High Court To Probe Fla. Apportionment Plan

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Supreme Court agreed today to examine a reapportionment plan for the Florida House and Senate enacted by the Legislature on March 9 of this year.

The court will hear arguments later this term on an appeal from a decision on March 18 by a special three-judge federal panel in Miami, which found the plan unconstitutional.

This is the third time the lawsuit, started in 1962, has been before the high court. The fight has been carried on by Dade County Elections Supervisor Claude R. Brown now succeeded by Martin Braterman and Richard H. M. Swann, now judge of Florida's 3rd District Court of Appeals.

They said the new plan allows "a clear pattern of under-representation for the populous urban counties and over-representation for the sparsely settled rural counties in the legislative houses."

The difference between true population equality and some of the over-represented counties in the House is as much as 18.28 per cent, the appeal said, while some under-represented counties are off by 16.27 per cent. In the Senate, the percentages were said to run 16.59 and 10.66 per cent, respectively.

Because of some lower court decisions applying the court's standard set by the Supreme Court in 1964, the general feeling has developed that a 15 per cent deviation from equality is permissible, the appeal said.

"This appeal presents to the court a unique opportunity to make clear that is . . . standard will not be followed and that there is no maximum permissible deviation," it declared.

The complainants also objected to the "grandfathering" of senators from Orange, Palm Beach and Polk counties, while other senators whose terms had not expired were not similarly treated in the new plan.

After the high court's 1964 ruling, the case was returned to the three-judge panel for further action. At that point the Legislature enacted a temporary plan which State Atty. Gen. Earl Faircloth contended was not in accord with the Supreme Court yardstick.

But the panel let it stand temporarily with the understanding that it would be overruled again later. As the result of a second appeal, the Supreme Court said on Feb. 29, 1966, that it found "no warrant for perpetuating what all conceded to be an unconstitutional apportionment for a 90th or 91st session" and again returned the case to the lower court. The outcome of this order was the plan acted on today.

Fear 'Complete Chaos' County Voter Registration Shows Big Dip

Seminole County legislators expressed the fear that a negative decision by the Supreme Court concerning the apportionment of the legislature would throw the state into "complete chaos."

Both Sen. Mack N. Cleveland Jr. and Rep. S. J. Davis Jr. gave opinions, however, that while the court could declare the apportionment unconstitutional, it probably would instead give tentative approval on a temporary basis with the inadequacies to be corrected during the 1967 session.

Cleveland stated, "The very worst I feel they will do is order the legislature to submit an acceptable reapportionment to meet its previous decisions."

Davis said, "Since the court has involved itself in apportionment of the various states and declared the previous reapportionment unconstitutional, it is proper that it look at the last plan."

He further declared, "This is an acceptable plan although I feel it does not meet the absolute criteria of one man-one vote with a mathematical certainty."

"There may be some merit to the grandfather portion of the plan since all Senators were not treated alike," Davis opined.

Both Cleveland and Davis voted against the plan during the legislative session of the Legislature because Seminole County was placed in the large 11 county, fourth senatorial district with four senators elected at large.

Members of the powerful senate rules committee meeting at the Capitol indicated the suit could throw the legislature into a turmoil.

"Something like this is all we need," said Sen. Jack Matthews of Jacksonville, looking forward upon the prospect of another reapportionment session. He expressed doubt that a decision could be reached before the Nov. 8 Florida general election. If the Swann decision were overturned by the Supreme Court, the results in the legislative race could be thrown out.

Two senators directly named in the suit, Ben Johnson of Orlando and Ben Hill Griffin of Frostproof, commented on the suit's objections to their being "grandfathered in" to the next Legislature, without having to stand election this year as all but one of their colleagues were required.

Sen. Johnson said she felt the decision in the Swann case was "eminently fair," although conceding that some areas need to be revised."

