An Idaho Confession

This is splendidly illustrated in the manly admission by the editor of the Idaho Sunday Statesman. He now accepts the statement of General Smuts, the South African Prime Minister, made twenty years ago. "Hundreds of years hence Wilson's name will be one of the greatest in history."

"The Statesman in those days thundered that America should not surrender its independence to a super-state like the League of Nations!" "Now, as we look back, it appears that our responsibility was to give the League a chance to succeed by participation in it and to criticize after instead of before failure."

Borah's land has come to have a change of heart. The conversion has been in the making for several years. James P. Pope, an able and courageous young lawyer, challenged the Idaho isolationist and, standing firmly on Wilson's doctrines, was elected to the United States Senate, where he proclaimed these lofty ideals to all America and the world.

Wilson's spirit remains among us. Twenty years ago, defeated, discredited and maligned, he was almost a pathetic figure. Seminole Soldiers

What happened to the Seminole Indian stalwarts' draft officials were having difficulty getting out of the Everglades a few months ago in order to induct them into military service?

Well, they're in training and making a grand showing, of course. Justifiably suspicious of the white man, they simply didn't know what scheme was on foot when they were ordered to sign up for the draft. They eventually got it clear in their minds that the United States was in trouble and needed some fighting done, and so now they're holding rehearsals for war dances they confidently expect to do in Berlin and Tokyo.

Giving a report on them, Parade magazine says the Seminoles are part of the 45th division, an outfit made up of braves from more than 50 distinct Indian tribes. The site of their training camp is not disclosed.

Besides Seminoles, the division includes Choctaws, Chickasaws, Creeks, Chickasaws, Apaches, Shawnees, Poncas, Sioux, Kaws, Kiowas, Pottawatomies, Ojibwas, Apinaks, Pueblo, Zunis, Hopis and others. The Seminoles, like the others, are getting due consideration for their ability to conceal themselves and fight stealthily and to engage in sudden, vicious attack.

Apparently, the Seminoles are showing no reluctance to fight for the nation with which they still have technical affinity. Experience persuaded their forefathers a century ago that a treaty with the United States would be violated at will, so they passed up the formality of a peace treaty and huddled together in the fastness of the Everglades—Lakeland Ledger.

3. To show housewives how they can influence war workers in the household to be more safety conscious and to avoid accidents on and off the job—at work, on the highways, at home.
4. To help reach the vast army of women war workers and aid them in guarding against accidents.

## Axis Attempts To Close El Alamein Line Gaps Stopped

Allies Shoot Down 7 Enemy Planes, Hammer Rommel's Forces In Egypt

(By Associated Press.) In the Egyptian desert, the British army beat off Axis attempts to close gaps driven into the El Alamein line. As Allied planes hammered at Rommel's forces, United States airmen shot down four of the seven Allied bag.

Italy claimed Allied frontal assaults had been repulsed and said a landing attempt on the supply port of Matruh was turned back.

Berlin reported 104 British tanks were destroyed in the El Alamein skirmishing.

Carried along by the first rain of their offensive to crush Axis forces, the Allies in Britain's Eighth Army have driven through gaps in his main El Alamein defense belt and have fanned out to the rear of Axis "soft-shelled" infantry and artillery, dispatches from the front said last night.

With the support of an American and Allied air force that was supreme in the skies, and massed artillery which broke the desert with the most furious barrage of any African campaign, British, Australian, Indian, New Zealanders, South Africans and assaulting Greeks smashed through advance enemy lines at one point in their first lunge before dawn Saturday and rolled over his artillery, mortars, tanks and barbed wire defense positions at other points.

The Allied forces then took up positions behind these unarmored tanks and presumably the purpose was to cut them up piece-meal.

But the main clash in the hard-fought struggle was the coming of the armored forces for Rommel's tanks were badly smashed toward the rear.

The official communique yesterday was reticent concerning details therefore, and told only of the initial penetrations along the front between the sea and Qattara Depression 80 miles west of Alexandria.

But war correspondents had the assurance of the British field commander, Lt. Gen. Bernard L. Montgomery, that his preparations were complete and he meant business.

British and Allied troops fighting in front are first class soldiers and I am determined they will have success," he said at a press conference.

The gashes in the enemy positions had been made by dawn Saturday and throughout the night desert fighting Saturday "out-gas" was maintained in spite of enemy counterattacks.
