

Girl Athlete Is Newest Threat To Amateur Golfers

 NEW YORK, Feb. 10. — May you didn't see that little item out of Los Angeles the other day, it was just a tiny squinted eye for golf. It said that America's greatest all-around woman athlete was eligible for amateur golf competition.

The Babe, now Mrs. George Kahanian, was ruled ineligible by the U. S. Golf Association in 1936 because of her professionalism in other sports. Two years later, she applied for reinstatement as an amateur and now her request has been granted.

Babe was a golf star from the start, just as she was a standout in every other sport she took up. She shot a 95 her first round, soon chopped that down into the low 80's, and won medalist honors in the first tournament in which she played with a 77. Six months later she won the 1935 Texas championship.

Shortly afterwards, the U. S. G. A. barred her from amateur tournaments but she continued to play in open events and won the Western open in 1940, and the San Francisco match play open last year.

Babe quickly gained fame as a long hitter (she knocked out 200 yard shots with a putter under the aggression it was a No. 1 iron).

The last time we saw her play she was weak with the short irons, losing most of her strokes around the green. If she has improved her short game, she'll give any of the girls a battle and beat most of them.

A few years ago this observer saw Babe play in her first open tournament against men. It was at Hot Springs, Va., and we recall how a pair of name pros ruined their chances of winning by trying to outslug Babe from the tee—and failing.

That same journey also saw the debut of another star, a local country assistant pro. This competitor grabbed the lead and held it for three rounds. He banged one into the woods in the last round, lost a half dozen strokes trying to get out, and lost the tournament to Billy Burke. The youngster's name was Babe.

Babe first caught the national headlines in 1930 when the women's national track and field championships were held in Dallas. She set U. S. records in the 100 and 200 yard dashes, and finished second in the broad jump. Mail Restrictions Are Clarified By Local Postmaster

Complaints from the public of delayed or lost mail to members of the armed forces indicate that there is wide misunderstanding of how this mail is handled and the difficulty of delivering mail overseas, Mrs. Mable Holly, acting postmaster, stated this morning as she outlined the procedure and restrictions involved in mailing parcels and letters to service men.

Reflecting that the mail system is more satisfactory than during the last war, there have been fewer complaints from anxious relatives and friends, although the volume of mail is larger. A memorandum from the postmaster general states:

Delays in the mail to armed forces may be caused by various factors. Heavily continued. Transportation of the mail sometimes must be postponed so that more urgent need for arms, food or more military and naval personnel may be filled first. Ship sinkings account for much loss of mail. Censorship holds up many letters.

Ships must travel in convoys, in the interest of safety, and a convoy can start only when the last ship is loaded and ready to depart. This tends to slow up the voyage, as does the fact that convoy sailing includes round-about means of reaching a destination. Incorrect or incomplete addresses on mail makes it impossible to deliver the article.

Very small letters are the most satisfactory means of corresponding with men and women overseas since they are given priority over ordinary mail. Mail to the United States from overseas is more rapid and regular because ships and planes on return trips have more space available and the location of addresses in this country is more stable than soldiers who are constantly being transferred and moved around overseas.

No parcel shall be accepted for mailing to personnel of the United States Army, Marine Corps, or Coast Guard who are stationed overseas if it weighs more than 5 pounds, or exceeds 15 inches in length, or 36 inches in length and girth combined. This includes parcels addressed in care of the Postmaster at New York, N. Y., or San Francisco, Calif.

For the present, it is not necessary that an approval request be obtained from the addresses cycling, speed skating, handball and squash.

Prices And Wages

The same thing is true about wage-raising. There are always some wage inequalities here and there that need to be ironed out, just as there are always some price injustices to correct.

It should be borne in mind constantly, by everybody concerned, that monkeying with prices and wages is dangerous. Many foreign countries have already been sucked into the vortex of inflation, bringing immense losses to millions of people.

And it is so easy to start the inflation process! A little pressure here for higher wages, a little pressure there for higher prices, a feeling that "if they can get it, we should get it, too."

The only safe way in a time like this is to "peg" prices and wages firmly to solid ground, and not let anybody monkey with the pegs. Britain and Canada have done it, and this country can do it.

Sieges That Failed

The bloody failure of the siege of Stalingrad ranks with other great unsuccessful sieges of history, like the two Turkish sieges of Vienna in 1529 and 1683, and the Athenian failure to capture Syracuse in Sicily in 413 B. C.

In all these cases but one city lay between the assailants and apparently unlimited progress. Had the Germans captured Stalingrad and organized it as a fortress, they would have made immensely difficult the Russian defense of Leningrad, Moscow and the Caucasus.

Equally large stakes depended on the resistance of Vienna and Syracuse; the Turkish conquest of Austria on the one hand, the Athenian subjugation of Sicily and Italy on the other, with the resultant loss to the world of the great career of Rome.

