Teacher Incentives Not Improving Students

WASHINGTON (AP)—Cash rewards for teachers won't improve Johnny's reading and arithmetic, according to the evaluation of a \$770,000 federal experiment. But there appears to be some hope of improvement if his parents also are eligible for incentives based on his progress. The controversial experiment was conducted last school year in Cincinnati, Ohio; Jacksonville, Fla.; San Antonio, Tex., and Oakland, Calif.

Even before it began, the experiment was rocked with criticism from some teachers, school board members, administrators and parents.

Hara Bomb Charge Dropped By Judge

JACKSONVILLE, Fla. (AP)—Federal charges of planting a bomb at Walt Disney World and attempted extortion have been dropped against Robert Hara, 23, the son of the president of Tupper-Ware Co. U.S. Dist. Judge Charles R. Scott dismissed the charges Monday on a motion by U.S. Atty. John Briggs. Briggs said he acted at the request of the Justice Department in Washington but would not elaborate. Attorneys had indicated earlier that the identification of Hara was made by comparing his voice with that of a telephone caller who told a Disney World switchboard operator that a bomb was planted in the tourist attraction and demanded money.

Hara's attorney, James Russ of Orlando, moved from suppression of voice recordings, and his motion was pending at the time the case was dismissed. Disney records show Hara was employed there from December, 1971, through March, 1972. He was accused of telephoning Disney World Feb. 3, 1972, with a threat that a bomb in a utility shed would blow up if he wasn't paid \$90,000. Officers said they found a bomb set to detonate at midnight in a shed in Frontierland. It was found two hours after the attraction closed to patrons. Another series of telephoned threats demanding \$250,000 was reported on March 13. A courier kept a series of rendezvous, but no one met him to collect the money, officials reported.

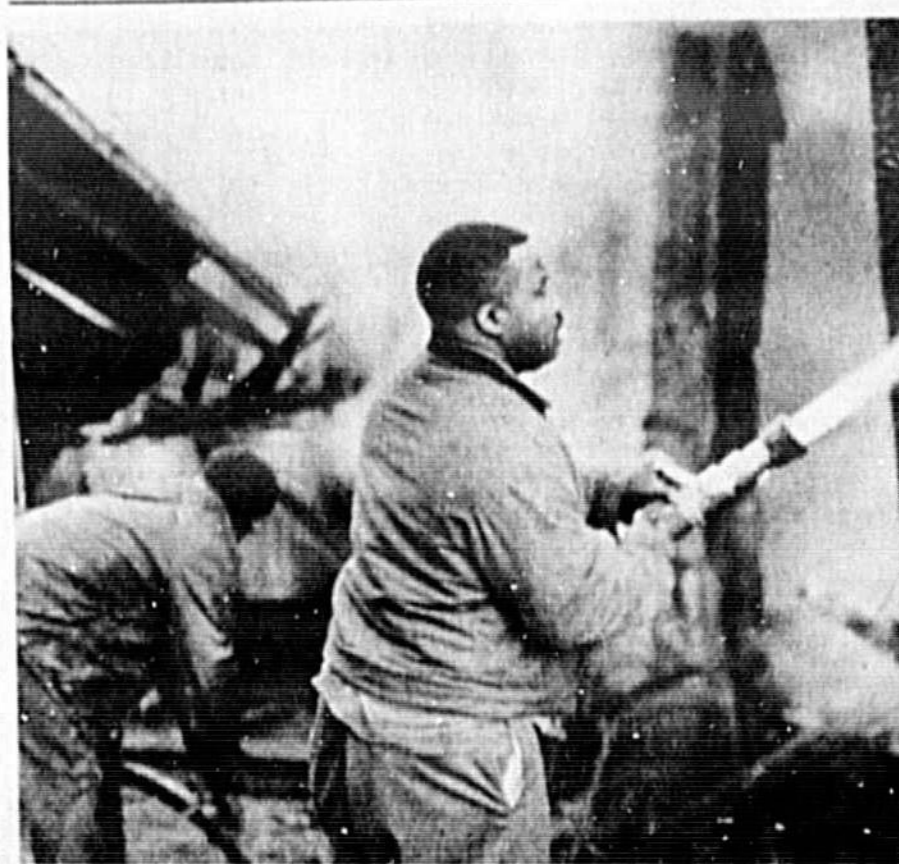

Embree asked that the mayor's office "strongly urge" or require or do whatever it takes to get the hydrants fixed so they will be operable. Dade, Palm Beach: Expensive Counties

