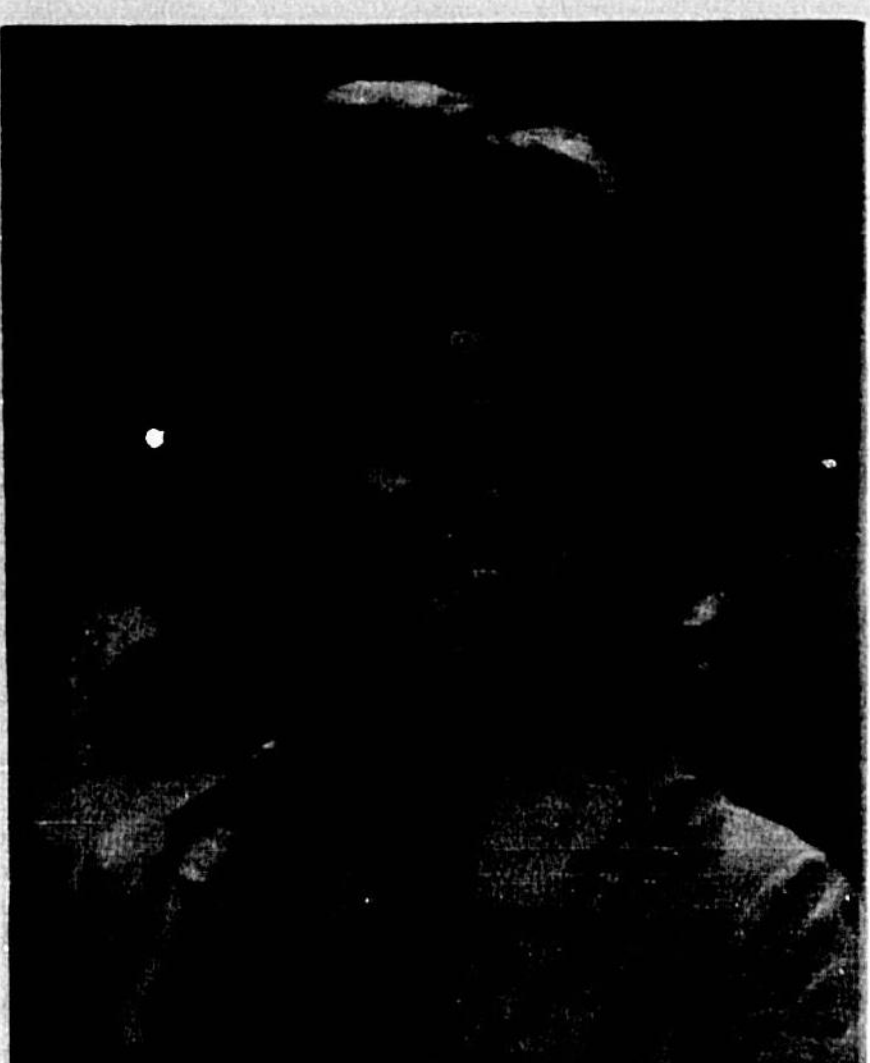


Miss Margo Reams Engaged

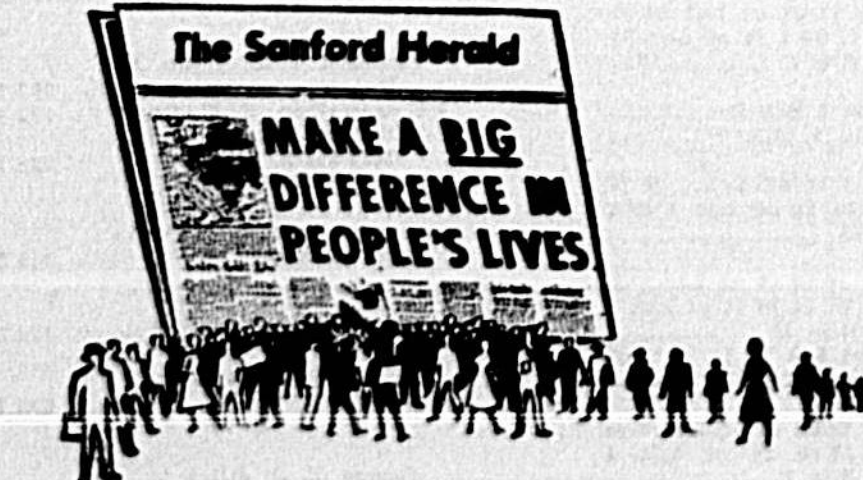
