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"Fair Trade Act" Is Before Senate For Final Action

(Continued from Page One) Lake county estimated the driver's license of 50 cents, which must be renewed each year, would produce about \$300,000 the first year, with increased amounts thereafter. All the money will be used to equip and finance the patrol.

The House also passed and sent to the Senate a bill which would amend the State Parole and Probation Commission.

Representative Henderson of Volusia introduced the measure, which passed 60 to 3. Henderson said enactment of the law, based on the Federal parole system, would save the State more than \$100,000 a year.

The commission of three members appointed by the Board of Commissioners of State Institutions would take over the parole duties of the State Department of Corrections.

Prisoners granted paroles would remain under the legal custody of the commission. Prisoners would not be granted paroles, as they now must do, to the pardon board.

The commission would take the initiative, being required to consider the records of prisoners at intervals.

Commission members would be forbidden to take part in political activities.

The salary of the commissioners

would be \$300 a month. The staff would be employed by competitive examinations.

New Bid Made By Britain For Soviet Support

Chamberlain Expresses Hope That Full Agreement May Be Reached Quickly

Relevant Points Are Now Cleared

British Marines Withdraw From Cotton Mill At Pootung

Prime Minister Chamberlain announced today the British government is making new proposals to Soviet Russia for her adherence to the French-British front and had every reason to hope it would be possible to "reach a full agreement at an early date."

He said as a result of a conversation at Geneva between Foreign Secretary Viscount Halifax and Ivan Maisky, Soviet ambassador to London, "all relevant points of view had now been made clear."

Russia instructed her representative at Geneva to protest against a plan by Finland and Sweden to fortify the Åland Islands at the Baltic gateway to the Gulf of Bohemia.

Germany and Italy already have acquiesced in the Swedish-Finnish plan for building fortifications.

In China, 80 British missionaries withdrew from Foochow where they had been set ashore to protect a British-owned cotton mill. The Japanese protested that the British had no right to land missionaries in their occupied territory.

Reports from Geneva said Viscount Halifax was convinced by talks with Soviet Ambassador Ivan Maisky that the only way to bring Russia into the British-French bloc was by promising aid in event the Soviet Union is attacked. Halifax was said to be ready to urge agreement along that line at the Cabinet meeting, for which he is to return by plane.

Although one or two Cabinet members still held out against a far-reaching three-power pact, most of them were said to have been persuaded by public sentiment and by pressure from France and Turkey that a British-Russian agreement must be reached regardless of the terms.

One of the major obstacles in the way of Britain's entry into a close alliance with Soviet Russia was removed when Poland informed the British Government she had no objections to a tri-power pact on the basis now under consideration.

Russia was believed to have taken the same position. Both powers previously had objected to any arrangement under which Soviet troops might be sent out of their soil without their consent.

At Geneva, the League of Nations gave Russia a strong back-up in its demands with a tri-power League committee for Danzig directed by Karl Radekhardt to return to his post as high commissioner for the Free City.
