

### City Aides Get Pay Hike In New Budget

Sanford's city commissioners and City Manager W. H. Kneaves are rather pleased with themselves and the citizens of the community have reason to be pleased, too.

The long-drawn-out session, with scratch pad at hand and the other hand clutching the budget, ended at 11:30 p.m. and came up finally with a budget for the 1966-67 fiscal year that contains all city employees (except the city manager) but including the city's 14 departments.

The final total for the general government budget was \$1,200,000 and the city budget came to \$661,600.

The task was accomplished without the necessity of having to increase the millage rate on ad valorem taxes, but enables the city to keep pace with the needs, desires and requests of its citizens.

The \$1 million bond issue with which to build the lake front marina project, a new fire station and a recreation hall in the Goldwater area are not included in the general government budget of the city. The bond issue money, a capital improvement project, is budgeted separately.

First, commissioners had to overcome a deficit of close to \$200,000 caused by removal of the parking meters on downtown streets and the necessity to find money to pay the interest on the parking lot at First Street and Park Avenue for which parking meter revenue was earmarked.

By raising utility taxes on commercial users and bringing costs of occupational licenses in line with those in other cities of this area they were able to overcome some of the deficit. Other increases in revenues, increased on investment, increased on church services and a transfer of funds from the water and sewer division.

City employees all received an across-the-board, cost-of-living raise of two per cent. City laborers will receive a little extra in the form of a five per cent raise.

In addition, the commission raised the city's contribution toward the employees' pension fund. Not directly benefiting the employees, but costing the city nearly \$20,000, the increase in social security taxes, due to the Medicare provision.

For several years, all departments of the city have been operating with depleted funds, causing some employees to have to serve in other departments and forcing curtailment of some operations temporarily.

This problem will be alleviated with the provision for the hiring of 14 new city employees — three new policemen, to bring the force up to necessary strength — two new laborers in the parks department.

ment to help with the city's beautification program — a new driver and helper for the refuse department and a new man for the electrical inspector office and the maintenance department.

In the utility department, six new employees will be hired — a utility plant operator and laborer; two new laborers in the water distribution department and two in the sewer department.

Also budgeted is the hiring of a new public works director, who also will serve as city engineer.

A sum of \$4,000 was budgeted to air-condition the city long-awaited innovation. Commissioners allowed \$17,000 as a beginning of a three-year program to relocate the city zoo on the city-owned sanitary landfill area, just inside the city limits on Seminole Boulevard, which will be surrounded by a beautiful tropical garden.

Replaced in the budget at the request of merchants in the southern part of the city is the extension of the "Brightway" mercury vapor street lights on Hwy. 17-92 out to Onora Road, covering the newly annexed area. Regular street lights also will be installed on Onora Road to the city limits, to brighten the area of the new shopping center.

In the street department more than seven miles of city streets, plus the replacement of street equipment was allowed.

The maintenance department will get a new \$14,000 budget, \$250,000 is budgeted for the city's debt service.

### Water Hardware Bids Studied

Bids on 3,300 feet of pipe and fittings for the water department were opened at a public hearing of the Longwood City Council and were turned over to Councilman John Dutton and Perry White of the water committee for further study and recommendation.

Submitting bids were Hughes Supply, Davis Meter Supply and American Cast Iron Pipe Company.

The pipe and fittings are to be used to extend the present water line on Church Street in order to provide better fire protection to Longwood.

In other business, bids on 1,000 feet of two-and-one-half inch fire hose and one-and-one-half inch versatile screen and fog nozzle were opened and read from Roger B. Quincy, Leo Blanchard Municipal Supply, and ABC Fire Equipment Company.

The board voted to table the bids until the new budget is drawn after Councilman B. H. Ferrell, chairman of the finance committee, reported that the fire department budget is over expended by more than \$600.

It was decided to accept the recommendation of the Zoning and Planning Board to deny Restler R. C. Bounie's request for a change in zoning to permit construction of a building on 88 1/2 and Oxford Street wherein concrete picnic tables could be built.

The Zoning and Planning Board was authorized to join the Seminole County Zoning and Planning Commission with \$200 due to be paid by the city.

Recommendation of Council Chairman Carl Kommler that 28 additional chairs be purchased for the council chamber was tabled until the new budget is drawn.

The request of property owners east of Highway 17-92 to be rezoned residential from commercial was denied.

Meeting was adjourned at 8:30 p.m.

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) — A proposal for a new constitution for a new state election, to be held on Nov. 2, was discussed today by the state election division.

The proposal, to create a new state district court of appeals, will be followed by proposals to:

- Authorize an additional judge in Lake County.
- Provide that the clerk of the Palm Beach Circuit Court act as clerk of the County of Orange.
- Authorize issuance and sale of \$200 million in road bonds.
- Repeal the law that allows a person to be a member of more than one political party.

Others who have been on the Florida ballot in the past are to be removed from the ballot.

