## Three Notes Left In Cell By Goering

### Officials Refuse To Divulge Contents; Dozen German Prison Workers Held

NUREMBERG, Oct. 17. (AP)—The Allied Control Council's commission which conducted the execution of the ten Nazi leaders disclosed today that it had translations of the three notes Hermann Goering wrote and left in his cell before he cheated the hangman. The commission, however, refused to divulge the contents. Meanwhile, the three-man Army board investigating the suicide of Goering surrounded itself today with a barrier of security and refused to make any information available to the public as to how the former Reichsmarschal obtained the cyanide and placed the vial in his mouth undetected.

Twelve German prison employees were being questioned today in connection with the mystery. Although not under arrest, they are being "protectively held." They will be kept under constant scrutiny until cleared of all possible complicity.

An answer to the mystery was suggested today in a dispatch from Nuremberg by one of the eight Allied correspondents who was in on those last fatal hours. The newsman had been taken on a tour of the death row in Nuremberg prison shortly before the executions were to start and there was considerable commotion with the correspondent peering into the small iron-barred portholes of each of the condemned men's cells.

They saw Goering lying in bed — one arm outstretched over the Army blanket which covered him; the other folded over his chest with the flat closed. Perhaps in that fit moment, the man, a potassium cyanide. The commotion caused by the visitors may have served to tip off Goering that the hour of his doom was almost at hand. It is possible that in those few moments, that the G. I. guarding Goering's cell turned his head.

It was only human for him to turn around to see what the star was all about — that the Nazi crown prince slipped the deadly vial into his mouth.

The big mistake, says the American correspondent, was that the newsman were taken through the condemned block in a body. It might have, turned out differently, he suggests, if the correspondents had been taken through one or two at a time.

Goering's suicide was still the major news in Nuremberg, although many sensational rumors circulated about the prison. One of these was that the ring-leaders of Adolf Hitler's Nazi state have been buried at sea. An earlier rumor had them in unmarked graves.

There are some additional viewpoints: A barber said Americans gave Goering the poison. A laundress said the poison was slipped into the prison in a bar of soap. A "straw doll" actually were hanged and the real Nazis are alive somewhere — despite the fact that many witnesses saw the executions.

Meanwhile, British newspapers charged that American military authorities had "gagged" newsmen and bungled the handling of news in connection with the suicide of Goering and the hangings. The charges drew a sharp reply from American military Government public relations officers today, who said the coverage of the hangings was a fair-power arrangement.

## Final Rites Held For Former Resident

Funeral services were conducted this afternoon at 4:00 o'clock at the Seattle Funeral Home in New Smyrna for William James Griffin, 54, who was found dead in his home there yesterday morning. He is reported to have been dead about 15 minutes when his body was found. The Rev. J. Alvin Inman, pastor of the First Baptist Church there officiated and burial was made in Edgewater Cemetery.

Mr. Griffin was born Oct. 11, 1892 in Sanford and had lived in New Smyrna Beach since 1922. He has been a railroad conductor with the Florida East Coast Railroad for 27 years, and was a member of the Order of Railroad Conductors.

Survivors include his wife, Mrs. Pauline Griffin; one son, Billy; one daughter, Betty; three sisters, Mrs. Margaret Leeks and Mrs. Edwina Handy, both of Sanford; and Mrs. Lamar Mace of Globe, Ariz.; one brother, Douglas C. Griffin of Hendersonville, N. C.

## Local Meat Supply Increases With Practically No Advance In Prices

Lifting of OPA restriction, and the immediate filling of hitherto empty meat shelves, but due to the fact that orders had been made for much of this meat on Monday before the restrictions were lifted, little if any increase in retail prices is to be noted.

Retail prices are, however, an expected next week. Practically all retailers are taking their full quotas of meat as with the lifting of the regulations they find a chance to secure adequate profits, which, they say, were very low under OPA control.

