Dunn Asks Money Back

County Commissioner Vernon Dunn has asked the return of his checks tendered in payment of his share of the \$350 expenditure by the 1959 County Commission which has been termed "illegal" by Atty. General Richard Ervin, according to a statement today by County Clerk Arthur Beckwith Jr.

Dunn's decision was apparently reached at a luncheon meeting of the county commissioners concerned held Thursday.

According to Altamonte Springs Mayor Lawrence Swofford, who was on the 1959 commission and attended the meeting, the group asked Dunn to recall his payment so they could present a united front at the next meeting of the County Commission, when they will appear in a body to explain their action.

Attending the luncheon meeting with Dunn and Swofford were John Krider, David Gatchel, who both served on the commission and former county attorney Mack Cleveland Jr.

At the time the 1959 county commission was working with the newly established zoning board to work out a set of regulations to govern the zoning of the county.

On several occasions it was necessary to work through the evening and the commission felt that dinner should be provided. The cost of the meals furnished by the county came to about \$150.00.

It was also felt that in the case of a request for a patent hoist, from the Good Samaritan home, that the county would be justified in spending a similar sum to give the home the needed piece of equipment because it is a non-profit institution and open to any aged Negro in the county regard-

less of the applicant's ability to pay.

The expenditures were discovered during the course of the recent audit of the county's books and the Attorney General ruled both expenditures were not within the purview of a County Commission and, in effect, represented the extension of the County's credit to non-governmental activities. This is forbidden by state law.

The communication from the Attorney General calling the attention of the commission to the alleged violations of the law, was a lengthy document and cited various court decisions establishing the degree of sovereignty held by a county and then setting forth the limitations on the credit and the extension thereof by county commissions.

It concluded with the statement that while the violation is not serious and is a "technical violation, only" still it was felt necessary that the County Commission request the money be returned by the commissioners involved.

Capt. Tully said the group was bound for Norfolk to help get the Aircraft Carrier Enterprise out of the wake of the Hurricane Ella threat.

The men will also go on cruise until Nov. 13, Capt. Tully added.

Ella Shuns Mainland

WILMINGTON, N. C. (UPI)—Hurricane Ella increased its high winds from 90 to 100 miles an hour today and started moving slowly away from the mainland.

The high winds menaced shipping in the area and whipped seas to a frenzy virtually the length of the Atlantic seaboard.

At 11 a. m. the storm was centered at 31.6 north latitude, 75.5 west longitude or about 315 miles south-southeast of Cape Hatteras, N. C., the Weather Bureau said.

The new fix put the storm 25 miles further off Hatteras than just three hours previously.

Forecasters said the storm was moving on an east-northeast course at about 5 m.p.h., which also represented a change in status. Ella had remained stationary during the night and early morning.

"During the next 12 hours Ella is expected to move slowly north-eastward with a pos-

ible turn to the north-northeast on Saturday morning," the Weather Bureau said.

Weather officials said no important change in size and little further intensification of the islands went about their business as usual.

Their chief concern was for the erosion that the storm would cause to the vacation beaches. The area was hard hit by a northeaster that raked the seaboard last March 7.

"This path will keep the center well off the coast of North Carolina," the advisory said. "Due to the large extent of the storm, gales will continue at exposed points along the North Carolina coast today and tonight with a chance of whole gale force winds on the Outer Banks tonight, mostly in gusts."

"Tides will range up two to four feet above normal on the North Carolina coast from Hatteras north, and on the southern and western side of Pamlico and Albemarle sounds. Seas will continue extremely rough over the open waters off the Carolina coast."

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GOV. BRYANT

Bryant Stresses Road Needs

TALLAHASSEE (UPI)—The State Road Department is aiming at a \$15 million monthly construction program in Florida.

Gov. Farris Bryant told his news conference Thursday the main problem the department now faces is delays by the U. S. Bureau of Roads in approving interstate projects in which the government shared the costs.

Florida can do nothing about this, the governor said.

He said the department had added new personnel, is using outside engineering consultants extensively, and is handling right-of-way acquisitions faster in order to keep up with the state's pressing highway needs.

Bryant said one man was hired recently to do nothing but see that outside consultants are on schedule with their state work. The governor said outside help for the department is necessary to keep up with road work.

Berlin Woes Still Unsolved; Meet Fails

WASHINGTON (UPI)—President Kennedy and Secretary of State Dean Rusk failed to crack the Berlin deadlock in marathon talks with Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko which lasted until early today.

Kennedy and Gromyko talked for two hours and fifteen minutes at the White House Thursday evening. The Soviet official and Rusk continued the discussions at the State Department until 12:15 a.m. without producing any softening of the stern Soviet demands for Allied evacuation of West Berlin.

Ranger Probe Expensive Flop

CAPE CANAVERAL (UPI)—An \$8 million power failure has ruined a U. S. attempt to send a Ranger-5 spacecraft on a collision course to the moon to get the world's first close-up lunar snapshots.