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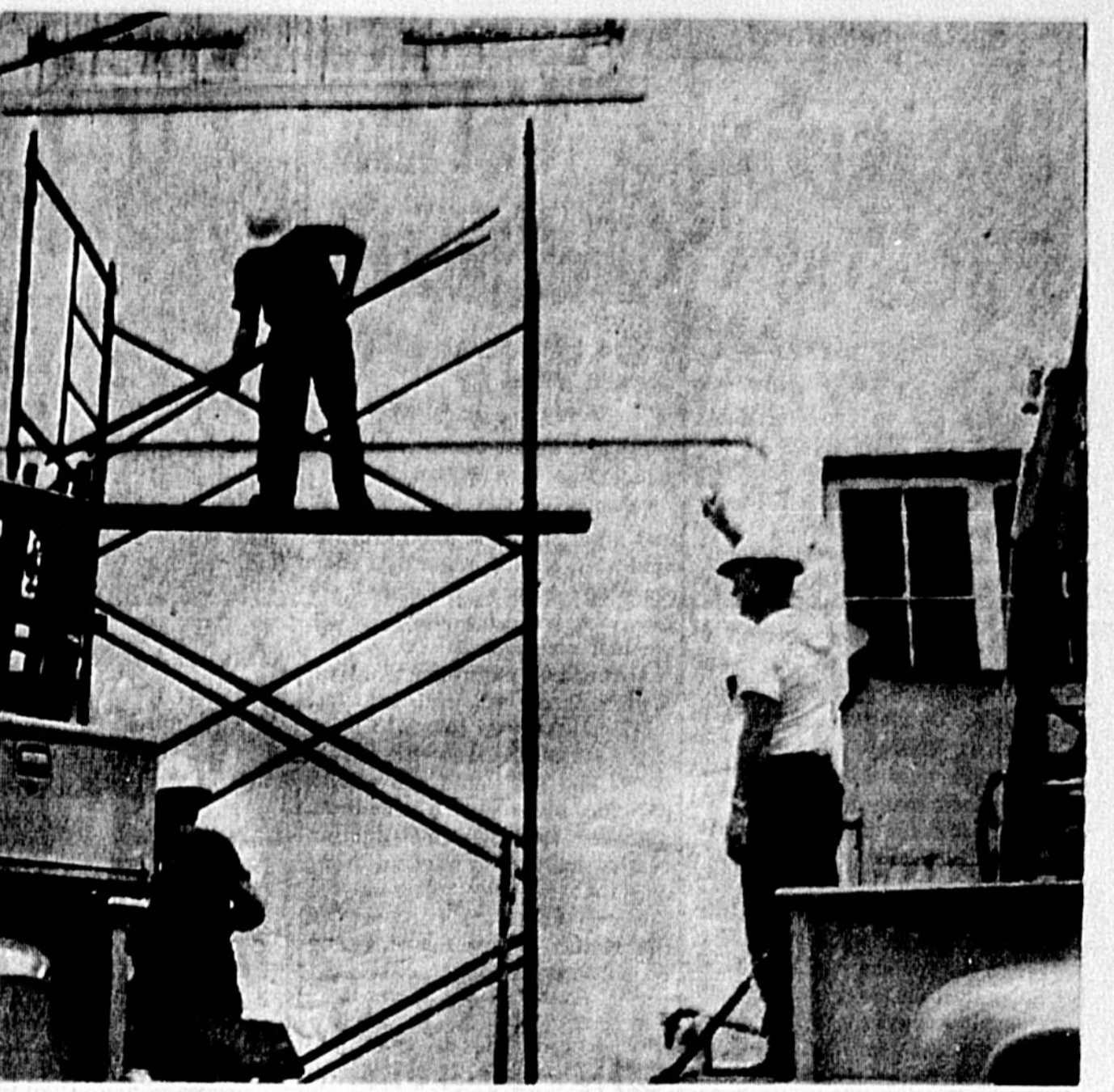

Tax Collections Up

For the second month in succession, Seminole sales tax collections have increased by nearly 10 per cent over the same period in 1965, according to a report received from the office of J. Ed Strawn, director of the Florida Revenue Commission.

Sales tax collected in September amounted to \$105,636.20 as opposed to \$103,726.68 in August and \$97,524.40 in Sept., 1965.

Of this amount, \$65,309.24 was returned to the county.

World News In Brief

APPEAL GRANTED — WASHINGTON (AP) — The Supreme Court granted today a writ of habeas corpus to Curtis Publishing Company against a \$400,000 judgment given by a federal court in New York. The writ was granted because the court found that the company had been denied a fair trial.

COURT SAYS NO — WASHINGTON (AP) — The Supreme Court refused today to review a decision that upheld Maryland's practice of exempting church property from taxation.

INEX MISSISS GULF — HURRICANE MISSISS GULF, a tropical storm, hit the Texas Gulf coast today and slammed inland deeper into Mexico. It was reported with winds up to 135 miles an hour and blinding rains.

Enrollment at the end of the first month of school at Sanford Junior High in Casselberry, 1,558.

The high schools are close behind with Crooms at 1,229 (senior and junior high), Seminole High, 1,104 and Lyman 1,034.

Oviedo's daily attendance with students from the first through the 12th grades is 744.

Largest elementary school, grades one through six is Pine Crest with 1,136 students; next largest is Goldboro with 976 students, followed by Altamonte with 832, Lake Mary with 830 and South Seminole Elementary with 816.

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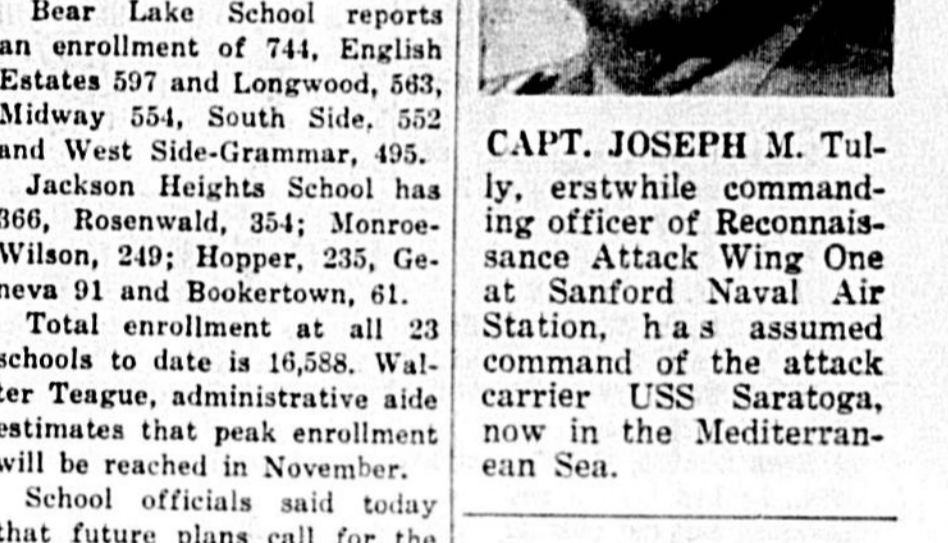

