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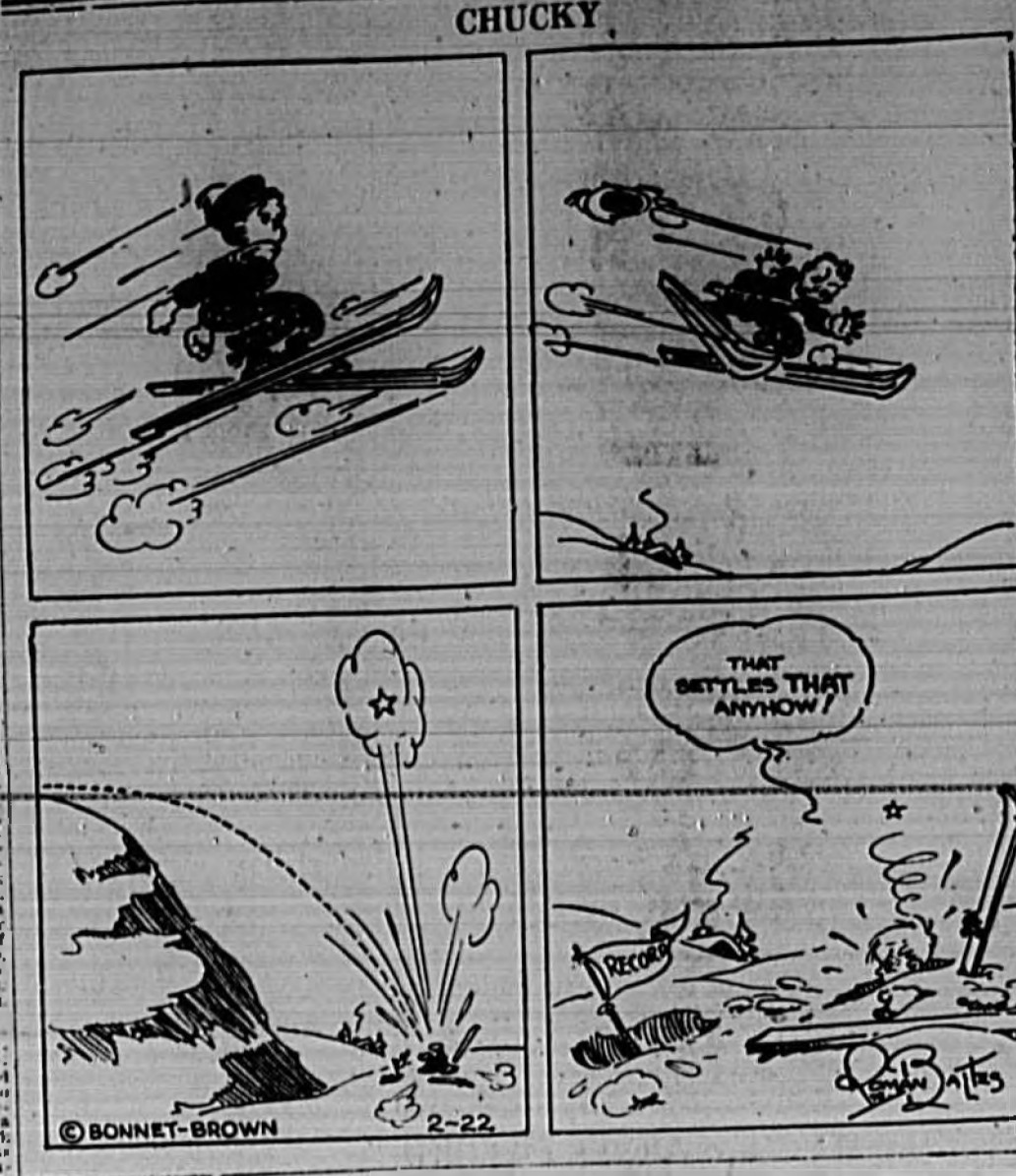
Box score for the Fed vs Cocoa game. Columns include team, player, and statistics like hits, runs, errors, and innings pitched.

had turned the baby down. The nurse called them to come on back and they left immediately.

"Henderson and I went to the hospital to get the baby and to tell them we were to deliver the baby to Mrs. McLean and they would get the money."

Then followed a story of more parleying, backing and filling, ending with the final failure of the whole attempt—an attempt which the previous jury had found was a hoax perpetrated by Means, who got a 15-year sentence. The conspiracy charge now pending is over a sum of \$35,000 Means and Whitaker allegedly schemed to obtain but did not get.