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP)—Metropolitan Dade and Palm Beach counties are the most expensive places to live in Florida, according to preliminary findings of a state-financed cost of living study. The Department of Administration reported Monday to the Legislature results of the study which could provide the basis for differential pay for state employees and for state aid to education in Florida. The study checked costs of 111 items of food, housing, clothing, transportation, health and recreation. Around the state the items averaged \$100 with Dade County leading the list with \$109.20 a month. Palm Beach County registered \$107.25 and Broward \$104.45. Orange, Collier and Hillsborough counties also topped the \$100 mark. Twelve counties were surveyed by a Board of Regents team with representatives from the University of Florida, Florida State and Florida Atlantic University. Statistical estimates were made for the other 55 counties.

The estimated level in the least two expensive counties were \$80.98 for Franklin and \$82.31 for Holmes — both are in the Florida panhandle. Procedural Disputes Delay Cease-Fire Observers Use

SAIGON (AP) — Procedural disputes today continued to delay the dispatch of cease-fire observers into the South Vietnamese provinces, and the South Vietnamese command reported more than 250 new violations of the truce by the North Vietnamese and Viet Cong between noon Monday and dawn Tuesday. But there was a drop of 30 per cent from the previous reporting period.

In Honolulu, the U.S. Pacific Command said U.S. B-52 bombers and fighter-bombers continued operations against Communist forces in Laos and Cambodia Monday at the request of the U.S. State Department. It gave no details.

Meanwhile, Vice President Spiro T. Agnew arrived in Saigon for his first stop on a seven-day tour of Southeast Asia and reaffirmed the Nixon administration's support for President Nguyen Van Thieu's regime as the only legitimate government of South Vietnam. He also said the U.S. government does not recognize the right of North Vietnamese troops to remain in South Vietnam.

Agnew said he would hold "important consultations" with Thieu on postwar relations. The four-nation International Commission of Control and Supervision failed to get its seven regional teams in place and operations were suspended.