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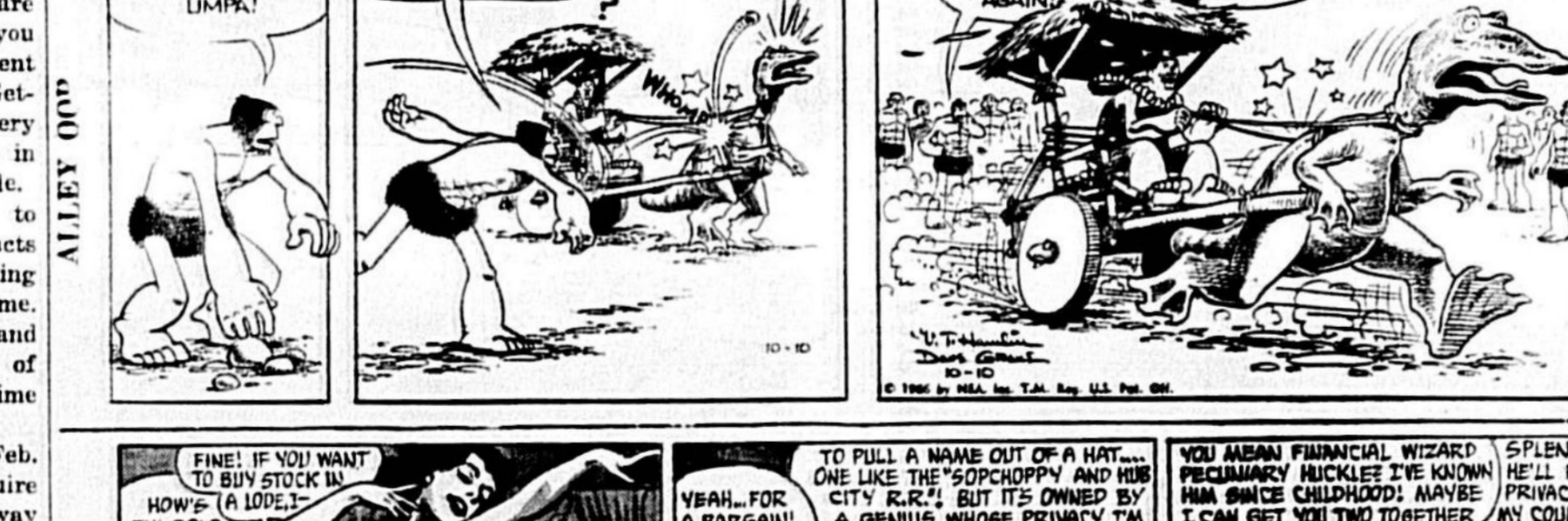
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Jacoby On Bridge

Flooding Study Set By City Commission

Heavy flooding in certain low-lying street areas in the central part of city residential areas is going to receive extensive study from city commissioners.

"Something simply must be done about this situation. Every time we have a heavy rain, some of these streets are simply impassable, especially on Sanford Avenue, Mellonville and Elm in the 13th Street to 17th Street areas, as well as several other spots," Commissioner Joe Baker declared.

Other commissioners agreed and declared to contact engineers to institute a study of "what can be done about the situation."

In the absence of City Manager W. E. Knowles, who is on vacation, commission deferred action until Knowles' return when he will be asked to talk with engineers about a plan to alleviate the flooding problem.

According to previous studies on the situation it has been indicated that bigger storm drains would have to be laid in order to carry off the flash flooding waters, or possibly a lift station installed to pump the water out of the low spots.

"Whatever we are able to do to correct this problem is going to cost a considerable amount of money," said Commissioner Earl Higginbotham.

Nevertheless, it must be done. The situation isn't going to get any better," he concluded.

Grab Teamster For Bombings Of Blythe Trucks

A Teamsters' Union organizer, Taylor Andrews, who is suspected of connection with repeated bombings of trucks belonging to local Blythe Motor Lines transport trucks, Redwing Carriers Corporation, has been convicted in Miami of illegal possession of dynamite, The Sanford Herald learned today.

The Miami Police Department reported today that 62 sticks of dynamite found in a suitcase belonging to Andrews were wrapped in copies of the local newspaper.

(Over the past year, The Herald has carried numerous stories on the bombing, burning and sabotaging of trucks belonging to the local firm, while it was being picketed by Teamsters Union organizers.)

"The U.S. Department of Agriculture," he writes, "paid \$4,664,745 to 25 Florida sugar concerns during 1965 as a reward for not producing sugar."

Churches--- Tax Break To Go On

Other commissioners agreed and declared to contact engineers to institute a study of "what can be done about the situation."

Sanford Hit With \$2,915 Fla. Tax Bill

City of Sanford has been hit with a tax bill for \$2,915 on October 10, 1966, from the State Supreme Court decision.

City Attorney William Hutchins explained that though municipalities do not usually have to pay taxes on gasoline, fuel and other items, the Supreme Court ruling designates utilities such as refuse collection, "business enterprise," on which the city "theoretically" realizes a profit.

"Therefore the court decided municipalities must pay seven cents a gallon tax on fuel used to operate city vehicles," Hutchins said.

It was pointed out that the State of Florida must also pay the tax on quantities of fuel less than 500 gallons. The \$2,915 will be paid out of contingency.

"The tax reverts back to the state, so the state is actually taxing itself," Commissioner Earl Higginbotham commented.

Mandatory retirement age for city employees is 65 years, but extension can be granted, on a year to year basis, by commission approval.

Hardy has worked for the city since 1929 when he went to work in the utility department. In 1953, he was transferred to the traffic department and for 13 years has had the job of keeping an eagle eye on commercial parkers, on the city's main street.

"He's always cheerful, courteous, polite and manages to maintain good relationships with the public, even while he's handling them a ticket," one person commented.

