Water Police cruising Sanford

SANFORD - Beware of the "water police" if you're watering your lawn today

Nine two man crews from the St. Johns River Water Management District sweeped into Seintnole County this morning from their Orlando office looking for violators of the month-old water restrictions and issuing \$50 consent orders. Today, no watering is allowed for residences or businesses except for those using heat pump air conditioners that require a constant flow of water

First-time residential violators face a \$50 fine or a court appearance. Second time violators face fines of up to \$250. First-time business violations are assessed a \$100 time, with subsequent violations subject to up to \$500

Pat Frost, manager of the district office in Orlando, said the sweep is to make people aware of the restrictions and to enforce the mandatory watering limits. Frost said several two-menteams will be back in Seminole County Samirday, a day when residences and bustnesses with odd-minibered addresses may

Throughout the duration of the mandatory restrictions. Frost said at least one team will be in Seminole County every day looking for

SANFORD - Sanford Housing Authority commissioners last night agreed to send housing authority tenants to learn how they may assume management of the city's six housing projects.

The commissioners agreed to pay travel expenses for about five housing authority tenants to attend a conference in Tampa on resident management, an experimental program in operation in housing authorities in Chicago and

Central Florida Legal Services, which repre-

sents the authority's 2,000 tenants in grievances—ence on how to run things." against the council, praised SHA for the action.

SHA Interim Executive Director Judy Weekley said the program has some entrepreneurial

"In the project in Tampa, some of the residents have set up businesses related to the organiza-tion." Weekley said. "One lady started an answering service and another has a babysitting service for working mothers. We thought it would be good to send them down to get some ideas of how it's done down there."

Treena Kaye, managing attorney for Central Florida Legal Services, said the move would be a

very progressive one. 'We're excited about the possibilities," Kave said. "This kind of program can help the residents improve their incomes, become more self-governing and give them some good experi-

Commissioners voted unanimously for the project. The move drew praise from Bruce Scott, a paralegal for CFLS.

"I would just like to say for the record, that on behalf of our clients, the Seminole Joint Tenant Council, that we are very pleased to see management embracing this.

A date for travel to the conference in Tampa has not been set, nor has the expense of sending residents to the seminar, but Weekley said the program probably would last for two days and that as many as live residents might go. Weekley said the tenant council would be responsible for choosing delegates to send.

Gasoline no threat to Water

GENEVA - Wellwater samples taken daily near the Geneva-Grocery reveal this community's limited drinking water remains uncontaminated by gasoline, health

Now nearly two weeks after 800 or more gallons of unleaded gasoline spilled from an underground 1,000-gallon tank at the store on Avenue C. tests show no detectable amounts of hydrocarbons - the components of gasoline - in a well about 100 feet east of the spill site nor in any of several wells tested periodically in the neighborhood south of the store, said Richard Salemi, environmental health supervisor for the Seminole County Public Health Unit

Salemi said the tests, which cost \$232 each, substantiate preliminary state findings that none of the gasoline has seeped into this community's sole drinking water supply, known as the "Geneva

The bubble is about a 20-square-mile layer of fresh water more than 100 feet underneath Geneva. It is completely surrounded and underlain by undrinkable freshwater and is replinished by a shallow groundwater table fed by

Bill Bostwick of the Florida Department of Environmental Regulation said the process to remove the remaining gasoline in the soil can begin next week when final results are received on a series of bortugs made in and around the spill site. Hostwick is waste management division administrator for the central Florida DER district

Bostwick said a total of time bornes have been made around the site where the rusting tank was excavated more than a week ago-Only one of the borings made northeast of the spill indicated hydrocarbons. Bostwick said the hydrocarbons may have come from: another underground tank discovered near the boring site.

Bostwick said no DER burings have revealed gasoline in the gringidwater as yet. Before Janimal and Associates engineers with

SANFORD — The first time Cheryl Zember 219 Pine Winds Drive went fishing since moving to Florida, her catch was the most unusual she had ever pulled in Fishing in Lake Monroe, about 15 acet from shore near the U.S. Highway 17.92 bridge, she pulled in a stingray. And not just one - there were three of them at the end of her line

The largest of the three measured about nine inches, plus a fail that added another 18 inches to its length. When the Zembers pulled it in they found two small stingrays, four to five inches in size with amother six nucles of spined tail, attached to the underside of the larger struggay.