The 755-pound probe, hurled away from earth by a 10-story Atlas-Agena rocket Thursday, is expected to miss the moon by about 300 miles and then swing into orbit around the sun around midday Sunday.

Ranger-5 failed to get solar power and its own batteries ran down—and, like its four Ranger predecessors and six earlier U. S. moonshots, it is a failure. The moon remains America's most elusive target in space.

The United States, still desperately short of the vital lunar exploration information needed to plan manned flights to the moon later this decade, won't get another moonshot opportunity until early 1963.

2nd Blaze Hits Church

A fire was discovered in the boys lavatory at All Soul's Catholic School Thursday afternoon about 5:30 and was quickly extinguished by the fire department. It was the second fire in two weeks for the church which suffered \$4,000 damage when the narthex was burned out two weeks ago.

Fire Chief Mack Cleveland Sr. said today there was practically no damage to the building but there was a lot of smoke. A trail of burned matches and exploded firecrackers was discovered in the hallway leading to the lavatory.

Cleveland believes there is a connection between Thursday's fire and the previous blaze and he hopes to get a lead on the cause of the previous conflagration by questioning the suspects in yesterday's fire.

Father Richard Lyons, pastor of All Souls, says he is not convinced there is any connection between the two fires, but that the Thursday attempt was merely the "prank of a couple of boys."

The usually closed window of the lavatory was found open after the fire. Fr. Lyons says they are "thankful the new school building is fireproof."

BETHLEHEM, Pa. (UPI)—A Czech United Nations diplomat who killed his wife and then led police on a chase through three states, died today from a self-inflicted gunshot wound.

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The Federal Reserve Board, trying to relax credit and boost the economy, Thursday ordered bank reserves on savings and time deposits trimmed from five to four percent.

JFK Leaves For 'Barnstorming'

WASHINGTON (UPI)—President Kennedy left today on a barnstorming tour for Democratic candidates but made arrangements to keep fully informed of all international developments.

Kennedy's Air Force jet left for Cleveland, Ohio, where he will begin a seven-state tour ending Sunday in Seattle, Wash. He planned to be back at the White House late Sunday night.

The President was accompanied by his staff of political advisers and three Democratic members of Congress from Ohio—Sen. Stephen M. Young and Reps. Michael A. Feighan and Charles A. Vanik.

Kennedy was occupied until a late hour Thursday night with developments on the Soviet front.

Georgia May Have First Negro Solon

ATLANTA (UPI)—Georgia would send its first Negro to the legislature since Reconstruction days under recounted senatorial primary returns that are to be given today to a state judge.

Judge Durwood Pye, a strong segregationist, obtained swift obedience Thursday to his injunction that returns from Fulton County in last Tuesday's Senate primary be counted on a district rather than a county basis.

Economy Dip For '63 Seen

HOT SPRINGS, Va. (UPI)—A "great majority" of the nation's top business consultants predicted today that there would be a slight dip in the nation's economy in the first half of 1963.

The prediction, which differed from that of government economists, was made public by Frederick R. Kappel, board chairman of American Telephone & Telegraph Co., at the opening session of the Business Council.

The council, made up of the nation's top corporation officials, began a three-day work and play meeting here today.

Kappel said most of the council's 20 technical consultants expect economic activity "to peak out by year-end and turn down in the first quarter of 1963."

Administration officials in Washington are forecasting either continued small gains for the economy or a leveling off on a high plateau. Neither group expects substantial pickup before the second half of 1963.

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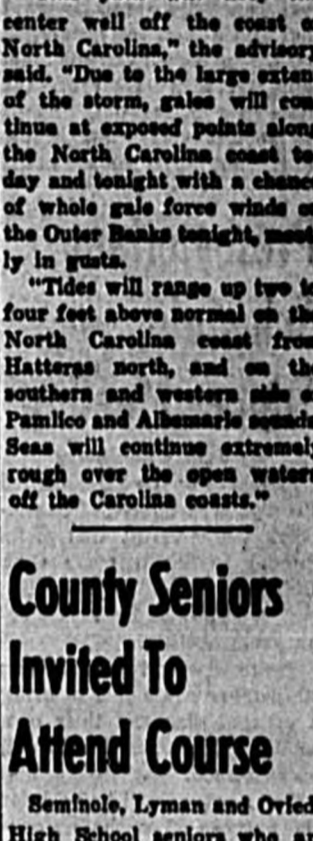