How The Government Takes Care Of Sugarman For Not Producing

A. Duda and Sons, Inc., of Oviedo, was paid \$142,197 for not producing sugar in 1965, according to the Tampa Tribune. Washington correspondent for the Florida sugar industry — "Uncle Sam is playing sugar daddy to the Florida sugar industry," Charles S. Telford, Tribune correspondent for the Tribune, wrote in the Oct. 10 edition.

"The U.S. Department of Agriculture," he writes, "paid \$4,664,745 to 25 Florida sugar concerns during 1965 as a reward for not producing sugar."

"Sen. John J. Williams (R-Del.), as onetime grain and feed dealer who has chosen in the Senate to become a watchdog over federal expenditures, places these figures in the congressional record."

Grab Teamster For Bombings Of Blythe Trucks

A Teamsters' Union organizer, Taylor Andrews, who is suspected of connection with repeated bombings of trucks belonging to local Blythe Motor Lines transport trucks, Redwing Carriers Corporation, has been convicted in Miami of illegal possession of dynamite, The Sanford Herald learned today.

The Miami Police Department reported today that 62 sticks of dynamite found in a suitcase belonging to Andrews were wrapped in copies of the local newspaper.

(Over the past year, The Herald has carried numerous stories on the bombing, burning and sabotaging of trucks belonging to the local firm, while it was being plucked by Teamsters Union organizers.)

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World News In Brief

DEFENSE COMPROMISE
WASHINGTON (AP) — A House-Senate conference committee is expected to make public today its compromise in a dispute that has delayed action on a \$58-billion defense appropriation bill.

The dispute centers over a proposal, which the Senate tacked onto the bill, to give President Johnson authority to call up as many as 467,000 reservists without declaring a national emergency.

CONG FIGHTS BACK
SAIGON, South Viet Nam (AP) — A dihard band of Viet Cong guerrillas answered an American demand to surrender with a ball of bullets today, and an encircling force of U.S. helicopter troops wiped them out.

A U.S. spokesman said 1st Division cavalrymen killed 33 Viet Cong and captured eight in a five-hour engagement near the central coast 28 miles northwest of Qui Nhon.

SENTENCE WITHHELD
NEW YORK (AP) — A trial judge has withheld pronouncing sentence in U.S. Rep. Adam Clayton Powell's criminal contempt conviction until he hears Powell's arguments that the case was out of the court's jurisdiction.

State Supreme Court Justice Matthew M. Levy said he would put off sentencing until he decides on the validity of the trial, boycotted by Powell and his attorneys.

INEZ NEARING THE END
MIAMI, Fla. (AP) — A Hurricane Inez whirled toward her death over Mexico today, U.S. weathermen waved a thankful goodbye to the most unpredictable storm ever to come screeching in from the south.

Inez wasn't the most wicked, and she wasn't in the hair of the forecasters as long as some — although it seemed like it.

REYNOLDS HEIR NEAR DEATH
RICHMOND, Va. (UPI) — Millionaire Richard Roland Reynolds, a 29-year-old heir to the Reynolds aluminum fortune, was near death today after walking into a whirling airplane propeller.

Reynolds, the bachelor son of industrialist J. Louis Reynolds, was injured Monday afternoon while inspecting an Italian-designed twin-engine amphibious plane he hoped to buy.

NEARING AN AGREEMENT
WASHINGTON (AP) — Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko says after meeting with President Johnson "he looks like both countries are striving to reach agreement" on a treaty to prevent the spread of nuclear weapons.

The State Department promptly agreed with Gromyko's appraisal.

GE STRIKE FEARED
WASHINGTON (AP) — The threat of a strike against giant General Electric Co. heightened today despite intensified efforts of government officials who fear a walkout would hurt the Viet Nam war effort.

"It is unfortunate that this company has not moved an inch," said Paul Jennings, President of the AFL-CIO International Union of Electrical Workers.

CONGRESS ROADBLOCKS
WASHINGTON (UPI) — The 89th Congress had its eyes fixed on the door today, Roadblocks to a pre-election adjournment were falling. The leaders said Oct. 22 — at the latest — would do it.

But battles still lay ahead on calling up military reservists, on rehabilitating the nation's ghettoes, on outlawing aid to the Viet Cong, and on lesser matters.

KIRK SPENDING MORE
TALLAHASSEE (UPI) — Claude Kirk dipped into his campaign pocket book twice as deep as his Democratic opponent, Robert King High, last week, spending \$34,582 on the race for governor.

It was the second week in a row that Kirk, the Republican nominee, reported spending more than High. High reported campaign expenses for the past week totalling \$14,684.

Churches--- Tax Break To Go On

The judge said there was an "inference of negligence from failure of the carrier to furnish adequate sleeping quarters for the navigating crew." 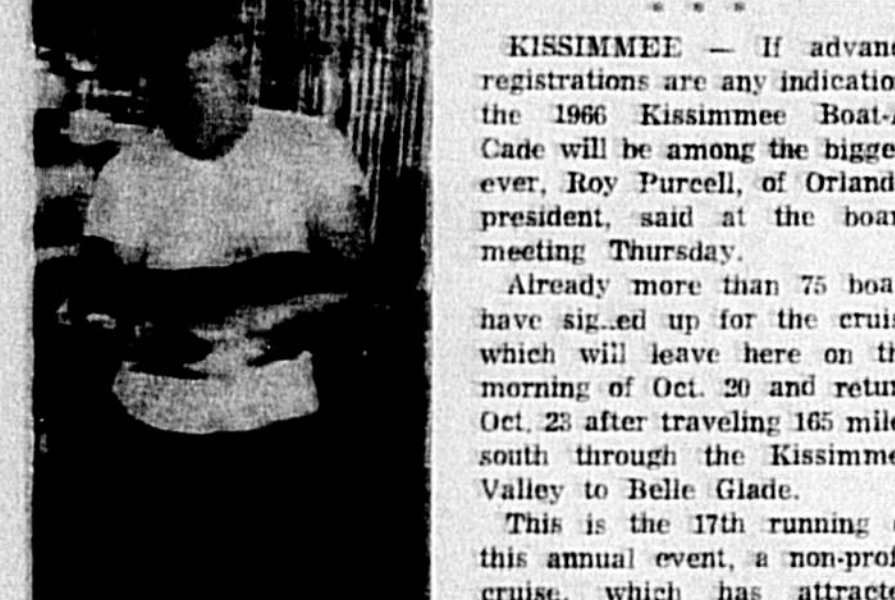

If North and South could see each other's hands they would find three no-trump which is a cinch contract. There are nine tricks in eight.

