WASHINGTON (UPI)—A top Senate Democrat warned today of rough terrain ahead on Capitol Hill for President Kennedy's plan to raise the Federal Housing Agency to cabinet rank.

Mrs. Kennedy Heads The List Of Best Dressed

NEW YORK (UPI)—Mrs. Jacqueline Kennedy heads the list of the world's best dressed women for the second year in a row and was joined at the fashion summit by her sister, Princess Lee Radziwill of London, and a close friend, Mrs. Charles B. Wrightman of Palm Beach.

The New York Couture Group, which conducts the annual best-dressed poll among 2,000 fashion experts, added two other new names to the 1961 list. They were Mrs. Herve Alphonse, wife of the French ambassador to the United States, and Mrs. Umberto Agnelli, a member of the Italian family which manufactures Fiat cars.

Making room for the newcomers on the list of the most chic dozen were actress Audrey Hepburn and Mrs. Norman K. Winston, wife of a New York real estate developer, both of whom were elevated to the couture group's permanent fashion hall of fame.

Two women among 1960's best dressed were dropped from the list—Mrs. Stavros Niarchos of the Greek shipping family and Mrs. Patrick Guinness of the Irish stout-brewing family.

The other winners of the fashion world's highest accolade, all repeats from the 1960 list, were Mrs. Gloria Rubio Guinness, Mexican-born wife of banker Loel Guinness of the brewing family; Queen Sirikit of Thailand, petite consort of King Phumiphon Aduldet; Donna Marcella Agnelli, wife of Gianni Agnelli of the Turin automotive family; Mrs. Evangeline Bell Bruce, wife of U. S. Ambassador to Britain David K. E. Bruce; Princess Alexandra of Kent; Vicomtesse Jacqueline de Ribes of Paris; Mrs. Dorinda Dixon Ryan, wife of New York millionaire John Barry Ryan III.

Fresh Attempts Made To Bring Peace To Laos

GENEVA (UPI)—The Russian and British co-chairmen of the 14-nation Laos peace conference may ask the jungle kingdom's three rival princes to come here for a fresh attempt to settle their differences, it was learned today.

Informal sources said Britain's chief delegate Malcolm MacDonald and Soviet Deputy Foreign Minister Georgi Pushkin might propose at today's session calling all three princes to a meeting.

They said the question of inviting the princes here was discussed Thursday by Pushkin and MacDonald, but that no firm decision was reached. Today's meeting—the first full session of the new year—could decide to listen to "neutralist" Prince Souvanna Phouma before calling in his Communist half-brother, Prince Souphanouvong, and pro-Western Prince Boun Oum, premier of the Laos government, the sources said.

Solon Not Disposed To Vote For Proposed Bond Issue

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Chairman Richard B. Russell of the Senate Armed Services Committee said today he was not disposed to vote for the proposed United Nations bond issue. He termed UN use of force in the Congo a tragic mistake.

The Georgia Democrat said in an interview that when the United States "joined with Russia" in moving to control anti-Communist Katanga it gave Indian Prime Minister Jawaharlal Nehru "the excuse he was looking for" to invade Portuguese Goa. The action, he said, also has caused Indonesian President Sukarno to threaten invasion of New Guinea.

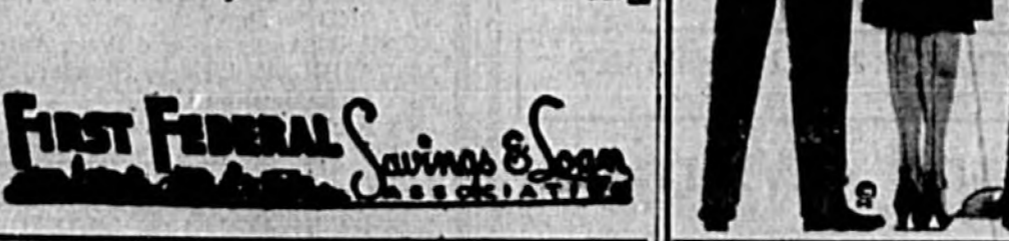
Russell, a member of the Senate appropriations and space committees, and congressional atomic committee, is the Senate's senior military authority. He is probably privy to more military intelligence than any other senator.