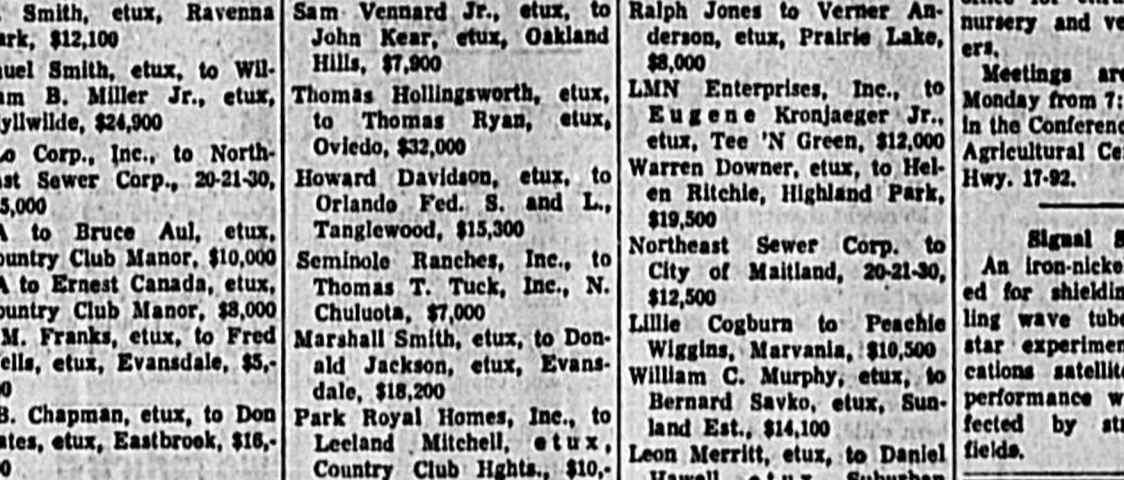

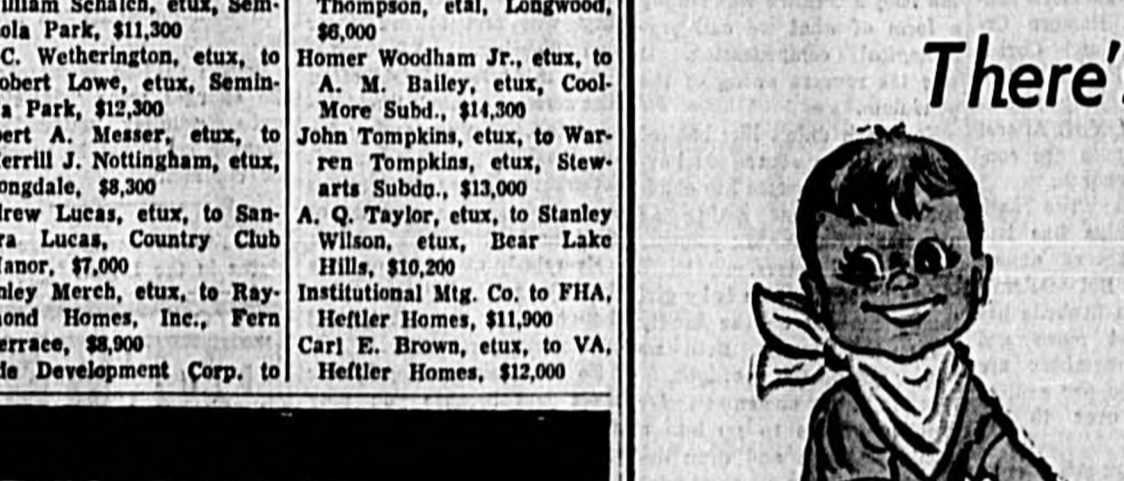

This is that the Russians are merely doing to us what we have done to them many times. The United States, it is pointed out, has invaded Asia and military bases ringed all around the Soviet Union, from the North Sea to the Sea of Japan.

On the surface, the argument appears valid. It has a fairness about it that appeals to Americans, who like to assume that their arguments make the same impression on Communists.

But it ignores the fact that our arms and our military policy have been a constant reaction to a series of Russian moves that began before the end of World War II and which today continue.

To name a few: Russia's refusal to remove her troops from Iran in 1946; the first violations of the four-power agreements governing Berlin; the seizure of the democratic regimes in Czechoslovakia, Hungary, etc.; and the dropping of the Iron Curtain around their borders; guerrilla war in Greece.

All that is ancient history, however, though it is still open to disputed interpretations. But the fact remains that ever since the end of the Korean War, the power struggle between East and West has been fairly static and the boundary line between the two spheres fairly well established.

There has been continual prodding against the line, of course, and occasional eruptions through it, such as currently in Southeast Asia. And it is far from being stabilized, as the ever-increasing tension in Berlin testifies.

Yet the passage of time has made this division of the world more or less permanent, despite the desires of men, and it is thus legitimate to view Russia's virtual occupation of Cuba as merely an equalizing of the situation and to say it is the same as the United States maintaining a base in Turkey.

Let those who are leaning over backwards to find justification for Cuba ask themselves what would happen if the United States suddenly began sending great quantities of arms and "technicians" to a country like Finland, right up against Russia itself and hitherto acknowledged as being within the sphere of Soviet influence as Cuba once was within the American. There would be a real parallel to Cuba.

Even our most fanatic rightists, who harp on our alleged "no-win" policy, would have to admit that such a thing would be an unwarranted provocation of the Russians and a serious tampering with the precarious balance on which world peace rests.

