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## John L. Lewis Foams Against "Little Steel"

### CIO Founder Is Paid 20-Minute Ovation Before Commencing Speech To Workers

## Claims Dream Has Come True

### Says Name Of Thomas Girdler Is Synonymous With Murder

PITTSBURGH, Dec. 16.—(AP)—John L. Lewis denounced the operators of "little steel" today and told an uproarious convention of steel workers that his dream of seeing the nation's mill men "handed together" in unionism "has come true."

The founder of CIO, welcomed amid a wild demonstration to the floor of the first national convention of the steel workers organizing committee, assailed Tom Girdler, president of the Republic Steel Corporation, declaring that the name of Girdler "should be synonymous with murder."

The shaggy-haired labor leader took the platform after a 20-minute ovation and then declared "you have found out for the first time in your respective lives that you could organize if you wanted to organize."

Immediately, committee members said they would attempt to obtain consideration of the measure after the House disposes of its current business—the wages and hours bill.

## Economy Need Is Seen Imperative By Governor Cone

### Executive Sees Political Revolution Unless Action Is Had

TALLAHASSEE, Dec. 16.—(AP)—Governor Cone told the state cabinet yesterday there would be a political revolution unless economy in government is made effective.

He spoke as the cabinet discussed increased bills for electric current supplied to the capitol. He concurred with Secretary of State Gray that steps should be taken to reduce the bills.

"We must have some economy or there will be a political revolution about the cost of government," the governor said. "I have an economy into my bones."

Electric current bills increased from \$774 in July to \$837 in November. The 1937 legislature made no increase in the appropriation for maintaining the capitol building and supplying it with light, heat and water.

Increased bills resulted, Gray said, because of additional electrical machinery, such as calculators, and because of new offices opened in the capitol annex recently constructed. The increase, he added, resulted in a state situation.

State bills unpaid because of insufficient funds in operating accounts passed \$1,000,000 with others piling up about \$300,000. (Continued on Page Three)

## Motor Inspector Locates Here To Regulate Trucks

Declaring that strict enforcement of State provisions regulating licenses and trucks and trailers will be carried out, J. C. Burt, motor vehicle inspector of the Motor Vehicle Department in Tallahassee, informed a Herald reporter today that his department had been lenient with firms and individuals for a long time, but that continued violations in large numbers necessitated strict inspection and enforcement henceforth.

Mr. Burt, who is in charge of this district, is located in Sanford permanently at the Gilbert Hotel, having come here on Nov. 1.

"We have a new form out for trucks and trailers," he said, "and drivers will be required to give us all the information that we want. There have been 400 violations of the law in the past few months and we are going to clamp down right now."

Tested scales have been introduced in the city and the trucks and trailers will be weighed here, he said. Trucks found to be carrying improper tags will be halted and cases made out against their owners.

Mr. Burt also pointed out that winter guests who place their children in school and fail to buy a Florida license tag are subject to penalization unless they pay tuition. A fine of \$500 or six months in jail is provided under the law, he said. The same penalty pertains to transients engaged in compensatory work who have failed to provide a Florida tag.

Drivers of used cars, who fail to have the title of the machines transferred to their name in 10 days, also are violators of the law and subject to the fine, he said.

## Yacht Owner Sees Beauty In St. Johns

### Van Andens Of Miami Advocate Construction Of St. Johns-Indian River Canal

The value of the St. Johns-Indian River Canal to Sanford as an attraction for tourists who travel via the water route was pointed out by Frank Van Anden, owner and operator of the trim 65-foot craft, Zetta Moretti, docked at the Municipal Pier, in an interview with a Herald reporter yesterday.

Mr. Van Anden and his wife, whose love of water travel brought them on the 400 mile jaunt from their home in Miami to Sanford joined in the assertion that upon the completion of the proposed canal the St. Johns River would be the main route for the southern yachtsmen who visit the South by the hundreds each winter.

On the slowly winding St. Johns River, bordered by huge cypresses and tall palms, is one of the few remaining places where Florida may be seen in its natural state, the couple who made a leisurely trip from Jacksonville, asserted, and there is no comparison between this extremely interesting and (Continued on page six)

The weather bureau at New Orleans issued southeast storm warnings for the Gulf Coast from Galveston, Texas, to Carrabelle, Florida, saying a moderate disturbance in the Gulf of Mexico would move northward during the next 36 hours.

Forecasters said the disturbance would increase in intensity and probably would cause squally weather along the coast. The wind may reach gale force at times in exposed spots they added.

## Hull Opposed To Having War Hinge On Vote

### However, Bill Calling For Referendum Has Good Chance Of Being Okeyed By House

WASHINGTON, Dec. 16.—(AP)—The state department aligned itself yesterday against a strong movement in congress to require a favorable vote of the people before the United States could declare war, except in event of invasion.

