

Blue Cross-Blue Shield Claims Manager Paul Myers said in an interview that women covered under a family contract policy for a minimum of nine months are entitled to make claims for an abortion. However, because of the variety of policies, it is impossible to determine the amount any one individual might receive, he said.

Dave Mancini, spokesman for Blue Cross-Blue Shield, explained that if an abortion was done in a clinic, generally a policy would pay only for the surgeon's fee, unless the clinic was set up as part of a hospital.

Phil Weber, information officer for the Division of HRS, said 746 legal abortions have been reported in the state since a liberalized law took effect April



Crime's 'Top Hq.' Bared

NEW YORK (AP) - A dirty gray and blue junkyard trailer, surrounded by discarded auto wrecks and often frequented by Cadillacs, has been unmasked as organized crime's "summit headquarters" for the New York City area. A sweeping dragnet, involving issuance of subpoenas to more than 600 reputed organized crime figures, was announced Monday by Brooklyn Dist. Atty. Eugene Gold, who called it the biggest underworld probe in history. Gold disclosed that three telephones had been bugged and an eavesdropping device had been installed last April in the

40-by 15-foot trailer in Brooklyn which is surrounded by barbed wire and guarded at night by dogs. Conversations recorded over the past seven months and a gallery of still and moving pictures revealed "the comings and goings of prominent members of the five organized crime families of New York City and other people," Gold

Included in the range of crimes said to have been discussed in the trailer were narcotics, counterfeiting, labor racketeering, auto theft, insurance fraud, prostitution, gambling, loansharking, burglary and arson.

"All the top members of organized crime had been in the trailer," Gold said. An estimated 100 policemen were also understood to have

been issued subpoenas.

"We have pierced the vein of organized crime," declared Gold, who told newsmen that his investigation had been more productive than the exposure of the 1957 Apalachin crime convention. * * *

It is nothing new that the freedom of the press is being threatened. For this has been the case ever since the first printer loaded his press on a wagon and started the cross-country trek

which was littered with the bodies of those brave pioneers who found out what was going on and printed it. It is an historical fact that dictators and tyrants showed their unbridled ambitions when the press and the editors were censored, con-

trolled and the practitioners jailed or killed. Thus it is with considerable enthusiasm that we hail the action of the prestigious editors and publishers of Florida when they voted 53-1 to back a proposed "shield law" at a panel discussion at a joint meeting in Marco Island this past weekend.

For what is at stake is precisely what is meant by the "free press" which hires reporters to seek the facts and make them public even when those who might be adversely affected try to stop them.

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Traditionally the reporter who has the guts and the skill to create his own sources of information so that the real meaning of the event he is digging into can be given depth and the public properly informed, did so assured that the "confidentiality" of his profession would be respected.

However a recent close decision by the Supreme Court denied this and sent the situation back into Congress so that a "shield" law which would give legal standing to the confidentiality aspect of the reporter's trade could be debated and, if approved by Congress, become law.

This is taking place at a time in our nation's history when only the blindest of observers could fail to realize that people's right to know is being nibbled away at in a most dangerous manner. We could refer to the outright hostility which

Presidential '72 Nixon's Strength In Massachusetts

BOSTON - Sen. George McGovern's campaign in Masschusetts should be a raging prairie fire by this time, sweeping all before it, racing toward a major triumph over President Nixon at the polls on Nov. 7.

Despite a more than two-to-one Democratic majority in voter registration, and probably the most liberal Democratic tradition in the nation, Massachusetts could go Republican in this presidential race for the first time since 1956.

The situation is still fluid. The critical closing weeks of the campaign still lie ahead. But all present indicators point toward a neck and neck finish, with President Nixon's chances of winning the state's 14 electoral votes considered at least even-perhaps even a little better than even.

In some ways, this head-to-head presidential contest may be among the most interesting in the nation. It presents many of the same emotional conflicts, contending groups and issues that have beset the McGovern effort elsewhere. Massachusetts, like much of America, is predominantly

Democratic in party affiliation. Massachusetts, like many other areas, has large ethnic groupings - Americans of Italian, French-Canadian, Portuguese, Polish, Irish and African extraction.

That, however, has never been the Democratic presiden tial candidate's problem. His problem was best summed up by Eunice Kennedy Shriver in a news conference on the same day. From her observations on the campaign trail with her husband, Democratic vice-presidential candidate R. Sargent Shriver, she has found simply that: The conservative influence of the Catholic church is still "The American public is not listening. Poles and Italians. Such groups and the state as a whole have demonstrated they know what they like in political candidates and in the last three presidential elections that choice has been overwhelmingly Democratic.

