City, Schools Hassle On Stadium

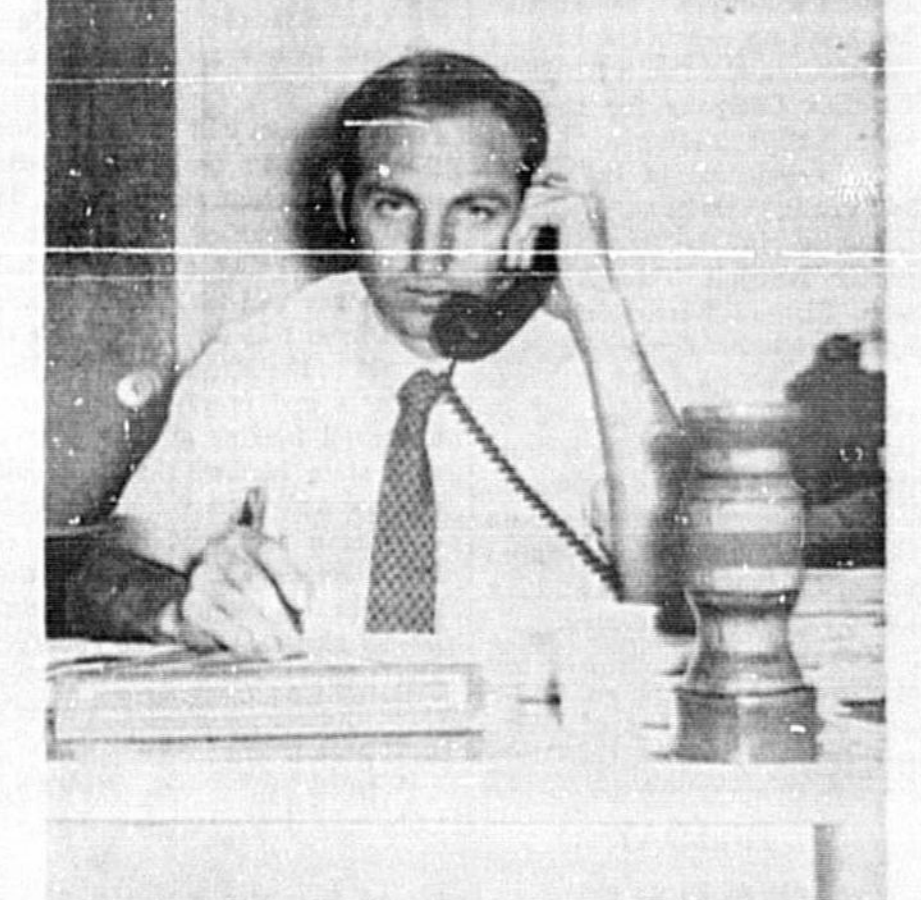

Regardless of whatever issues and whatever pressures are being felt all over the United States, the urgent necessity of new looks, new approaches and new definitions in the field of education stands as a prime challenge and a prime opportunity.

Among these is the assumption that all children need to and should be headed for academic degrees with the government standing as a benevolent patron to see that all have such doors opened.

Educators and educational administrators and public school boards surely demonstrate that their approach to solutions of their unique problems is based on "more money."

