**Controlling Naval Gunfire Was Big Problem In Palau**

PELELIU, Palau Islands (labeled)—By the time all First Division Marines had landed on Peleliu, there was one man—including the Japanese—for every two square yards on the island. The problem of naval gunfire support clearly was a delicate one.

By noon on D-day plus one patrol, mortar sections and whole companies of Marines were across the airport and heading for the precipitous coral ridges where Japs were holed up in the stoupest defenses yet encountered in the Pacific. Each day as the Marines drove forward, the problem became tougher.

To control its gunfire, the Navy sent to the division a naval gunfire liaison officer, Navy Lt. Marvin E. Morton, Jr., of Little Rock, Ark.

This is how he worked: The forward company of the 1st Battalion, 28th Marine Regiment, discovers an enemy

blockhouse on which naval gunfire will be required. He passes his information to the battalion naval gunfire liaison officer.

Can Disapprove Request If the request is satisfactory in the opinion of the battalion officer, a support ship delivers the fire. The regimental or division naval gunfire officer can disapprove the request.

The First Marines regimental gunfire liaison officer denies the request if it would jeopardize the lives of Marines of his regiment, or conflict with another firing problem. Lt. Morton, at the division command post, checks the request against the whole picture of the situation and action at the moment.

It sounds like a slow process, but it isn't. Only two minutes elapsed in some instances between the observer's request and the first shell fired from the ship.

Japs Well Employed "It is difficult to make a definite estimate of the effects of naval gunfire in an operation of this sort," Lt. Morton pointed out. "The Japs were well employed. I saw numerous instances where naval gunfire had destroyed gun emplacements, ammunition dumps, bomb shelters, buildings and tanks. Just how many Japs were killed by it, nobody can say.

"One night, naval gunfire destroyed 14 Japanese barges. Whether they were attempting to bring in reinforcements or evacuate Japanese, I don't know. But they were not successful, in any event.

"The fire support ships did a splendid job, firing all missions that were requested.

"One night, noise was heard off Orange Beach and we suspected that the Japs might be trying an amphibious counter attack. Starshell illumination was requested. This was furnished in exactly two minutes.

Extensive Preparation Extensive pre-invasion preparation for the control of naval gunfire was made. Lt. Morton assisted in the formulation of the naval gunfire plan for the operation, co-ordinated the gunfire plan with the air and artillery plan, indoctrinated officers and men of the Division in naval gunfire and checked communications and control nets aboard the command ship and ashore.

Summarizing the action as he saw it, Lt. Morton said: "The naval gunfire in this operation performed its mission admirably." Naturally, there were emplacements that were not destroyed. There were caves in the hills that perhaps could never be destroyed by naval gunfire even had we known in advance of their location. And where em-

## Indian A W O L 4 Days Seeking Sniper's Scalp

### Chief Chukima Leaves 90th Division In Ger- many, Joins Tanks

WITH GENERAL PATTON'S ARMY, Dec. 8.—Carl Chukima, known as "Chief," a thirty-eight-year-old Hopi Indian from the Oraibi Reservation near Flagstaff, Ariz., has just returned from a four day hunting trip.

A sniper had wounded one of the Chief's white American friends, and Chukima, who is a private in Company B, 815th Engineers, of the 90th Division, appointed himself a one-man war party to avenge the attack.

Captain Clarence Symes, of Lubbock, Tex., the company commander, was about to list Chukima as missing in action on the unit's morning report on the day the Indian stoically resumed his place on the engineer road gang.

"He comes and goes," explained Captain Symes, "it's very difficult on occasion."

### Angered by Sniper

The last time Captain Symes saw Chukima was in the German town of Butzdorf, which the 368th Infantry and the engineers were attempting to clean up. A sniper winged a man standing next to the Chief as the two were leaving a house.

"It start making me mad," explained the stone-faced Hopi, "I go house—one from one. That evening I still in town looking for sniper. Next day I stay. In afternoon I keep looking for sniper but no find. I ask boy and he say infantry have pull out and that evening I joined the tanks."

Chukima decided to fight the war for a while with the armor, and stayed two days with the 10th Armored Division, going out on duty and a guard trick.

"After three days," continued the Hopi, "I ask boys where infantry is. I told one tank going out of town I go with him. I hitch hike to where I find 90th Division M.P. He tell me where headquarters are. I come back."

Chukima pulled two white feathers from his pocket.

"I wear them in helmet," he explained, "but I nearly lose them in tank so put them in pocket. One feather is to keep me strong. Other to take care of 90th Division."

The Hopi tribe had at an all night ceremonial rite over the feathers before presenting them to his warrior.

Back with his outfit, the Chief took a couple of days to track down a group of Germans, estimated to have been fifteen in number. The trail terminated in a house in a small village, where one of the residents told him that the enemy had changed clothes and disappeared.

### Ran Sixty Miles in Day

Chukima has the stamina of a well-oiled machine. When he was sixteen years old he ran sixty miles one day, carrying his ceremonial mask and costume to join his tribesmen in a traditional Hopi dance to ask the gods for rain.