E. B. Sizemore, Sanford Avenue butcher, said today that he had been unable to secure any western beef on pork since August. He based practically all of the monthly quota of Iowa Humphrey which was limited to 7,500 pounds for slaughter of 2,700 pounds of dressed meat which, he said, lasted about a week. He was of the opinion that meat prices would go up and then level off to normal.

H. K. Beck, large cattle carter, was limited to a like slaughtering quota.

Fresh ham at 70 cents a pound, pork chops at 60 cents and pork roasts at 62 cents a pound made initial debate this morning at a local meat counter and attracted much interest from housewives.

Meat managers predict that smoked ham and bacon will be available in a week or two.

Following President Truman's speech Monday evening, a great many cattle in the Semole area met their doom and supplies started piling in. The quality of this meat is reported to be exceptionally good for its grade, and it is well streaked with fat.

One large stock store meat counter, was practically empty this morning and was explained by the local meat can be sold, due to company ruling that allow only Grade A western beef sales.

Sirloin steak sold at 61 cents a pound this morning, roll roast beef at 54, hamburger at 35 and chuck roast of beef at 38 cents. No lamb is yet being sold. Fish, turkey and chicken supplies are plentiful.

Area rent control director W. J. Jones of Orlando announced today that the Sanford defense rental area office is being moved to Orlando due to the closing of the Sanford Armory building.

Mr. Jones said that arrangements are now being made to move the O.P.A. Rent Control Office to Room 230 of the Meisch Building. The opening of the office, however, will be delayed at least two weeks, he added, in order that the lease be completed and office equipment and supplies be moved into the new location.

"Until the new Sanford office is opened to the public," Mr. Jones declared, "all O.P.A. rental problems in Sanford and Seminole County should be referred to the O.P.A. Rent Control Office, Meisch Building, Orlando." Mr. Jones indicated that such referrals will receive prompt attention.

## AF Of L Urges Housing Bill Be Approved

### Special Session Of Congress Demanded To Okey Ellender, Wagner, Taft Bill

CHICAGO, Oct. 17. (AP)—The American Federation of Labor today demanded that President Truman summon Congress to Washington for a special session to enact the Wagner-Ellender-Taft general housing bill.

The A. F. of L. wants Washington to produce more apartments that veterans can rent and fewer one-family houses that must be bought.

The convention pointed out that the administration had been concentrating on one-family houses for veterans. It maintained that more jobs would be made in the construction industry and more housing needs would be met if emphasis is placed on building apartments.

The resolution said: "These one-family homes will cost more than the average war veteran can pay for in his remaining years of life, thus causing foreclosure and loss of his home. Rental apartments would provide a living set up within the veteran's spending means."

The convention yesterday rejected a 73-year-old William Green to a 24 consecutive term as A. F. of L. president. San Francisco was chosen as the 1947 A. F. of L. convention city. Green said he hoped to announce at the 1947 convention that A. F. of L. membership had reached more than 10,000,000. It is now 7,150,000.

## Thirteen Killed In Air Tragedy At Laramie, Wyo.

LARAMIE, Wyo., Oct. 17. (AP)—Thirteen persons were killed today when a passenger plane crashed coming in for a landing during a storm at Laramie, Wyo.

The ailing crewman of Albany county, E. F. Knight, said 11 persons were killed instantly and two died after being brought to a Laramie hospital. Knight said the plane apparently was east-bound and had intended to land at Cheyenne, but was turned back by bad weather.

The plane crashed shortly after 1:00 A. M. as it came in for a landing at the Laramie airport. Bodies were thrown clear of the wreckage which was scattered over an area of 300-square yards.

Knight identified two of the dead as Jack W. Trogdon of Spartanburg, S. C., and Seaman First Class Robert A. Gregory, whose address was not available.

If last night's gridiron exhibition by the Seminole High School Baby Celery Fed eleven in any decision of what Semifinals may field during the next couple of years, local football fans need not worry much about having a winning club. Coach Fred Canas sent his smaller but faster charges against a large Seabreeze High Baby Sandcrab machine and although the locals were outplayed, 254 yards to 221, the running Johnny Alexander, Don Deal, Lloyd Swain and Bill Humphrey, ed to be too much for the visitors to be so much for the visitor and the Baby Feds racked up their first win of the season by a score of 25 to 18.