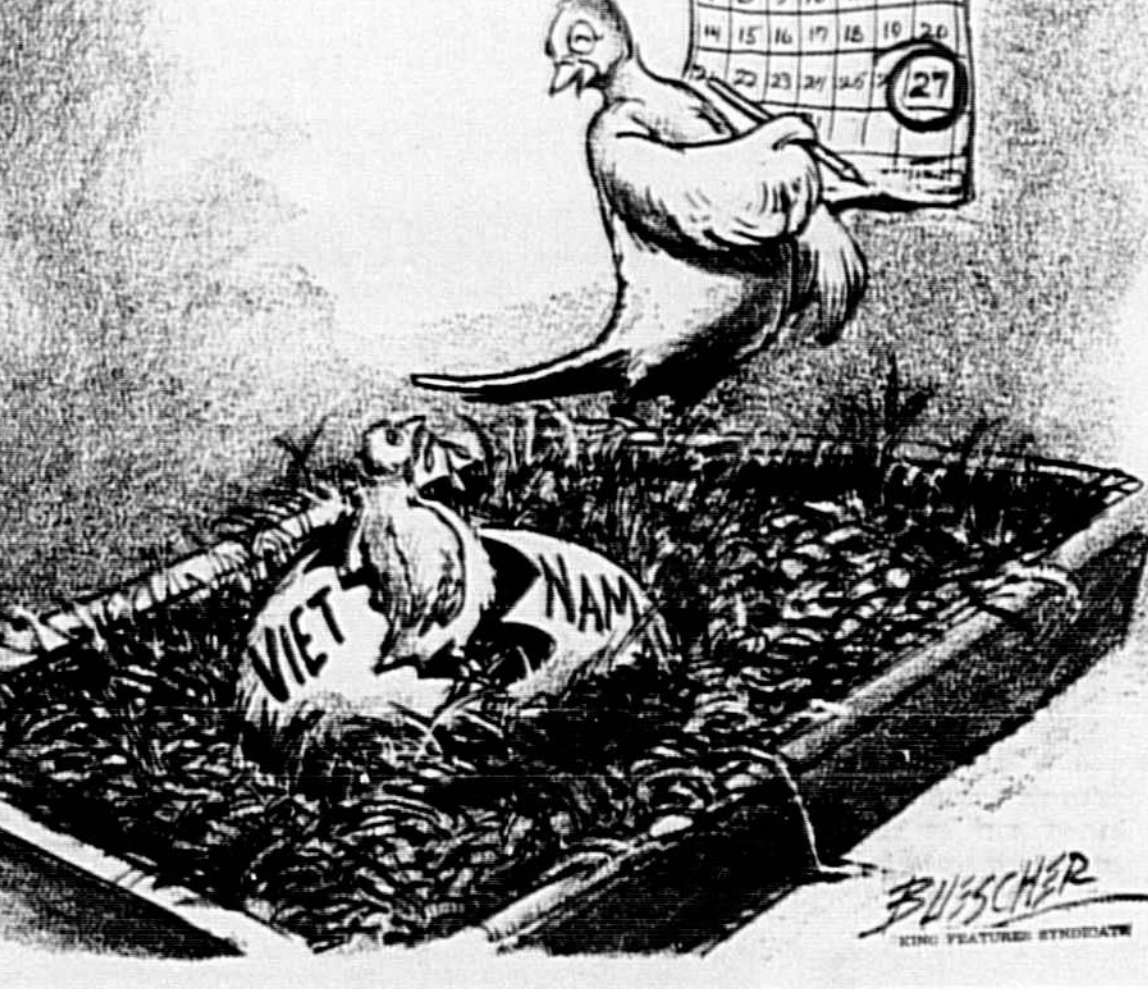

State Tax Fight Expected By KEN GEPFERT Associated Press Writer TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP) More than two months before the opening gavel, battle lines already are being drawn for what promises to be one of the major tax fights of the 1973 Legislature.

The issue—whether the state's intangible tax should be repealed—was argued by opposing sides Monday during the organizational meeting of the House Finance and Taxation Committee.

Rep. F. Eugene Tubbs, R-Merritt Island, attacked the tax on investments such as stocks and bonds as "grossly unfair."

"The existence of a quarter-billion dollar state surplus is proof that 'the people have been taxed too much,'" Tubbs said. "Why is it that in the annals of government the only way to get rid of a surplus is to spend it?" he asked.

Ogden rejected the argument that the tax was a burden on the taxpayer least able to afford saying an exemption for those with \$5,000 or less in intangibles aimed the tax at persons with "substantial investments."

"Besides," Ogden added, "What's the difference between a retired person who invests in stocks and bonds and a person who invests in real property? The taxpayer who buys a duplex and rents out one side pays up to 30 mills in property tax while another taxpayer investing in intangibles pays only one mill and they want to repeal that."

Tubbs said the tax worked a particular hardship on retired persons on a fixed income, "the people who can least afford it."

"It's a tax on thrift," the Merritt Island Republican added in an interview. "Why should someone be taxed on what he has saved? I think it's closer to a state personal income tax than anything we have."

"The battle lines are being drawn," Ogden conceded in an interview. "I think a very strong effort will be made to repeal it this session," he added, "but I hope the logical conclusion will prevail that we're in any position to repeal a tax which would benefit so few while most of the public is still burdened with the property tax."

Tubbs said efforts to repeal the intangible tax had a good chance for success "because the majority of us who ran for office campaigned on a promise of repealing this tax."

"It's a tax on thrift," the Merritt Island Republican added in an interview. "Why should someone be taxed on what he has saved? I think it's closer to a state personal income tax than anything we have."