Secretary Hull told reporters that, from the standpoint of promoting peace and keeping the country out of war, he was unable to see "the wisdom, or the practicability" of the proposed requirement.

Nevertheless, study of a petition pending in the house indicated there was a good chance the chamber would approve a constitutional amendment by Representative Ludlow, democrat, Indiana to require the national referendum on declarations of war.

The petition bears 218 signatures, enough to make possible a house vote on the Ludlow amendment on Dec. 27. Congress probably will be in recess on that date, however, and thus the vote is expected to be delayed until January.

## Soviets Will Seek Arrest Of Missing 'American' Couple

MOSCOW, Dec. 16.—(AP)—The Soviet government said today that Soviet authorities "have taken measures to seek out and arrest" the missing couple known as "Mr. and Mrs. Donald L. Robinson."

This was interpreted in foreign circles to mean that the couple who professed to be Americans had been under arrest since their strange and unexplained disappearance last week although the newspaper refrained from any such statement.

The "Robinsons" entered Russia under passports obtained fraudulently, Ivestia said "according to information obtained by the editor, the Soviet authorities have taken measures to seek out and arrest the persons mentioned in the telegram (from the state department)."

### Navy Blue Jackets To Honor Victims

### Unprecedented Move Is Seen As Highest Voluntary Tribute

WASHINGTON, Dec. 16.—(AP)—Secretary Hull announced today that official reports had confirmed that Japanese surface vessels machine-gunned the American gunboat Panay after it had been bombed from the air by Japanese naval fliers.

SHANGHAI, Dec. 16.—(AP)—Rear Admiral Teiso Mitunami, chief of Japanese naval aerial operations, was relieved of his post today as the result of the bombing of the United States gunboat Panay.

The Domei (Japanese news agency) carried the announcement of his removal, declaring the Japanese government was acting swiftly to carry out its pledge to America to punish officers responsible for the attack.

Foreign military and naval observers said they believed the Panay bombing and other attacks which have been made by young officers who had disregarded orders of commanders to control their action.

TOKYO, Dec. 16.—(AP)—The Japanese Navy Ministry announced today that a company of Blue Jackets would be detailed to honor the victims of the Panay bombing at a spot on the Yangtze River where they were killed.

The formal naval salute will be an unprecedented gesture which authorities said was the highest possible voluntary tribute of one nation to another.

The American seaman and an Italian newspaperman were killed Sunday when Japanese aerial bombers sank the gunboat Panay. Authoritative sources said the planned salute was not connected with the American protest against the attack.

SHANGHAI, Dec. 16.—(AP)—Undismayed by bitter world criticism of bombing and machine gunning United States and other foreign ships, the leaders of Japan's armed forces were reported today to be preparing a grand drive into south China to complete their conquest of this war-ravaged nation.

Reports of the impending south China invasion, which would bring Japan into even graver collision with British interests, came from many quarters, but could not be officially confirmed.

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A Case Well Done

Ill-advised persons who have been told that they could violate the State lottery laws with impunity, that the police would never bother the "Big Shots," that no Grand Jury would waste time investigating local gambling conditions, that if it did it couldn't bring an indictment, that the Assistant State Attorney didn't have a leg to stand on and couldn't possibly get a conviction, that they couldn't get a jury anyway and that one man could hang the jury and force a mistrial, should realize now the risks they have been taking.

For what they said couldn't be done, has been done. The so-called King of Seminole County "Cuba" barons has been convicted. He has been found guilty of a violation of the state lottery laws and is automatically deprived of his rights of citizenship. He is subject to a fine of at least \$500, and possibly \$5,000; or he may be sent to the State Penitentiary at Ralston for from one to ten years. In any event he has gotten himself into a most uncomfortable position and there are not many who would care to trade places with him.

Furthermore, there are two other "Big shots" in this racket who are under indictment. The same fate awaits them if they are proven guilty. The Grand Jury is still in session prepared to indict anyone else who still thinks he can get away with a violation of State laws. The sale of "Cuba" tickets continued, if in somewhat diminished quantity, right through the Grand Jury's investigation, right up to the recent trial, but with the conviction of the biggest one of them all, they should fold their tents like the Arabs and silently steal away. A word to the wise is sufficient.

At this point The Herald would say a word in commendation of Assistant State Attorney Lloyd F. Boyle who demonstrated in this case that he is a conscientious public servant and an extremely capable prosecutor. The easiest way in all cases of this kind is to let nature take its course and do nothing about them. Nor is it always easy to prove even when you know a man is guilty. Especially in this so in lottery violations. It takes a good deal of persistence, a tremendous amount of preparation, and a broad knowledge of the law.