Even should we grant what is patently false, that Castro represents the democratically voiced will of the Cuban people who, through him, have requested Soviet aid, it is dangerous playing with fire for the Kremlin to send that aid—just as it would be for the United States to send missiles to the Finns at their request.

The problem of Cuba is a difficult one, with no clear solution in view. The President is charged with the responsibility of solving it, but it will not help him if the nation behind him is divided between those who urge all-out war against six million Cubans and those who say it is just following the rules of the game to let these little pawns be swept to the Communist side of the board.

"Red" Churches Grow

At the Roman Catholic Church's Synodical Council in Rome are some men who daily have suffered persecution for their faith, and sometimes imprisonment.

These men are representatives of the "church of silence" behind the Iron Curtain. That they are there at all is proof both of their own determination and of Communist failure to stamp out religion even after 45 years.

Two high officers of the church are missing from the home continent. They are Joseph Cardinal Mindszenty of Hungary, now in refuge at the U. S. legation in Budapest, and Archbishop Josef Beran of Czechoslovakia, confined since 1946 for his refusal to take the Communist oath of allegiance.

A survey of the state of religion in the European Iron Curtain countries just has been published by Radio Free Europe.

The survey points out that the churches remain the only organized bodies in Eastern Europe which are not directly controlled by the Communist parties, and as such promote the only rival ideology to communism.

They remain remarkably strong despite an unremitting campaign by Communist governments, ranging from a spider's web of legal restrictions and arrests of priests to the scientific teaching of atheism.

Here is a rundown: Soviet Union: The Communist party newspaper Pravda recently admitted "atheist education" has had no impact on "the heart core of believers." Estimates, which may be too high, place the number of persons belonging to various religious faiths in the Soviet Union at 80 million—roughly 45 per cent of the population.

Bulgaria: Bulgarians traditionally are stubborn adherents to the Eastern Orthodox Church, and Christians and Easter find churches and nearby streets and squares crowded. Almost all rural marriages are concluded in the church.

Czechoslovakia: The anti-religious campaign has had considerable success among young people. But Ostrava newspaper Nova Svoboda has complained that more and more church members are ready to turn 10 per cent of their income over to the church.

East Germany: After erection of the Berlin wall in August, 1961, the Communists redoubled their efforts to split the German Evangelical Church into east and west. The effort so far has failed. A Protestant official estimated that 80 per cent of the young people in East Germany attend church.

Hungary: The regime recognizes the strong religious feeling of the majority and has hesitated to clamp down too hard. Efforts to substitute atheist forms for weddings, christenings and funerals have had little success.

Poland: Church situation has worsened steadily in past few years but still is best of all Communist bloc countries. Church attendance considered better than in previous days.

Romania: Older persons appear to be immune to atheist propaganda, although it is showing some effects among teen-agers.

Reds Celebrate Old War

MOSCOW (UPI)—The Soviet government today observed the 150th anniversary of Russia's victory over Napoleon with ceremonies on the battlefield and a "festive meeting" in the glass-and-marble Palace of Congresses inside the Kremlin.

Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev and other top Communist and government leaders attended the celebration in the Kremlin fortresses on Red Square.

Beth's excessive concern for the baby's welfare was simply a form of what we call psychological compensation. It was the reverse swing of the pendulum.

For Beth didn't like babies! She had been soured on having a family because her childhood was spent acting as a nursemaid for her six younger brothers and sisters.

And after her own baby girl finally arrived on the family stage, that meant Beth no longer got all the spotlight.

It is not uncommon for "spoiled" wives to go into a mental tizzy and even demand sanitarium treatment following the birth of their first baby.

For this demotion of a spoiled wife, who may also have been the "only" child and the darling of her own parents, is a terrific shock to many grown women.

Everybody tends to ignore "mamma's" after the birth of the new baby and now inquire "How's the baby?"

Mamma may then resent the baby and secretly think: "Oh, it was so much pleasanter before the baby came! I wish I could enjoy that peace (and spotlighting) once more."

When this though even absentmindedly fits across her consciousness, such a mother may then recoil in shock.

"What am I thinking?" she says to herself in horror. "Why I must be a heinous monster to consider the death of my own baby. I must be abnormal. Surely I must be going insane."

Then such mothers may actually try to assume the sym-

ptoms of insanity as a form of self-inflicted punishment.

And they may grow terrified lest God really take their baby away via death. That's when they become excessively concerned about its health so they jump out of bed a dozen times per night to see if it is still breathing.

Remember, excessive concern may be a reverse swing of the pendulum to disguise an earlier state of indifference or even jealousy.

You husbands of wives who were spoiled "only" children, must anticipate this terrific shock that childbirth often produces even in a supposedly mature college educated wife. Then you can ward off many sanitarium cases.

For not only must the oldest child be properly prepared for the arrival of the second baby in a family, but a lot of wives must likewise be "cushioned" against the secret jealousy they will feel toward their own offspring.

And this "Death Wish" often fits across the mind of middle-aged folks who are caring for an invalid parent. But it doesn't mean you are callous or unfeeling or a monster or abnormal!