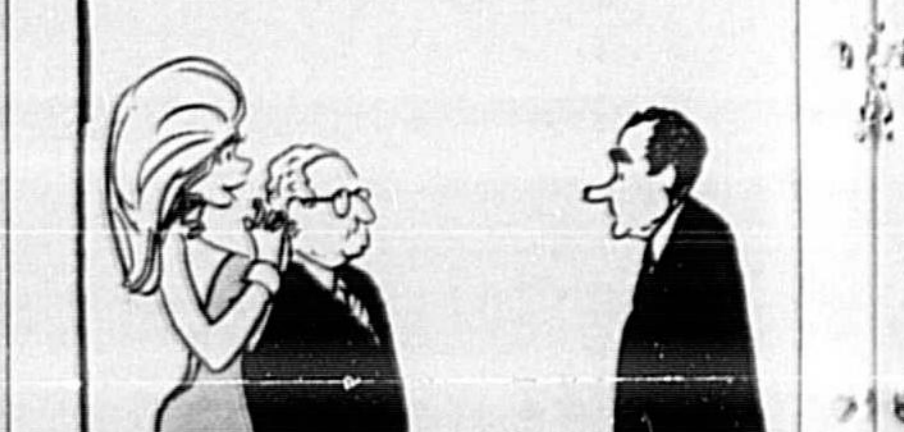

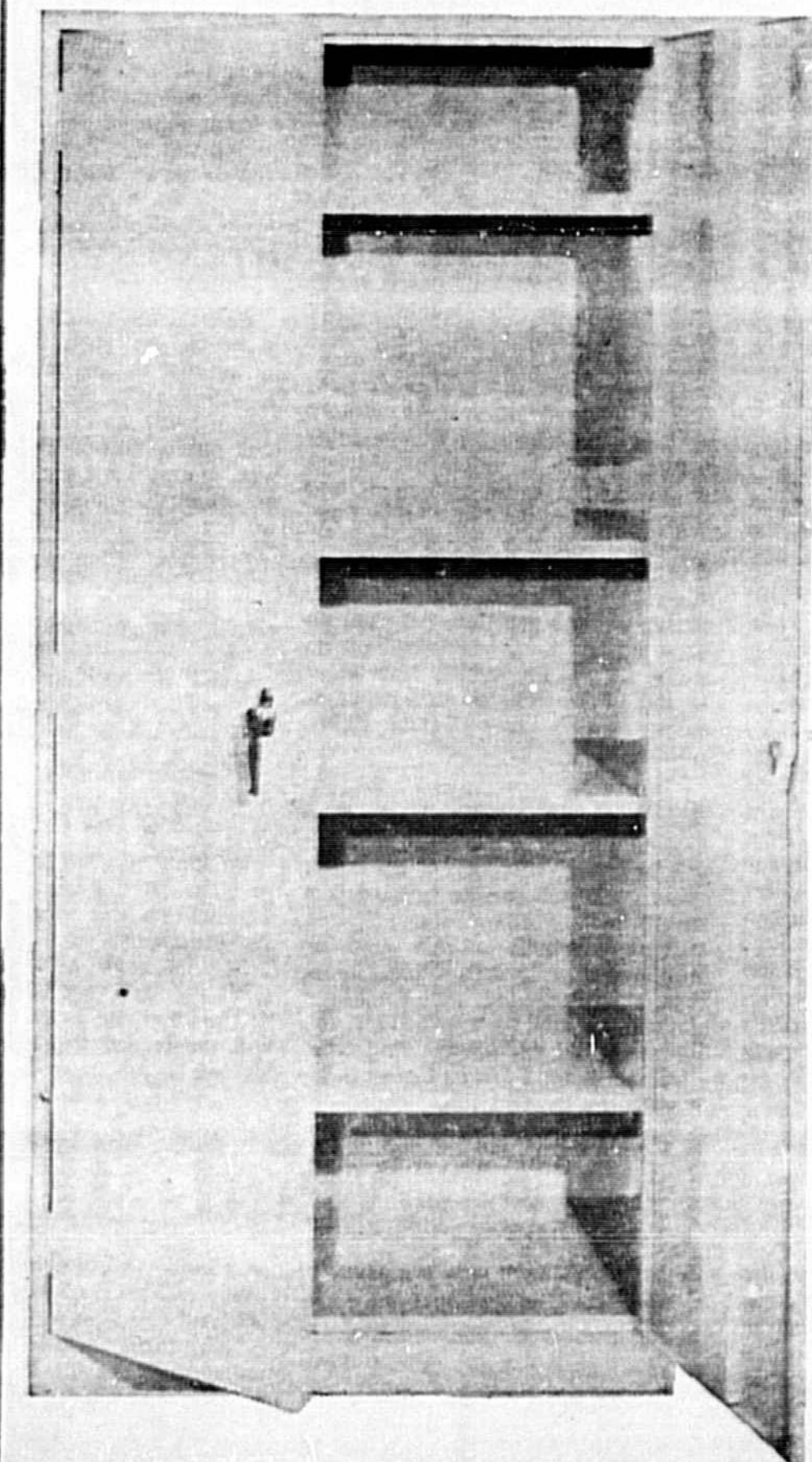



WINTER SPRINGS — Seminole County Commissioners received accolades at last night's meeting of City Council when City Attorney Thomas Freeman stated they had done a "great job" in procuring signalization upon one of the county's busiest intersections.

Mayor Granville Brown told council he had spoken with Commissioner Mike Hattaway relative to the signalization at SR 434 and U. S. 17-92 and that "it had been cleared in Tallahassee and work will be started shortly."

According to Mayor Brown, the meeting, to be held in Jacksonville, will feature speakers upon how various proposed legislative acts will affect municipalities, such as revenue sharing, etc.

Mayor Brown also announced plans for the second phase of the Hacienda Village are now in the hands of the city engineer and that work will commence upon the second phase of the village shortly.

A request by Southern Bell to place telephone lines upon south Edgemoor Avenue was referred to the city engineer for recommendation. The previous council had mentioned referring the matter to the city zoning board, but Councilman Clifford Jordan opined the matter should fall within the purview of professionals such as the city engineer and Building Department, Freeman concurred, contending the engineer would be more knowledgeable of the problems.

Councilman Victor Miller stated the city should exercise control in the matter assuring that the utilities are underground.

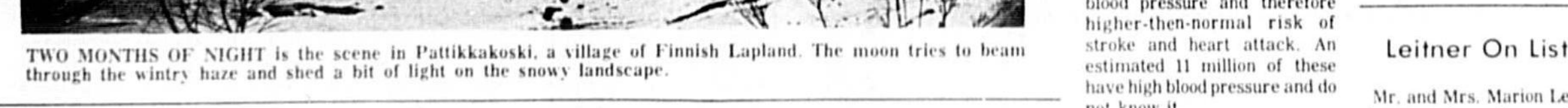

'Administrative Breakdown'? Winsor Manor Decision Due

LONGWOOD — Decision on whether building will be permitted to commence again in Winsor Manor, first addition, is to be made by the City Council in special session Wednesday at 7:30 p.m.

Casselberry Resolution For Schools

By DONNA ESTES

CASSELBERRY — Preparation of a resolution to "actively and effectively support legislation" requested by the School Board to supplement its capital outlay budget was authorized unanimously by the City Council Monday night.

