County Asks For Rehearing On Geneva Water Issue

A circuit court decision declaring that Seminole County has no authority to make decisions based on protection of the "Geneva Bubble" - a cache of fresh water - will go back to Circuit Judge Dominick Salft for rehearing if a county request is

The Geneva Bubble, atop a body of salt water, is the only source of fresh water for the area and residents have expressed fear it will be destroyed by overdevelopment.

County commissioners, after prompting from County Attorney Nikki Clayton and special attorney for the county's insurance company, Howard Marsee, decided to ask Salfi for a

clarification of his week-old order in a suit filed by the bubble comes under the jurisdiction of the St. Margaret Cammack, of Geneva.

Mrs. Cammack sued the county after commissioners nine months ago refused permission for wells serving her planned development of about 300 homes to feed off the bubble.

The development, on 370 acres, was to surround Lake Harney

While denying conditional use for the wells, the commission also refused to hear plans for other developments in Geneva while a study was being conducted on the bubble. Geneva residents pleaded with the county to control developments. In his decision, Salfi said authority to control

Johns River Water Management District by state law and and Mrs. Cammack had already received permission from that agency to use the water.

A matter of confusion in the order, Ms. Clayton and Marsee said, was whether the judge was also ordering the commission to grant a conditional use to permit location of two eight-inch wells and a water plant at a specific site selected by Mrs.

Attorneys for Mrs. Cammack, Robert Marks and Jerome Bornstein, at the special hearing on the issue before commissioners at 9 p.m. Tuesday, said Salfi's order was "perfectly clear" and in "good English" and that the judge said the county could not withhold permission from their client to drill the wells and use the water.

Bornstein said Mrs. Cammack has spent more than \$13,000 in legal fees to have her rights declared by the court. He said he and his client were at the meeting to stop the litigation before another \$25,000 to \$50,000 was spent by his client and the county in legal expenses. He added that court action only benefits lawyers financially in the long run when an issue can be settled out of court. Bornstein also hinted that the issue



2 Cents More In Gas Taxes **Looks Certain**

By Donna Estes Herald Staff Writer

Motorists will almost certainly be paying another 2 cents-per-gallon in taxes at the gas pumps in Seminole County by Oct. 1

While the county commission has not formally approved the additional tax. it has set a workshop for July 8 to determine what road projects would be built with the revenues and will be advertising its intent to adopt an ordinance levying the tax. Adoption of an ordinance setting the tax is expected at the commission's July 9 meeting.

What's holding up the formal approval was the proposed signing of interlocal agreements by the cities on how the proceeds from the 2 cents-per-gallon tax would be distributed to the county and the municipalities.

Five cities - Sanford, Longwood, Casselberry, Oviedo and Lake Mary have refused to sign the agreements guaranteeing the county almost 65 percent of the revenues and granting each of the cities specific percentages of the remaining 35 percent.

Mayor Bettye Smith said the Sanford City Commission refused to sign the agreement because it did not want to appear to be endorsing the additional tax. Casselberry City Council flatly rejected the agreement Monday night saying the state law is clear on how the revenues should be shared and no change necessary. The Longwood City Commission did not like its proposed share of the money and Oviedo commissioners simply agreed "not to sign." Earlier the Lake Mary Commission decided Mayor Dick Fess should study the tsauc.

The cities of Altamonte Springs and Winter Springs agreed to keep the county's share at 65 per cent and to approve a new 2-cents-per-gallon.

The county was pinning its hopes on

the city of Sanford to approve the agreement. Sanford with Altamonte Springs and Winter Springs combined would have made up more than 50 percent of the population of the incorporated areas.

The law, passed during the 1985 session of the Legislature, says that the proceeds will be distributed on a percentage comparison of expenditures made by the cities and the county for roads and road improvements over the past five fiscal years (1980 through 1985) unless cities comprising more than 50 percent of the county's incorporated areas population signed interlocal agreements designating different percentagen.

At stake for the county is its share of the funds. Under a formula developed two years ago on distribution of a 4 cents-per-gallon gasoline tax, the county received 65 percent of the

The county's proposed interlocal agreement on the additional two cents called for the county's share to remain at 65 percent, but the percentages to the cities to shift from year to year depending on how much money they spent for roads.

County Administrator Ken Hooper sald today the county's budget and management office is "frantically" getting figures together to show the county's expenditures for roads and road improvements over the past five years to determine its share of the revenues from the 2 cents.

