

Both schools will be on the 10-period day schedule, more often referred to as double sessions. The boundaries and sessions for each school include: AOUNA Seminole High - With Highway 17-92 being the dividing line all students living in the eastern section will attend the afternoon session and students living west of Hwy. 17-92 will be scheduled in the morning classes. Lyman High -- With the Seaboard Coast Line railroad (main track) being the dividing line, all students living in the western section will attend the afternoon session and students living east of the track will be scheduled in morning classes.

Exceptions to the above may be that certain programs and subjects, due to their nature, will be available only for one session. In this event, students who normally could attend the alternate session may be assigned by the school to the session offering that program or subject and busing will be provided according to the approved transportation policies.



\$500,000 Paid For HLH Plant Home Builder To Employ 150

A modular home builder an nounced this morning he has purchased the H. L. Hunt Sar ford Avenue property and will locate a 150-employe plant in the renovated structure within 45 days to manufacture four the substantian transformer

H. W. (Ted) Mack, president of Space Homes of North Carona. Inc., with home office at Ashville, N.C., at a special news conference at Holiday Isle, disclosed his firm would build modular housing units to be sold at a cost between \$16,-000 and \$18,000.

Although the price paid for the Hunt property was not revealed by Mack, Greater Sanford Chamber of Commerce Manager John Krider, also present at today's session said the cost for the Hunt property. consisting of a 117,000 square foot building and 17 acres, was about half a million dollars.

Mack introduced Gary Smith as the new plant manager and reported the new firm would work through the Florida State Employment Service in hiring. "At least 40 persons will be required at the start with expansions up to 150 workers within six months to construct on eight assembly lines from eight to 10 houses a day," Mack

The president said the company is a part of a real estate holding firm that rents 300 apartments at Ashville. Commercial properties also are rented by the company, which has its own sales corporation,







So. Viets End Spearheads; • **Planning To Renew Attack**

By WALTER WHITEHEAD SAIGON (UPI)-South Vietnam announced today the end of two of its spearhead drives into Cambodia, where regrouping guerrilla troops killed six Americans and wounded 25 in a

predawn attack. Most of the 16,000 government soldiers involved in the two just-completed cross-border thruste_one along Cambodia's coast and the other into its northeastern sector - were expected to go back in new drives or as reinforcements within a week.

"These troops were withdrawn to give them time to relax, recover and re-equip for a couple of days," a military source said. "They don't need much time." Tailitary sources said eleDivision and the 7th North Vietnamese Division are returning to the border area from interior Cambodia, having regrouped after fleeing the Allied

Some of these guerrilla troops were believed involved in this morning's attack against a U.S. 25th Infentry Division base inside Cambodia 85 miles north northwest of Saigon. Spokesmen for the American Command said the attackers. behind a barage of rocket grenades, killed six GIs and wounded 25 but were beaten

back. No Communist bodies were found at daybreak. To counter the loss o supplies and the American bombing of supply lines in Laos, the North Vietnamese

were reported to have captured two population centers -one in Southern Laos and the other in Northeast Cambodia-for use as supply havens from U.S. bombers.

The towns were identified as Attopeu in Southern Laos and Stung Treng in Northeastern Cambodia, both on the southern reaches of the Ho Chi Minh supply trail.



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

Halls of Ivy need to be looked at with the increased understanding and practical appraisals available in this crisis year of 1970. Among these is the assumption that all children

need to and should be headed for academic degrees with the government standing as a benevolent patron to see that all have such doors opened. This is so out-moded and out-grown that it

should not be tolerated when the educational needs of today are assessed. Not that the academic degree, which effective training for the crafts stands out as practical instruction teaching the basics of several go about seeing that every dollar for education is the study of liberal arts or the pursuit of excellence a star in this new state of affairs.

Another Nutty Law

If a law proposed in the Georgia Legisla-E ture were to be passed, tickets to music events in the state would carry this warning: "Caution: Excessive loud noise may damage future hearing."