The legislation requested by the School Board would require land developers, builders and contractors to purchase and deed to Seminole District School Board sufficient acreage within or without their development for school sites or school use; provide an appropriate amount of money per pupil; or any increase in the fair market value of property to be placed on the tax roll immediately at the higher evaluation rather than waiting until January 1 of each calendar year.

At the suggestion of City Attorney Kenneth McIntosh, the resolution ordered prepared by the Casselberry Council includes that the legislation requested be of "equal application to all the citizens of Seminole County."

McIntosh also recommended that the city evidence a willingness to support legislation of "equal applicability to all the citizens of the State of Florida in all 67 counties."

Councilman Edith Duerr said while she is in favor of the resolution, at the same time the state should be asked for reinstatement of the state funding for new construction of schools in line with the growth factor in Seminole.

City Manager Ron Bergman said he made a survey of surrounding cities in the matter and found it is "doubtful" the earlier General Florida Red Cross administrator Judd Wood said damages were in excess of \$3 million.

Two points in neighboring Osceola County and the Titusville Cocoa Airport in Brevard County were reported struck by twisters Sunday.

Tornado Damages Extensive

ORLANDO, Fla. (AP)—State and federal officials Tuesday agreed with an Orlando civil defense director's estimate that a tornado that ripped through a tiny square Orlando neighborhood Sunday caused between \$750,000 and \$900,000 in private property damage.

Bob McFerrer of the U. S. What Does 'Totalled' Really Mean?

The approaching car suddenly went out of control. There was nothing you could do to avoid the impending crash. It was a real "smash up," as they say.

