County Board Actions

By ANN SIECZKOWSKI

A traffic count of 11,180 cars per day presently counted on SR 436 in front of the soon to open Butler Plaza was the motivating reason for the appearance of S. Clark Butler. developer of the Plaza, before the Board of County Commissioners. He said that the plaza is scheduled to open in late February and that the 1,000 to 1,500 cars entering and leaving the plaza in addition to the traffic from the apartment complexes on the other side of SR 436 will cause considerable traffic problems in that area.

William Bush, County Engineer, remarked that the Department of Transportation has its official road program, which carries to October 1, 1973, all scheduled, and that he did not anticipate any possibility for change at this late date and even if a change was contemplated, it would not be done in the time requested by Butler. Bush said that Howell Branch Road to Lake Howell Road is rapidly becoming congested, with traffic backing up into both at SR 436. Both roads are among the highest priority road projects shown for fourlaning. The tracfic count at the present time is from 8 to

"The problem with fourlaning is acquiring the right-ofway," Bush said. He recommended that the road should be reworked to provide entrance and exits without hardship.

State, County Roads

"To this date, when a road is taken from the state road program, the phase "returning to the county" is used." County Engineer, William Bush said. "This is redundant, really, in reference to the Old Mims Road, since in 1940 there were no state roads.'

In 1940, SR 46 was rebuilt by the State on the old alignment where SR 44 was located. At that time, the State notified the county commission that having completed SR 46, the state would turn back to Seminole County Old SR 44, as it was being removed from the State road system. The county refused to accept the road back into its

system. It was felt that it would be easier to maintain it as a "jungle road" than as a county road. There were no residents on the road at the time. However, according to Road Superintendent, J. C. Lavender, the road at this time, is actually cut in two parcels and fenced off, but some residents have moved into the area.

"The county can't help on the road now due to the lack of right-of-way and because it is not in the road system. We don't know who owns the property, but it's in the tax records. The fence has been in the area since 1960, according to Lavender, and "there is a gate with a key, and only Florida Power and Light has a key.'

There is a drainage ditch which requires cleaning periodically and Lavender said that there will be a day when the residents will be walking in two feet of water when that river backs up. There is just no place for that water to go. Commissioner Mike Hattaway, Bush and Lavender were scheduled to meet to discuss the needs in the area and report back to the Baord next week.

Federal Funds Wanted

Department heads of the county government have begun the campaign for the federal revenue sharing funds which will accrue to Seminole County in January

County Commissioners heard Sheriff John Polk explain why he felt that the law enforcement body should receive a goodly portion of those funds coming into Seminole. He said that part of the money should go toward building additional administrative space in the compound area. This, according to Polk, would not interfere with any current plans for the parking lot. He told commissioners that this administrative space would be over and above the present expansion plans for the jail, which does not allow for more office space.

In response to questioning by Chairman Greg Drummond about the possibility of using the space currently being used for other services being converted into office space, Polk explained that the only old space which will be available is where the Creech tanks are now, and this would be insufficient. The architect's estimate of \$35 per square foot for office space is too high, according to Polk and the presently planned expansion only applies to the old building.

"I don't see how the money could be better spent," Polk remarked," and this is an immediate need." Deputy Clerk Ashby Jones advised that the funds run from July 1 to Jan. 1, and then will come in quarterly amounts, for a total of \$177,000 bi-annually. However, Jenes,

said that this applies to the current year and he has no committment as to the amount for the years following. Commissioner Sid Vihlen was interested in having the County Attorney look into the matter of building a new branch courthouse with part of the fund. Attorney Howard Marsee said that he would look into the question, but the act was intended to give local government broad interpretation to ways to spend the money.





Editorial Comment

You Can't Pin A Lable To Henry Kissinger

He has been called Superkraut, Dr Strangelove, a pudgy Svengali, a latter-day Metternich and the second most powerful man in the world.

None of the labels fits. For Dr. Henry Kissinger, President Nixon's national security advisor, is much too complex a man to be wrapped up and pigeon-holed under any single heading.