He said the county share could continue to be 65 percent, or could be more or less than that amount.

Meanwhile, four of the cities -Longwood, Casselberry, Oviedo and Lake Mary - have effectively blocked any change in the proceeds from the county-imposed 4 cents-per-gallon gas-

Officials at the Swiss Embassy in Beirut agreed "in principle" to take in the hostages, but had received no official request. In Washington White House officials reacted cautiously to the proposed transfer.

Computer Hacker Convicted Of Tapping Defense Network

LOS ANGELES (UPI) - A young home computer whiz was convicted of illegally tapping into an international network linking research agencies doing work for the Department of Defense.

Ronald M. Austin, 20, a UCLA physics major from Santa Monica, was found guilty Tuesday of breaking into 200 computer files at 14 military, university and private research organizations from San Diego to Norway.

Among the organizations whose computer systems Austin penetrated from July to November 1983 were the Rand Corp. a Santa Monica think tank; the Naval Research Laboratory in Washington; the Norwegian Telecommunication Agency; the UCLA Department of Computer Science and the Naval Oceans Systems Center in San Diego, prosecutors said.

Superior Court Judge Gordon Ringer found Austin guilty of 12 felony counts of malicious access to a computer system at the conclusion of a two-day non-jury trial, but acquitted him of one count of receiving stolen sirline tickets that investigators seized from his residence.

Ringer scheduled sentencing Aug. 23, when he could send Austin to prison or place him on probation. Austin's attorney said he would appeal the conviction.

Virginia Sex Killer Executed

RICHMOND, Va. (UPI) - Morris Odell Mason, a mildly retarded alcoholic, was executed for raping and burning an elderly woman to death in a 1978 sex crime rampage he boasted made Virginia's Eastern Shore "popular."

Mason, 32, made no final statement before being atrapped into Virginia's 2,500-volt electric chair Tuesday night, but he told the warden of death row to tell other condemned inmates "to hang in there."

Mason was pronounced dead at 11:07 p.m., becoming the 46th inmate executed in the nation since 1976 and the second put to death on Tuesday.

Charles Milton was executed by lethal injection in Huntaville, Texas, early Tuesday for killing a woman during a liquor store holdup he staged to support his \$600-a day drug heroin habit.

The Supreme Court rejected Mason's final appeal Tuesday evening and the condemned killer ordered his final meal - four McDonald's Big Macs, two orders of fries. two hot fudge sundaes, an apple turnover and soft drinks.

FTC Happy With Arbitration Plan

WASHINGTON (UPI) - The Federal Trade Commission says the landmark arbitration program it created with General Motors in 1983 has paid an estimated 100,000 diagruntled car owners an average of about \$300 each.

FTC Chairman James Miller said Tuesday he is so happy with the program, which had been opposed as inadequate by consumer groups and most of the nation's attorneys general, that he will seek similar solutions in other defect

"The data shows we are successful in getting money directly into the hands of the consumer in a short period of time," with the average complaint resolved within 40 days, Miller said.

But the Ralph Nader-founded Center for Auto Safety said it has dozens of letters from GM owners who complain they have waited from mix months to a year for an arbitration proceeding.

Leftist guerrillas battling the U.S.-backed government of Salvadoran President Jose Napoleon Duarte last Wednesday gunned down four U.S. Marines serving as U.S. Embassy guards, along with two American businessmen and seven others in downtown San Salvador

Following the killings, President Reagan vowed to punish the assassins and said he would step up the delivery of military goods to the Salvadoran government

"The operation carried out by our comdefense of our people and our sovereignty against the criminal undeclared war of which we are victims." Radio Venceremos

El Salvador's 51/2-year-old civil war has claimed an estimated 50,000 lives.

In Mexico City, a spokesman for Radio Venceremos told UPI: "It is the Americans who give the weapons for the war, and we want the American public to understand the consequences of their government's ac-

The radio, the official voice of the leftist Farabundo Marti National Liberation Front. also warned Duarte he might be a target of guerrilla violence but denied the rebels had threatened him previously.

"It is totally false that we have threatened to kill Napoleon Duarte," Radio Venceremos

"But we remind him that he is commander in chief of the army with whom we are at war and our military objectives cannot only be soldiers. The military high command must also share the responsibility."

At ceremonies Friday returning the bodies of the four Marines to the United States. Duarte said he had received death threats.

The deaths were the first casualties suffered by American military personnel in El Salvador since May 25, 1983, when the deputy commander of the U.S. military group, Navy Lt. Cmdr. Albert A. Schaufelberger, was shot by the rebels.

