Townsendites Decline All Endorsements

Founder Of Pension Movement To Support Lemke; Won't 'Coerce' Followers

Suit Is Entered To Oust Leader

Robert E. Clements Sees Forces Of Politics At Work

CLEVELAND, July 18. (AP)—Townsend National Convention today adopted a resolution declaring the old pension organization "shall not at any time during this campaign, directly or indirectly endorse any Presidential or Vice-Presidential candidate."

This was the answer in the question of which way the "Townsend Family" would throw its vote in November.

Dr. Francis Townsend, founder of the movement, announced he would support Representative Lemke, Union Party presidential candidate, but said he would not attempt "to coerce" followers. The leadership of the pension movement was beset from within and without last night with difficulties involving the political and financial trend of the organization. (Continued on page three)

Revolution In Spain Said To Be Shattered

Leftist Government Blamed For Fierce Fighting In Morocco And Continent

Meagre Reports Say Many Killed

Former Army Staff Chief Alleged To Be Held Prisoner

Copyright 1936 By The Associated Press MADRID, July 18.—(AP)—A fierce army revolt which flared rapidly throughout Spanish Morocco today was "broken tonight," the government announced, after planes bombed rebel strongholds and a number of generals had arrested.

Reports from the French border points said the revolt spread to Spain itself, and garrisons in cities throughout Andalusia were in revolt. The government here denied these stories. However, an official announcement said fleet warships are enroute to Morocco to crush the widespread army revolt there.

This announcement followed previous ones that the rebellion was crushed. Madrid itself is calm. Government spokesmen admitted they had to take "radical and urgent measures in the interior."

So far as could be learned, the revolt of the army was caused by opposition to Spaul's leftist government.

In the French frontier town of Hendaye, reports said the revolt is participated in by a third of the Spanish Foreign Legion and regular garrison troops. These troops said fierce fighting with many dead and wounded is going on.

Government censorship made it difficult to learn what is happening. French correspondents said the revolt had been planned for July 25 but was hastened by leaders.

Unconfirmed reports from Tangier, Morocco, said General Ramon Franco, former chief of the Spanish army general staff, had been arrested as a suspected leader of the revolt.

McClelland Leaves For Raiford Jail With Two Prisoners

Shannon was declared guilty of assault with an attempt to commit manslaughter on George Calhoun, a local engineer. The sheriff is delivering his prisoners by automobile.