But South has a normal heart opening and North a normal raise to two hearts. As for South's jump to four hearts we assume that it meets with complete approval of all bridge players.

There also is no good play for four hearts. Dummy's doubleton spade is useless because South also holds a doubton. The jack of spades is of no value. The four trumps are nice but they aren't needed to solidify South's trumps and they just can't ruff anything.

There is one ray of light. West opens the king of clubs which South assumes is from

South must lead the king of clubs. West continues. South must finesse the jack and discard something on the ace of clubs.

The play may not work. Unlike people sometimes lead the king without having the queen to back it up. In that case East would win the second club and South would be down two instead of one. Or clubs might break 4-2 in the first instance East would ruff the second club. Once more South would be down two. In the second case East would ruff the third club and South would still be down one.

All this is possible but here just can't ruff anything. South must duck that first club to give himself the chance to make his contract.

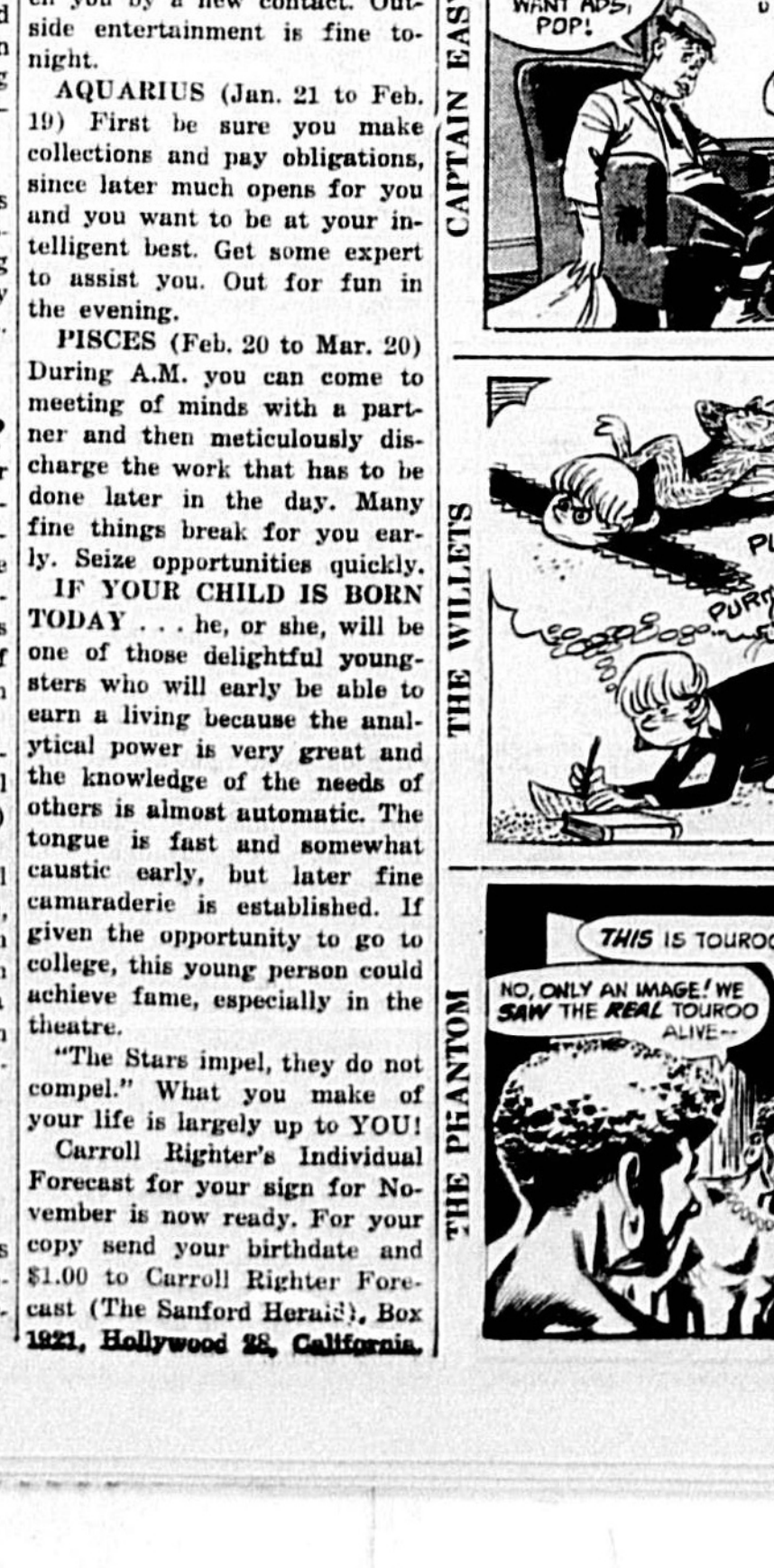
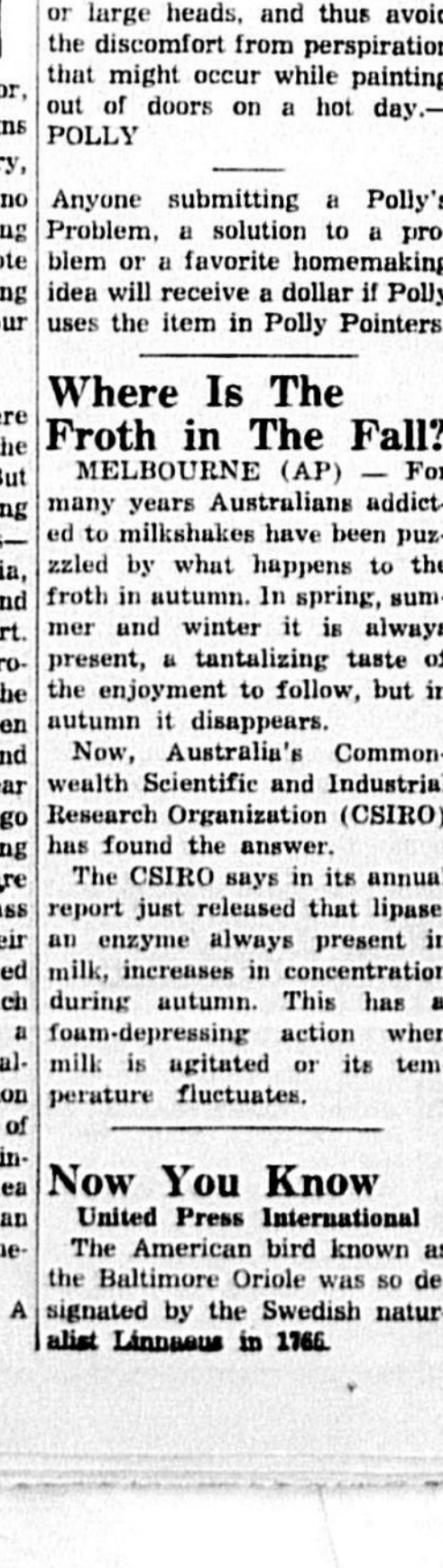
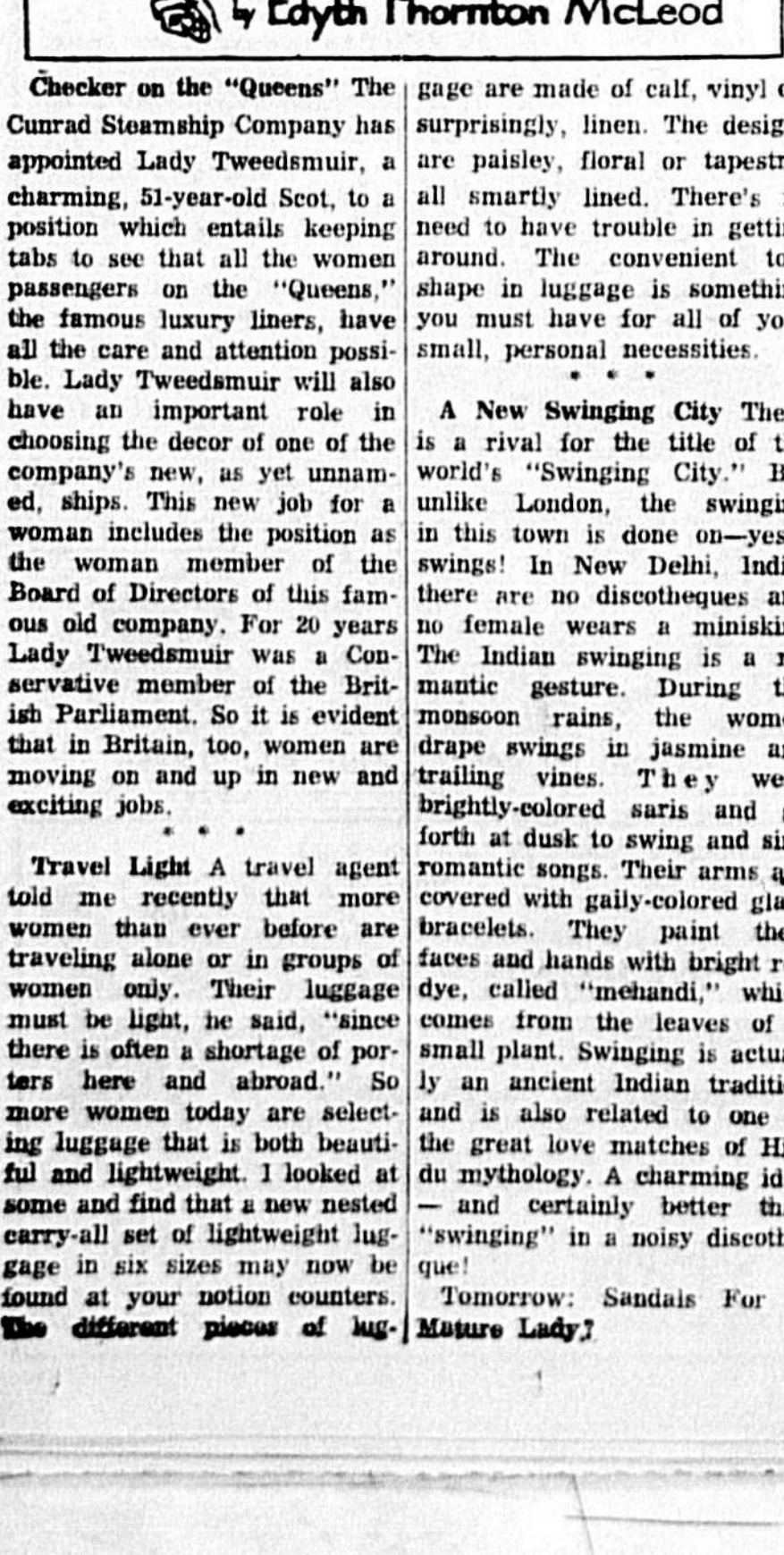
Where Is The Froth In The Fall?