In 1984, El Salvador received \$196.5 million in military aid from the United States, along with \$329 million in economic

For fiscal 1985 Congress approved \$326 million in economic aid and \$128 million in military aid to El Salvador.

Abused Wife Gets \$2.3 Million

HARTFORD, Conn. (UPI) - An abused wife, awarded \$2.3 militon by a federal jury that decided police did not adequately protect her from her violent husband, hopes the landmark decision will help similar victims.

"I hope other women will be helped. Now, maybe the police will do their jobs right," said Tracey Thurman, 24, of Torrington, who was scarred and partially paralyzed from a 1983 assault by her husband, when she was stabbed 13 times.

After 11/2 days of deliberation, a 12-member U.S. District Court jury Tuesday found police in Torrington denied Thurman equal protection under the law and were negligent in protecting her 3-year-old son. The child was awarded \$300,000.

The defendants in the landmark case, presided over by federal Judge M. Joseph Blumenfeld, were expected to appeal the case, which could influence police departments across the nation.

It was the first time a federal judge permitted a wife to sue on grounds, she was afforded less police protection against her husband than she would have received if a stranger had threat-

ened her. Thurman sought \$3.5 million in damages from the city of Torrington and 29 present and former police officers, contending they had failed to protect her from her husband despite her numerous complaints of harassment and threats.

Thurman testified police came to her home after each of her complaints but officers told her they would not arrest her husband unless they caught him in the act of harassment or received her complaint within four hours of an incident.

Even when Thurman said her husband stabbed her 13 times on June 10, 1983, she said he was not immediately taken into custody and was able to walk over to her prone body and kick her in the head while police looked on.

The jury found most of the police officers, including the present and former police chiefs. guilty of negligence and concluded they had denied the woman equal protection under the law.

Charles Thurman, 23, now serving a 15-year prison term for the assault, is appealing his conviction.

Calif. Proposes Tough Laws On Money Laundering LOS ANGELES (UPI) - Saying

more drug dealers are bringing their money to California for laundering since Florida and Georgia passed tough new laws, state officials are proposing even stricter legislation.

Two bills aimed at stemming the flow of illegal drug money by imposing tough fines and jail time on financial institutions and their officials caught laundering funds were unveiled Tuesday by state Attorney General John Van de Kamp.

"California is awash in a sea of illegal drug profits," Van de Kamp said in announcing the two bills, which would also impose tough new regulations for reporting the large sums of cash usually deposited by drug

If passed, the bills would give California the toughest antination. Van de Kamp said at a news conference.

Cause Of Air-India Jet Crash May Never Be Known

CORK, Ireland (UPI) - Investigators say they may never determine what caused the crash of an Air-India jet that broke up at an altitude of 6 miles and plummeted into the Atlantic Ocean off the Irish coast, killing all 329 people on

A terrorist bomb on the plane, flying from Toronto and Montreal to New Delhi and Bombay, India with a refueling stop in London, is suspected of causing Sunday's crash the third worst disaster in aviation history.

Japanese and Canadian police are investigating whether there was a link between the crash and a bomb explosion in luggage removed from a Canadian Pacific Airways jet in Tokyo the same day.

Only 2 percent of the Air India jet's fuselage has been recovered, and its flight recorders, with vital operations data, are buried deep beneath the sea.

The Irish government appealed to people living near the counts of Ireland, France, Spain and Britain to watch for bodies and wreckage that might wash ashore during summer. Searchers have recovered only 131 bodies.

Iraq Kicks Out Libyans

BEIRUT, Lebanon (UPI) - Iraq today broke diplomatic relations with Libya, withdrawing its recognition of Libya as an Arab state and as a member of the Arab League because of a "suspect" alliance between Iran and Libya, the Iraqi government said.

The official Iraqi News Agency, in a dispatch monitored in Beirut, quoted a Foreign Ministry spokesman in Baghdad as saying iraq recalled its diplomatic mission from Tripoli and demanded that Libyan diplomats leave Iraq.

Iranian Parliament Speaker Hashemi Rafsanjani recently met with Libyan leader Col. Moammar Khadafy during a three-day visit to Tripoli and later the two countries announced plans to promote "Islamic revolution" on a world wide scale.

Don't Junk The Rug ...

Don't throw away the toupee, but scientists are apparently making some headway on baldness.