President Kennedy's request for authority to buy up to \$100 million of the impending \$200 million UN bond issue to meet costs of UN military operations has brought both criticism and support in Congress.

Chairman Harry F. Byrd, (D-Va.), of the Senate Finance Committee, also has registered his opposition to the proposal. Senate Democratic Whip Hubert H. Humphrey, Minn., however, has promised to back Kennedy's bond request "to the hilt."

The request probably will be taken up by the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, rather than by Byrd's finance group. It will touch off a sharp Senate debate on the whole future of U.S. policy toward the world organization and its financial support.

Medical Care Near End Of Agenda

WASHINGTON (UPI)—President Kennedy's No. 1 domestic goal-minded care for the elderly financed by Social Security taxes—seemed likely today to wind up near the bottom of the list of things Congress will consider this year.

In fact, there is no assurance yet that even a skeletonized version can be enacted. This is the situation despite assertions by Democratic party strategists that a presidential victory on this issue would give a major boost to Democratic prospects in next November's elections.

The outlook for action on the bill undoubtedly will be a major topic when Kennedy confers at the White House Saturday with Chairman Wilbur Mills, (D-Ark.), of the House Ways & Means Committee.

Bing Crosby Has Surgery

SANTA MONICA, Calif. (UPI)—Singer Bing Crosby, 57, undergoes surgery today for the removal of kidney stones.

Crosby's brother, Larry, said Bing expected to be out of the hospital by Jan. 18 in time for his golf tournament in northern California.

Tests determined the kidney stone was causing him severe stomach pain. He underwent a similar operation several years ago in 1957 and was in the hospital a week or so, explained Larry Crosby.

The crooner entered St. John's Hospital Jan. 1 but left twice, once to have dinner with his family and again Wednesday to attend the christening of his seventh child, Nathaniel Patrick Crosby.

When asked how the singer was taking confinement to a hospital bed, a spokesman said, "He's not taking it like most patients, in fact he is a little bored with the whole thing."

Crosby was hospitalized about two weeks ago in San Francisco for several days with what attendants said was stomach flu.

80 Persons Die As Trains Collide

HARMELEN, Holland (UPI)—Two speeding express trains collided today, killing 80 persons in The Netherlands' worst rail disaster. Officials said one of the trains apparently sped past a red warning signal that was obscured by heavy fog. Seven hours after the crash, authorities said 80 bodies had been removed. Another 30 persons were injured and scores more suffered minor cuts and bruises.

Nationalists Revolt Against Nepal Ruler

CALCUTTA, India (UPI)—An armed uprising has started against King Mahendra's regime in Nepal, with heavy casualties on both sides, it was reported here today. Reports reaching here from Darjeeling, an Indian town on the Nepali border, said fighting had occurred in eastern and western parts of the Himalayan kingdom.

Algeria Hit By New Strike

ALGIERS, Algeria (UPI)—The outlawed Secret Army Organization (OAS) called a two-hour strike today in an effort to show massive support for its violent struggle to keep Algeria French.

With casualties mounting daily and the situation threatening to get out of hand, the prefect of Oran, in northwest Algeria, threatened to impose a state of siege if necessary.

Sukarno Escapes Third Attempt On His Life

MAKASSAR, Indonesia (UPI)—President Sukarno escaped a third attempt against his life when a hand grenade exploded Sunday night in a crowd outside a sports arena, killing 3 persons and injuring 33.

The 60-year-old president, unhurt but obviously edgy after the explosion, went on with his speech in the arena and ripped into the Netherlands for its refusal to hand West Irian West New Guinea over to Indonesia.

A government spokesman said several persons were arrested as "Dutch agents" in the assassination attempt. He charged the incident was designed to break the spirit of Indonesia and was an example of the "cruelty and immorality of imperialism."

Makassar is in southwest Celebes, one of Indonesia's biggest islands and a major stronghold of rebels who rose up against the Sukarno government in 1958. They only recently ended their resistance and submitted to the authority of the central government.