The contest was only several minutes old when Swain, Alexander and Deal, on a series of line plunges and tricky off tackle thrusts, carried to the Seabreeze one yard stripe. Deal promptly ploughed over center for a touchdown. The try for the extra point from placement failed.

Deal wasted no time in hitting the center for the two yards and a score.

The final five minutes of the contest saw the entire Baby Fed squad in action. The freshmen and sophomores gave the Sandcrabs a good fight. Although the bigger Daytona machine was ploughing through the Fed eleven, the kids broke through occasionally to split the Seabreeze backs for losses.

Deal led the local ground gainers with a net of 84 yards. He was followed by Swain with a total of 68 and Alexander picked up 53. Buchaven led the visitors with 119 yards.

"I set a goal of 65 wins this year," says Benrat Ben, "and we ended up by winning 69. Next year, we're aiming for 80."

Chapman, once the fiery outfielder of the New York Yankees back in the days of "murderers row," is as happy as a youngster with a new toy.

"To become a first-division club," Chaplin says, "we've got to go out and get—through buying or trading—a shortstop, two outfielders, a catcher and three pitchers. However, I've said before that the Phillies will accept no canaries for turkeys in any trades, and that's all goes.

"We have few men that other clubs want in trades, and it may be three years before our elaborate farm system catches up with us and begins to deliver some good players who are ready for the majors. Therefore, it looks like we will have to buy experienced men."

Wouldn't Leave  
Chapman, who guided the Phillies to fifth place in the turgid National League race this year, declared he wouldn't leave his job as manager of the Phillies for any job in baseball—not even for the New York Yankees.

"I have a good contract which runs through the 1948 season," Chapman reveals. "Owner Ben Carpenter is a regular fellow, and also don't come better than new Pennock."

"I am very fond of Carpenter. Why we get along like brothers. Just before the National League season closed, Bob and I engaged in a foot race in front of his palatial home in Philadelphia. Both of us were in our street clothes, and we wanted to settle once and for

all who was the fastest man. I won't say who won the race."

Has Free Hand  
Chapman said he'd been given a free hand by Carpenter and Pennock to make any trades, sales or buys that he thinks will strengthen the club.

"The ground work for some of the deals we will make this winter already has been laid," he says, "and we may come through with something at the national baseball meeting in Los Angeles in December."

Chapman's first job as a baseball skipper was in 1942 as manager of the Richmond Colts of the class B Piedmont League. He also managed the 1944 Richmond team before being sold to the Brooklyn Dodgers.

Ben made a prediction before the start of last season that the Phillies would not finish in their usual spot in the National League cellar and that they wouldn't lose 100 games. He was right—both ways.

AP Newsfeatures. VENICE—Venice's famed glass industry, a war casualty, is not dead. But it is badly crippled.

"Good Venetian glass," he contends, "can't be imitated. France and England and Germany and the United States all make good clear glass. But they haven't the workmanship in design that Murano has. And even if they did their labor costs would make the price too high."

The artists who put together mosaics out of minute pieces of colored glass, using as many as 5,000 for one postcard-size picture, work five to six days to complete one, but it sells for only \$8.88.

"Some of it is not as good as it used to be," Bacci says frankly. But he adds with pride, "It is still the best in the world."