Researchers at Northwestern University are expanding their study of a drug, Minoxidil, that has shown promise in restoring hair to clean pates. The drug is normally prescribed to control high blood pressure, but hair growth has been a side effect among some patients.

Dr. Henry Roenigk, chief of dermatology at Northwestern University Medical School, said that in initial tests about half the 83 patients who used the preparation for at least six months grew some hair. Roenigk said about 20 percent of the patients experienced "excellent results," meaning that they had "good, thick cosmetically attractive hatr."

The product is still considered experimental, but the Upjohn Co., which owns the patent, expects to seek approval from the Food and Drug Administration to sell the preparation to the public. Much of the current testing is to determine possible side effects from the product. No harm has been found so far.

Other purported "cures" for baldness have proved to be false. So caution is advised for men unhappy with their dome tops. But if Minoxidil does work, fewer men may complain of "hair today, gone tomorrow."

A Bad Decision

Combine the often overweening policy of some workman's compensation officials with a racially motivated personnel decision and you have instant folly.

The Kentucky Workers' Compensation Board has ordered the City of Louisville to find a job with all-white co-workers for a man who says he fears black persons. Gary Pearl, a former street-cleaning supervisor, asserts he is not prejudiced; he says he has a mental problem that makes him afraid to work with blacks.

That sufficed for the Kentucky Workers' Compensation Board, which directed Louisville to make "exhaustive efforts...to return (Pearl) to gainful employment in an all-white setting, if necessary for his employability

Meanwhile, the city, which is to say the taxpayers, must pay Mr. Pearl between \$900 and \$1,000 per month until a work environment to his liking can be found. In addition, the people must pay for litigating and appeal in the courts lest the Pearl case become a license for racial bigotry.

In this free country, Mr. Pearl is not required to work at a given job that he finds objectionable for whatever reason; certainly, he has no birth-right claim to be on Louisville's payroll. That the Kentucky Workers' Compensation Board should honor his petition to work only in company of whites is "outrageously racist" as civil-rights groups have charged. This incredible ruling should be struck down by the courts without

Budget Cuts To Wait

Everything is on the table." Pete Domenici. Chairman of the Senate Budget Committee, as he ledhis Senate colleagues into conference with Rep. William Gray's House Budget Committeemen, But hardly anyone was listening Everyone who was anyone, II seemed, was over at the hearings before the House Ways and Means Committee on President Reagan's vast tax reform plan.

It appears that the off-sought goal of federal budget reduction lives and dies today by political pressure, as it has always. That pressure, which one month ago came from the President, the Senate leadership. and the public, has shifted to the huge debate over the abstraction of tax reform, in which everything is also "on the table," according to Rep. Dan Rostenkowski, Chairman of Ways and Means, where tax bills originate.

So, while it seems the whole world agonizes over tax reform, the initiative for genuine budget reduction has disappeared. Originally, the President and the Senate had asked for a 2 percent limit on cost-of-living adjustments in Social Security benefits, unless inflation exceeded 4 percent. By mid-May the House Budget Committee had produced a plan that dropped that idea like a stone. The President's budget had called for complete termination of 13 boondoggle federal programs; the House restored them all except federal revenue sharing, which is authorized through 1986 anyway.

Traditional budget politicking was built into both plans. The senators and the congressmen announced cuts in direct loans for a variety of purposes. But a number of offbudget credit programs were brought back into their budgets. including a substitute for the subsidiaries provided by the Export-Import bank, which could actually cost more than the direct loans they would replace.

Says economist Alan Greenspan We'll get \$25:30 billion in budget reduction, rather than \$56 billion," which is what the White House-Senate proposals called for But at the same time projections of the budjet deficit have jumped to the \$220 biliton range from \$180 billion because of slower growth. So, less in cuts, more in spending, But then: the political action these days is over at Ways and Means in tax reform. For the budget, the story looks familiar: Wait 'til next year.

Parallels To 1940

to the summer of 1940, Franklin Roosevelt confronted a problem in Latin America that in many ways resembles the one with which President Reagan is currently wrestling. Reagan, a Roosevelt supporter who frequently invokes the memory of FDR, would be fascinated by the parallels.

In the summer of 1940, with the sudden collapse of the supposedly formidable French army, Hitler stood at the English Channel and loomed over the Continent of Europe. The catastrophic defeat of the Axis a few years later may casue us to forget how bleak things looked. that summer.

In July, he told Secretary of the Navy Frank L. Knox that as soon as Germany had consolidated in Europe It would proceed to penetrate South America - and that then we would have our work cut out for us in this country.