The grenade exploded at 9 p. m. about 150 yards behind the car carrying Sukarno to the sports arena. It was thrown from the crowd and landed in the road between the motorcade and the crowd.

Col. Josef, the government spokesman, said the blast killed two adults and a child and injured 14 children, 10 adult civilians, 3 members of the mobile brigade and a soldier.

Sukarno, speaking to a crowd of 3,000 students, political leaders and military personnel, concentrated on his attack on Dutch Foreign Minister J.M.A.J. Luns' arguments for retention of Dutch control over West New Guinea.

"If Luns says that Dutch colonialism gave Indonesia more than it took away it is a lie," said Sukarno bluntly.

In a previous speech at Bonjain, Sukarno said Indonesia wanted to avoid bloodshed but would send "thousands and thousands" of boats to invade West New Guinea unless the Dutch get out.

Sunday's assassination attempt was the third against Sukarno in a little more than four years.

Late in 1957 a grenade was tossed at his automobile in Jakarta where he was attending a ceremony. Several persons were killed, including some children. Arrests were made and death sentences decreed but they have not yet been carried out.

Stock Exchange Officials Silent

NEW YORK (UPI)—Members gathered for trading in the busy market at the American Stock Exchange on Trinity Place today with a question on their lips or in their minds: What next?

There had been a series of bumps in the road in the past eight months of exchange operations. All the time, however, Amex was building to a new record of stock volume as the second largest American securities exchange. More appeared to lie ahead.

The Jolts were capped by a Securities and Exchange Commission staff report issued Friday night after trading closed stating that Amex had let operations show "general deficiency of standards and a fundamental failure of controls." In other words, there was lax administration of rules set up to protect the public that invests in securities traded on the exchange—and from this laxness, abuses.

Kennedy Meets With Leaders On Program

WASHINGTON (UPI)—President Kennedy invited Democratic and Republican congressional leaders to the White House today in a move to enlist bipartisan support for his 1962 legislative program.

Vice President Lyndon B. Johnson was asked to join in the meeting to discuss administration proposals to be submitted to the election-year session of Congress starting Wednesday.

The meeting with 15 House and Senate leaders was the second of three pre-session conferences scheduled at the White House.

Kennedy met Saturday with Chairman Wilbur Mills (D-Ark.), of the House Ways and Means Committee, and plans to confer Tuesday with other top Democrats.

House Republican Leader Charles A. Halleck of Indiana hoisted one storm warning for the Chief Executive Sunday night. Halleck said in a television interview that Kennedy's proposal for medical care for the aged pointed toward socialism and would not pass Congress this year.

Senate Democratic Leader Mike Mansfield of Montana also predicted trouble ahead for the administration. He said the new session would be more difficult than the last one and the House would bear "the burden of responsibility."

The President's proposal for the United States to buy \$100 million in United Nations bonds and his request for broad tariff-cutting powers appeared likely to stir up a major battle.

The President will deliver his State of the Union Address to a joint session of the House and Senate Thursday. He will send his budget and other legislative proposals to Congress in subsequent messages in the next few weeks.

Kennedy, Clay In Agreement

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Gen. Lucius D. Clay prepared to return to Berlin today in full agreement with President Kennedy on policy for handling "possible crisis situations" there.

The President announced the agreement Sunday in a three-paragraph statement after a four-hour meeting with Clay, his personal representative in Berlin. Kennedy said they had "a most useful and satisfactory review" of the Berlin situation.

The President's conference with Clay came as officials reported new instructions were being sent to Llewellyn E. Thompson, U. S. ambassador to Moscow, for his next "exploratory" talk on Berlin with Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko.

Secretary of State Dean Rusk said in a radio interview Sunday that he was "somewhat encouraged" by the resumption of the U. S.-Soviet talks in Moscow.

He said Berlin remained "a very important and potentially dangerous issue" and the exploratory talks were being conducted to find out if there was any basis for negotiations looking toward an agreement.