Everybody at times, as in a fit of anger, will thus think thoughts that are not typical of his true personality.

So don't become psychiatric cases just because you may have flirted subconsciously with the desire to get rid of your responsibilities.

WASHINGTON—(NEA)—What the average citizen gets out of the new tax law just passed by Congress is not much.

What came out was a series of highly technical amendments to existing tax law. The changes benefit corporations and businessmen. Business will even be allowed to deduct expenses for lobbying and trying to influence congressional votes.

As originally requested by President Kennedy last year, the tax bill was intended to close tax loopholes and increase tax receipts sufficiently to cover revenue losses from an investment tax credit of 15 per cent on new equipment purchases. This latter was cut to 7 per cent.

An administration proposal

for compulsory deduction of taxes from dividends and interest payments to individuals was killed.

Treasury and congressional staff estimates put the government's loss of revenue from the new law for the fiscal year ending next June 30 at from \$670 million to \$1.3 billion. For full years after that the estimated losses will be from \$170 million to \$600 million.

These figures do not take into account the increased taxes which Treasury expects to collect from the alternative effects on business of the 7 per cent investment tax credit. No one is smart enough to make any estimate of how much this might be.

For average citizens filing individual income tax returns, here are some of the new law's more important effects:

Companies paying dividends and interest to individuals will be required to make more detailed reports on such payments to the government. If Internal Revenue Service checks up on all these reports, it may be able to collect taxes from a lot of people who have not been paying them. IRS hopes to collect about \$175 million of the more than \$1 billion that has been escaping the tax collectors through this old loophole.

Expense account deductions of salesmen and business executives for entertainment of customers were tightened a little. Expenses for maintaining yachts or hunting lodges will be deductible only to the extent that they are used for entertaining that leads directly to a business transaction.

Good will entertaining, banquets and business meals are made deductible for tax purposes only if they directly precede or follow a substantial and bona fide business talk.

Taking a customer to a night club or a prize fight would not be a deductible expense if it is not preceded or followed by business negotiations. It's still a big loophole.

With the approval and provisional consent of Capt. Cordell's family, I would be honored to propose that Osceola Airport be renamed Seminole County Airport and be dedicated to the memory of Capt. Terry Cordell and be identified as "CORDELL FIELD."