What Roosevelt had in mind was an impressive German economic and cultural penetration of the region, already underway, which could then provide the foundation of military cooperation.

Uruguay was to be the headquarters for the organization of the German economic effort. It was not pipedream. In 1940, more than 55 percent of Latin American exports went to Europe Brazilian coffee. Peruvian Un. Argentine beef.

FDR could see clearly, a Europe consolidated under Hitler and run from Berlin would be a powerful economic entity as well as a military one, and it could - and no doubt would - use its economic leverage to further penetrate the Southern Hemisphere.

Uruguay had already been invaded by German agents. Twelve of them led by a man named Julius Dalldorf and operating under the German minister Otto Langman had been arrested by the Uruguayan authorities in June. The German plans rested on a

promising ethnic situation. There

were large German and Italian colonies throughout Latin America, especially in the vital ABC powers Argentina, Brazil, and Chile. More recently, these communities have provided a haven for Nazi war criminals. There were riots between Nazi and anti-Nazi moby in La Paz and Montivideo. Under American pressure, Columbia's government-owned airline. Avianca, fired all of its German employees. Ecuador expelled the Italian mission for subversion. Mexico threw out Hitler's man in Mexico City, Arthur Dietrich.

Nevertheless, much of Latin America inclined toward the Axis until it became clear that Hitler was losing. In the summer of 1940, it was not clear that he could be beaten at all, and he had numerous disciples in Latin America, such as Argentine's Juan Peron.

In 1940. Hitler's interest in conquering England was secondary. His principal goal was to conquer Russia, seize its resources, destroy Bolshevism, and consolidate a Germanic continental empire. He in fact came startling close to doing so-Had he succeeded, his emptre would have been a formidable economic and military force.

There is little doubt that FDR would share Reagan's strategic alarm about Soviet penetration of Cuba and Nicaragua, Again, a continental empire has designs on the hemisphere. Reagan knows that, even if many congresamen do

Welcome Mat For Gandhi

The recent visit to the United States by Rajiv Gandhi, Prime Minister of India, gave encouragement to the idea of improved relations between the two countries. This is a distinct possibility, but improvement depends in large measure on a better understanding of India.

For more than 30 years, there has been an abundance of sympathy for India in the United States. This, however, isn't the same thing as understanding. Often, the sympathy has prevented a realistic grasp of Indian realities and opportunities.

First of all, it's necessary to bear in mind that India is officially a union of states. As the Sikh separatist movement makes clear, there are powerful pressures aimed at fragmentation or disintegration. The country is made up of diverse peoples with many different religions and languages. Nevertheless, India is likely to hang together.

Despite all the talk about "the world's largest democracy," India has a very strong and ruthless central government and party apparatus. It doesn't hesitate to use police and soldiers to contain separatist or communal violence.

India, of course, is the second most populous nation on earth, with an estimated 750 million people.

India is a strange country in that it combines both ancient and modem ways. Hundreds of millions of Indians live as their ancestors did 5.000 years ago. Others live in the vicinity of nuclear power plants or build jet engines. For decades to come, India will have a mixed economy and mixed society mixed between the styles of yesterday and today.

Some people believe that India may be the next Japan. No one doubts the intelligence and drive of Indians. The country, however, is hindered by socialism.

Rajty Gandhi is said to want to bring a new degree of freedom to the Indian economy. The bureacracy is indifferent to the fact that the standard of living in India has lagged under state control. The socialists don't want to learn from Japan or other advanced countries

Despite all this, the United States has good reason to seek better relations with the Indians. Destabilizing of India would make the world more complicated and dangerous for the United States. President Reagan was wise to put out the welcome mat for Prime Minister Gandhi

Unanswered Questions In Mengele Case

WASHINGTON - Our intelligence sources are not convinced that Dr. Josef Mengele, the Nazi war criminal, is dead. They believe the evidence of his alleged drowning in 1979 could have been manufactured as part of an elaborate hoax to throw off the legions of Mengele hunters, some of whom may have been getting uncomfortably close to the Auschwitz "Angel of Death."

At first blush, the evidence of his demise is impressive. It includes not only the remains found in Brazil. but letters and other documents. There is also the testimony of Mengele's son and extles who knew him while he was on the lam-

But both American and Israeli intelligence sources told our associate Lucette Lagnado that the story of Mengele's accidental drowning is contradicted by other evidence. Here are some of the contradictions that make us suspi-

- The testimony of Gilda Stam-

mer, the Hungarian woman who claims that she and her husband gave Mengele refuge in Brazil for severel years starting in 1962. doesn't jibe with other, more authoritative evidence. Also, her husband has yet to be interviewed to confirm or deny her account. At last report, he was on his way to Singapore.