The Kennedy-Clay meeting followed reports last week that Clay thought the U. S. military commander in Berlin, Maj. Gen. Albert Watson, should be given greater authority to deal with provocations along the Berlin wall.

But both Clay and Rusk said after a Saturday meeting that there was no disagreement between them on basic Berlin policy.

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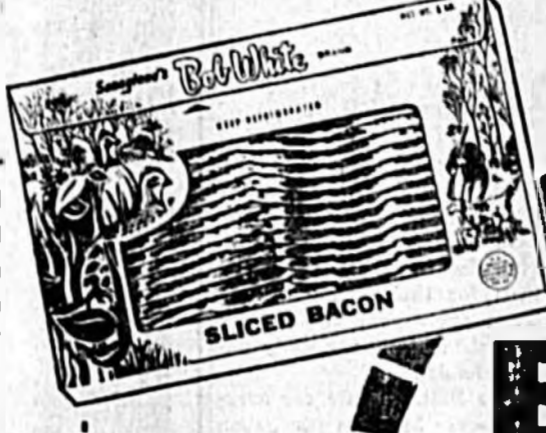

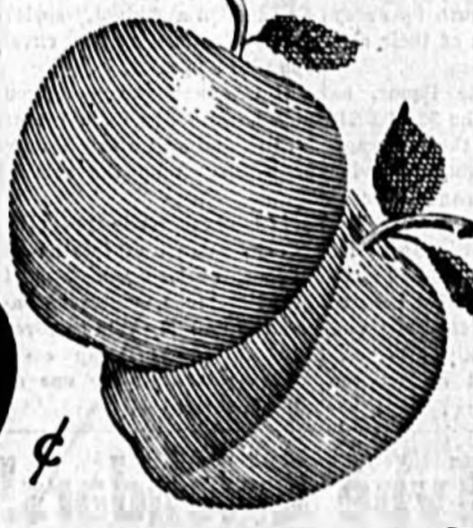

Arlene and Phillip show how economically a young couple can live in modern America. But it takes brains and "horse sense" to conduct your home on a budget. People of low I. Q. scream for Uncle Sam to support them via welfare projects and then often squander their money on unwise items. So get hep!

CASE L-407: Arlene, aged 28, is my daughter-in-law. When she and Phillip got married, they moved to Bloomington, Indiana, where Phillip did some part time teaching and started graduate work toward his Ph.D. in history.

They located in a little apartment and started living on a budget. The first time Mrs. Crane and I visited them, they showed us their pantry shelves, stacked high with canned goods. "And we got them at a bargain," they exclaimed. Then they told us they watched the ads in the Bloomington newspaper for all grocery sales. Whenever they saw a good deal on canned goods, they took their full quota. And they really had shown smart judgment, for they were buying standard canned goods as cheaply as my wife does, and she is a superb shopper. "Dad," they also added, "we have lived our first year on

only \$9.50 per week for groceries." And that is certainly a splendid evidence of budgeting, plus bargaining, for any young married couple here in modern America. Remember, these figures were for the year 1960, which means they applied to present inflationary levels. Obviously, they didn't splurge on T-bone steaks, for they used eggs as their staple diet. Fortunately, they both like eggs and eggs can be served in a wide variety of appetizing ways, so they didn't complain. And they purchased their eggs in 12-dozen lots from farmers when they'd drive up to visit us at our summer home 90 miles away from Bloomington, so they'd get them at 10 cents a dozen cheaper, thereby paying the gasoline bill for their trip. Since they don't use cigarettes, they thus saved \$4.42 per week which the average smoking couple burn up every week on the ends of their cigarettes.

They don't use liquor, so they also saved the \$6.92 PER WEEK which the average liquor-using couple squander on alcoholic beverages here in America. Arlene and Phillip spent an average of only \$9.50 per week for all groceries, whereas the average smoking and liquor using family in America pours \$11.34 on tobacco and liquor every 7 days be-

fore they even begin to buy food. Arlene and Phillip thus furnished their table and also paid for all the gas and oil bills for their small car, on what many couples squander on nuisance and medically unwise habits. For Phillip's little car averages over 31 miles per gallon on regular gas, so his total fuel bills, even for occasional trips to Chicago, don't run \$1.50 per week.

