

pressing anew their confidence in the present farm program. Chairman Cooley (D-NC) of the house agriculture committee told newsmen he has no plan to bring

the Brannan Plan up for a vote in the new session of Congress. "It was defeated last Fall, and regard this as its final deleat in the Blat Congress," he said.

Senator Anderson (D-NM) who preceded Charles F. Brannan as Mr. Truman's Secretary of Agriculture, said:

"I feel the present legislation should be given an opportunity to operate before we launch a new program. I don't think sentiment of congress is much different now

than it was last fall. Brannan's proposal would use federal funds to pay direct subsidies to farmers and thereby make some foods cheaper for

consumers.
In contrast, the program passed in the closing days of the last session seeks, through govern-ment crop loans and purchases of surpluses, to maintain near parity prices for many farm ommodities.
(Parity is a price calculated to

The Washington Bread Case

In April, 1941, the anti-trust lawyers brought a criminal suit in Washington, D. C.

They charged that the A&P, two grocery chain competitors, two labor unions and other good American citizens had conspired to fix the price of bread.





