HOUSE PASSES Mother's Day Proclamation LINDY'S BABY Results Expected

SANFORD, FLORIDA, SATURDAY, MAY 13, 1933

President Reonevelt by proclamation has called for observance of Mother's Day on May 14, usefue that everything be done this year "for the relief and ceiting of outhers and children who may be in needed the necessity of life."

In doing this he followed the special request of the Senate, expressed in recent resolution. The preclamation follows:

Whereas by House Joint Resolution 281, approved and signed by President Wilson on May 8, 1913, the second Sunday in May of each year has been destinated as Mother's Day for the expression of our love and revenue for the mothers of our country; and

Whereas Senate Resolution 15, adopted May 1, 1933, states that "there are throughout our hand today an unprecedentedly large number of mothers and dependent children who, because of unemployment or loss as their bread earners, are lacking many of the necessities at life," and the President

are lacking many of the necessities of lite, and the President of the United States is therein authorized and requested to state proclamation calling these notices to the attention of our citizens on Mother's Day this year.

Now, therefore, I, Franklin D Research, President of the

United States of America, by virtue of the authority vested in and reverence for motherhood.

(a) by the customary display of the United States flag

on all government buildings homes and other suitable places; (b) By the usual tokens and messages of affection to our mothers; and c) By doing all that we can through our churches, fraternal and welfare agencies for the relief and welfare of mothers and children who may be in orest of the necessities

In witness whereof, I have hereunto set my hand and raused the seal of the United States to be attived.

Done at the City of Washington this second day of May, in the year of our Lord nineteen hundred and thirty three and of the independence of the United States of America the one hundred and fifty-seventh.

A spekesman of the chancel-lor's Nazi pacty intimated that Hitler will not go into details or try to refute arguments but with a large perspective, will at-tempt to expound Germany's wish for peace, ecupled with a plea that nations keep their hands off Germany's internal policies and let her work out her salvation for herself.

Great importance was attached to the Reichstag convecation, not only because of an enabling act passed last March giving Hitler dictatorial powers but also because of the impassee reached in Geneva over Germany's arms de-

Regarding one of the points of controversy at the conference, tung last night declared that "should defense organizations be counted as soldiers, there re-mains nothing further for the government than actually to make members of these organizations

neva developments.

The difficulties at Geneva developed during consideration of the British disarmament scheme, under which bath Germany and France would be allotted home armies of 200,000 men, with France allowed an additional overwas army of 200,000.

These forces would be raissed by a conscript plan. The present Germ army is limited by the Treasy of Versailles to 100,000 volunteers who must serve 12 years each.

The Germans have objected to the British proposals on the ground that they fail to meet Berlin's demand for arms equality. Another point of controversy concerned a question the French delegates raised as to whether considered in the German allot-ment of 200,000. A conference committee decided that the storm troops should be so considered.