Your insurance company unhesitatingly declared the automobile a total loss. Adjustors said it would cost entirely too much for repairs. Finally, the wreck was towed to the junkyard.

Is this the ignoble end of your blue beauty with shiny vinyl top, the one car you truly loved? No — not really. Many basic components are thus saved for future use. Pentagon Papers

Britain's Vietnam Role Described

By RICHARD SALTUS Associated Press Writer LOS ANGELES (AP) — A newly released section of the Pentagon papers describes Britain's attempts to mediate a Vietnam war settlement as "sometimes embarrassing" to the United States by spotlighting apparent contradictions in President Lyndon B. Johnson's peace-seeking efforts.

The study says the United States brought Britain into the negotiating process in 1966-1967 only to help British Prime Minister Harold Wilson politically and because of the importance of British support for U.S. Vietnam policies. Johnson's secret diplomatic efforts from 1965 to 1966 are described in four previously unissued volumes of the Pentagon

war study introduced as evidence in the trial of Daniel Ellsberg and Anthony Russo, charged with espionage, conspiracy and theft in connection with the leak of the study to news media. The Pentagon documents were released to the press Monday. "The eagerness of British leaders to participate with maximum visibility in bringing peace to Vietnam... was sometimes embarrassing to the United States, which greatly preferred confidential dealings with a minimum of participants," the study said.

Britain was a go-between for peace feelers which were known by the code name "Sunflower." That diplomatic effort ended in early 1967 when Johnson resumed bombing of North Vietnam following a suspension during the Tet lunar new year. The Pentagon study said that among sources of embarrasment to the United States were references by Wilson to Sunflower and a previous diplomatic attempt, "Marigold," in comments to Parliament.

Vietnam Peace Welcomed As U.S. Mourns Johnson

Copley News Service An elated world that welcomed even a fragile peace in Vietnam after a seemingly endless conflict across Indochina today paid tribute to Lyndon B. Johnson, 36th president of the United States, with relief that rejoicing for America had been 12 years of an unwanted and unsure war which cost more than 45,000 lives and plundered the nation's coffers.

Even as the hour drew near for an uneasy Vietnam truce, there was a sadness across the land, too, as the nation paid tribute to Lyndon B. Johnson, 36th president of the United States, who died of a heart attack in his native Texas at the age of 64. In Washington, thousands of Americans filed by casket of the dead ex-president as he lay in state in the Capitol Rotunda.

Later hundreds of dignitaries and friends led by President Nixon attended funeral services in which Mr. Johnson was eulogized as the "tall man with giant character." Then the American leader was taken home for burial in the Pedernales River country he had loved so well. The former president, who had launched the nation on a course of sweeping domestic reforms in the turbulent 1960s, died less than a week before peace came to Vietnam — a peace which had eluded him during his five years in the White House.

Coincident with a return to peace, Defense Secretary Melvin R. Laird suspended the flow of U.S. troops to Vietnam, including the assignment of about 2,000 men who had received their orders to go there.

Movement To Slice State Doles, Health

JACKSONVILLE, Fla. (AP) — There appears to be a move brewing to press for separation of the state welfare and health agencies during this year's Legislature. Emmett S. Roberts, who heads the combined agency known as the Department of Health and Rehabilitative Services, brought the rumors out into the open Monday in a talk to the Florida Association of County Health Officers.

"I will use every means of persuasion at my disposal to prevent this from happening," vowed Roberts. "I hope you join with me in that determination." Dr. Wilson T. Sowler, state health officer, refused to comment on the move, saying he was attempting to win status as a separate state agency. Health and welfare were separate, answering only to the Cabinet, until government reorganization a few years ago. Roberts acknowledged there has been a lack of teamwork between the divisions within his department.

"Systems tend to become inflexible and immovable," Roberts said. "The people who work in a system develop a vested interest in it and tend to resist change. This is still true, but not to the degree it was a year ago." Stennis Condition Is Listed 'Very Serious'

By ROBERT L. CAMPBELL Associated Press Writer WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen. John C. Stennis, a power in the Senate's Southern bloc and an ardent supporter of a strong U.S. military, was in "very serious" condition today after being shot twice during a hold-up in front of his home here.