I just couldn't believe it." she said. I thought strugrays were only found in salt water. We were very careful though," she added, "because I know those long tails have sharp barbs on them and if they bit you they go in you easily but they'll rip up your skin when you pull them out.

Detectives had tried to contact Dickerson's family and discovered that David Anthony Dickerson, 28, was arrested July 23, 1989, in Canton, Ohio, on trespassing and disorderly conduct charges.

When dectectives tracked down Dickerson's wife in Kentucky, they found the man was alive.

Land preservation bill signed

WEST PALM BEACH - Gov. Bob Martinez signed into law Thursday a 10-year, multi-billion-dollar state landbuying program to save what's left of Florida's pristine areas from development.

Martinez signed the "Preservation 2000" plan Thursday morning at the Pine-Jog Environmental Center in West Palm Beach, six months after he proposed the plan on the recommendation of his Commission on the Future of Florida's Environment.

The new law, approved by the Legislature near the end of the session that ended four weeks ago, authorizes the state to issue up to \$3 billion in bonds over the next 10 years to purchase environmentally sensitive land. The bonds will be repaid from an existing

tax on real estate transactions. "Preservation 2000 is the most ambitious

Preservation 2000 is the most ambitious land acquisition program in the nation.

land acquisition program in the nation and will enable Florida to lead the way in protecting its environment for future generations," Martinez said at the bill-signing ceremony.

The law creates the Florida Preservation 2000 Trust Fund, which will receive up to \$300 million a year in bonds for the state to buy land on Florida's coast, add to state parks and forests and acquire environmentally sensitive and recreational lands.

The money will be funneled through the

programs like Conservation and Recreation Lands - known as CARL - and to water management districts to enhance the Save Our Rivers program and water recharge areas critical to Florida's water supply.

It also contains provisions to improve state land acquisitions by verifying appraisal information and requiring the CARL committee to assess which lands are the

highest priority for state acquisition. The law also allows for accelerated acquisition in cases when there is a danger of imminent development or when federal matching funds will be lost if not purchased immediately.

It also creates a new program within the Florida Game and Fresh Water Fish Commission to help buy and manage lands to conserve the state's fish and wildlife re-

Appeals of death row inmates rejected

TALLAHASSEE - The U.S. Supreme Court rejected Thursday the appeals of six Florida death row inmates, including Anthony Bertolotti, 38, who received the death penalty for the Sept. 27, 1983, rape, robbery and stabbling of Orange County housewife Carol Ward.

Justices Thurgood Marshall and William J. Brennan dissented from the majority decision as they do on all death penalty appeals.

Kennedy, 45, escaped from the Union Correctional Institute in Raiford on April 11, 1981, and hid in a trailer in Duval County owned by Floyd Cone Jr. He shot and killed Cone and officer Robert P. McDermon when they arrived at the trailer after participating in a manhunt for

The high court also rejected the appeal of a second double murderer, Carl Jackson, 46, who was convicted of the April 20, 1975, shootings of sentence to stand.

Disney ends dispute with bond deal

ORLANDO, Fla. (UPI) -The battle of the bonds officially ended Thursday between Orange County

and Walt Disney World Co. Disney wired \$1.5 million to Miami to close a deal that frees up \$80 million for the county to use in financing mortgages for low- and moderate-income families.

It was a complicated deal that ended months of hostility between Disney and the county. Disney's governmental

arm, the Reedy Creek Improvement District. In Janunry won \$57 million in tax-exempt bonds from the state - all that were available for six central Florida counties.

The Orange County Housing Authority had hoped to win \$19 million in bonds from the state for mortgage financing.

The county asked Disney, which is using the money to upgrade its sewage treatment plant, to surrender a portion of the bonds and threatened legal action, but the entertainment glant refused.

However, Lisa Fisher, county housing authority director, convinced Disney last month to invest \$1.5 million to buy the residual from a 1980 loan outstanding against the housing authority.

Guardsmen suspected of drug-trafficking

MIAMI - Seven former and current members of the U.S. Coast Guard, including one man from Deland, were charged Thursday with drug trafficking in two separate federal indictments returned by a grand jury.

Six of the defendants were charged with possession with intent to distribute more than 13 pounds of cocaine, U.S. Attorney Dexter Lehtinen said.

The seventh defendant, Paul J. McGuirk, 34, of Davie, was charged in a separate indictment with possession with intent to distribute 110 pounds of marijuana on July 24. 1985. McGuirk left the Coast Guard and is a marine enforcement officer for the Customs Service.