Support for the proposal is strong in the local United Fund or Community Chest.

### City OKs Budget Of \$1.89 Million

City of Sanford continued to pop its seams Monday evening as two more parcels of property were annexed on the south side of the city by the city commission in regular session.

Royal Castle property at Hwy. 17-92 and 27th Street was officially taken into the city, while at the southernmost city limits, boundaries jumped across Onora Road to take in the Standard Oil station property on the southeast corner, at Hwy. 17-92.

In other action commissioners officially accepted the revised salary schedule for city employees; adopted revised utility service tax rates and occupational license fees schedules, set the tax rate at 18 mills (no change) and officially adopted the 1965-66 budget of \$1.89 million for general government and \$291,000 for the utility department.

A public hearing has been set for Sept. 27 in an appeal for rezoning of a strip of property at Santa Avenue and 25th Street in order to make way for the construction of a Burger King restaurant. All existing property is already zoned C-1 commercial.

A motion unanimously passed a motion to request the city zoning and planning board to consider amending present city laws to require erection of fences between lines of residential and commercial zoning for the protection of residential property owners, even where there is an alley between properties.

Also approved was County Engineer William Bush's request to construct a drainage ditch in the Lincoln Heights section to relieve street flooding. Digging of the ditch will be subject to approval of the City of Sanford.

### Port Authority Pricing Land For Terminal

The Seminole County Port Authority Monday night agreed to ask for proposals from at least four appraisers in regard to obtaining land on which to build the Port of Sanford.

Appraisers to be contacted will be asked to submit estimated costs at a special meeting of the Authority on Sept. 20.

The Authority is seeking to find the true market value of the parcel of land which is under consideration as a potential site of the port.

Chairman Francis E. Rountree, announced that no particular site for the port has been decided. He said several sites are being considered and the board recommends one to be selected.

The Port Authority also agreed to contact several engineering firms in regard to costs of doing the planning and specifications for the port.

In another action, Dicus & Greene, accounting firm of Sanford, was employed by the authority on a time basis.

Council voted to post "no hunting" signs in the village, and set a \$200 fine for violators.

Council also heard school bus drivers praise road conditions saying the roads were the "best" they have ever been.

### Pope Extends New York Visit

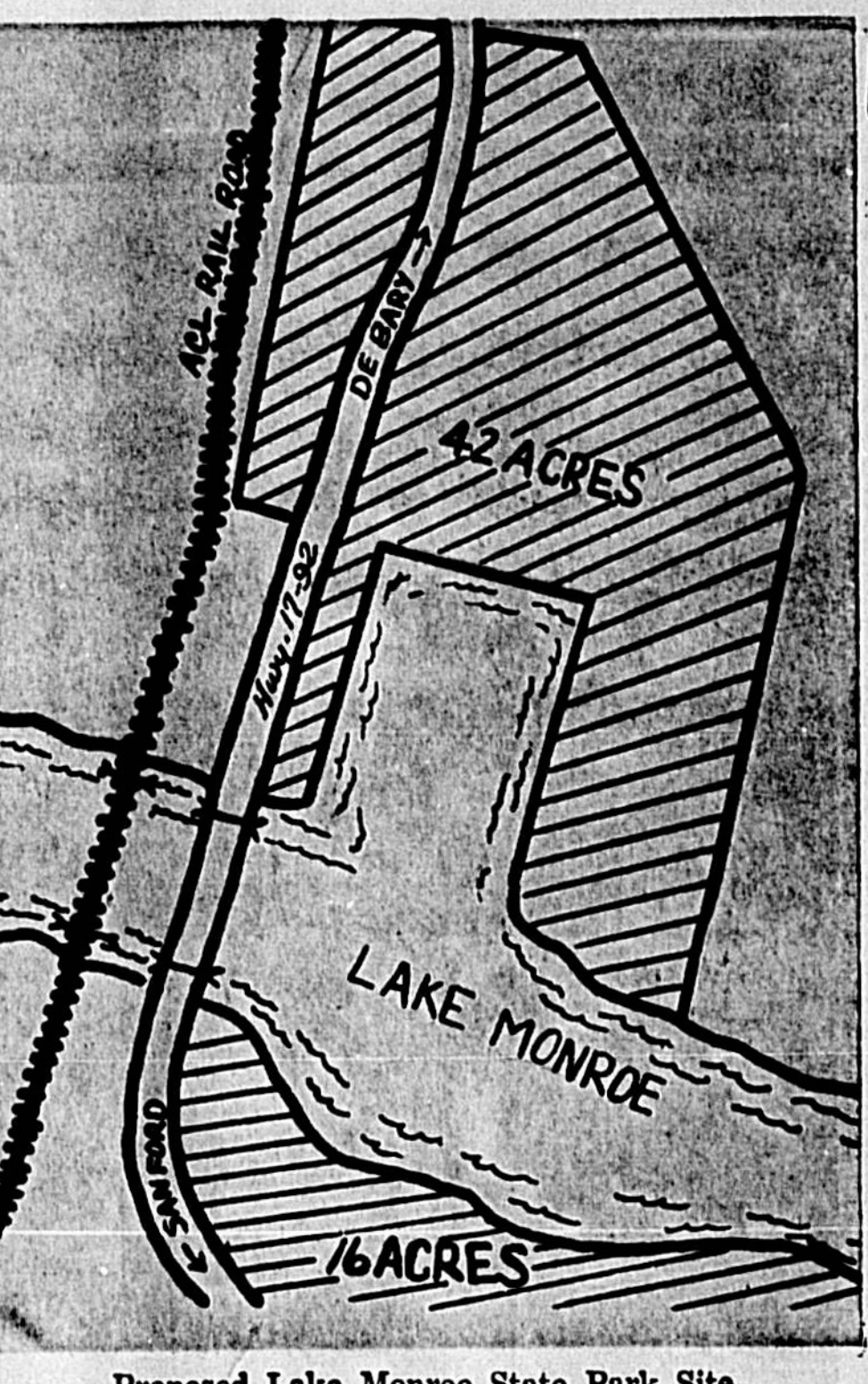
Informed Vatican sources said the Pope will extend his stay in New York to at least two days and perhaps longer.