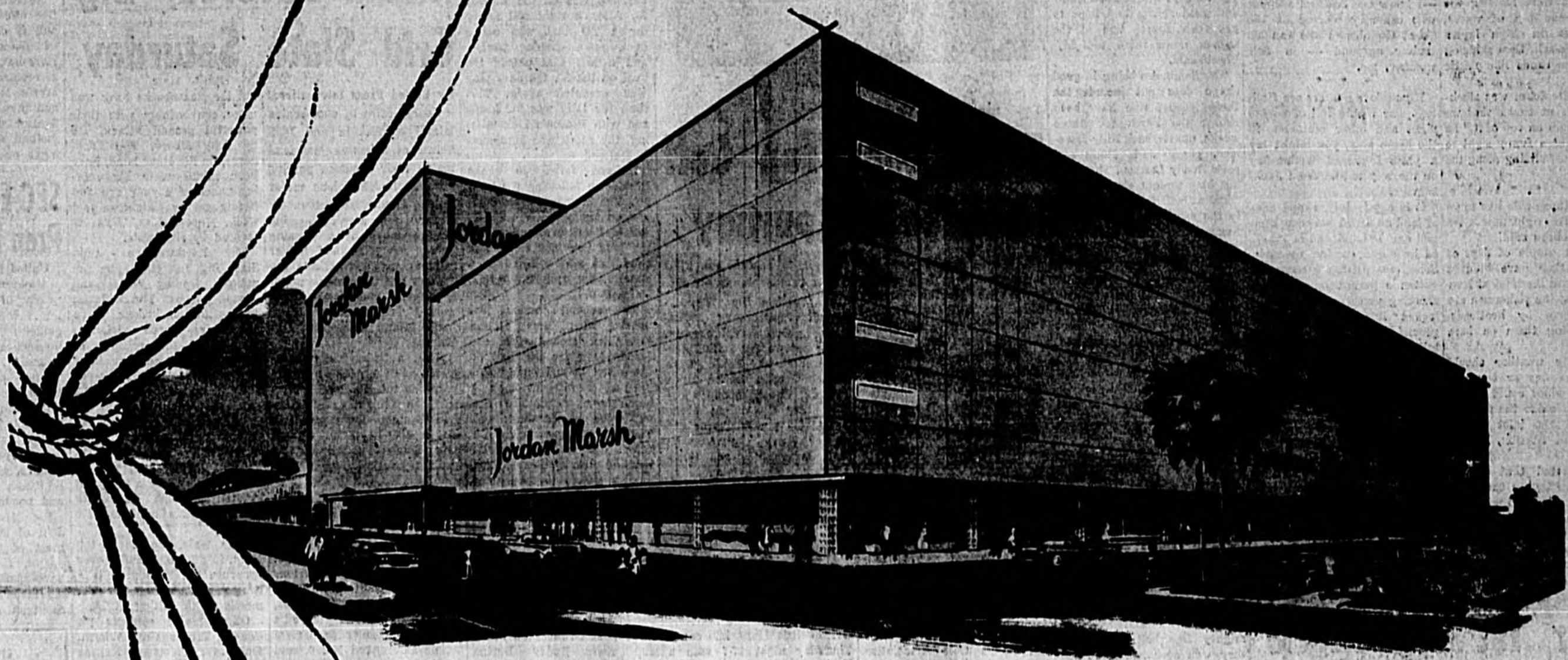

Shiner, a six-foot, 195-pound junior, has hit on 85 of 94 attempts, good for 687 yards and three TD's. Maryland, front-runner in the Atlantic Coast Conference, has won four games this year.

In Saturday's top games, first-ranked Texas meets Southwest Conference rival Arkansas, ranked No. 6, and third-ranked Northwestern tangles with seventh-ranked Ohio State.

Alabama, rated No. 2, is an 11-point favorite to hand Tennessee its fifth straight defeat; fourth-ranked Mississippi is a 13-point choice over winless Tulane; fifth-ranked Southern California rates 16 points better than California; eighth-ranked Wisconsin is picked by six over Iowa; ninth-ranked Washington takes on Stanford, an eight-point underdog, and 10th-rated LSU is a 14-point choice over Kentucky.

Both Texas and Arkansas, co-holders of the Southwest Conference crown, have compiled 4-0 records this season.

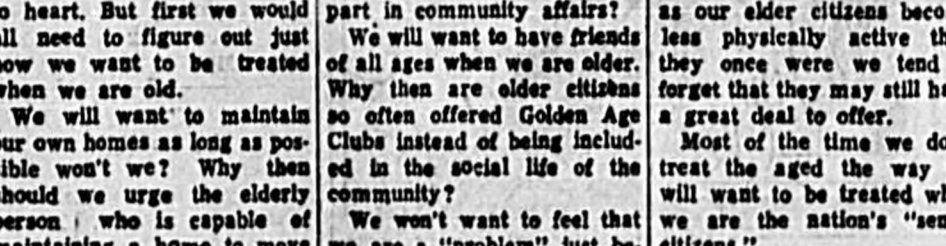

We will want to be useful to others as long as we are able-bodied. Why then, aren't our elderly citizens encouraged to take a more active part in community affairs?

We will want to have friends of all ages when we are older. Why then are older citizens so often offered Golden Age Clubs instead of being included in the social life of the community?

We won't want to feel that we are a "problem" just be-

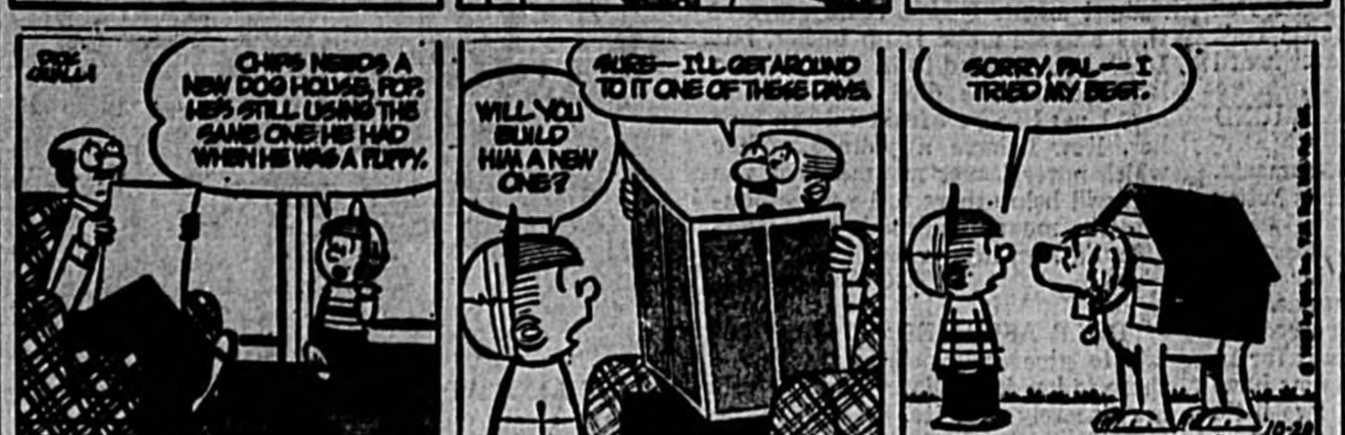

Former Church Trustee Gives Statement On Hearing

C. W. Mullins, instigator of a suit to establish his legal rights as trustee of the Altamonte Springs First Baptist Church against Rev. Lewis D. Haines, pastor of the church, today issued a statement pointing out that last week's decision handed down by Judge Valle Williams Jr. had nothing to do with charges originally brought against the minister and in no way cleared him of misconduct charges presented before a meeting of the church in July.