U.S. Attorney spokeswoman Diane Cossin said arrest warrants had been issued for all the defendants, but declined to say

The investigation leading to the indictments was called 'Operation Tempest" and was conducted by agents from the Customs Service. Drug Enforcement Administration and the Coast Guard. Lehtinen said in a prepared statement.

As members of the Coast Guard, all seven defendants were formerly assigned to duty whether any of them were in at Islamorada in the Florida

Keys where the alleged criminal activity took place. Lehtinen said. None of the defendants were officers and only three are currently with the Coast Guard.

The six charged with cocaine trafficking allegedly failed to turn over to federal authorities more than 13 pounds of cocaine retrieved from coastal waters, the indictment said. The defendants allegedly found the cocaine April 11, 1987.





Man hides drugs in underwear

MIDWARY - A man was arrested at about 11 p.m. Thursday when a Seminole County sheriff's deputy reportedly discovered \$3,000 worth of crack cocaine and less than 20 grams of marijuana hidden in his underwear.

NASA asseses **Hubble mirror** vision defects

CAPE CANAVERAL - NASA is struggling to explain how one of the \$1.5 billion Hubble Space Telescope's critical mirrors was ground to the wrong prescription, a debacle that has crippled the observatory with blurry vis-

A Senate space subcommittee planned to hold a special hearing on Hubble's trouble early Friday in Washington with Lennard Fisk, NASA's associate administrator for space science and applications, on hand as chief witness.

Agency officials Thursday refused to speculate on how one of the telescope's two lightgathering mirrors ended up ground into the wrong shape. preventing the observatory from bringing starlight to a sharp focus and delaying long-awaited pictures of stars and galaxies at the edge of the universe.

James Westphal, the scientist in charge of the telescope's virtually useless \$40 million Wide Field/Planetary Camera. said no one anticipated problems. with Hubble's supposedly near-perfect mirrors. But that is precisely what appears to be the

We don't know exactly where the problem is," he said by telephone from the Goddard Space Flight Center in Greenbelt, Md. "We've made some exquisite mirrors, but apparently one or both of them is the wrong shape. It is a thing that none of us dreamed would happen. It's tough."

Inheriting a mess

Peru's newly elected president, Alberto Fullmori, is about to inherit one of the most desperate dilemmas confronting any leader of the hemisphere.

His country's economy has collapsed under the weight of hyperinflation reaching 2,000 percent annually. And the nation's frail democratic institutions are under siege from a fanatical Maoist guerrilla movement operating alongside cocaine traffickers throughout the Andean highlands. The poverty that stems from lack of economic development is simultaneously fueling expansion of the guerrilla war and the narcotics trade.

What Peru needs most are free-market reforms to lift it out of the wreckage created by the mismanagement of outgoing President Alan Garcia and decades of deadening statist economic policies. But the presidential candidate who pledged to implement market reforms, novelist Mario Vargas Llosa, was soundly defeated in last weekend's balloting.

Fujimori, who will be inaugurated on July 28, is a political novice; he was virtually unknown to Peruvians only a few months ago. An engineer and former president of National Agrarian University in Lima, he is the descendant of Japanese immigrants and stressed his roots throughout the presidential

His economic plans, at least to the extent they were articulated during the campaign, are ill defined. But he plainly recognizes the need for economic growth as the only solution to Peru's multiple crises. The country's fate now hangs on whether he can put together a rational economic recovery program based on market principles and at the same time effectively combat the growing rebel insurgency known as the Sendero Luminoso, or

Shining Path. The election of an untested leader such as Fujimori reflects the deep polarization within Peruvian society. Before the first round of presidential balloting in April, Vargas Llosa was considered a heavy favorite. The writer is an internationally respected pillar of Peru's coastal establishment, which is dominated by fair-skinned people of European descent. At the ballot box, however, Vargas Llosa apparently was rejected by large numbers of the impoverished Quechua-speaking Indians who inhabit the Andes and the slums that ring

Peru's rural highlands are where Sendero has gained a firm foothold. The guerrillas rule the countryside through terror, sometimes providing armed protection for cocaine traffickers in exchange for cash. Fujimori's election may cast doubt on the Pentagon's plans to establish a training center in the Upper Huallaga Valley to assist the Peruvian military in fighting traffickers and rebels. Fujimori has voiced some concern about the U.S. plan.