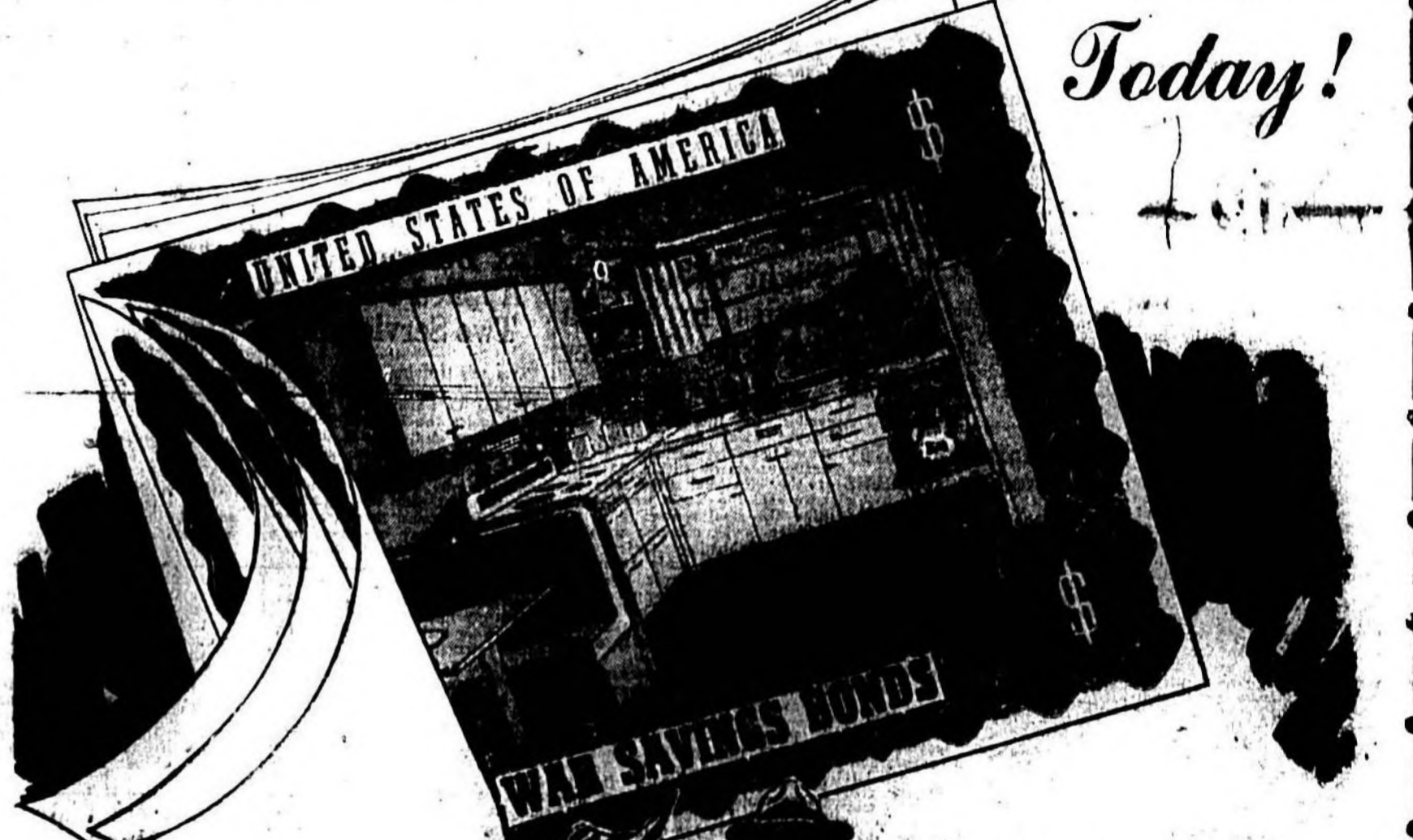

Dog Champ Does His Bit Aiding War Charities

NEW YORK, Feb. 11. (AP)—He's only a little fellow about 18 inches high—but he's a champion of champions, this Noriday Saddle!

In the dog record books, they call him a smooth-haired Fox Terrier. He has won 56 "best of show" titles and sired more than 20 champions, both records. He has earned \$10,150 for war charities since Pearl Harbor. He has rallied every other pet dog to do his part for victory.

So you can't blame Saddle for having a proud bark these days as he romps over his master's 100-acre estate at Old Westbury, L. I., chasing the rabbits and squirrels.

If he could talk, the perky little black and white would tell you of two horrible experiences he had, probably like this:

"I was whelped in Workop, England, some five years ago. My mother had crawled off to a far corner of the Cowards' estate for my birth, and the first thing I knew, I was lying in mud with the rain beating down on me.

