## W. A. Patrick Is Head Of Service Corps Of County

(Continued from Page One) service requirements, and by reason of service to his country are designated member of the United States Service Corps. This membership will permit the wearing of the official insignia of the Corps. This arm band insignia is presented by the United States Government and its issue is governed by the Office of Civilian Defense regulations.

Service Corps members will then be asked to designate two eight-hour days weekly and upon assignment these volunteer workers must assume their duties with a full knowledge of the responsibility of attendance on their assigned days. Official insignia will be worn at all times while they are on duty. Persons in Seminole County who desire to serve their country on this volunteer basis may make application to Major W. Z. Scherzer, head-quarters of the Defense Council in the Armory or by telephoning 974. The dates of the training period will be given to all applicants. A roster of the hours of service will be kept for each member of the Service Corps in order that proper recognition may be given to the individual in accordance with hours served.

## WASHINGTON

WAHINGTON, Oct. 23. (WW) — Lt. Gen. Breton B. Somervell, chief of the Army service of supply, got his knowledge of capital bureaucracy, politics and society early.

When he was 16, his father, a physician, and his mother, a former school teacher, moved here from Little Rock, Ark., and opened Bacon Seminary, a finishing school for young ladies. That put the family in the thick of things and three years later, young Breton was off to West Point.

In 1914, he graduated sixth in his class, became a second lieutenant in the Engineers Corps—the engineers. Somervell is probably the only man in the Army who has so distinguished himself and earned both honors and advancement "on leave."

He was "on leave" in Paris when World War I broke out. He hurried to the American embassy, volunteered his services, and made his mark herding stranded Americans home.

Four years later, he was again "on leave" in Paris, borrowed his general's car, drove to the front in Champagne. There he found he was one of those listed in the Army catalogues as "highly irregular," but the 89th Division gave him a job. He participated in the Meuse - Argonne offensive and came out of it with the Distinguished Service Cross.

He was "on leave" too when he made WPA history by handing that troublesome New Deal agency in New York for four years.

Somervell's post-World War romance with YWCA worker Anna Jurnell resulted in their marriage at Cobden, Ill., in 1918. Mrs. Somervell died recently, and the general's household is now managed by his three daughters, but he is at his desk from 12 to 17 hours a day.

One of those Washington rumors going around is that General Marshall is going to be placed in charge of the second front and that the man who will succeed him as chief of staff is Lieutenant General Somervell.

The man in battle isn't impervious. The fact that Somervell is practically the only one mentioned as General Marshall's successor is. He's a favorite with Congress and congressional committees. He has welcomedcriticism from the men on the Hill and has been lenient only of those who call "the carbuncle and boorish general."

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## 'Axis Attempts To Close El Alamein Line Gaps Stopped

Allies Shoot Down 7 Enemy Planes, Hammer Rommel's Forces In Egypt

(By Associated Press) In the Egyptian desert, the British army beat off Axis attempts to close gaps driven into the El Alamein line. An Allied plane hammered at Rommel's forces, United States airmen shot down four of the seven Allied bag.

Italy claimed Allied frontal assaults had been repelled and said a landing attempt on the supply Port of Matruh was turned back.

Berlin reported 104 British planes were destroyed in the El Alamein skirmish.

Captured along by the first rush of the Germans to crush Marshal Erwin Rommel's African force, the Allies in Britain's Eighth Army have driven through gaps in his main El Alamein defense line and have fanned out to the rear of Axis "soft-shelled" infantry and artillery divisions from the front said last night.

With the support of an American and Allied air force that was supreme in the skies, and massed artillery which awoke the desert with the most innumerable barrage of fire, the British, Australians, Indians, New Zealanders, South Africans, and snouting Greeks smashed through advance enemy lines at one point in their first lunges before dawn Saturday and rolled over his main artillery, minefield, and other points.

The Allied forces took up positions behind these unarmored forces, front line dispatches said, and presumably the purpose was to cut them up piece-meal.

But the main clash in the hard-bitten battle was yet to come.

The British had armored forces for Marshal's tanks were heavily

metally retreating toward the front.

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"Fighting continues," the communiqué said.

British and American ships of the Mediterranean Fleet sank five more Italian supply ships, probably sank a destroyer and armed merchant cruiser and damaged five other ships trying to carry supplies to the hard-pressed forces under Marshal Erwin Rommel.

Striking at supply bases and ports in Northern Italy from which reinforcements and material have moved across the Mediterranean, British bombers from England conducted their third successive night raid, extending their operations to Milan and Genoa and transferred to the air corps.