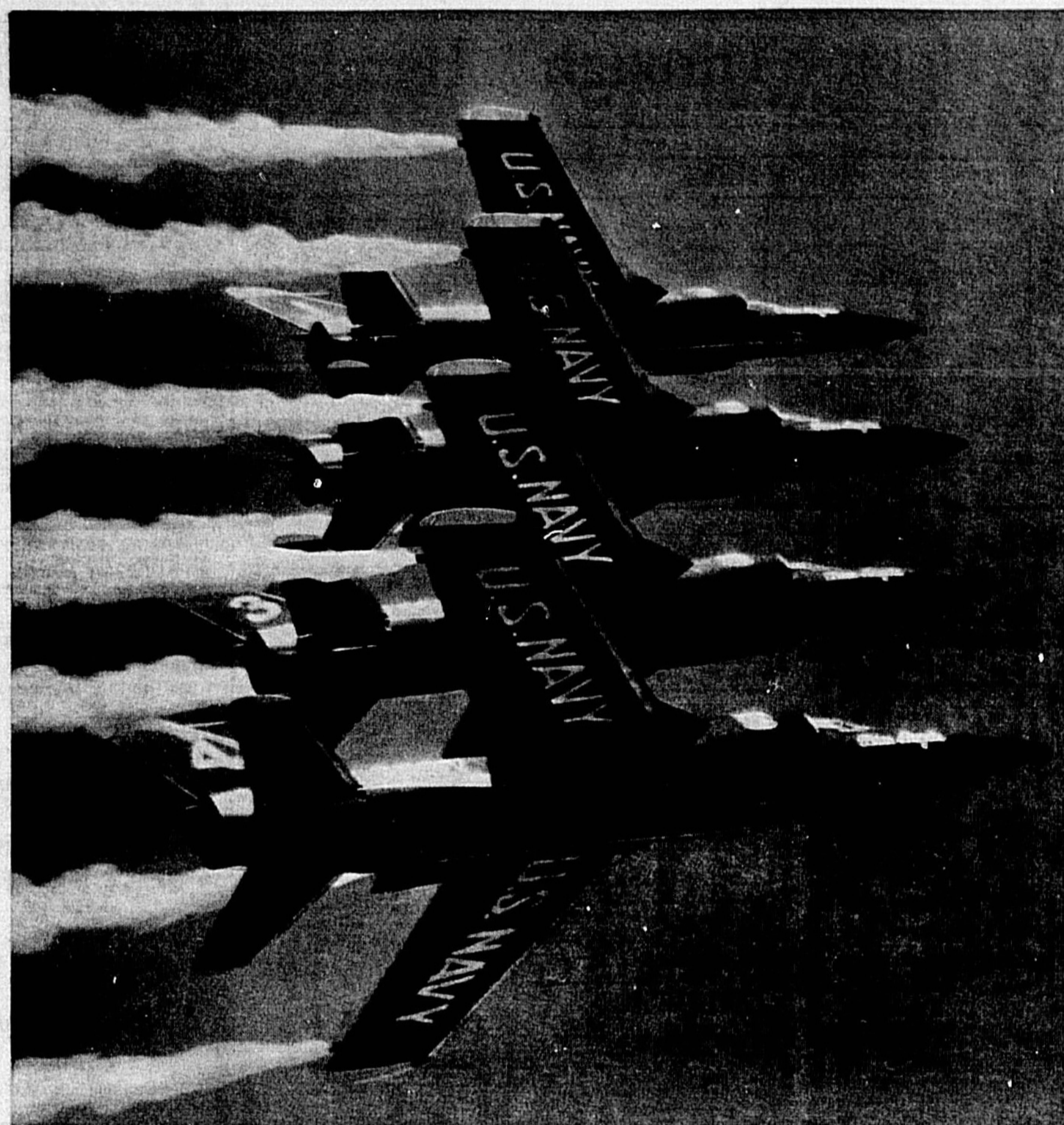

Celebration Set For 'Diamond' Project

A "celebration" meeting in surmounting the final hurdle preparatory to construction of the Lake Mary interchange on Interstate 4 was to be held this afternoon at the County Commission chambers. Commissioners were to meet with Willard Peebles, of Willard, district member of the State Road Department, to "celebrate" the acquisition of all necessary right-of-way for the site of the "diamond." Peebles said all land was donated to the county. Purpose of the meeting was to sign the necessary deeds in the presence of newspaper photographers. Peebles confirmed today that a report published last week by William Benedict, State Road Department district engineer at Deland, that construction plans have been submitted for approval to the U. S. Public Roads Bureau at Tallahassee. SRD anticipates asking for bids and letting the contract in December, with actual construction to start in late January. Benedict said four ramps will be constructed, an entrance and an exit on either side of I-4. A Lake Mary Boulevard bridge over I-4 was constructed when I-4 was built. The ramps will lead on and off I-4 at this bridge on the boulevard. Seminole County recently paved Lake Mary Boulevard from Lake Mary to the bridge and plans to pave from the bridge to Longwood-Markham Road when the ramps are built. Further, it is anticipated a road will be built from Highway 17-92 through Lake Mary to Lake Mary Boulevard, giving a "straight shoot" to I-4. The Lake Mary interchange will give Seminole County five accesses to I-4—at Altamonte Springs, at Longwood and two at Sanford. It will give a center access in the nine-mile stretch between the Longwood (SR-434) and SR-65 (First Street) interchanges.