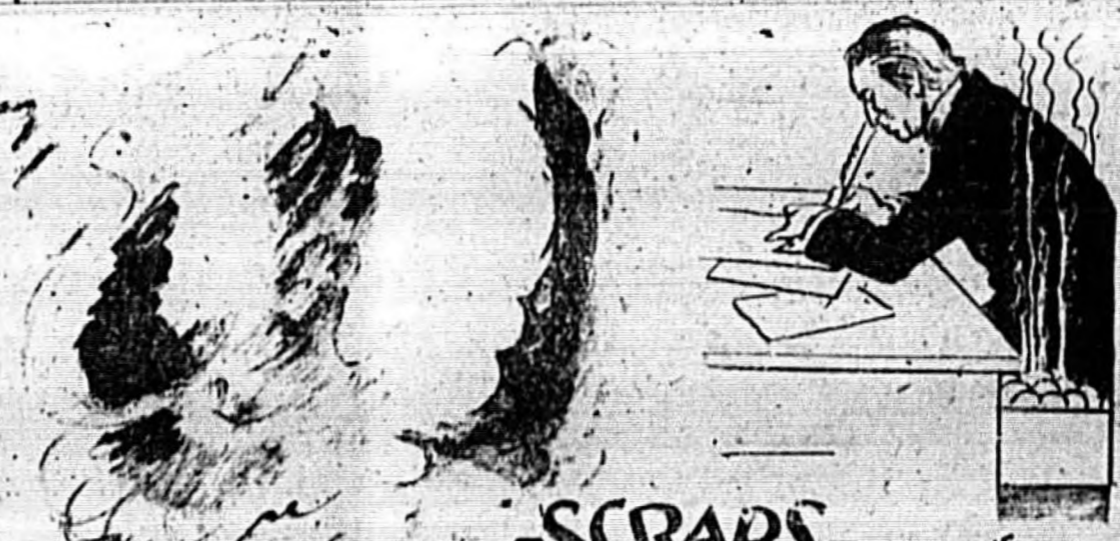

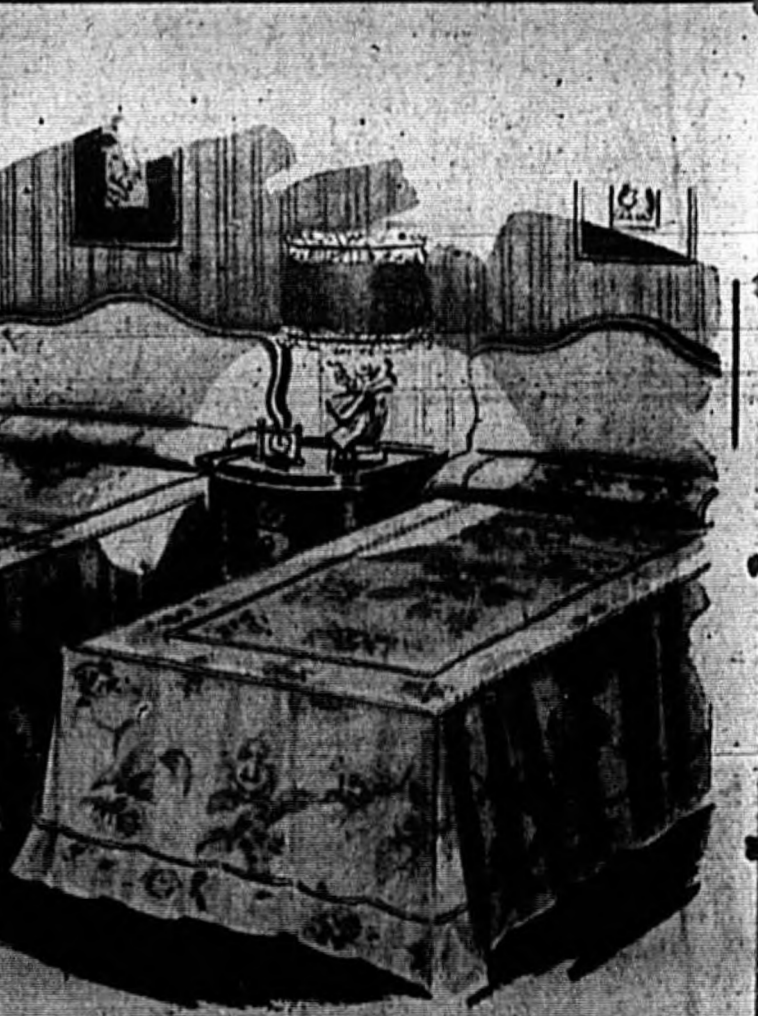

## Observers Say Turks Reject USSR Demands

### Turkey Again Replies To Soviet Request For Joint Defense Of Vital Straits

ANKARA, Oct. 18, (AP)—Turkey today replied in detail to Russia's second demand for joint defense of the Dardanelles. Responsible persons said they are sure the Russian proposal was flatly rejected. It is also believed Turkey turned down the Russian plan for administration of the vital strait only by Black Sea powers. It is also believed Turkey rejected a Russian proposal to revise the 1833 Montreux Convention that governs the strait.