Hubert Humphrey carried the state 1,469,218 (63 per cent) to 766,844 (33 per cent) for Mr. Nixon in 1968, Democrat Lyndon Johnson, 76 per cent to 24 per cent for Sen. Barry Goldwater in 1964, and in 1960 John F. Kennedy won handily over Mr. Nixon 60 per cent to 40 per cent.

With that tradition and the amazing momentum McGovern built up in his highly successful presidential primary effort in Massachusetts early this year he should have been off with an early and substantial lead after being nominated at the Democratic convention in July.

A late summer poll conducted by Becker Research Corp. did show McGovern leading Mr. Nixon 47 to 43 per cent. But, then came the dropping of Sen. Thomas Eagleton as McGovern's vice presidential running mate, and the uproar over McGovern defense and income redistribution proposals.

Businessmen Urged To Use Airmail

WASHINGTON - In an unusual venture into the world of Madison Avenue advertising techniques, the U.S. Postal Service is spending more than \$800,000 in a one-year campaign to persuade businessmen they should send all their letters by airmail.

A major thrust is the mailing of an oversized copy of the well-known red, white and blue bannered airmail envelope in the form of a promotional brochure. The brochure tells businessmen the use of airmail will insure more reliable delivery because of its priority

over regular mail. The selected mailings to 1,200,000 business establishments began in the summer and will be carried out in four phased programs over the next few weeks. Total cost of the mail operation is \$450,000.

A Postal Service spokesman said the balance of promotional money will be used to print posters and other publicity material for display in public buildings. The promotional theme centers on spending extra money for airmail inder a "three cent insurance policy."

Most of the American business mail

- which totals more than 49 billion pieces annually - goes by first class delivery. Although considered the top grade type of service for most correspondence, the Postal Service, in the promotional material, indicates there may be drawbacks. "Unlike many first class letters, that

fly standby when space is available, airmail always catches the first plane out," the brochure states. Airmail volume now constitutes about 1.5 billion pieces a year. It is estimated by the Postal Service that as many as 1 billion more pieces of regular first class business mail items are available for conversion for airmail

"The efficiency of airmail is obvious to business interests," the service spokesman said. "The purpose of this program is to acquaint them with what we have to offer." Results of the promotional effort are not expected to be known until early

The direct mail promotion is expected, according to Postal Service forecasts, to reach 25 per cent of American businesses which do an average amount of commercial mail business.


In the brochure, Postal Service officials emphasize the speed and efficiency of airmail while noting that a letter sent now for eight cents would cost three cents more if converted.

"Airmail insures that cities in the continental United States are only two days away," the brochure states.

"Airmail hardly ever takes more than two days to arrive - often only one. Just make sure your letters get to an airmail box by our last pickup of the

Postal Service officials hope the pro-motional effort will "break a belief" now held by businessmen that all mail, despite the amount of postage paid, eventually is carried by airplane. Essentially, this is the case although first class letters are handled in processing on a space available basis.

According to the service, this saving may be costing businessmen lost time. "Airmail letters always get handled and processed first," the brochure said. "... When you use airmail, you save up to a half a day in handling alone."



By BRUCE BIOSSAT It is an interesting facet of the 1972 campaign that a fair number of newsmen are planning to follow Sen. Edward Kennedy on some of his forays for candidates quest-

ing after governorships or seats in the House or Senate. The reporters think, of course, that they are getting a preview of 1976. No sharper commentary could be had on the incredible dullness of the 1972 presidential race and, indeed, on virtually all the key races for governorship and Congress.

You have to strain a bit even to use the word "key" in talking about these latter contests. A lot of newsmen watched Kennedy helping Sen, George McGovern for a few days. While that team act provided some cues, it also led to unsolvable arguments about who was drawing the crowds. The newsmen want a fuller

look at the pure Ted. Why? Well, most of them have been nurtured on a diet of excitement and they're not getting it. They know things could change, that the Nixon-McGovern race could close up and bring them dashing back to the big boys' chart-ered jet aircraft. But they're not betting on it.

Those who have no choice but to stick with the main event to the end may have to ask for an adrenalin transfusion from the fabled, frenzied Victor Gold, press secretary to Vice President Agnew. Gold directs the press bus with a charged-up fury which suggests that the future of the free world hangs on our staying no more than 10 yards behind the candidate.