The reason I am mentioning their case is to show how young married couples with brains can still live comparatively cheaply in America. The higher your I. Q., the less it costs you to live! People with low intelligences are poor bargain hunters. On our South Side here in Chicago they squander money on water melons, out of season, when they ought to be sinking that same money into beans and potatoes.

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Hanging on the wall by my desk are four calendars, which are all that I have room for.

So if you happen to have invented a new type of calendar, please don't send it to me, not even if it is illustrated with a sexy picture of Melina what's-her-name who played in "Never-On-Sunday."

I have enough trouble figuring out what day it is without being distracted by anything like that.

Dear Sir:

We, as property owners along Pineway, take exception to the announcement by the county officials that "the property owners along Pineway are standing in the way of progress."

In the first place, the County requests that we deed them 40 feet of our property for a right-of-way when they already have 25 feet of that amount, as verified by a recent survey of our property. They don't ask for the difference of 40 and 25, or 15 feet, but FORTY (40) feet. They measured 40 feet from the center of the road, and set stakes to indicate the right-of-way line. There is quite a difference when we measure 40 feet from the property line. Perhaps they need a course in simple Arithmetic.

In the second place, we do not want to have to donate half of our front yard, even if measured from the center of the road "period." It seems unjust to request such a right-of-way from any property owner for a road that won't go anywhere, unless it is for the financial benefit of some other property owned down the road.

Of course it is the intent to turn over to the State an 80 foot right-of-way and "saddle" them with the rebuilding of the road and its maintenance. It is always easy to ask the State and Federal Government for outlays of money, and then, in the next breath cry about losing "States and County Rights." We feel the existing 25 feet is sufficient for the present traffic, now and in the future.

The County Officials should desist from bragging about their low budget and stop taking credit for accomplishments made possible by "easy" money and "donated" property. We don't think it is an imposition on their part to maintain their own roads or on the taxpayers of the County to pay for using same.

Political Notebook

WASHINGTON (NEA) — A search for new ways and means to achieve closer cooperation and greater unity in the North Atlantic Treaty Organization is to be made at the Atlantic Convention meeting in Paris Jan. 8-20.

The hope is that the 99 leading citizen delegates from the 15 NATO countries will come up with something more than high-minded resolutions emerging usually from such sessions, to which no one pays much attention.

The United States delegation of 20 is headed by former Secretary of State Christian A. Herter and former Undersecretary Will Clayton. It includes Elmo Roper, William A. M. Burden, Eric Johnston, William F. Knowland and others of comparable stature. Britain, France and Germany have 10 delegates each, Canada 7, others fewer, down to Iceland and Luxembourg's 2.

This parley was dreamed up after the 1959 Atlantic Congress of 650 citizens of NATO countries in London. That group was too unwieldy, so it recommended this smaller gathering.

Both of these meetings were called by the NATO Parliamentarians Conference, made up of representatives from the lawmaking bodies of the 15 NATO countries. Their as-

ignment to the nongovernmental leaders is to find a fresh approach to strengthen the Atlantic Alliance politically.

The parent NATO is supposed to supply the military unity for international defense against aggression. In the economic field, there is close co-operation through the new Organization for Economic Co-operation and Development — OECD. This will be strengthened by the Common Market, which is being enlarged and expanded to increase trade.

The Atlantic Convention is sure to talk about that, particularly since the two chairmen of the U. S. delegation are also authors of the Congressional Economic Committee's brilliant report on Foreign Economic Policy.

But major attention will be given to the weakest link in the Atlantic Alliance. This is that it cannot present a united front to the world, military or economically, unless these policies are backed by greater political unity.

There is no fixed agenda. The convention's function is exploratory, to find new answers. But among the answers it will tackle, these are considered important:

One admitted shortcoming of the present NATO is that its decisions must be made by

unanimous vote. The smallest country can thus veto its 14 partners. Some system of weighted voting may be considered to get majority decisions. It could be based on population, gross national product or NATO contributions.