Newsmen thought the note was sent to Russia after two cabinet sessions and that Turkey probably suggested again that an international commission decide whether or not Turkey has lived up to the terms of the Montreux Convention.

Russia charged that Axis ships went through the Dardanelles during the war. In her first note to Russia, however, Turkey said some Axis vessels possibly did get through, but they did so illegally, and that she had always acted in good faith. In that earlier note, Turkey also declared that joint defense of the Dardanelles would mean Russian bases on Turkish soil. She said that would violate Turkey's sovereign rights, and it is believed that Turkey has told Russia the same thing once more.

The United States and Britain have consistently backed Turkey's stand.

The text of the Turkish note probably will be made public in three days.

## Judge Ware And Assistant Lauded By State Official

County Judge R. W. Ware, at whose office hunting and trapping licenses are now available, has been commended, together with his assistant, Mrs. Letha Fowler, for forwarding to the Game and Fresh Water Fish Commission filled out stubs attached to licenses which show the amount of game killed or taken last season in Seminole County.

Hunting of deer, turkey, quail and squirrels is permitted from Nov. 30 to Nov. 30 every day and Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays are closed days thereafter. Thanksgiving, Christmas and New Year's days are open to hunting. Open season for hunting the Ocala National Forest is Dec. 1 to 30 except on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays. The duck, goose and coot season is from Nov. 23 to Jan. 6.

## Mysterious Communist Leader In U.S. Identified As Gerhard Eisler

### Boyle Mentioned For Nomination To Senate Post

NEW YORK, Oct. 18, (AP)—The former editor of the Communist newspaper, the Daily Worker, Louis F. Budenz, today named the mysterious figure who allegedly directs all Communist activity in the United States. Budenz declares the man is known as Hans Berger, but that his real name is Gerhard Eisler.

Budenz said he took orders from Berger while he was editing the Communist Daily Worker. Budenz left the Communist Party a year ago, joined the Roman Catholic Church, and now is an economics instructor at Fordham University. Budenz first announced in a speech in Detroit last Sunday the existence of a so-called secret, but dominant figure in American Communist affairs. He did not mention the name. Budenz has now named his man but declined to give further information about Berger. The former editor said he would be a witness next month in Washington before the house committee on un-American affairs.

Budenz said in Detroit said in connection with the alleged American communist head:

"He never shows his face. He does not appear in official Communist buildings. Few Communist leaders here ever see him. They all, however, follow his orders or suggestions implicitly. His name on an article is a sign that it is official. The average rank and file American Communist, however, never heard of him."

The Daily Worker in yesterday's edition published an interview with Berger. The newspaper referred to him as Gerhard Eisler and quoted him as saying the charges were "too ridiculous to answer." The newspaper said the interview took place in Berger's New York apartment.

The newspaper added that Berger and his wife had planned to sail yesterday for their native Leipzig with State Department approval.

The newspaper, however, said their exit permit had been cancelled suddenly.

## Newspapers In State Face Big Paper Shortage

### Florida Association Asks Congressmen For Immediate Aid

STUART, Oct. 18, (AP)—The Florida Press Association yesterday said more than 100 Florida newspapers face suspension of publication by January 1 because they have been notified by paper supply houses that they will have no paper to sell after December.

The association, through President Edwin A. Manning, publisher of the Stuart News, called on Florida's Congressional contingent for "immediate relief to break the OPA deadlock on newspaper prices."

