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Political Demagogues

We are hearing a great deal about political demagogues these days not only in national politics where Congress is trying desperately to do something that is popular, whether wise or foolish, but also in local circles where a primary election is not far away.

We understand that one of the candidates for governor is making an appeal for Sanford votes on the pledge that he will, if elected, provide state aid for this city in its bond difficulties.

It is apparent that any such plea for votes could come only from a demagogue. The governor could not negotiate a bond issue, without an amendment to the constitution and a majority vote of the Legislature, which he could never get.

It also has come to our attention that one of the local candidates for the Legislature is whispering an appeal for votes on the grounds that he will pass a law wiping out Sanford's bonded indebtedness.

The people of Seminole County should be continually on the lookout for just such political buncombe and clap trap as this. Unfortunately there are a few candidates seeking office this year who will resort to anything to gain votes.

Undoubtedly the retirement of Sanford's bonded debt, by whatever means, is a thing most to be desired at the present time, but it is not something that can be accomplished by any finger-snapping methods or fake promises.

The Massie Verdict

The verdict of the racially mixed Honolulu jury trying the case of Lieutenant Massie probably came as a surprise and disappointment to most Americans who are often accustomed to view any action in the defense of the honor of women as justifiable.

There was hardly any doubt as to the guilt of the defendants, and although the circumstances surrounding the case were such as to excuse a violation of oath resulting in a verdict of acquittal, the jury cannot be justly criticized for obeying the rules of legal procedure.

The defense plea of insanity seemed to us to be a most unworthy step in the effort to save Massie. Obviously, a scheme to evade justice, it was a more serious reflection upon the character of Lieutenant Massie, who just the same as admitted that he would not have defended his wife's honor if he had not been crazy.

As it is, despite the fact that the case has been allowed to adopt subterfuge in an effort for freedom, we hope some means will develop by which Massie and the other three defendants will never have to breathe a particle of prison air.