"I stopped once at a spring to eat my little lunch," Chukima said, "but only rest short time. I arrived before sundown."

The dance, which lasted all night, was followed by rain the next day.

For relaxation during pre-war days the Indian chased horses. It's easy, according to Chukima, "just chase 'em all day over the hills, he explained in his guttural monotone. "They lay down when they get tired."

Of course, there's the element of time.

"You start early in the morning. They give out some time in the afternoon," the Hopi declared.

The 90th Division's chief likes his work, but he misses his tribe. "Would like to see friends," Chukima mumbled wishfully. "No talk my language for long time."

Before sunrise every morning "Chief" Chukima usually sows a few grains of crushed corn into the French soil as a petition to the maize goddess to look with favor on the activities of the 90th Division. It has worked like a charm, for the 90th has fought its way all across France and is still going strong at the German frontier.

## Former NMB Chairman Urges Action To Avoid Increasing Labor Strife

NEW YORK CITY, Dec. 8. (Special)—An immediate conference of labor, business and government representatives to adopt a co-operative national labor policy is imperative to avoid an outbreak of ruinous labor disputes, declares William M. Leiserson, former chairman of the National Mediation Board, who outlines in the January issue of The American Magazine a formula for dealing with a situation he says is "now approaching the explosive stage."

Failure of the Roosevelt administration to develop a definite labor policy has resulted in a system of handling disputes which "drifts from bad to worse" and has given the War Labor Board the split personality of mutual friend and judge in addition to that of cop in enforcing wage controls against workers and employers, states Mr. Leiserson.

This recognized authority on labor problems contends that the right of the Director of Economic Stabilization to reject a wage raise approved by the WLB "has seriously undermined confidence in the independence of the board."

"Most of our current strikes," asserts Mr. Leiserson, "are directed against confusions and delay in the government machinery for settling disputes. Sometimes they are directed against the workers' own labor leaders for failure to get action from government agencies."

"Three years after Pearl Harbor we still have no definite policy toward labor during the war, or plan for labor after the war. We have met each labor crisis with an improvisation which, while patching the immediate breach, has generated new misunderstandings of its own."

Mr. Leiserson says "both labor and industry dread what may happen as the war draws to an end" because "if strikes then get out of control it will not merely cripple industry, it will damage the labor movement itself, disgust our returning soldiers and sailors and harm every single one of us. Public opinion can be induced to bring labor and management to the point of mutual agreement on the fundamentals of a national labor policy if the President will put this squarely up to a Labor conference" as did Woodrow Wilson during World War I.

Unlike Mr. Wilson, President Roosevelt, he states, permitted a labor conference called shortly after Pearl Harbor to adjourn without establishing definite policies to guide the War Labor Board.

"It dodged or evaded the two basic issues, wages and union shop, which have bedeviled the labor situation ever since," charges Mr. Leiserson.

"The employer representatives (to such a conference) should not be hand-picked by the government, but should stand for the views of industry as a whole. The labor representatives should include, besides CIO and AFL, representatives of the Railroads Brotherhoods and other recognized independent unions.

"Such a conference, it seems to me, might well agree on some such policies as these: That works and employers, in any labor dispute, first make a serious, bona-fide effort to resolve their differences by collective bargaining and mutual agreement within a fixed time limit.

"Next, that government mediation machinery, no scattered through many agencies, be reorganized and centralized. That arbitration be recognized as a separate function, to be encouraged on a voluntary basis if mediation fails. Any top labor board that is set up should confine it-

## Army Assigns Two Crews For Most Bombers

### Marshall Calls Move Plan To Demoralize By Sustained Power

WASHINGTON, Dec. 8. (AP)—General George C. Marshall, Chief of Staff of the United States Army, has revealed that most of America's war planes have been provided with two crews as part of the technique of demoralizing the Germans with a "flood of sustained power."

Writing in the "United States at War" edition of the "Army and Navy Journal" to be issued

Thursday, the top man of the United States Army observed: "Wars are the great tragedies of the human race and every effort should be made to avoid their prolongation by simple means."

Yet it probably has been a good thing to have the great military power of the United States fully demonstrated in the battle field, as demonstrated that the world must know for the future that the democracy can and will create a military force sufficient to overwhelm prospective aggressors of the world to come.

Recommending the reasons for American success, General Marshall said that "the 'Big Boy' carefully trained replacement and all our units continued in action with full ranks, stimulated by the presence of new men in their winning the approval of

their veteran brothers in arms. Applying the same principle to the air forces in the form of two crews for nearly every type of the staff to be kept in constant operation until they are ready for the operators."

The fact that most of the Army corps and divisions in the great breakthrough carried off by General Patton's Third Army had the precision and accuracy whatever was the situation of efficiency in the air, the great training units of the Army were thus "Big Boy" formed.

The machinegun section members of his section and told them to use the new found gun until their own was ready.