Manning sent communications to Congressmen J. Hardin Peterson, Bob Sikes, Emory H. Price, Joe Hendricks, Pat Cannon, Dwight Rogers and Senators Pepper and Holland, warning:

"Approximately 100 newspapers in Florida, which are supplied by two paper houses, have been notified that contracts with the mills have expired and that the mills refuse to renew."

"They have been told flatly that there will be no newsprint after this year ends."

The paper houses have told the Florida publishers that OPA prices are below the world market, as a result of which 99 per cent of the world's newsprint which is manufactured in Canada and Finland is being diverted to Europe, South America and elsewhere. Unless steps are taken immediately to set up new contracts to supply Florida publishers, the foreign mills will have made commitments in other countries which will absorb their production for a year or more in advance and there will be no place to buy the newsprint which Florida publishers must have."

Warning that "it is possible that the damage has already been done," he said, "this is the greatest crisis ever faced by the newspaper industry in Florida."

"An additional 125 Florida newspapers, customarily supplied by a Jacksonville paper house," he declared, "face a newspaper crisis because of the marketing strike. The Florida publishers, he stated, "has contracts with the mills through 1946, but newsprint scheduled to keep its customers publishing through November is already ship scheduled to arrive at Jacksonville October 25."

"Unless steps are taken to settle the dock workers strike, the newsprint on which these 125 papers depend for November publication will be tied up on that ship and instead of only half of the newspapers of the State being crippled by cancellation of newsprint contracts by the mills, virtually 100 per cent of the papers will be crippled or put out of business unless immediate relief is obtained on both counts."

Troops poured into the Sanghien sector, 40 miles south of Peiping. Communist evacuated that city rather than made a stand.

At Peiping, 50,000 Communist troops were striking. The city is surrounded.

## Richard Maxwell Given Captaincy In Marine Corps

Richard C. Maxwell, Jr., who with his wife is making his home in York, Pa., has been informed that he had been given a permanent commission as captain in the United States Marine Corps, effective May 31, 1944.

Capt. Maxwell joined the Marine Corps in October, 1940 and served overseas two years as a member of the Third Marines, famed fighting division, during which time he trained thousands of men at Samoa. He fought in the battles of Bougainville, Tulagi and others in the Solomon Islands, and was among the first Marines to land on Guadalcanal.

The son of Mr. and Mrs. R. C. Maxwell, Sr., of Sanford, Capt. Maxwell is a graduate of Seminole High School and the University of Georgia.

## Note Left In Cell Reveals How Late Reichsmarschal In- tended To Take Life

NUERNBERG, Oct. 18, (AP)—Hermann Goering, according to a high source in Nuernberg today, boasted in one of the three notes he left in his cell that he would cheat the hangman. One of the letters, it was learned, revealed how the late Reichsmarschal intended to commit suicide under the nose of the military police that were assigned to guard him.

The letter was addressed to the American commandant of the Nuernberg jail, Col. B. C. Andrus.

Also found in Goering's cell was a letter to his widow, Emmy Goering, and one addressed to the German people, urging them to have courage.

It was also disclosed today in Nuernberg that Hitler's No. one henchman was not the only one of the eleven doomed Nazis who hoped to circumvent Allied retribution. It was revealed that between last January and the day of the execution, military policemen guarding the top German traitors found potential suicide weapons in the cells of the condemned on ten different occasions.

A screw was found in the cell of Baron Constantin Von Neurath. The late Joachim Von Ribbentrop once had a glass vial in his possession.

Mrs. Goering cried today while talking to newsmen about her late husband. She declared, "I can't believe it yet. I can't imagine that this man is no longer alive. He was my husband, and I side with him, and I will side with him after his death too." She said she was glad Goering had been able to take his own life instead of being hanged, and added, "If one may be glad, I am glad."

Mrs. Goering stated that she had longed to be able just to shake hands with him on one of her visits to the Nuernberg jail. The glass between them, preventing her from touching him, was that possibly it was lucky after all for it proved she was not the one who slipped him the poison.