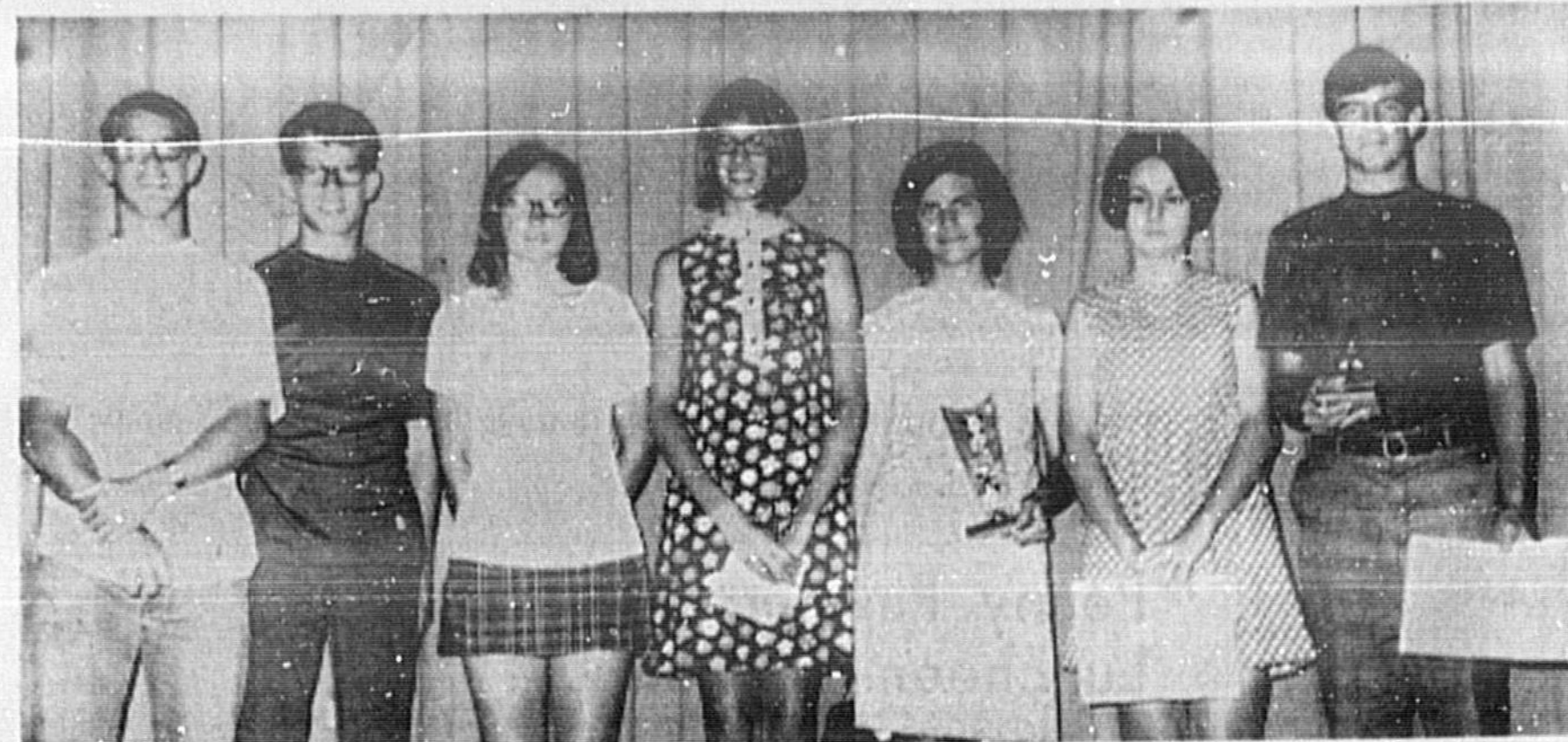

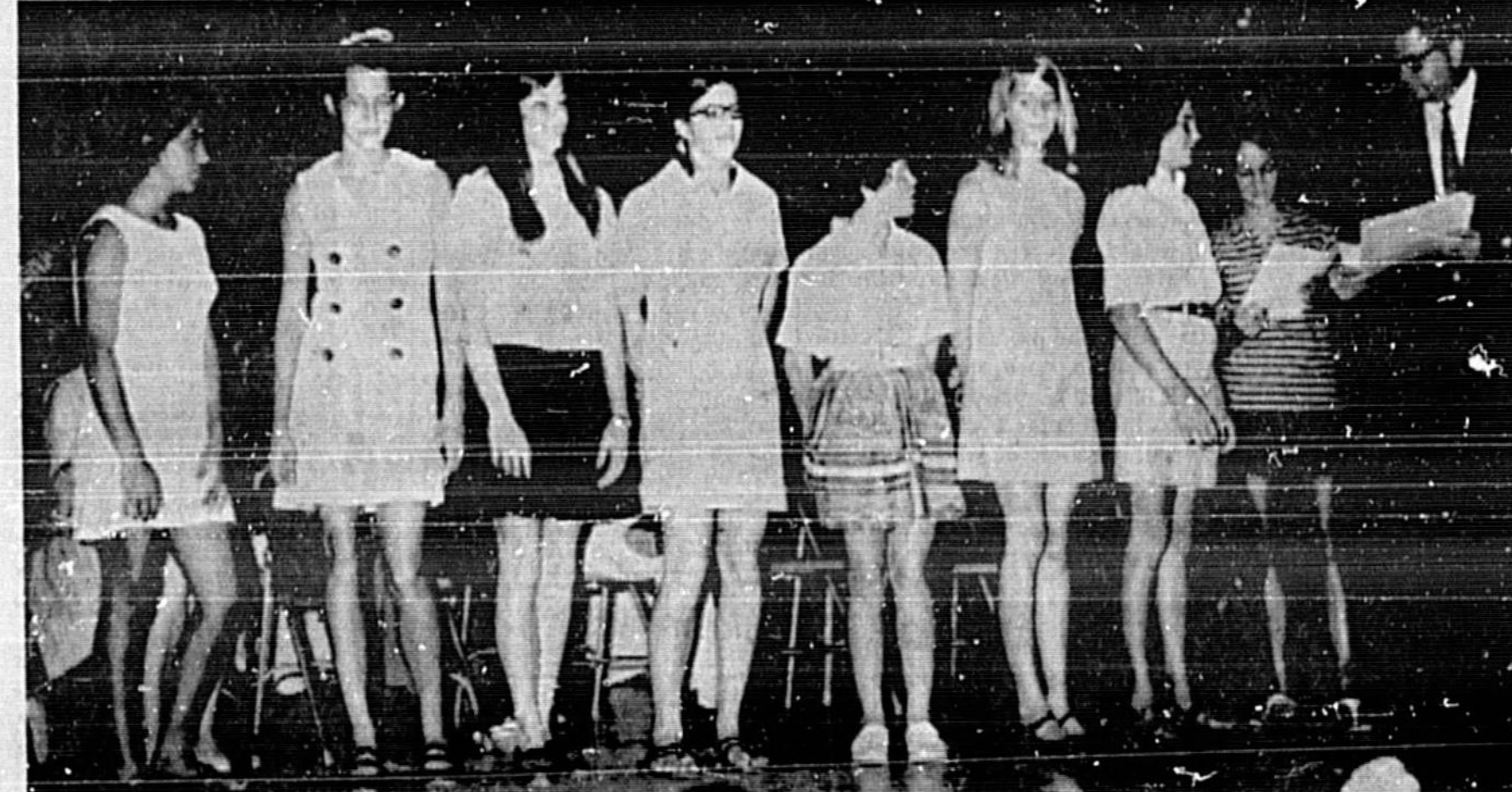

Three Counties Receive Warning Bad Air, Water Worsen In So. Florida

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP) — Bad air and bad water are getting worse in