Florida League Will Meet Orlando on Next Sunday

President Walter W. Rose of the Florida State League has called a meeting of the clubs of the league to convene here Sunday afternoon, this being an adjourned meeting from the regular annual meeting held January 12.

While there has been some talk of the possibility of independent ball superseding the league, it does not appear that the obstacles confronting the league's existence are more serious than they have been at any other season.

When asked what his opinion was with reference to the outcome of the difficulties, Mr. Rose stated: "In my opinion the league will continue, although there is a possibility of a change in the cities now represented. This is no different than the situation which has obtained each year in the past."

At the close of last season Mr. Rose stated that he would not be a candidate for re-election as league president, and in conversation yesterday confirmed his previous statement that he is not a candidate and wishes to be relieved.

In losing the services of Mr. Rose the league loses one of its organizers, who has pulled it out of many difficult holes, having reorganized several clubs at critical times during his four years as president.

Under his leadership his office has met all its financial obligations very promptly, and at the annual meeting on January 12, each club was agreeably surprised to receive a check for several hundred dollars from the league treasury.

During his term as president, Mr. Rose was honored by being placed upon the board of arbitration of minor league clubs. His intimate knowledge of baseball and the rules and regulations have made him an especially valuable man for the position of president, which he has held since the organization of the Florida State League four years ago.—Orlando Sentinel.