Means said he urged Mrs. McLean to go out to Fairview and the next day she did, but "Henderson" and "Fenton" said they had seen two chauffeurs, a nurse, a maid, Mrs. McLean and another man out there and would not go ahead.

"I went to Mrs. McLean and told her she was violating her agreement by having so many people out there. Three men were in 14 hours to get away. My only object in the case was to insure safe return of the baby. I told Mrs. McLean that if she kept on putting obstacles in the way there was no telling what would happen to the baby."

# HITLER TO MAKE DECLARATION OF PEACE ON MAY 15

## Chancellor Summons German Reichstag To Issue Manifesto

BERLIN, May, 12. (A.P.)—Chancellor Adolf Hitler yesterday summoned the German Reichstag to convene on May 17 in order to make an impressive and solemn declaration before the whole world in the presence of the Reichstag of Germany's desire for peace.

This The Associated Press learned on reliable authority. It was categorically denied that the Nazi chieftain intends to announce Germany's desire to withdraw from the world disarmament conference in Geneva but will try to fix responsibility in case Germany fails.

A spokesman of the chancellor's Nazi party intimated that Hitler will not go into details or try to refute arguments but with a large perspective, will attempt to expound Germany's wish for peace, coupled with a plea that nations keep their hands off Germany's internal policies and let her work out her salvation for herself.

Great importance was attached to the Reichstag convention, not only because of an enabling act passed last March giving Hitler dictatorial powers but also because of the impasse reached in Geneva over Germany's arms demand.

Regarding one of the points of controversy at the conference, the industrialist Allgemeine Zeitung last night declared that "should defense organizations be counted as soldiers, there remains nothing further for the government than actually to make members of these organizations into soldiers."

The summoning of the Reichstag was taken as an indication of the tenacity with which German officialdom viewed the Geneva developments.

The difficulties at Geneva developed during consideration of the British disarmament scheme, under which both Germany and France would be allotted home armies of 200,000 men, with France allowed an additional overseas army of 200,000. These forces would be raised by a conscript plan. The present German army is limited by the Treaty of Versailles to 100,000 volunteers who must serve 12 years each.