"My mother grabbed me in her mouth and headed for the warm

house. I was so tiny and dirty that the kitchen maid thought my mother had a rat in her mouth. She pulled me out and was just going to throw me into a stove, when mother's yelps brought Mr. and Mrs. Coward.

"After a hot bath, I was named Noriday, because that was the name of the Cowards' stable, and Saddle because Mrs. Coward thought she saw what looked like a saddle on my back.

"My life was uneventful until I heard that I was going to America. I'll never forget the trip over. Like many another first-time seagoer, I nearly died. If it hadn't been for the kindness of a ship's butcher, who rescued me from the deck to which I had crawled, and furnished me, I wouldn't be here today.

"Since his arrival in the United States, Saddle has lived at the Long Island home of James M. Austin. Up to Dec. 7, 1941, dog shows and an average of 300 fan mail letters a month, kept him pretty busy, but since that memorable day, the little fellow has been doing his bit in the war effort.

Austin gives the black and white credit for inspiring the War Dog Fund of the Dogs for Defense, Inc. "I was sitting there with Saddle one night, thinking about the war, and as I looked into his eyes I thought of what a little fellow like him could do

in the war. Like a flash, the plan for the War Dog Fund came to me.

"After weeks of study, and conferences with Washington officials, the plan was put into operation. It gives the pet dogs at home a chance to serve their country. The Army and Navy want 200,000 dogs for the K-9 corps. It will cost about \$3,000,000 to assemble and train them.

There are 20,000,000 dogs in the United States. All of them can't join the Army or Navy, but they can enlist in the War Dog Fund.

"When a dog enlists, he receives a certificate, a Dog for Defense Tag, and an Army or Navy 'rank.' Contributions of \$1 make the dog a 'private' or a 'sergeant'; \$5, a 'sergeant or a chief petty officer'; \$10, 'lieutenant' or 'ensign'; \$15, 'captain' or a 'naval lieutenant'; \$20, 'major' or 'commander'; \$25, 'colonel' or a 'naval captain'; \$100, 'general' or an 'admiral'.

To help swell the growing fund for war dogs, the Westminster Kennel Club will hold its 67th Dog Show at Madison Square Garden, Feb. 11 and 12 for the benefit of Dogs for Defense. A dramatic feature will be the showing of champions headed by Noriday Saddle, the dog who was too little to go to war, but who is doing his bit to end it.

Freckled-faced broad-shouldered, spindle-legged Bob Fitzsimmons discovered his new famous snarl punch when he knocked out Jim Corbett. Fitz was an ungainly knock-

out, but through men with long arms and a knockout punch 'at the end of them he had a peculiar style and was easy to hit but if he hit you first, you seldom recovered. Fitz's style was both simple and his toes. He was always shuffling in, trying to get you to lead, and then countering with a terrific hook to the stomach that knocked the breath out of you. He'd stun you with the punch and was quick to see that you were ready for his short right hand that always found its way into a fighter's ribs, rarely got as after that one.

He was about six feet tall but gave weight more than 175. Fitz had shoulders like a giant but from his shoulders and chest down he tapered off until he had practically no hips. His legs were long and bony, and as he shuffled toward his opponent, he appeared more knock-kneed than ever. This gave him great hitting power.

Fitz never bothered to block punches. He raised upon his eyes to see what you had in mind and he would try to get you to punch at him the way he wanted, then counter with his favorite left hook.

Fitzsimmons' one fault was that he himself was easy to hit, he took chances with knockout punches. Although he would not say Joe Louis with his crocheting style, I would say that Remy Robelt would have been a huge victim of the Brown Bomber.

He sprang from the table as Fitz as a panther, ran across the room with his hand extended and belted Fitz to the champion. "Hello, Fitz! Don't without another word, he ran back to the rickety table. Fitz groined at the big fellow as he walked out. Fitz was silent as he undressed but finally he said to Julian, "It's a big fellow, isn't he? My old man, I'll bet."

After the seventh round of the fight, in which Fitz was being beaten although he had provoked Jeffries' face out of shape, Fitz said to Julian, "I'll try to knock 'im over the round."

After Experience, Girl Is Willing To Pay For Milk

FARMINGDALE, N. Y., Feb. 11.—You milk a cow on the right side—always.

"I'm just a city girl—but I learned that during the day I spent being on the ropes at the New York State Institute of Applied Agriculture here, where 60 girls a month will graduate to farms, they hope—to help alleviate an expected shortage of farm help."

Most of the girls joined because they love the outdoor life and meet the requirements of not being in an essential war job. But with a need for 3,500,000 additional farm hands this year these transplanted country girls may help keep us city people buttered on our bread.