The trip originally was announced for only one day when the Pope returned to the Vatican after his UN appearance and an open-air mass in New York's Yankee Stadium.

### Wildlife Plagues Hurricane Hunt

NEW ORLEANS (UPI) — Searchers, hopeful that most dead birds have been recovered, moved into flooded lowlands in a hurricane strike area plagued by treacherous wildlife.

Facing the hazards of poisonous snakes, alligators and hungry crocodiles, searchers were alerted to the delta south of here to aid the survivors of Hurricane Betsy, which have left 4 dead in four southern states.

Earlier reports that as many as 250 others in this area had died in the storm proved false.

Meanwhile, a rather bold low pressure trough is dumping rain on the eastern Bahamas and southwestern Atlantic.

"This trough is associated with a low pressure system in the upper atmosphere and development of a tropical storm from the system does not appear likely at this time," the Miami Weather Bureau said.

### Offshore Labor Fight Renewed

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) — Conner wrote a letter to State Agriculture Commissioner Doyle Conner who has renewed the fight to get offshore labor for Florida's big fruit and vegetable harvests and says that if something can't be worked out, "Florida agriculture is in trouble."

Conner said Labor Secretary W. Willard Wirtz already has indicated he is not in sympathy with the strong demands by Florida farmers for authorization to use foreign laborers.

Conner said that Wirtz will not be doing during the battle over offshore labor last spring, that foreign workers will not be needed "because of a stepped-up domestic recruiting program."

Florida citrusmen and farmers contended domestic labor is unsatisfactory for the harvest.

"Florida can not operate and meet its harvest schedule without offshore labor. Wirtz has failed to recognize this need," said Conner.

He said there already have been some increased food prices as a result of slow harvest, particularly in the case of celery and strawberries.

Wirtz in the past has used chiefly workers from the Bahamas and Virgin Islands. More than 1,000 offshore laborers were used last season just for the sugar cane harvest, and in the citrus and vegetable harvest.

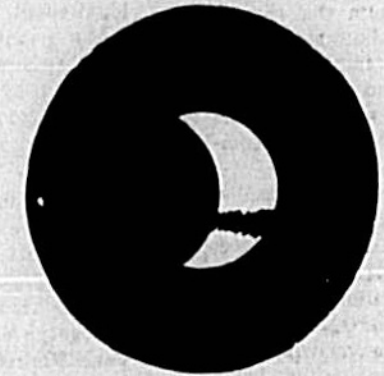

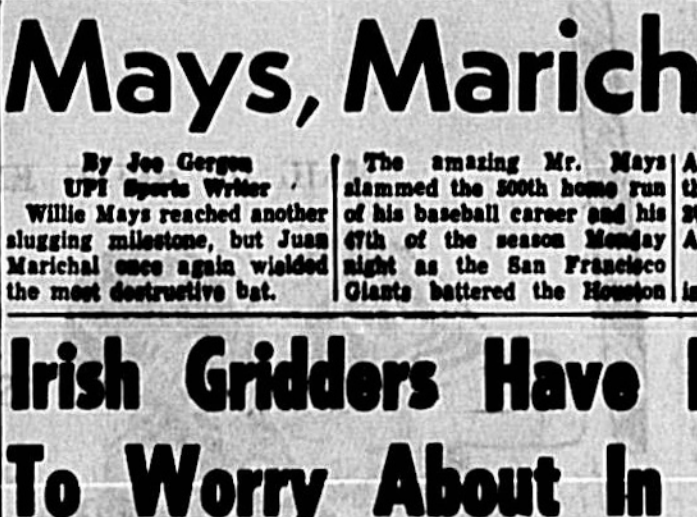