"Last week's hearing had only to do with settling aside a former ruling after I failed to take active part in the affair," Mullins said.

"As to the guilt or innocence of Haines," Mullins said, "charges stemming from actions of the minister last February and of his arrest for these actions are still on record in the Maitland Police Dept."

"All interested persons are invited to attend the lectures."

Mullins went on to say that "as trustee of the church I have never been consulted about any affairs of the church or money spent even though I was supposed to okay any and all transactions that were carried on since Haines' arrest."

"I quit attending church in Altamonte Springs and asked our attorney to request that the restraining order in my favor be dissolved by Judge Williams which was done on Oct. 9, 1952."

"Regarding the statement made by H. R. Hamby that if we had taken the effort to learn the truth as it occurred instead of passing opinion on public reports that supposedly took place, we know of no other records that could be more exact than those in the Maitland Police Station."

"As long as James Spencer, C. W. Mullins, Clifford Smith, Leslie T. Bryan and Robert Bradford were trustees and Mrs. Don Harris the treasurer, we never failed to make our payments on the church and we had the respect of the community."

"We voted Mr. Haines out of that church, we gave him proper notice of 60 days and 'they' have refused to recognize this as a business meeting."

"Another hearing held last Thursday dealt with notes that Mrs. Grace Bradford and Bryan hold against the church. Present at the hearing, other than the attorneys, were Thomas W. Sotherland Jr., Hamby, Bryan and Mrs. Bradford."

"At that time, Judge Williams indicated that he would enter judgments on behalf of Mrs. Bradford and Bryan against the First Baptist Church of Altamonte Springs for the money they loaned to the church in August of 1949," Mullins said.

Mrs. Bradford and Bryan each loaned the church \$2,500 in 1958 in order to enable the church to proceed with building of its first unit.

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Where Is Super-Carrier? Enterprise?

The Defense Department today announced "cancellation" of an amphibious maneuver in which more than 6,000 Marines were to have landed at Vieques Island near Puerto Rico Tuesday.

The Navy today refused to explain the exact whereabouts of the newest super-carrier, the nuclear-powered Enterprise with some 400 men from the Sanford Naval Air Station aboard.

The giant ship put out from Norfolk, Va. last Thursday. Reporters flying to Puerto Rico Sunday sighted it steaming south in the Atlantic. The big carrier was not originally listed as among the vessels assigned to this exercise.

It was also reported the Navy abruptly canceled a tour by newsmen aboard warships today amid mounting speculation that Navy-Marine maneuvers in the area were somehow linked with the Cuban situation.

The official explanation given was that the ships assembling in the area for scheduled maneuvers did not get close enough to this naval base on the southeast coast of Puerto Rico to permit the air transport of reporters to the vessels.

Also canceled was a scheduled morning press conference with Vice Adm. Horacio Rivero, commander of the amphibious exercise, aboard the flagship Mt. McKinley.

The maneuvers involve a force of about 20,000 men and 60 ships, including an estimated 6,000 battle-ready Marines. The Marines were due to storm ashore in a mock amphibious assault on the small island of Vieques.

Navy officials insisted the landing will be carried through as scheduled Tuesday. They said it had been planned for some time and in no way involved Cuba.

"We won't talk about Cuba, politically or military," one official said.

Big Question

Also on the program for the meeting will be a discussion of a letter from the County Courthouse Committee on space for an office for the administrative assistant included in the budget for the coming year. The committee's recommendation is that space be rented outside the courthouse.

Chinese Troops, Tanks Open New Onslaught Against India

NEW DELHI (UPI)—Chinese communist troops opened up a new front today in the undeclared border war with India and threw tanks into action in another sector of the embattled frontier, the Indian government said.

The government said the Communist forces launched a new "vigorous attack" this morning at Kibitso, on the eastern tip of the border, more than 100 miles from any previous reported fighting.

It said that tanks were brought in to crush an outpost in Ladakh, on the north-west sector in northern Kashmir, after the Indian post had earlier driven off Chinese artillery and infantry attacks.

It was the first time tanks had been reported employed in the border war that raged for the third consecutive day today between the world's two most populous nations.

An official Indian military spokesman said that eight Indian posts had been overwhelmed by advancing Chinese forces in Ladakh, and that seven more outpost units

"had fallen back to regroup." The Indian government report coincided with a Chinese Communist claim that its troops had captured at least four more Indian border points in their drive westward.

A New China News Agency broadcast monitored in Tokyo said that Chinese troops had "recovered Chipu, Jih-chang, Changto, the Hatung pass and other places" along the Sino-Indian border.

The Communist Sunday report the capture of at least seven other Indian posts in the frontier conflict that threatened to engulf the little Himalayan state of Bhutan.

Peiping Radio reported the Indians had launched a "violent" counter-attack early today at the extreme eastern end of the border after a weekend of losses.