Contract Signed For New Courthouse Complex

Plans are underway for the construction of a multi-storied new court house and jail complex for Seminole County with the signing Tuesday afternoon of contracts with John Burton IV and James Gamble Rogers as associate architects to design the new facility. Estimated costs of the complex, to be located north of the present jail, is in excess of \$1.5 million. Signing the contract on behalf of the county commission was John Alexander, commission chairman. Plans are scheduled to be completed in 6-8 months according to the architects. Burton and Rogers will discuss space needs with county officials and report back to the commission within 45 days. Following review and determination of space allocation and layout by the commission, it is estimated plans will be completed and ready to put out for bid by June 1, 1967 and construction completed within 18 months to two years. The board over the past six months has been investigating the current and future needs of each office in the court house to provide the increased services needed by the fast growing area. Alexander noted the current one-half mill of taxation levied for capital improvement will be insufficient to construct the facility and no new tax will be required for the project.

County Ponders Job Survey

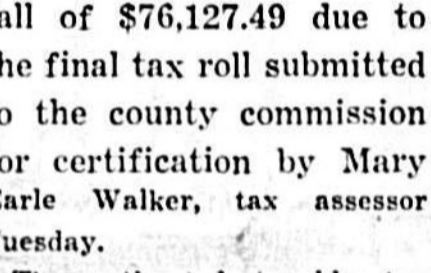
A comprehensive job classification survey of county employees which would cost in the "neighborhood of \$4,000" was proposed by George Cody representative of Frank C. Brown, business surveyors of Miami, at an informal meeting Tuesday afternoon. Present at the meeting were the board of county commissioners, Sheriff J. L. Hobby and elected fee officials including Mrs. Mary Earle Walker, tax assessor; Troy Ray, tax collector and Arthur Beckwith, county clerk. Cody explained the method of conducting such a survey with county employees completing information forms which are then reviewed by supervisors and then evaluated. Information included on the forms would be job description and nature, responsibility and duties of the positions. The positions would be evaluated with comparable positions in private business to determine fair and adequate pay for each job. "Seniority and merit would set the raises in salary in a six part plan to be recommended following completion of the survey," Cody said. He pointed out plans set up by 30 cities in the state as well as by many counties, including Orange and Brevard Counties. All the officials present at the meeting agreed that such a plan as suggested by Cody is needed. He was instructed by John Alexander, county commission chairman, to submit a "firm proposal" to the board.

Police Seminar Slated

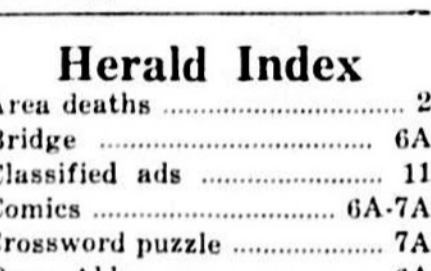

Table Action On Nurses Salaries

Discussion of pay increases for hospital employees and nurses, scheduled for Tuesday's meeting of the Seminole Memorial Hospital board of trustees, was postponed until a later date because two members of the five-man board, Andrew Carraway and William Bradford, were not present. In addition, John Schirard, board member said he would like to have time to study the salary schedule "in detail" and perhaps visit other hospitals in the Central Florida area "to observe their operations and find out what they are paying." He pointed out that more than 60 per cent of hospital income goes into salaries and "hospital workers cannot be paid by automation, as in many industries. We have to have a competent, efficient labor force on duty 24 hours a day, 365 days a year," he noted. Bessner said he would like to have the pay raises effective by the first of January, 1967, if possible. Bessner also noted that the weekly bulletin from the American Hospital Association has estimated hospital cost will rise from 10 to 30 per cent in the next year. He reported that some hospitals in New York City and Texas are said to have closed apparently because of the cost increase and shortage of professional personnel. Social Security, which handles medicare payments is now \$103,000 in arrears to Seminole Memorial Hospital, members of the board of trustees learned Tuesday. It was also noted that Medicare does not pay 100 per cent of the bill, but only 95 per cent, with the rest to be absorbed from other sources. In addition, \$62,000 worth of bills for welfare patients due from the State of Florida have not been paid, and probably will not be forthcoming. "During the last session of the legislature, they did not appropriate enough money to take care of the indigent hospital bills. In addition, time of state, in the hospital, formerly 30 days, was cut to only 12 days," A. B. Peterson, Sr., board chairman explained.

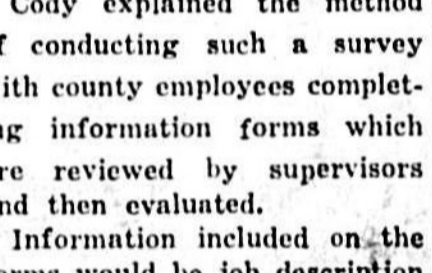

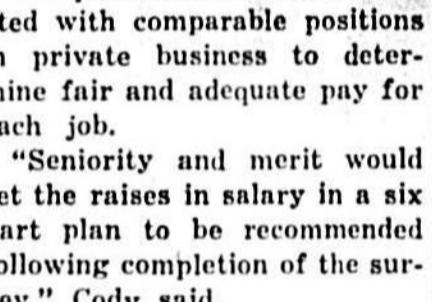