"This bevy of serious looking girls means business. They don't want the farmer to get the impression they are glamor girls just because they're from the city," said one girl.

"With eggs 70c a dozen, a chicken in the country is of more value right now than a chicadee in the city."

"Please don't say we're from Broadway—we aren't," said a Connecticut girl.

"After all," said another, "we must like the life or we wouldn't have well-paid jobs for an extended 8 to 10 months and keep—and buy our own work clothes—besides."

"All the rope-too-easy chores on the farm such as greasing tractors, caring for livestock, chopping wood, and milk are being done with zest. There are classes in poultry, animal husbandry and

rural culture.

The farmhand, Bill Minkler, says: "The girls are downright serious—but it takes longer than a month to learn farm routine."

"There are milking machines but the cows are being milked by hand—at 5 A. M.!! My instructor, an expert milker, gave me all the details before I tackled my tuberculin-tested Banga-free Betsy.

"The cows near leg should be back just so much—my head should rest against the right side, elbow in so I could sense a kick. The pail should be between the knees.

"No sooner shown than tried. No sooner tried than no milk! If she'd been a contented cow well, maybe. But she was more set on upsetting plans; moving her leg up, swung her tail and moaned.

"Even Felix, the cat, sauntered away to better his interests.

Gunnery Students At Tyndall Field Are Put Through

PANAMA CITY, Feb. 11.—So you think you are pretty good because you can stand in one spot and shoot down street "birds" as they come sailing past you?

Well, you're sometimes while standing in the back of a truck going down a lumpy road. That's the kind of shooting soldiers at the Army Air Force flexible gunnery school at Tyndall Field here have to do.

That is the aerial gunnery student's first taste of shooting moving objects from a moving base. It is a preliminary to learning to fire a 30 caliber machine gun from his own lightning fast plane at an enemy trying to shoot him down or to bomb his business on the ground.

As in the later phases of his course, the aerial gunnery student has the benefit of the best instructions. The shoot shooting is in charge of Lieut. Graddon D. Hubbard of Elwood, Ind., former national skeet shooting champion and twice a member of All-American skeet teams.

The students ride the 2 1/2-mile course in army trucks, shotgun poised and trigger fingers itchy. Suddenly clay targets start flying through the air at all angles and they bang away.

Before he has gone far the student has another chance as more targets fill the air—some horizontally, only three feet or so from the ground, some at a 45-degree angle, some flying straight up.

Allies, Striking Out Near Mateur, Report Advances

British, French Set Dormant Northern Front in Tunisia Into Quick Action

(By Associated Press) American bombers and torpedoes were credited in delayed dispatches with sinking three Japanese destroyers and crippling at least four others in an attack on enemy ships attempting to traverse Guadalcanal during the first week in February.

(By Associated Press) In North Africa, British dispatches reported a surge of Allied offensive activity on both ends of the 300 mile Tunisian front, but confirmation was lacking.

Frontline reports to Reuters said British and French troops were striking out in the Mateur sector advanced eight miles and another dispatch reported Marshal Rommel's army had fallen back in good order on the southern sector, declaring the maneuver short of the whole battle.

Other reports said rainstorms were sweeping the area and observers said bad weather might delay the showdown a month or six weeks.

The report came from a Reuters correspondent in the Mateur sector about 15 miles south of Hirta—who declared that Allied troops including British and French commandos attacked the Italian-held line in the northern sector at dawn Thursday.

The attack carried eight miles deep over an area of about 100 square miles, he said, adding, "By evening the men reached their primary objectives."

"The attacking force was a good size, but the results will not be known until the second day of fighting in progress has been completed."

There was no word of the attack immediately from any other source.

Meanwhile, far to the south on the vital Tunisian battlefield, the British Eighth Army was reported as fighting 30 miles inland from the Tunisian east coast, hemming in the German and Italian forces.

Incipient rains kept the sticky black soil of the center and north so soupy that only patrols were active.

R. A. F. Aircraft Hit Axis Targets in Burma Valley

NEW DELHI, Feb. 9. (AP)—R. A. F. planes have attacked enemy targets along a 200-mile stretch of the Northern Irrawaddy Valley in Burma, damaging storehouses, river steamers and railroads, a communication reported Thursday.

The attacks were carried out roughly between Kyaukse, in Central Burma, and Chank. At the same time Hurricane fighters destroyed railroads, Magway and Black River bridges, and a fire in two villages in the Akhah district.

Last night, the communists said, bombers raided the Japanese air base in Central Burma while enemy planes retaliated with a weak attack on Allied positions in the Rangoon area.

The continuing widespread raids include the Akhah air base, which was destroyed by a fire in India. Yesterday's communication told of United States bombers attacking an Rangoon, Mandalay, Prome, Akhah and other air bases.