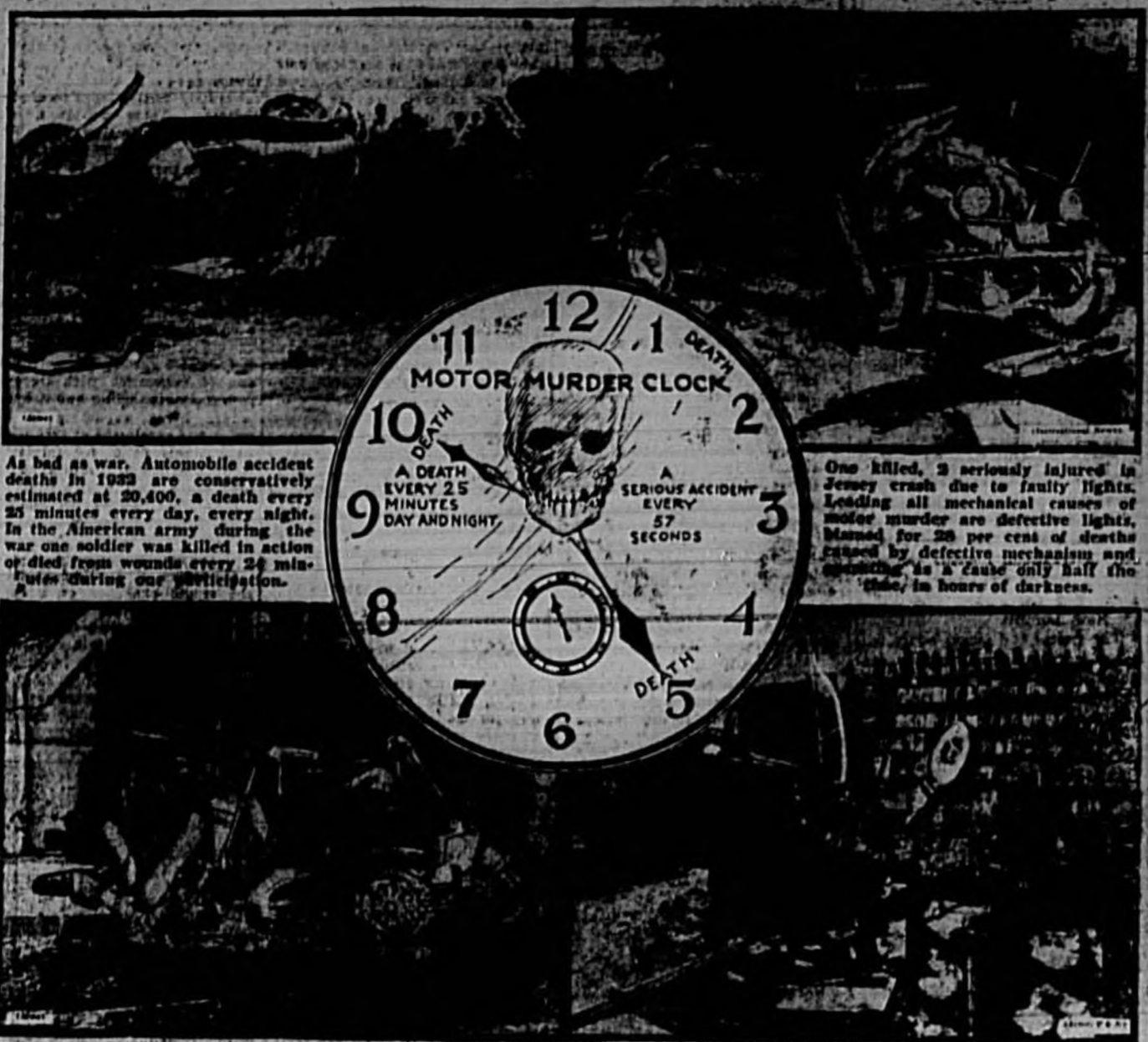

# How 20,000 Die Every Year on Our Highways



As bad as war. Automobile accident deaths in 1933 are conservatively estimated at 20,000, a death every 25 minutes every day, every night in the American army during the war one soldier was killed in action or died from wounds every 24 minutes during one participation.

Lower left, a skidding accident in Detroit killing one and seriously injuring another. Sliding or failure to use chains causes 11 per cent of deaths caused by mechanical defects, a figure that could be reduced by ordinary precautions. Lower right, the car in the collision at Mercer, Pa. Defective brakes caused 19 per cent of the fatalities due to mechanical failure in 1932. The big three mechanical causes of motor murder in 1932 were skids, bad brakes, and defective lights, with faulty lights leading list. Headlight glare is largely responsible but defective tail lights are also blamed. Of 1,380,382 cars officially inspected in Pennsylvania, 270,214 had faulty steering mechanisms; 547,203 had defective brakes; 738,703 had defective tires; and 19,023 had defective lights. Only 212,444 cars, less than 15 per cent, were in good condition. Negligence of equipment is accountable for many deaths, but the reckless driver, Public Enemy No. 1, is blamed for 40 per cent of accidents involving deaths, and Professor W. Sherman Smith of the University of Toledo said he found in a special study that 85 per cent of fatalities were due to "poor judgment of driver." Experts agree that next forward step in design must be in glare-proof, fool-proof lighting systems, but more important than any mechanical improvement would be elimination of negligence and carelessness. Death toll in 15 years was 723,000, more than killed in all our wars.