Peru's new president confronts enormous odds, both in the economic arena and in the threat posed by guerrillas. But unless he moves swiftly to stabilize the economy through market reforms, democracy in Peru will have little chance of putting down deep



House slow to fix campaign law

WASHINGTON — Bob Michel is not your basic boat-rocker. The House Minority Leader is almost a stereotype of the convivial congressman, a fellow who has pitched for the Republican congressional baseball team. golfed with Democrats Tip O'Neill and Dan Rostenkowski and lifts his baritone in song with anyone who wants to gather around the plano at the end of the evening.

It takes a lot to make Robert H. Michel mad. but this year he is on the warpath. At age 67, the man from Peoria has become, of all things,

More than a year ago, when Jim Wright was forced to resign from the speakership under ethics fire, Michel said the stain on the House's honor would be removed only if this 101st Congress became "the reform Congress." He Joined Speaker Thomas S. Foley (D-Wash.) in passing new rules that guarantee House members are paid by the public, not through interest-group speaking fees. Then Michel focused on the need for "dramatic reform of our campaign laws and (finance) practices."

That was an important breakthrough. Through most of the past 15 years, House Republicans except for an occasional maverick like John B. Anderson, had held themselves aloof from occasional Democratic drives to clean up campaign-finance laws, as most Senate Republicans continue to do.

Michel took the issue to this party's policy committee and put his own prestige on the line in arguing that the threat to Congress' reputation and integrity was so great that something must be done. He was hammered hard by some of his fellow Republicans. But in the end, he won their assent for 21 campaign-finance-law changes. The package was predictably tilted to Republican interests, but Michel brought it to Foley as a negotiating position, not a take-it-or-leave-it demand.

The two leaders agreed that negotiations should begin with Reps. Al Swift (D-Wash.) and Guy Vander Jagt (R-Mich.) as their representatives, with the understanding that, when the real sticking point was reached. Foley and Michel would take over themselves. At that point, they met once, with their subordinates, but Folcy never took the crucial steps that would have been required to forge a bipartisan bill. He never took the issue to his caucus or forced the Democrats to resolve their internal differences, and he never invited Michel to sit down for serious one-on-one negotiations.

He would not, however, promise Michel an "open rule," that would permit the Republicans to offer each of their major suggestions separately - and force the House

The reforms Michel drafted would change this. They would, among other things, lower the ceiling on PAC contributions from \$5,000 to \$1,000, require half of a candidate's money to be raised from his own constituents, and reduce the perks that incumbents use to secure re-election.

For more than a year since Wright's forced resignation, the Democrats have delayed coming to grips with those issues. As this was written, they were still debating what kind of limits to put on PACs and on "soft money" contributions from unions and others that are the lifeblood of their party. The Democrats prefer to emphasize spending ceilings for House races.

Michel risked a rebellion in his own GOP caucus by hinting late last year that he would even negotiate on spending ceilings if the Democrats were serious about a reform package. They never bothered to test how far he might be willing to go. But Michel is clear and correct in saving the miding ceilings by themselves are a priority retorm which would only remove one more threat to incumbents.

Michel is still ready to negotiate. "My goal" he said. "is to get something meaningful enacted into law....What we're spending on campaigns and the way we're raising it are unconscionable.

How Berlin Wall is saving lives

EAST BERLIN - More than 1,000 doctors have left East Germany for West Germany since the opening of the Berlin Wall last November. They were lured by the possibility of earning up to \$5,000 a month.

Now, fronteally, pieces of the wall are helping the dedicated doctors who remain behind to keep their struggling hospitals

running. That is why, when we toured a children's hospital in East Berlin recently, the doctors were full of gratitude for rich American souvenir hunters. including Nancy Reagan.

in an unusual venture, a state-run export company has teamed up with a West Berlin business to sell prime pieces of the wall to the former first lady, among others, and give the money to hospitals. Everybody and his brother has a chip or chunk from the wall. but this new venture is selling the last of

the large sections with the coveted graffiti. Not long after the wall came down, the new government declared that "official" pieces would be sold and the proceeds used for urgently needed modernization of public health services.

While the communists ran East Germany for 40 years, they never pumped enough money into hospitals to keep up with Western standards.

The six-floor "Kinderclinic" we visited was considered the finest in the country, a showcase for the communist system. But it is at least 10 years behind Western hospitals. The only relatively modern equipment we saw was donated by an Ohio hospital or bought with the Berlin Wall proceeds.