Had a single man on the jury been unconvinced by the argument and the evidence of the State; or, convinced, had failed to do his duty, there would have been a mistrial. It was necessary for Mr. Boyle to convince all six men on the jury as to the guilt of the defendant, and it was necessary for all six men to feel their responsibility to the public and to stand up for law and order, to get a conviction. This Mr. Boyle did; and this all six men on the jury did.

The Police department and the Sheriff's office, the Grand Jury, and the Petit Jury, as well as the State Attorney's office, have all done their duty in this case with the utmost efficiency and dispatch and have demonstrated conclusively their determination to stamp out lawlessness in this county and to restore the good name of Sanford as a law-abiding community. To this end they will have the unflinching support of public opinion.

Hospital Demand

The importance of good hospitals is shown by the increased admissions, especially by paying patients, during the first half of 1937, as compared with 1936, a bulletin from the Metropolitan Life Insurance Company reveals, although health conditions were approximately the same in both periods. In the first half of 1937 the number of patients in private and semi-private rooms increased 12.5 percent over the number for the 1936 period, as against an increase of only 3 percent in ward patients. The increase for all patients combined was 7 percent.

A study made from the records of 47 hospitals located in key sections of the country showed that only five hospitals out of this group failed to register an increase among private and semi-private patients. One institution showed an increase in the past year of more than 70 percent, and in another the increase amounted to 30 percent. In eight other hospitals the rise in admissions of paying patients equaled or exceeded 20 percent. On the other hand, in 19 of these hospitals, ward registrations actually decreased in 1937 as compared with the 1936 period, while in eight hospitals increases of less than 3 percent in the number of ward admissions occurred.

Attributing the rise in the number of private patients to better business conditions, the statisticians point out that larger incomes not only have enabled more persons to pay for private accommodations in hospitals, but made it possible for many others to enter hospitals for correction of conditions which had been neglected during the depression years.

That, of course, is what happens when you watch a youngster taking his first peek at a tree or at presents by his bedside on Christmas morning. The light that shines in a child's face at that moment is a glowing bit of proof that once in awhile at least, life can live up to its fair promise.

Life doesn't go that often once you leave childhood. And although a child has no special reason to surmise that painful fact, those delightful weeks just before Christmas always are tinged with just a faint shade of doubt—dark doubt for many.

The efforts of the department will be confined largely to those dogs that were not vaccinated by local veterinarians during the summer, and may have been infected from the virus of the rabid dogs that have been found.

Dr. Peter S. Roy, local veterinarian, pointed out that those who had their dogs vaccinated during the summer need have no fears of rabies for their pets as one injection of serum afforded immunization unless the dog had been previously infected. In this case however, the animal must undergo the Pasteur treatment similar to that given humans before it can be made immune or before it is rid of the disease.

Two additional dogs that showed signs of the infection were found by Dr. Roy yesterday and are being kept isolated for observation.

During the past few days the heads of three dogs have been tested and proved positive but as yet the extent to which the virus has been spread by the rabid animals cannot be ascertained.

One of the dogs was found in the San Lanta subdivision, one near Maple Avenue and Third Street and the other west of Sanford on the lake shore boulevard. Dog owners in these vicinities were urged to watch their pets carefully and to use every precaution to keep them from infected animals.

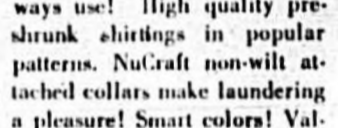

Many of the conditional pardons went to short time prisoners who have served most of their time. The pardon board gave a conditional pardon to Fred Shannon, sentenced to four years in 1936 for assault to commit manslaughter. Clemency was recommended by many, including five.

## Loyalists Claim First Major Win In Many Months

HENDAYE, Franco-Spanish Frontier, Dec. 17.—(AP)—The Spanish civil war's long deadlock appeared ready to break as loyalists boasted of their first major victory in months and reports seeped through tightly-sealed frontiers of a plot to assassinate Generalissimo Francisco Franco. The loyalists announced that a "glorious" offensive had cut the main road between Teruel and Calatayud and the parallel railroad. Such a victory, if actually attained, would completely isolate the appearance of Franco's dependent directly east of Madrid and smash his hopes of cutting off beleaguered Madrid from Valencia, Barcelona and the eastern sea front.

## Steel Ring Drawn

The government defense ministry said that a steel ring had been drawn about Teruel, one of the strongest rebel bases in all Spain, where 60,000 rebel troops are garrisoned. The rebel radio station at Seville announced last night that Franco's troops concentration will be completed by Monday and that his long-awaited big offensive would start "whenever Franco decides." It was also reported that the loyalists were so close to Teruel that the village of Castejon, only two and one-half miles from the rebel base, was a part of no-man's-land. "The loyalists are successfully taking the initiative around Teruel despite intense cold over the entire region lying in the deep valley of the Tula," Peters reported.