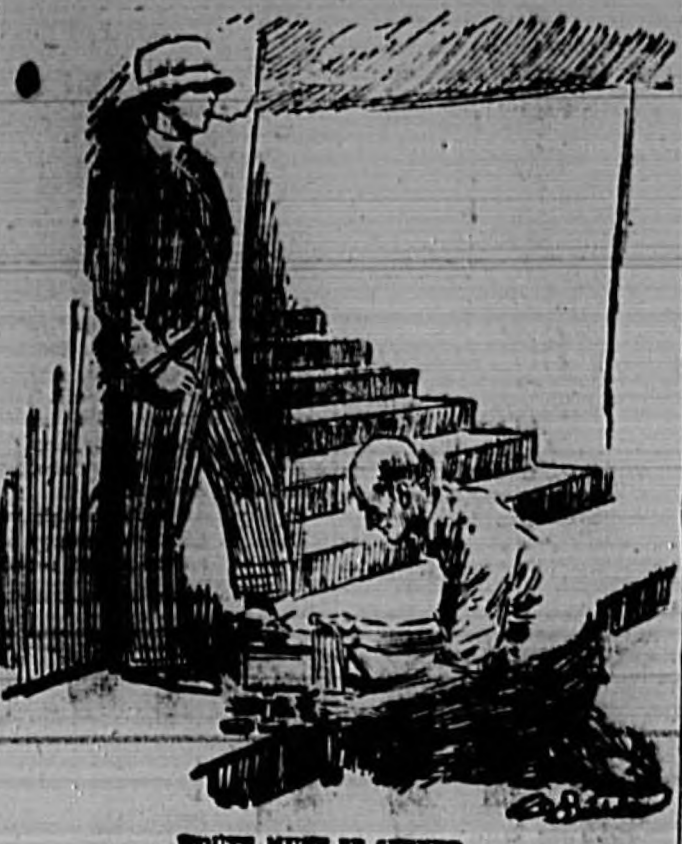

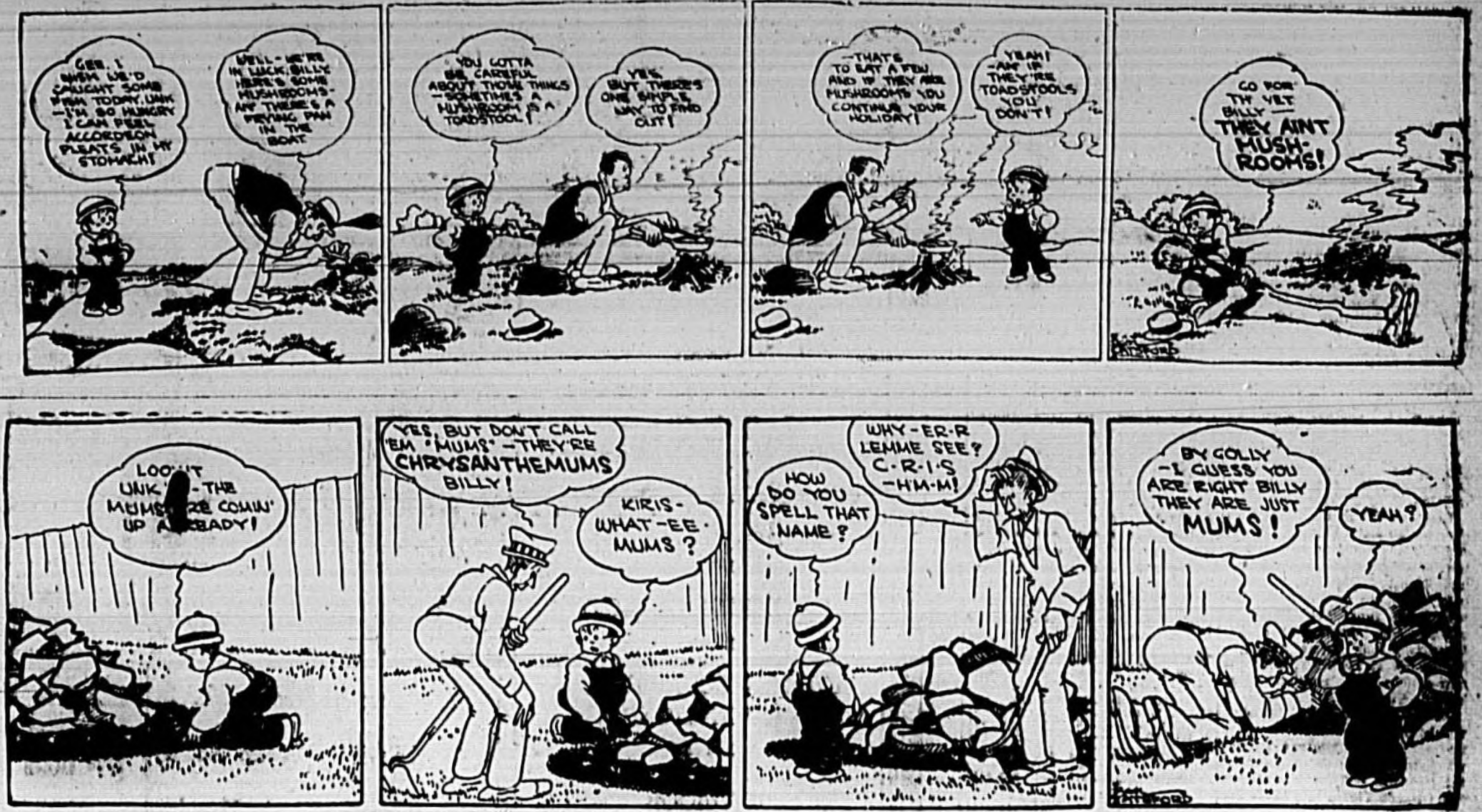