The wall pieces are being marketed by a state-owned trade enterprise called Limex and a new private company called LeLe Berlin Wall. Co-owners Judith LaCroix and Christian Herms have already given \$625,000 in wall money to hospitals. Limex and LeLe could have had all the pieces they wanted. But, they decided to treat the wall like fine art, reckoning that a limited edition print is worth more than a mass produced copy. They chose 360 sections of the wall with the best graffiti, including the work of some well-known graffiti artists. The rest of the wall, which has not yet been picked over and chipped off by do-it-yourself collectors. will become road base.

These are not pieces for casual souvenir hunters. The pieces sell for tens of thousands of dollars. Word quickly spread among art collectors, and they gathered last week in Monte Carlo for an auction of 81 pieces by Limex and LeLe Berlin Wall. Before the auction. LaCroix confided to us, discriminating buyers had already spoken for some of the best pieces

Actor Gene Hackman spent several days in Berlin making his selection. First Lady Nancy Reagan showed her famous penchant for pickiness. She wanted a section in soft colors, with graffiti (but no obscenities) and preferably with a message about freedom. She ended up with a section spray painted in blues and greens with part of a butterfly winging its way to the top and the German word for freedom sprayed on the piece. It will go in the Reagan presidential library where presumably Ronald Reagan will take some credit for the downfall of communism.

Other buyers have included the Aspen Art Museum in Colorado, the Hefner Gallery in Oklahoma, the Bassoli Museum in Italy and some Japanese and French companies. The buyers have to sign a contract saying they won't display their chunk in any way that trivializes the tragic message of the wall.

Devastation in California

SANTA BARBARA, Calif. - Hundreds of people burned out of their houses by a vicious arson fire that destroyed more than 500 dwellings and caused up to \$200 million damage returned to the rubble that was once a placid seaside community and now looks like a battlefield.

Although the 4,000-acre fire still burned out of control early today, a 20-degree drop in the temperature and the failure of dreaded "Sundowner" winds to materialize helped 800 firefighters from all over California keep the blaze from spreading as much as had been feared.

Fire bosses early today could not predict when the fire would be contained.

Mandela receives warm greeting

DETROIT - After a cold greeting in tropical Miami, the booming applause returned for Nelson Mandela at a sold-out Tiger Stadium raily where he recalled that the city's Motown music soothed him in his prison cell.

Mandela, near the end of a physically demanding eight-city tour, spoke briefly Thursday at a Ford auto plant, appeared at a downtown reception, and said an "important breakthrough" was near in the struggle against apartheid.

Unlike his appearance in Miami where he was snubbed by city officials angered over his support of Cuban President Fidel Castro, Mandela received an official welcome from Mayor Coleman Young and Michigan Gov. James Blanchard and civil rights pioneer Rosa Parks.

Senate virtually finishes anti-crime bill

WASHINGTON - The Senate, virtually finishing a major anti-crime bill, voted for a second time to ban nine assault weapons and approved the death penalty for major drug

A late-night effort to finish the bill Thursday falled and a final vote was set for July 11 for the legislation which had been declared all but dead three weeks ago. Only one possible amendment, dealing with more enforcement manpower in the savings and loan scandal, was left pending.

Toxic shock has 'nearly disappeared'

ATLANTA - Cases of potentially fatal toxic shock syndrome. which caused widespread panic among women in the last decade, have "nearly disappeared," a government doctor reported.

Dr. Anne Schuchat, an epidemiologist with the U.S. Centers for Disease Control, said the number of cases of toxic shock syndrome - which has been linked to use of super-absorbent Impons - dropped from 890 in 1980 to 61 in 1989. Schuchat attributed the sharp decline to preventive measures in the tampon industry.

Cinder said a note would be included on the July bill stating commissioners decided against imposing the sur-

charge. But commissioners said they would consider a permanent increase for homeowners who use too much water.

Cinder admitted some people won't conserve with a surcharge. He said some individual homeowners in Heathrow use 100,000 gallons or more each month, whereas the average homeowner uses about 10,000 gallons a month.

Cinder said a homeowner using more than 100,000 gallons of water a month would likely be violating watering restrictions in effect by watering every day. The manadatory restrictions imposed by the St. Johns Water Management District in May limit watering and car washing to three days a week.

"People in Heathrow aren't going to mind (a surcharge) much." commissioner Fred Streetman sald. "It's not necessarily true that it will encourage conservation, but it will also generate more income for the county."

Cinder said the reason for the surcharge was not to collect more money. He said county utilities staff are reviewing water rates and may recommend permanent increases for usage over 15,000 gallons a month.