South Florida, a special pollution committee reports, and a state official warns Dade Broward, and Palm Beach counties to work together to stay in existence.

The group urged sweeping and immediate corrective measures. 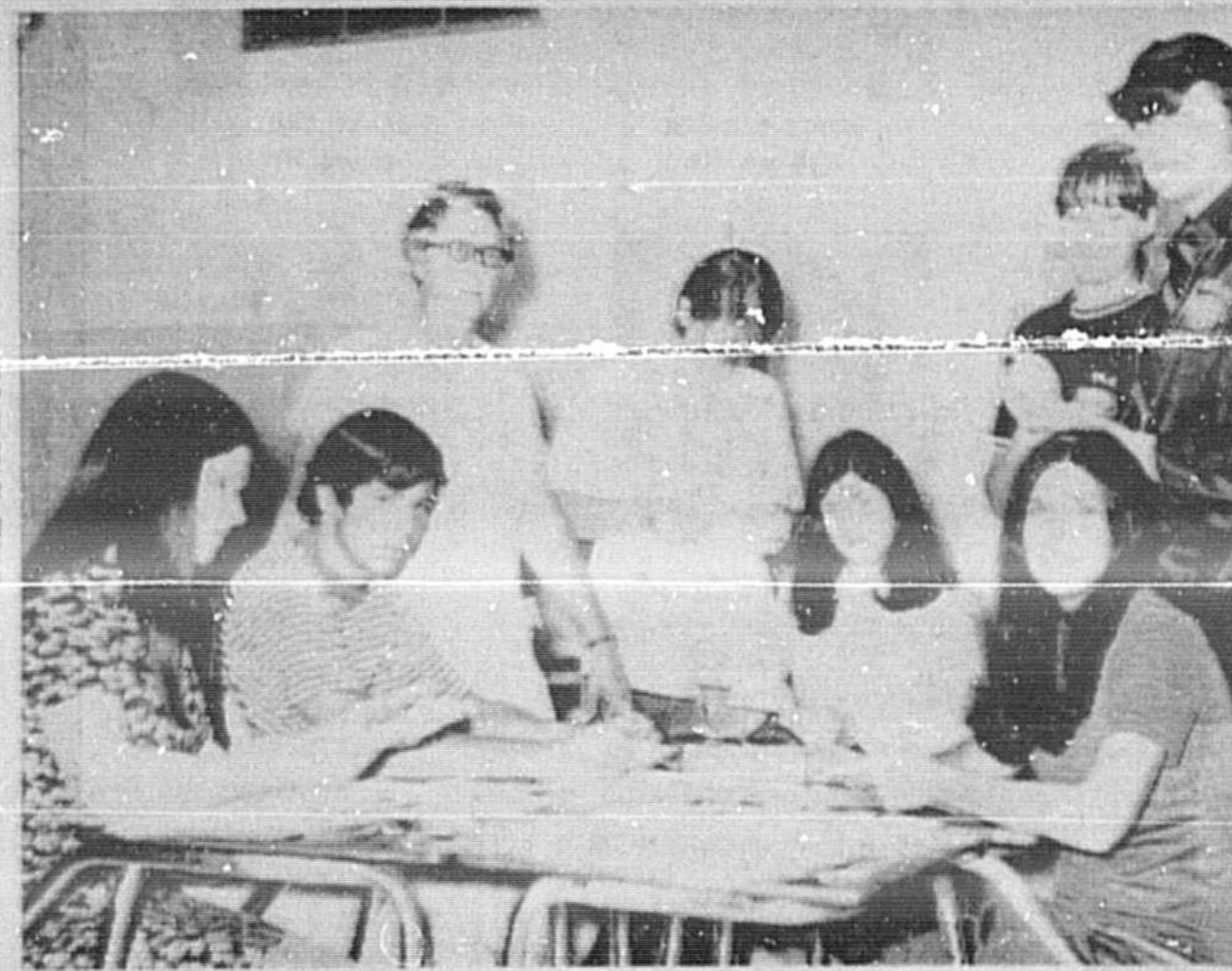
