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YOUTH OF EIGHT NEAR-SAVANT IN ASTROLOGY FIELD

William Gannaway, Living in Knoxville, Tenn., Tells How He Has Come To Know Stars Through Extensive Study

Editor's Note
Youth of eight with knowledge such as only a student could have in the study of astronomy is the eight-year-old William Gannaway Brownlow II of Knoxville, Tenn.

If in the early evening you look toward the southern section of this month's sky, you will see four very bright stars that make a large diamond.

The lowest one, farthest from the east, is Sirius, the brightest star in the heavens. Sirius is only eight light years distant from the earth. A light year refers to the distance light travels in a year—six million million miles.

At the top point of the diamond, much higher up and to the south is Alderbaran, the red eye of the bull.

The other two corners of the diamond are in the constellation Orion.

The upper one is Betelgeuse, which is 400 million miles through and so large that if the sun were in its center, its circumference would take in the orbits of both the earth and Mars.

The other star is Rigel, a white, hot star of great size, 400 light years distant. It is one of the greatest of the suns. Our own sun at this distance could be seen only with a good telescope.

Between Betelgeuse and Rigel are three bright stars in a line which form Orion's belt from which hangs his sword. In the sword is the great nebula of Orion—a glowing gas which even a strong field glass will show only as a small patch of light. In this nebula is Theta, a quadruple star.

Above Alderbaran are the Pleiades, which everybody knows. Higher up in the east, above Sirius, is the first magnitude star Procyon, in the "Little Dog." Higher still are the twins, Castor and Pollux, and overhead is Capella, the celestial dog.

Castor is a double star which my telescope shows as two suns turning around each other. Each of these also is double, but astronomers know this only by studying their light with a spectroscope—they are so close together.

This whole region has the most bright stars that can be seen with the naked eye of any region in the sky.

Jupiter is low in the southwest at this time of year, and is bright enough to be seen before it gets dark. Mars is to the south high in the sky. Both Mars and Alderbaran are red, but Mars is brighter and makes a steadier light, without twinkling.

NEW INVENTION TO BE GREATEST, ASSERTS EDISON

Wizard Of Menlo Park Hopes To Perfect Apparatus That Will Enable U. S. To Meet Own Demand For Rubber

(Copyright, 1927, By International News Service)

FOIT MYRIS, Fla., Mar. 2.—Thomas A. Edison is working in his little shop at his winter home here these days on his master invention which, when perfected, will, he hopes and believes, make it possible for the United States to raise sufficient rubber to supply her own needs and which will have a revolutionary effect on the South by displacing cotton growing with rubber production.

The world-famous inventor revealed this to International News Service here today in an exclusive two-hour interview in which he made known his long-cherished ambition to make this country free from dependence on other nations for its supply of crude rubber.

Edison said he was well aware of the fact that the United States is solely dependent on foreign countries for her supply of crude rubber and declared he is determined that this nation shall not be isolated from the rubber belt and face the possible crisis of being entirely cut off from rubber supply in case of war.

In making known his plans for an American rubber industry, the famous inventor whose guiding genius has contributed immeasurably to the advancement of civilization in recent decades pointed out that in the present age and in the future transportation will be largely dependent on rubber.

The experiments he is now making Edison said, probably will result in wholesale production of rubber in all territories in America South of Savannah, Ga. He thinks it will supplant the cotton industry in the southern territory and reap greater profits for the planters.

In Africa where bulk crude rubber is raised, Edison asserted, labor can be had for 20 cents a day. The labor problem would make the industry under present conditions prohibitive. With common labor calling for \$2.50 and \$4.00 a day,

U. S. Airmen Again Halted By Death

BUENOS AYRES, Mar. 2. (INS) Tragically that seems to stalk the flight of the American army good-will fliers today caused a postponement of the flight to Asuncion, out of respect to Captain Arturo Cuto, who died suddenly yesterday after the funeral of the two American aviators killed here on Saturday.

