Hurricanes: 1999 could be volatile for storms

The hurricane forecast for 1999 is scary. Experts are predicting a volatile season with as many as four major hurricanes.

Florida may get 14 tropical storms this year, of which nine could become hurricanes and four of them become very dangerous.

The biggest concern for areas such as Seminole County are inland winds, and if a storm stalls, the potential for flooding.

Hurricane forecaster Bill Gray, a professor at Colorado State University, said that hurricanes that threaten the Southeastern United States are the worst national hazard - worse than tornadoes, more dangerous than a global warning.

Gray said that a Category 3 hurricane could cause \$50 billion damage in a vulnerable place such as Florida's Gold Coast, Tampa, Houston or New Orleans. Gray was in Florida last week to discuss

officials. He said that his warnings do not mean that a hurricane will necessarily strike Florida but it would be wise for residents to be aware of the damage one could do.

Chief Terry Schenk of the Seminole County Fire/Rescue also serves as the area's chief meteorologist. His tracking abilities have helped prepare county residents for storms of any kind.

Since the beginning of the year, Schenk secure important papers. the hurricane situation with state weather has been telling everyone to prepare for See Storms, Page 5A

Bounded by West 8th Street on the north, West 11th Street on the south, French Avenue on the east, and Cedar Avenue on the west, Operation Clean Sweep is focused on providing a safe area. atmosphere for families.

"Families are what we are all about," Thompson said. "When you come to our meetings, you'll see it's usually in somebody's front yard. All the kids are running around playing. Sometimes we have to shout to be heard above the kids, but that's OK. We want them to be able to feel safe in their neighborhood."

Feeling safe in the neighborhood hasn't always been possible, according to Thompson. Dope peddling and prostitution were normal activities, and a double drive-by shooting in March put everyone on edge. "That was the straw that broke

Nadeau earns Sheriff's honors

"All the programs in the world won't work unless the people are receptive and willing to make it work," Thompson said. "This is not easy. Some of these people are having to stand up to their brothers, their sisters and sometimes their own children."

The group set its first meeting for April 6 and 23 people attended. Since then, 19 families have joined Operation Clean Sweep. In addition, individual residents are providing money to erect neighborhood watch signs in the

"These folks are digging into their own pockets to pay for these signs," Thompson said. "We haven't had a fund-raiser yet because we are too busy cleaning up the neighborhood."

Though she's an ardent supporter of Operation Clean Sweep, Thompson shies away from taking any credit for the early success of the group.

"This is not my doing," Thompson said. "There is no way I could have done this. It was all of us working together, and we got a lot of help from many people."

Police busy over holiday

Winter Springs - A check-point in Winter Springs on Saturday yeilded 160 citations, including nine DUI arrests.

Working part-time at McDonald's while attending school, Nadeau transferred to the adult high school nearly two years ago.



Indoor molds are harmful to human health In 1992-1994, there was an

unusual outbreak of pulmonary hemorrhage in infants in Cleveland, Ohio, where rescarchers found a specific fungus growing in the homes of sick infants. In May 1997. the Journal of American Medical Association carried a news article titled "Floods carry potential for toxic mold disease." in addition, the closure and extensive renovation of several courthouses in Florida, due to molds, are recent testimonials to the importance of indoor molds to human health. There is enough evidence accumulated up until now, implicating a particular fungus as a serious problem in homes and buildings and one of the causes of the "sick building syndrome." The Fungus: Stachybotrys chartum was first found and described in 1837 from wallpaper collected in a home in Prague. The fungus is commonly found on plant debris and in soil, and can be grown in artificial media such as potato dextrose or commeal agar, where it produces a large quantities of dark spores. The fungus is relatively easy to identify because of the unique characteristics of the spores which are uni-cellular, dark brown to black and often showing a ridged surface when mature. The spores are covered with a slime residue and remain together as a mass or ball of spores. The spores are, therefore, not readily disseminated in the air compared to other fungi. However, when the fungus and substrate dries and is disturbed by mechanical means or air movement, conidia can become airborne. A simple way to grow the fungus is to streak some spores onto wet filter paper in a petri AL LERKER

DEAR MOM: You're right. Children can be cruel, and the teacher was thoughtless and naive to have circulated the papers without first having checked them over. The kind of hurt your daughter experienced can linger for years.