But he is one of the most important men in the world today.

The Kissinger intellect, concepts and beliefs on world affairs and his ability as a negotiator, are deeply involved in the process that has brought both the Vietnam war and the East-West cold war to the threshold of settlement.

If both efforts ultimately succeed Kissinger will without question be one of those partly responsible for that achievement.

How much credit he personally should be assigned for what has been accomplished so far is a question that will have to be left for determination by historians of the future. It is not an assessment that yields to instant analysis.

But the sharply etched features of his personality, the lucidity and logic of most of his presentations, the body of his past writings, the depth and sweep of his historical grasp and the uniqueness of his relationship with Mr. Nixon have all contributed to the progress made and are clearly visible for all to see.

Newsmen particularly are keenly aware of Kissinger's ability to turn a humorous phrase at totally unexpected moments.

On one occasion a reporter cited one of Kissinger's past briefings in asking a question. Deadpan Kissinger promptly replied: "Yes, I read that briefing and I must say I

was quite impressed with it. On another occasion when an interviewer asked Kissinger to provide some insights into his own personality Kissinger shot back: "The problem is that the essential sweetness doesn't come through.'

He also volunteered:

"I am accused of being a megalomaniac but actually I am a paranoiac with the pleasure of knowing that in my job my enemies are real.'

WASHINGTON (NEA) While President Nixon sets a federal job freeze and talks of spreading power more effectively to the states, the Social Security Administration-a huge element in the U.S. bureaucracy-takes on bigger and bigger bur-Today 28.1 million Americans are on Social Security

In the year ended June 30, Medicare oversaw payments of \$8.4 billion to 4.6 million people covered under hospital insurance, and 10.9 million (much duplication here) covered by supplementary medical insurance affecting mostly Fortunately for the country, Social Security happens to

be just about the most efficient activity in the federal government. No outfit with so many "constituents" and with some 54,000 employes could be expected to be perfect. The agency has its sad tales of lost files, terrible delays, confusion, irritating conflicts between its people and some of the people who get or need help. Yet there is no inefficiency even remotely touching that

- 2. Prepare Mushroom Filling:
 - 1 medium-sized onion, finely chopped

- 1 tahlesnoon margarine 8 ounces fresh mushrooms
 - 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 2 to 3 tablespoons finely chopped stuffed green olives

Cook onion in margarine in frying-pan until lightly browned. Remove from heat and add mushrooms, olives, salad dressing and bread crumbs to onion in pan, stirring lightly to combine.

3. Prepare Flaky Pastry:

5 cups flour 2 teaspoons salt 1-2/3 cups shortening 3/4 to 1 cup cold water

Combine flour and salt in bowl and cut in shortening with fork or pastry blender until crumbs evenly until dough just holds in a ball. Reserve 3/4 of dough. Roll remaining 1/4 of dough 1/3 inch thick and cut out a steer's head, using paper pattern. Roll remaining dough from this portion thinner, cut in strips and prepare braid to reserve to decorate bottom edge of pastry-covered roast. Roll reserved 3/4 of dough 1/4 inch thick in rectangle of dimensions

4. Put it all together:

Rib Eve Roast (roasted to 15°F. below doneness desired) Mushroom Filling

Flaky Pastry (rectangle and trim) 1 egg, beaten

Place roast on board, drain drippings from pan, clean rack and replace in pan. Cover roast with mushroom filling and place pastry rectangle over it, folding and pressing pastry to shape of roast, Place pastry-covered roast on rack in pan. Brush pastry with egg. Place steer's head on roast, press braid around bottom edge of pastry and trim. Brush design and braid with egg. Insert thermometer in roast and bake in hot oven (425°F.) for 30 minutes or to desired degree of doneness.* Let set 20 minutes before carving.

*Internal temperature of roast for rare is 140°F.; for medium, 160°F and for well done, 170°F. Make allowance for roast rising in temperature 5°F. or more after removal from oven before carving.