According to Rep. McKee Hargett, the legislation is "needed" because some of today's rock music can cause serious injury to the inner ear. This item surely deserves a place in that thick volume entitled "Nutty Laws I've Known" by John Q. Public. (What next - sound level governors on radios?) But it is not so funny when it is viewed as a typical example of our whole approach to the problems of modern living.

No one is forced to attend a rock concer any more than he is forced to smoke. Yet Congress spends months arguing about a warning label on cigarette packages - while, at the same time, subsidizing the tobacco industry with your tax money. -- Gastonia (N.C.) Ganotte



Another Stay Of Trial

A stay of trial may take place in the case of the State of Florida versus Edward Kirkland. The stay will be granted, as a matter of law, upon the filing of a petition for certiorari with the State Supreme Court. This filing should take place today or tomorrow, said Kirkland. An Orlando attorney, Kirkland is accused of lewd and lascivious conduct and assault upon a female under the age of 14.

His attorney, Daniel Warren, of Daytona Beach said that the defense has 15 days in which to file a petition for certiorari (a writ out of a superior court to call up the records of a lower court to insure speedy trial, or a correction of errors or irregularities) with the Supreme Court of Florida appealing the denial of petitions last week in the Fourth District Court of Appeal (in Vero Beach) requesting

The Circuit Court was asked by Warren for a petition of mandamus or, in the alternate, prohibition, said warren.

This denial by the court of review automatically, under Florida law, gave Kirkland's defense 15 days to file a petition for a writ of certiorori with the Supreme Court. This is not a postponement at the discretion of the





Hearing Thursday **On SR 46** By FRED VAN PELT

Standing room only" probably will be the order of t day when the state Department of Transnortation (DeVT) conducts its second public hearing on improvement of west State Road 46 at 2 p.m. Thursday at the County Commission chambers in the court house.

Plans call for a new two-lane highway on a four-lane right-of-way between the Wekiva River and Interstate 4. Latest draft calls for a new road from I-4 west to meet SR 44 at a point north and west of Paola. Cost of improvement is estimated at \$375,600.

Lake County Commission today fulfilled a promise made a few weeks ago in a meeting at Mt. Dora and forwarded a resolution to DOT "that the Department of Transportation is encouraged and requested to improve State Road 46 in both Lake and Seminole County and the County Commissioners for Lake County endorse the proposed imporvements for State Road 46 in Lake and Seminole County and arge the Department of Transportation to consider these improvements."

In the interim, State Rep. E. Pope Bassett, in a telephone call from Tallahassee this morning, breathed new life into the proposed new Osteen Bridge over the St. Johns River. Bassett said he had been advised by Edward Mueller, DOT secretary, that a traffic count will be held on weekends, start-

ing with the upcoming weekend, at the present bridge. More than a year ago, in the winter season, a one-weekend check was held and it indicated a drop of 100 cars per day from a previous count. The new count will be held on several weekends to obtain a more accurate count. (Local residents are urged to drive over the bridge on the next few weekends to boost the count.)

The federal government is pushing for a high level bridge. similar to that on I-4 over the St. Johns River, to eliminate a drawbridge. This would necessitate access roads starting several miles north on SR 415 from the bridge, and crossing the marshlands, and starting from SR 46 immediately east of Cameron Avenue.

DOT, however, claims the high level bridge would cost more money than is presently available and it will push for a low level draw span.

Mueller also informed Bassett that the DOT is increasing the Osteen Bridge allocation in the 1979-71 budget to \$130,000 less money already spent, for a preliminary engineering study. design, plus a new, up-to-date study for a high or low level

DOT will set aside \$30,000 in the 1973-74 budget for the purchase of right-of-way and will earmark sufficient funds in 1974-75 for actual construction of the bridge. However, Bassett quoted Mueller, if sufficient demand

develops the building project could be moved up to 1973-74. If further demand develops, and depending on studies, the bridge construction could be accomplished in 1972-73.