In addition, the fungus produces cy-closporin and other compounds which are potent immunosuppresive agents. These chemicals may be responsible for the observed high toxicity of this fungus.

Symptoms: Common symptoms in humans are dermatitis, pain and inflammation the mucus membranes of the mouth and throat, a burningsensation of the nasal passages, tightness of the chest, cough, bloody rhinitis, fever. headache, and fatigue.

Detection and Control: Detection of the fungus is usually by inspection and/or air and surface sampling. Because the fungus is not readily airborne. air sampling in a contaminated environment may show low levels of spores in the air. inspection of potential sites of contamination, especially in covered/protected places, is necessary to determine where the fungus occurs and the level of contamination. The fungus is most commonly found in homes or buildings which have sustained flooding or water damage from broken pipes, roof leaks, sewage backup, condensation, etc.

Spores are found in the soil and introduced along with floodwaters or dust and dirt entering with water from a roof leak, etc. It is most common on the paper covering of sheetrock, but can be found on wallpaper, ceiling tiles, paper products, carpets with natural fibers, paper covering on insulated pipes, in insula-tion material, on wood, and on general organic debris. If areas contaminated with the fungus are discovered, do not attempt to solve the problem without following recommended safety procedures for working with toxic molds, especially if heavily contaminated (respirator and proper covering of the skin and eyes may be needed). Get advice if there is a scrious problem. Disinfecting the surface of contaminated materials may kill the fungus on the surface, but often it will survive under the surface and grow again.

Can diet help me avoid costly test?

DEAR DR. GOTT: I'm 33 and cannot gain weight. I've always been about 20 pounds underweight, despite a high-calorie nutritious diet. Over the years, I've been tested for parasites, diabetes, thyroid disorders, and cellac disease — all negative. However, mul-tiple stool specimens have had a high fat content. One doctor urged an intestinal biopey, but I currently have no health insurance, so this is not an option. Is there a diet that will help me with this problem?

DEAR READER: From your brief description, I suspect that you have malabsorption syndrome: Something in your system is preventing the prop-er absorption of nutrients. Because fat is the least digestible dietary component, you are losing excess fat in your stools.

The causes of malabsorption would fill an entire printed page; they range from primary intestinal disorders, such as sprue and pancreatic defi-ciency, to vascular and endocrine dis-eases. The treatment depends on the cause. I hesitate to give you a blanket endorsement of any distary therapy. However, some are helpful. For example, avoidance of milk products may reduce stool fat in lactose-intolerant



individuals; Pepto-Bismol and pancre-atic-enzyme supplements can likewise assist patients with certain infections or a pancreatic insufficiency.

Despite your lack of insurance, you may have to bite the bullet and undergo definitive testing. Your doctor apparently believes that you may have a primary intestinal disorder that could be diagnosed with a biopsy. Therefore, such a procedure may be your best bet.

I suggest that you place yourself in the hands of a capable gastroenterolo-gist — preferably one willing to put you on a reasonable payment achedule - who will review all your previous tests and then sit down with you to plan an appropriate strategy

Although your health has apparently not suffered yet, I think you would be smart to address your problem in a timely man



times already. It has been very special to me." The 1998 Pep Boys Indy Racing League champion stalked Gordon over the last 10 laps, cutting the lead from 4.064 seconds on Lap 193 to 1.271 seconds on Lap 197.

Whether Brack could catch Gordon was just one question. Whether Oordon had enough fuel was the other.

"This course is a good U.S. Open challenge," said Sue Fogleman. "It was set up to play very long which I think was a tough but fair test."


Mardi Lunn and Katie Peterson were the top two qualifiers shooting 2-under-par, 70. Lunn and Peterson were the only two players to break par.



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