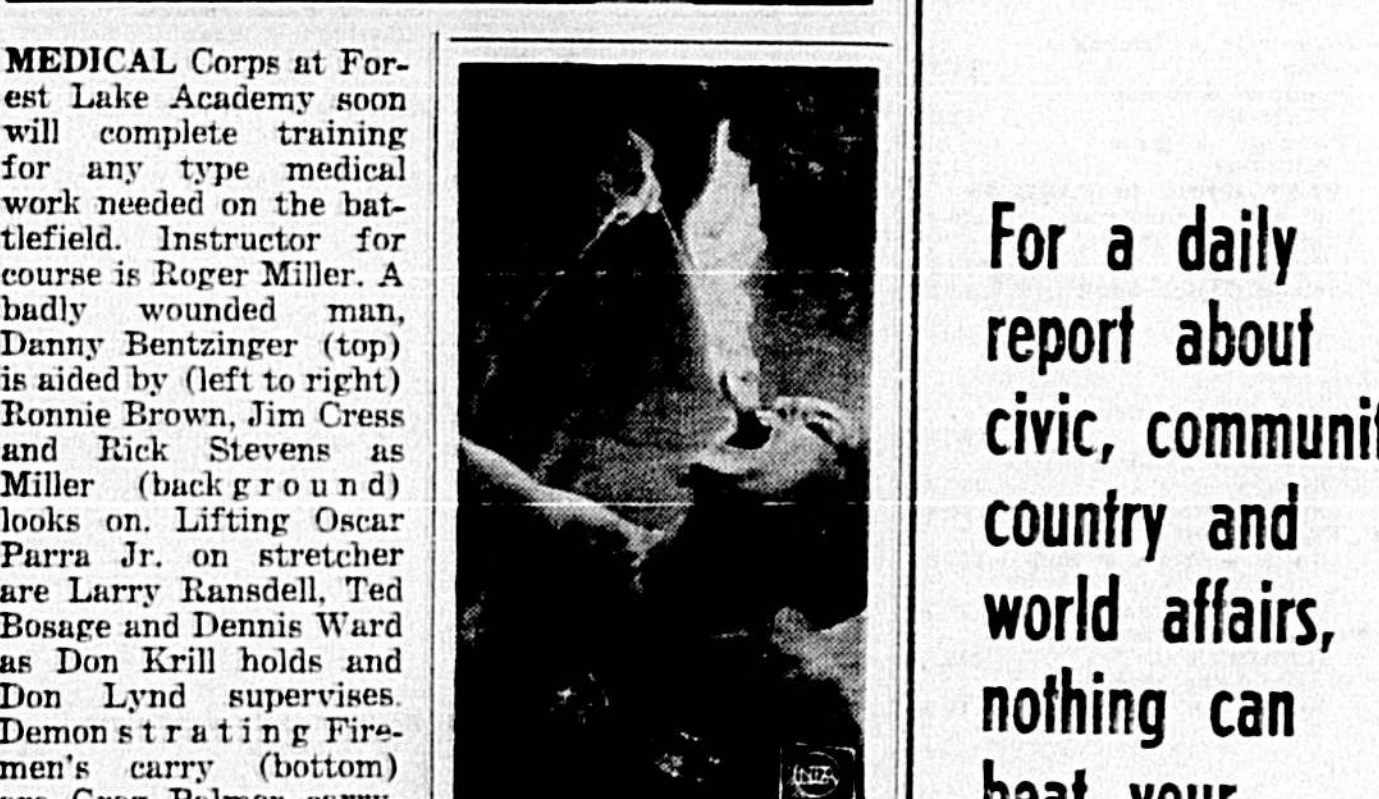


Table with columns: DESCRIPTION OF LAND, Section Township Range, NAME OF OWNER, and Acres of Land.