Captain Cuto, director of naval aviation for Argentine, collapsed while acting as pull-bearer for Captain Woolsey, one of the dead American fliers. As the body of Captain Woolsey was being removed from the military club, Captain Cuto attempted to carry too much of the weight of the coffin and in the excessive heat he collapsed.

The American fliers postponed their flight today in order to attend the funeral of Captain Cuto this afternoon.

The cost of rubber production in the United States would run higher than the actual value of the product.

So Edison is now striving to overcome the labor problem by his master invention in the form of a machine which will crush the rubber plant, press the sap and separate the liquid rubber from the rosin.

He is working night and day in his small workshop here and the experiment is going on the same bench where he perfected the electric light globe and the talking machine many years ago.

The electrical wizard is solving the many problems of his rubber pressing device. He asserted and when it finally is perfected, he believes it will be the greatest of all of his inventions.

Greatly interested in rubber production and confident that he has found the most productive plant adapted to the soil and climate of the South, Edison is spending his entire time and efforts on the rubber problem.

With three acres of land directly across from his estate here, planted in Madagascar rubber vines, different from the rubber tree in size and growth, the inventor stated today that he is pleased with the progress made by the plants since last season. They are now some three feet high and trail in the form of a grapevine.

While final tests have not yet been made, Edison estimates the vines will yield six per cent pure rubber, far more than the average rubber tree which, he pointed out, contains too much rosin to make the rubber worth separating.

With the use of the machine which is the making, Edison figured vines producing four per cent rubber will cover the cost of production and with such a handsome profit to be derived from proper cultivation of the plants, he believes many cotton growers of the South will abandon the cotton market and enter a new field—the

American rubber industry.

Working in close corporation with Edison in the venture, Henry Ford, the automobile monarch, has obtained a large quantity of rubber seed from Madagascar and ground is being prepared here for planting.

"I realize one of the greatest needs of the United States today is American-grown rubber of commercial value," Edison said. "It can be had and I am going to produce it. If I have to work twenty-four hours a day until it is done."

"The people of the nation give little thought to rubber production but we cannot move without rubber. In the present generation we depend almost entirely on rubber for transportation, since the automobile and motor truck must have tires upon which to run."

"Everything except rubber is going into three manufactured today. In case of war we would be cut off from rubber and we would soon feel the pang of rubber can be successfully grown right here in the southern part of the United States. We have known that it could be grown but we were stumped on how to extract it from the plant. To attempt it by hand would be too expensive and I hope to eliminate that expense with the machine I am working on which will not only reap vines from the field but will press and separate the liquid. We will then make use of the fibre in the manufacture of ropes and other products."

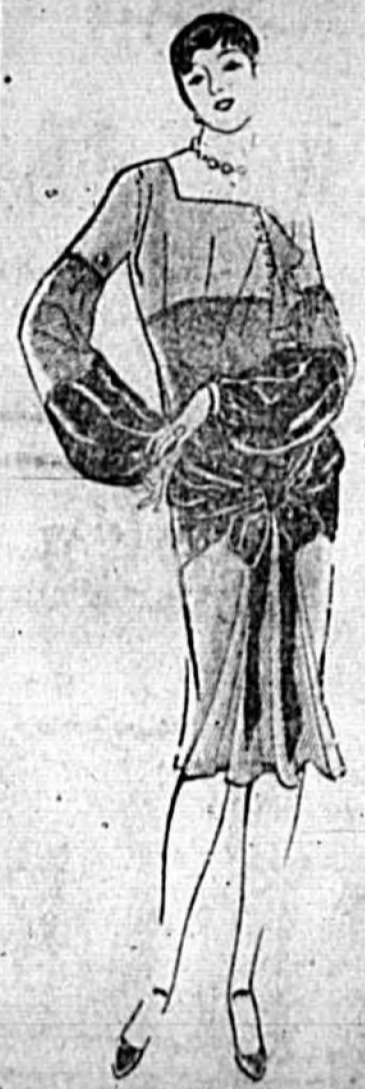
