(continued from page one) American people in the fair profit system. Yesterday, the bankers adopted resolutions pledging the Administration in its recovery efforts. This action brought together two vital forces at variance since the depression began. In New York, Donald R. Richberg, executive director of the national emergency council, warned that the budget could not be balanced until private capital under-

look the task of reducing relief costs by putting between 4,000,000 and 5,000,000 back to work. Unless this is done, Richberg said, there should be no more "moaning at the bar" or "walling at the wall" if the government is forced to undertake further work or recovery and reconstruction. The observations of Roosevelt and Richberg were a defense of the Administration's recovery efforts to date. They were interpreted by observers here also as a clear indication of the purpose of the new dealers to put reconstruction, temporarily, at least, before reform. The policy of subjecting business and industry to the minimum amount of disturbance in an effort to facilitate recovery was laid down when the new governing board of the NRA, which replaced the one man rule of General Hugh S. Johnson, announced no drastic or wholesale changes in codes would be made. Industry halted the step as a "sawing to the right." Immediately thereafter, there came expressions of faith in fair profits and private initiative from President Roosevelt and other high Administration leaders.

Failure of the President to use currency inflation powers awarded him by Congress proved especially cheering to the banking and industrial world. Whether directly or indirectly due to this new policy, bank loans have been expanding steadily and business has improved since it was initiated. Bids for the purchase of 300 feet of fire hose were ordered rejected. No action was taken on the report that it would cost \$75 to install 60 white and colored lights across Park Avenue at First Street. The Commissioners first will investigate recent lighting contracts agreed upon by the Florida Power and Light Co. and officials at Miami and Daytona Beach. Clerk Lamson was instructed to purchase two City bonds at a cost of 15 flat. The Commissioners agreed to donate \$50 to the Salvation Army for use in handling transients, providing that boarding house and restaurant owners who accept Army tickets in exchange for rooms and meals, should turn the tickets over to the City. The Army's request that two parking spaces be marked off in front of its Hall on Second Street also was granted. The Commissioners authorized the expenditures of \$60.93 for material and hardware needed to put all City Hall windows in good condition. An ordinance setting forth the budget appropriations for 1934-35 was placed on its first reading. At the suggestion of Mayor Leffler, Clerk Lamson is to communicate with Dr. A. P. Gov. Sholtz Warns Floridians Against Home Amendment

(Continued From Page One) more which has been pointed out by opponents of the amendment as the natural result of its adoption.

He did, however, indicate alarm at the effect passage of the amendment will have on the 1935 legislature.

"From Mr. Willis' report," the statement concluded, "the people can gain at least some idea as to the problem which will confront the next legislature in providing new and additional sources of revenue in the event the Homestead Exemption Amendment is adopted."

There was no elaboration on this point. The governor, ever since his inauguration, has bitterly opposed the development of new sources of revenue, and his reference to this subject was generally understood to mean that he has by no means changed his mind.

Gov. Sholtz has led the forces of state government in their job of bringing the state to a better financial position now than it has enjoyed for many years, but observers here expressed as he might, the chief executive could not stretch his so far highly successful economy program to cover to abrupt slashing off of 10,000,000 a year in revenue through adoption of the amendment.

There also was no other outspoken indication of his views on the \$5,000 figure for exemption, but it was recalled that while Gov. Sholtz has advocated an exemption limited to \$1,000, he has never hinted that he would consider \$5,000 exemption as anything but an affliction to the state's financial system.

The statement, it read, was issued because the governor felt it his duty to supply Floridians with all possible information as to effect of the amendment upon the state and its inhabitants.

Following is the statement in full: "During the past few weeks I have received scores of letters asking for my opinion as to the merits of the proposed Homestead Exemption Amendment...

"In matters of public welfare and public interest where the people do not have an opportunity to express themselves it is entirely proper for the governor as chief executive of all of the people of the state to act for them and on occasion to speak for them according to his best understanding of their wishes and their interests."

"However, when a proposition has been submitted to the sovereign people of the state for their decision, I believe they should be free to exercise their own judgment and vote in accordance with their individual convictions without executive influence or interference."

"The people of Florida are going to have an opportunity to speak for themselves on the several constitutional amendments at the polls Nov. 6th."

"Appreciating that the most reliable and dependable information of this character is available through the State Auditing Department, I requested Bryan Willis, state auditor, some weeks ago to prepare an estimate with the intention of presenting it on to the people and I have now received his report estimating that the loss in revenue would amount to \$9,124,834.77."

"Of this amount the state would lose \$24,933.84 as follows: Penalties, Health, Prison, and Education \$257,970.76; 1 mill school, 3-4 mills free Textbooks for schools \$249,963.65."

"The balance of loss in revenue, \$8,186,900.96 would be attached to the counties and to citizens towns villages as follows: Packard, president; Mrs. Roy T. Hils, secretary and treasurer; Mrs. E. J.
