 3 p.m.

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