This problem will become increasingly important if NATO is made a nuclear power, with missiles and warheads of its own not under one-country control. To prevent misuse of these weapons, there must be civilian political control over the military. The problem is how to set it up.

This is only one part of the bigger question of what form of political organization can best achieve the aims of the Atlantic Community—what it shall have for executive, legislative and judicial authorities and how much power each should have.

From here the subject evolves into how the NATO countries can achieve a common foreign policy. Certainly the present disagreements over an approach to Russia on the Berlin issue and the UN Congo policy do not show the world and Atlantic Community united for common objectives.

Coordination of monetary policies is considered essential if NATO military, economic and political objectives are to be properly financed.

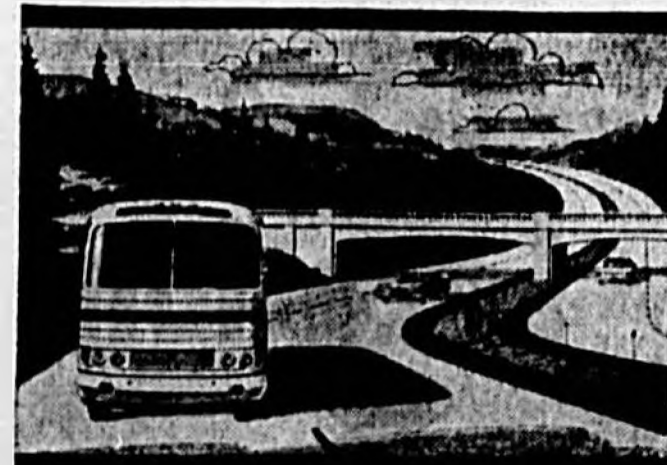

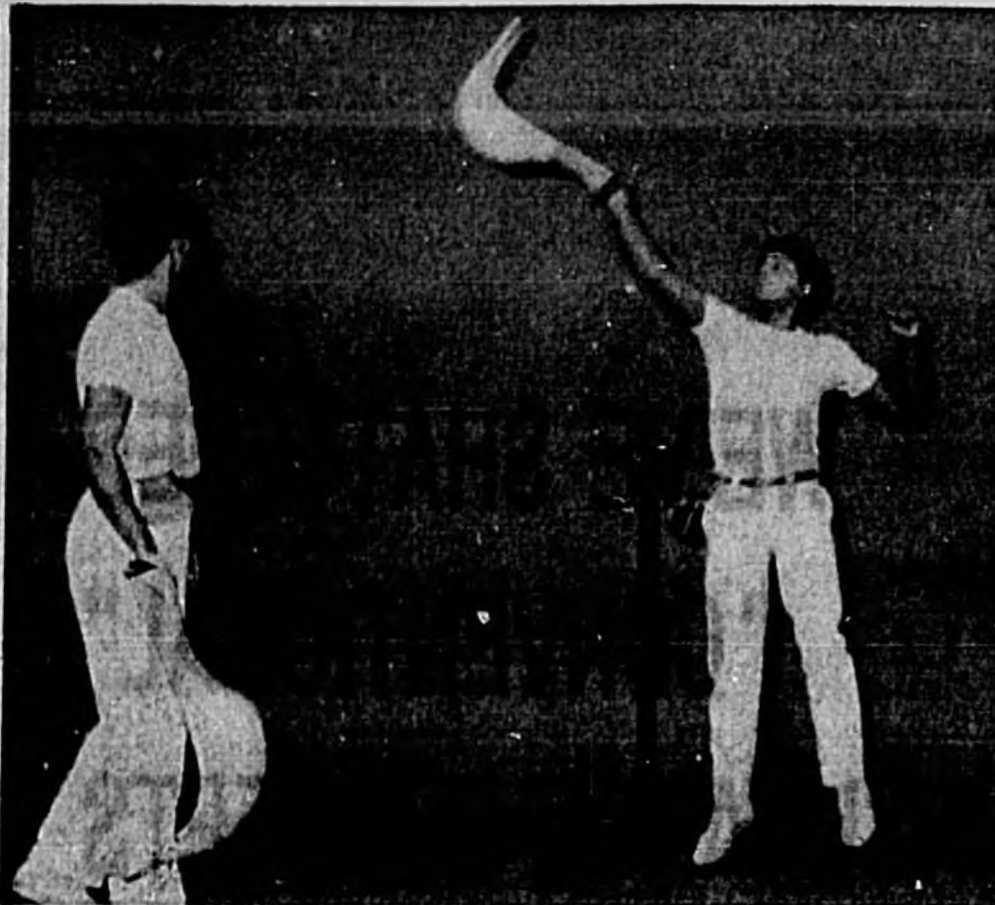

This week's articles will be concerned primarily with handling the trump suit. I will start with a rather simple hand.

All South has to do to bring home his contract is to win the opening club lead, cash his ace and king of spades, and go after the diamonds.

West will make his ace of diamonds and two trump tricks, but that will be all.