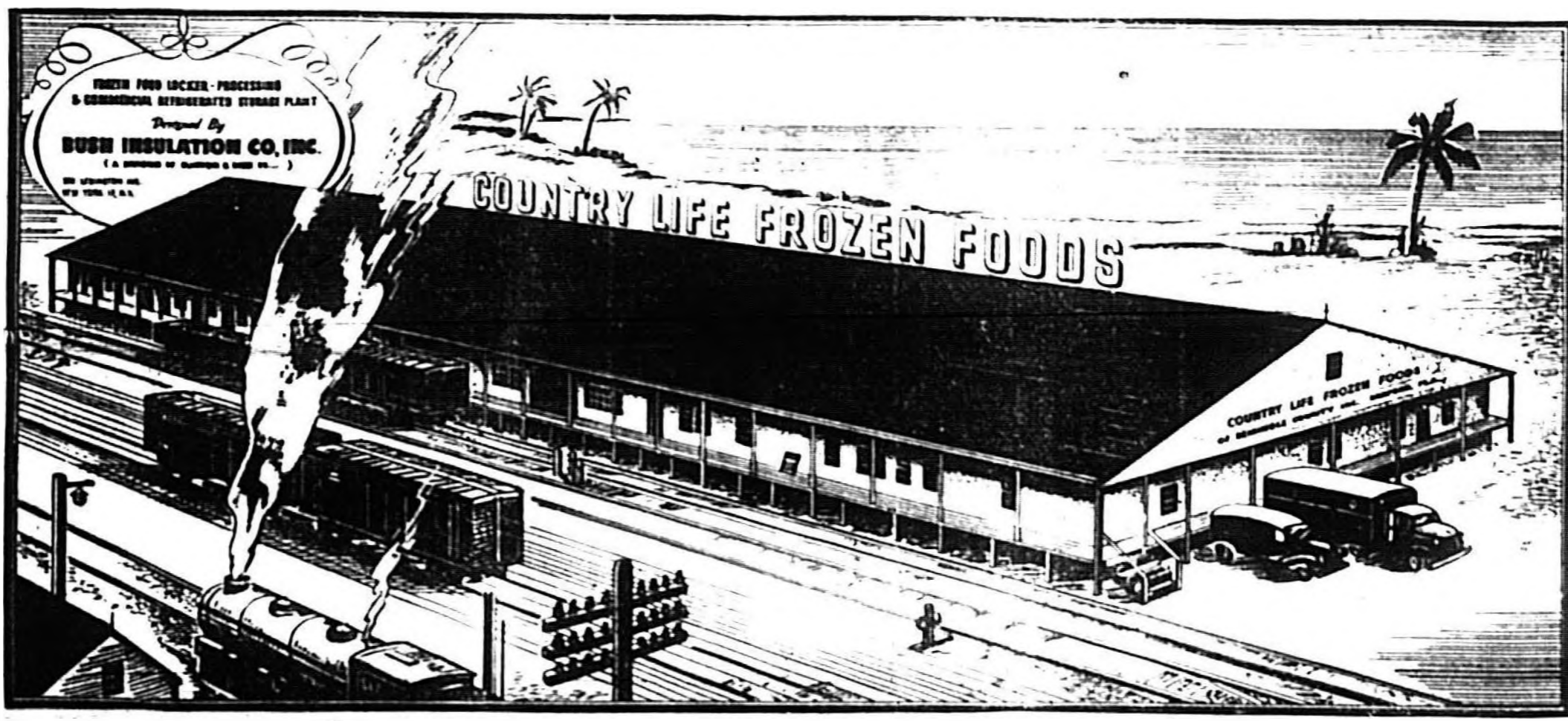

## U. S. Troops On Leyte Take Port Of Ormoc

### 6 More Jap Admirals And One General Reported By Tokyo Killed In Action

Ormoc, with its major port, fell today four days after the 77th Division made daring landings three miles away, while Tokyo claimed it sank two transports, a cruiser and destroyer, and two barges in an air attack south-east of Leyte.

A series of superfortress raids on Tokyo was reported by the Japanese who said fires were started by incendiary bombs but were put out immediately.

In China, the resurgent Chinese were rounding up the heels of the Japs retreating from Kweichow province. Only one of the two Jap forces which crossed into Kweichow province still remains. Chungking announced the Japanese were chased out of Kweichow into Kwangsi.

Seven more Japanese admirals, Vice-admiral Chuchi Nigume supreme Commander of the Japanese Naval forces was killed in action on Saipan Island May 7 at 74. Eighteen generals have died since May 24.

Capture of Ormoc drove a solid wedge between the Japanese still holding out on the west coast of Leyte to the south and those in the Ormoc corridor stretching 15 miles north from the port.

The U. S. Seventh division driving up the west coast meant a junction with the right wing of the 77th in a pincer assault on thousands of trapped Japanese 26th division troops. The enemy was pocketed in a narrow strip along a mile along the coast and approximately 2000 were killed after Gen. MacArthur had led his men ashore on the east coast of Leyte on Oct. 20 and began driving across the island.

In an attempt at diversion, about 200 enemy paratroopers were dropped in the San Pablo area (4) but the bulk of these forces were quickly wiped out. ## Shortage Of Food Reported In Greek City