After Vic's clamorous commands have been taped for fun once or twice, that's about it. So political reporters' thoughts naturally drift ahead to 1976, as they did in August at Miami Beach when the Republicans were renominating President Nixon with about as much zest as can be invested in a fifth television rerun of Mod Squad. We'll have to wait for later reports to get the fresh details but those of us who cover politics already know the basic answer. Ted Kennedy has the stuff.

He is a natural born campaigner, considerably better than either of his late brothers. He loves the business, has great fun practicing it, and communicates all of this both to his audience and to the professional observers.

Now, let's not have any stiff-backed nonsense about fun having no place in politics at a time when the nation and a good part of the world are engulfed in deep and often tragic problems. Our teachers have taught us all, quite properly, that tragedy and comedy go hand in hand, that the gravest difficulties can be dealt with more sensibly and perhaps more energetically if they are approached with a spicing of wit. Maybe more important still is the fact that Ted Ken-

nedy really works at the job. He is a dawn-to-midnight campaigner. He would scoff at the thin schedules of the 1972 contenders, which seem to be filled up mostly with notations about "candidate's personal time" or instructions on where to find your baggage.

If anybody imagines the American people don't want to see their candidates in the flesh any more, he hasn't been around much. They like the face-to-face encounters more than ever, and no 30-second clip on the evening news show is any kind of substitute.

But they do also like their candidates to be interesting And most of the chaps who are wandering around the political scene this fall act like members of the 14th interplanetary company of "Fiddler on the Roof." So, friends, if you're dozing a little right now, take heart. We'll try to get your blood flowing again soon with a report on Ted Kennedy's pilot film for the 1976 series.



He said the Beverage Division, which enforces cigaret tax laws, tracks down mail order purchases and requires payment of taxes but "we don't know how many we don't

The mail firms are required to send lists of their Florida customers to the Beverage Division, but with 141 of them operating at last count, Cassels said it's impossible to keep up with unpaid taxes.

"It's a problem we wish we could eliminate but we haven't come up with a solution yet," he



Hunting Notes

Dick Dove, local taxidermist, called this department Friday to pass along a word of warning to hunters. Only three birds are not protected under the International Migratory Bird Act. They are pigeons, English Sparrows, and starlings, even crows and hawks come under this regulation according to Dick.

Duck season opens Novermber 23 and runs through January, 1973. Dove suggested that it would be a very good idea for sportsmen to study in-flight pictures and learn to recognize the various ducks since canvasback, redhead, brant and geese are illegal to take.

Shortly after talking with Dove, a letter was received from the Information and Education Division of the Game and Fresh Water Fish Commission pertaining to the same subject, but stated in much stronger terms.

Quoting from the letter, "All eagles, hawks, and owls are protected by Florida law and may not be taken or molested at any time. Anyone shooting or otherwise harming one of these birds may be subject to a fine or a jail sentence." To be on the safe side the Game and Fresh Water Fish Commission cautions sportsmen not to shoot at any large

soaring bird. Both the black and turkey vulture and other large soaring birds are protected. The first phase of dove season is halfway through with mixed reports being received. Among the hunters finding fairly good shooting was David Hiley who bagged 11 on an outing in the Geneva area, but got only seven on his next trip

to the same spot. Jim Blythe at the Plaza Sports Shop mentioned that many reports of baited fields (illegal) had come his way during the current dove season. Local hunters have been having fairly good shooting in the Lake Mary area until this weekend but apparently the birds are becoming cautious and flying so high as to be hard to hit according to Blythe.

Speckled perch in Lake Monroe had a very bad time of it Saturday and Sunday if the number of boats on the water was any indication. From the seawall it appeared that fishing craft formed an almost unbroken line extending the length of the lake. An estimate of 100-150 parties each day would not be ar telched.





DEAR POLLY-Mrs. R. L. C. wanted to know what to use on her paneling. I suggest plain lemon oil as it cleans off the dirt and protects the wood. Rub in well with a woolen cloth and then use another clean cloth for wiping. use an old nylon slip for this and rub until dry. I keep he cloth with oil on it in a bag so it can be used again -

DEAR GIRLS-Mrs. R. L. C. said her paneling was a type of fiberboard finished to look like walnut. I discussed this with a chemist at a factory making such products. He said some paneling of this type has a paint finish and some has a vinyl finish. This would make a difference with various products used. As a general rule he said spray furniture polish will usually do the job or smudges and dirt might be wiped off with a mild detergent suds (do not soak) and then, after it is dry, use a polish to restore the shine .-- POLLY