Simple enough, yet there are two easy ways to lose the hand. One way is to try to make an overtrick. If South leads out three rounds of trumps, he will make that overtrick if trumps break 3-3, but with the actual break West will cash two high trumps and force South with a club before South has a chance to knock out the ace of diamonds. South will wind up going down four tricks.

The actual declarer found another way to lose the hand.

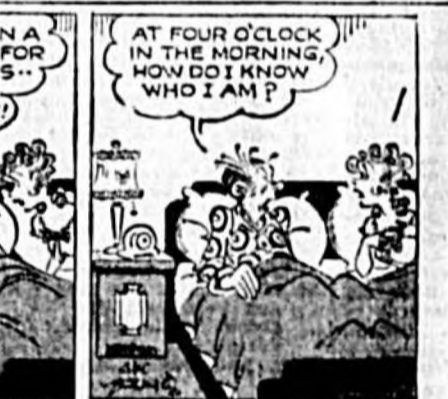

The supported churches and armed forces activities

and were instrumental in starting several children going to Sunday School.

The club helped raise money for the band's trip to Washington, D. C., and sent a boy to Key Club International. They also helped with Scouting in the area, helped with adult training courses, helped with guided tours at Camp LaNoChee, and conducted Cub roundtables.

The Underprivileged Child committee, paid for tonsil-

ectomies for two children, bought clothing for several children, paid for dental work for several children, purchased a hearing aid for a child and worked with other county agencies in providing help for needy children.

The Marianna plan group has worked to help eight boys in the industrial schools, kept in touch with 26 boys by sending letters and cards, and worked with the county judge's office for closer and

better co-ordination.

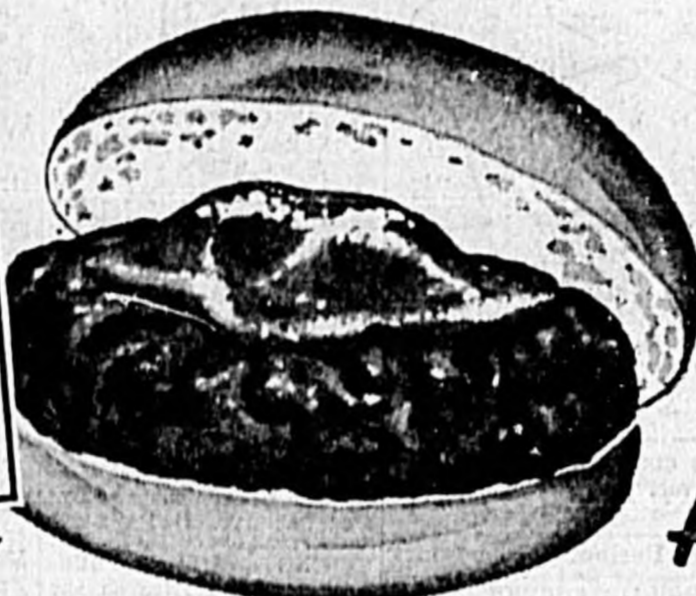
Members of the agriculture and conservation committee worked in many areas, including the Science Fair, county fair, 4-H projects and short course, and many local agricultural problems.