Asked about the length of the surgery, Maj. Garland said it was "consistent with the extent of the wounds." The hospital's "very serious" classification is the most serious classification it has. Stennis was shot at 7:40 p.m. Tuesday as he alighted from his car after returning to his home. Police were looking for two teenagers in connection with the shooting.

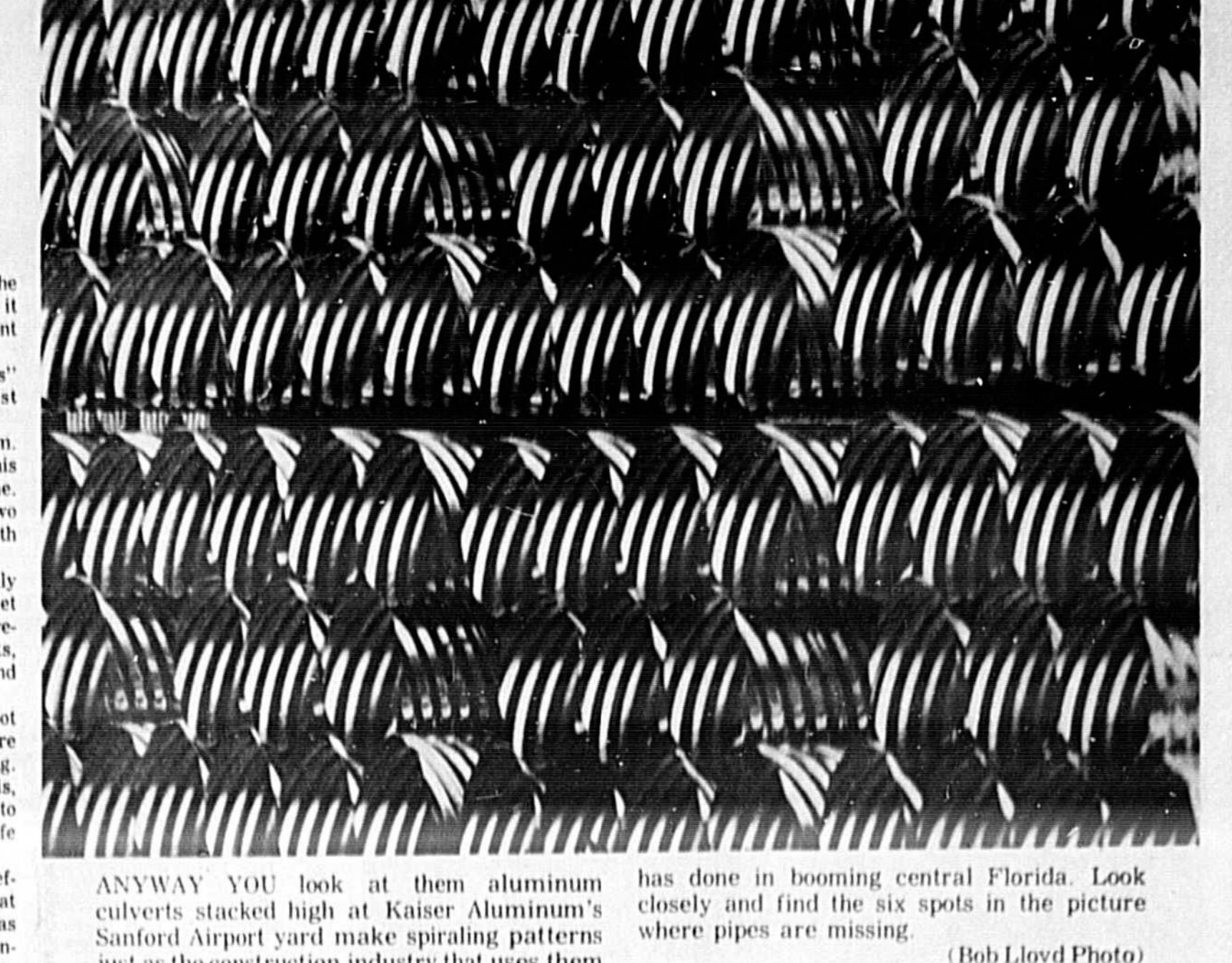
Decision Expected On Bell Rate Hike