Worried Indian government officials, struggling with the massive problems of getting reinforcements and supplies into battle areas two and three miles high, were preparing for the possibility of a major war with their giant communist neighbor.

"From the way they (the Chinese) are going, there's no limit to where they may go," Defense Minister V. K. Krishna Menon told newsmen Sunday.

The Chinese communists claimed the capture of seven more Indian outposts on the Tibetan border Sunday, and Indian sources admitted the Chinese had advanced as much as five miles since the battle started Saturday.

Indian newspapers, and even Krishna Menon, referred to the fighting as a "war." The Indian Express, this country's largest circulation newspaper, demanded that relations with communist China be broken off.

NEW YORK (UPI)—Heavy, relentless selling hit the stock market this morning in the wake of international crisis reports in Washington.

The ticker was five minutes late only a half hour after the opening bell with a flood of sell orders resulting in "flash" prices.

The somewhat depressing statements at a business leaders conference in Hot Springs, Va., added to traders' concern over the Washington headlines.

Pressure was sufficient to send the average down through their short-term resistance levels almost immediately, and many brokers felt there was nothing left to prevent a test of the year's lows.

The trend-setting issues, Polaroid, Xerox and IBM, all opened late. IBM slid 3/4 to 310 on 2,700 shares, Xerox 2 1/2 to 135 on 2,000 shares and Polaroid six to 100 on 8,300.

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County Board To Talk Fate Of Drag Racing, Air Strip

Top subject on the agenda for the County Commission meeting Tuesday will be the matter of the Osceola Air Strip and its future uses, according to Commission Chairman General J. C. Hutchinson.

The board will be asked to make a decision on which of the three possible courses will be taken for the 1,150 acre airstrip. The FAA indicated several weeks ago the county would have to make up its mind as to whether the strip would be closed completely, kept partially open or reserved wholly to use by aircraft.

There will also be a discussion of the suggested priority list for county roads, submitted a month ago by County Engineer Bill Bush.

The appointment of a Board of Adjustment and Appeals to the Building Code will be talked over by the commission and some action may be taken. 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Wright Murder Trial Date To Be Set Soon

State's Attorney Arthur Steel is expected to set a trial date the first week in November for Mrs. Christine Wright charged with second degree murder in the death of her husband April 14.

In May a Seminole County grand jury returned a true bill indicting Mrs. Wright for the murder of her husband, Virgil James Wright.

The offense which carries a 20-year to life penalty, was defined in the bill as "enjoining a depraved mind and as being without premeditated design."

Wright was found at the back of his home in Sanford lying in a flower bed, shot in the face. His wife told deputies she called the police twice, once without giving an address and then again giving the location of the home.

JFK Summons Congress Leaders On Policy Move

WASHINGTON (UPI)—President Kennedy summoned some top congressional leaders back to Washington today amid reports that a new U. S. foreign policy move was in the making.

There were many indications that a crisis had developed. The White House had no immediate comment, but all signs pointed to a clarifying statement within a matter of hours.

Senate GOP Leader Everett M. Dirksen, R-Ill., was one of those summoned back to Washington by the President. An aide said in Chicago that "the senator was told at 8:45 a. m. that the President was sending a jet plane here to pick him up for the return to Washington. I understand he talked to the President directly."

The aide said that a similar summons had been issued to Leslie Arends, House Republican whip, who also is campaigning in Illinois.

Heavy Selling Hits Market In Wake Of 'Crisis'

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Hunt On For Storm Survivors

ROERVIK, Norway (UPI)—Norwegian rescue teams, hampered by rain and heavy winds, today pulled survivors and bodies from the storm-lashed seas where a coastal vessel with nearly 100 persons aboard went aground and apparently sank during the night.

A Navy spokesman, Cmdr. Dahl Johansen, said 48 survivors and eight bodies were brought ashore. Unconfirmed reports said three more survivors had been picked up, and several others sighted on small islands near the disaster area. Another report said 12 more bodies had been seen floating in the sea.

It was not immediately possible to determine the number of persons still missing from the 3,173-ton Sanct Spirit, which was believed carrying

about 45 passengers and 45 crewmen.

A spokesman for the ship's owners, the Norwegian shipping firm Stavangerbrev Dampskiffsselskap, said it was not known how many persons were aboard the ship. He said some of the survivors reached land in five lifeboats.

The Sanct Spirit apparently hit a reef off the rugged northern coast of Norway shortly before midnight as it battled a storm in the narrow strait between the mainland and Vikna Island, where Roerвик is located.

A search of nearby islands and fjords got under way at daylight, but heavy rain made visibility very poor.

Early today a Catalina search plane of the Norwegian air force reported sighting wreckage, mailbags and luggage from the missing vessel.

"The mailbags indicate that the ship has sunk," the spokesman said.

Shipping experts said the lack of any signal such as rocket flares or the spotting of emergency lanterns also led to the belief the ship had sunk.

The ship's last radio messages said it had received a hole in the side and its electricity had failed but lifeboats were set out. Then radio contact was lost.