Cinder sought to activate a 1981 "Emergency Water Conservation Ordinance" allowing the short-term surcharges in order to promote water conservation by home-





FROM THE PULPIT

Take heed to what matters most

Focus on priorities, keep values

By S. EDWARD JOHNSON

"Do not work for food that spoils, but for food that endures to eternal life, which the Son of Man will give you. On Him God the Father has placed His seal of approval." Matthew 6:27.

Without a doubt it seems that one of the most difficult tasks we have in life is knowing what matters most. It is not really difficult to determine what matters. Many things matter. But determining what matters most is difficult.

In the Holy Bible we find a man who is best remembered for a single incident in which he showed that he did not know what matters most. His name was Esau, a likeable individual. a strong and virile outdoorsman and hunter. He had a twin brother who was named Jacob who was more sheltered, gentle. a stay-at-home type. Perhaps many of you will recall the

Esau, who was the first born of the twins came in from the hunt one evening worn out, tired and

hungry Esau like a brick.

What is pottage? Some men might say that the "word" describes very well what sometimes their wives have often prepared for them. Actually, it means anything boiled in a pot, and this was probably a pot of vegetable soup.

But now comes Esau's crisis of deciding what matters most. Certainly his birthright mattered. It was his gift as first-born with an overwhelming hunger. son: leadership of the family, a He found his brother Jacob double share of the inheritance stirring a mess of pottage that he and honor. But Esau experihad cooked and its fragrance hit enced something else that mat-

stomach growled with hunger. and this was what mattered most to him at that moment, the immediate satisfaction of a phys-Ical need.

Walter Bowle once said of Esau that he lost tomorrow because he snatched so greedily at today. The wrong thing mattered most to Esau. No one can deny that life is a long series of decisions that we determine what we shall do or say, and be.

Throughout the time of my ministry I have discovered that the source of many problems is not knowing what matters most. To sell a birthright for a bowl of soup was plain folly. But is it wiser to sell the bless dness and peace of communion with God for anything that earth can yield?

How many shrewd men and women of the highest standing have, and are, making as bad a bargain as Esau? The pottage is hot and comforting but it is soon caten, and when the bowl is empty and the sense of hunger comes back in an hour or two. the transaction does not look quite as advantageous as it did.

Esau had many hours of rueful meditation on his bad bargain before he in vain sought his Father's blessing. And suspicions of folly of their choice are apt to haunt men and women who prefer the present to the future, even before the future becomes the present, and the folly is manifest.

gain the whole world and forfeit his life." Let us all understand this about ourselves. The twin brothers Esau and Jacob dwell side by side within us. pulling us in opposite directions.

For our own sake and for the sake of those who love us and whom we love, we've got to make some decisions about what matters most. We live in a beautiful community, and each of us are a real part of its present and future. Let us take heed then that we estimate things according to their true relative worth; that we live not just for today, but for eternity. And that we suppress all greedy cravings. If we do not, we shall be 'profane' people like Esau, who for one poor morsel of meat, sold his birthright.

My dear friends all, our birthright comes from God and it consists of many tomorrows of rich fulfillment. But like poor Esau, anyone of us can lose tomorrow because we snatch greedily at today. Our birthright can be bartered away - we can keep it by being sure we know what matters.

Our Father God, search us deeply in this day and show us the great glory of Him who lived so faithfully, for we know that He alone can show us our best selves.....Amen.....








Treating a lupus crossover disease

DEAR READER: Scieroderma consists of scarring and vascular abnormalities in many tissues. especially the skin, the joints and the gastrointestinal tract. Polymyositis is a disease marked by inflammation of muscles. Lupus crythematosus is a chronic disorder affecting the skin and kidneys. All three diseases are part of a general classification of allments called "collagen vascular diseases."

The treatment of these afflictions is fulfulamentally identical: drugs to shut down the body's over-aggressive immune responses. Thus, prednisone (purified cortisone) and other medicines, such as methotrexate, which inhibit the immune system, are used to relieve symptoms. These drugs are powerful, however, and usually produce unwanted side effects, such as diminished resistance to infection. In view of the seriousness of

your diseases and their treatment, I believe you are justified in questioning your doctor until he or she fully expiains your condition and the prognosis.

Obviously, patients can have mild forms of collagen vascular diseases - as well as more advanced manifestations - so you may, in the future, be able to reduce or eliminate your