Ms. Stammer said Mengele lived alone in Bruzil. Yet there is documented evidence that his second wife. Marta, and stepson. Karl-Heinz, were with him in South America through 1964.

- Members of Paraguayan dictator Alfredo Stroessner's staff admitted to the CIA that Mengele lived in Paraguay until 1965 three years after Ms. Stammer said he had settled in Brazil. The staff members also told the CIA that Mengele moved to Portugal in the late 1960s and "sent correspondence, including Christmas cards, to them from Portugal until late 1980" - a year after he was supposed to have drowned.

- Ms. Stammer insists that

Mengele was never away from their home for more than a day or two during the years he spent with them. Yet a CIA report indicates that Mengele was a frequent visitor to Paraguay after 1965. Our associate also interviewed a Paraguayan rancher who said he stayed in the room next to Mengele for extended periods as late as the 1970s. A room was kept specially for Mengele at the small Europea Hotel in Asuncion, the rancher said.

- The circumstances surrounding the news of Mengele's death were bigarre, to say the least. After years of inaction, West German police suddenly got an anonymous tip that led them to raid the home of Hans Sedlmayer, a longtime executive of the Mengele family tractor firm. There they found the documents that led them to the evidence of Mengele's drowning. It couldn't have come at a more suspicious time - just as several governments were zeroing in on Mengele and after millions of dollars in reward money had been offered.

- Before the drowning story

broke, the Mengele family attorney, Fritz Steinacher, publicly affirmed that he was "still" Josef Mengele's lawyer. Steinacher also made a secret visit to Israel just a few weeks before the tip to West German police led to the discovery of the old Nazt's supposed grave in Brazil.

Did Steinacher return from Israel with alarming news for his client? Did this have anything to do with the sudden appearance of evidence a few weeks later that Mengele was

The Mengele mystery still has not been solved. Nothing short of an international commission composed of Americans, Germans, Israelis and Brazilians would have the credibility to settle the matter once and for

Footnote: We have been pursuing the Mengele story for 25 years. The story of our long search for the death-camp doctor will appear in Sunday's Parade magazine (June 30). It went to press before the

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Ships On Scene Could Blockade Lebanon

WASHINGTON (UPI) - Pentagon sources say the United States could set up a naval quarantine of Lebanon with the seven warships that patroled between 40 and 60 miles from the Lebanese coast today.

If necessary, more ships could be dispatched to the scene, the sources said Tuesday.

The ships offshore include the nuclearpowered aircraft carrier Nimitz, which has more than 90 alreraft, among them F-14 fighters. A-6 light bombers, S-3 reconnaissance planes. E-2C radar warning planes and aerial tankers to give the patrolling fighters more time in the air.

At the same time, the Pentagon announced that preparations were under way for the "Bright Star" exercises that are to take place in Egypt and Oman in July and August.

The manuevers, the Pentagon said, "are not related in any way to the current hostage situation.

But should the hostage crisis extend into July, several thousand U.S. forces would be in the Middle East and presumably could be called upon if President Reagan opts for a military solution or retaliation.

Pentagon officials said the terse announcement of the Bright Star exercises was intended to quell any speculation that the transport of helicopters, artillery, tanks, armored personnel carriers, trucks, Jeeps


and other equipment was fied to the hostage crisis in Beirut, Lebanon.

The Pentagon provided no details about the forthcoming exercises but in previous years up to 5,500 Army, Navy and Air Force personnel have participated.

Earlier Tuesday, White House spokesman Larry Speakes said a blockade of Lebanon and a closing of Beirut International Airport were among the military options relayed to Reagan should be decide to use force to gain the release of the 40 hostages.

Aircraft from the Nimitz could be used to patrol beyond the warships' horizon to report oncoming traffic, which could then be stopped by some Navy vessels, sources said.

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

Terrorism Abroad Prompts Fear In South Florida

MIAMI (UPI) - Renewed fear of terrorism in the sky forced an Eastern Airlines plane to turn back to Miami and be evacuated so dogs and a police bomb squad could search the aircraft.

Flight 240 was called back minutes after takeoff from Miami International Airport late Monday night when airline officials realized a man who had been "acting strangely" had gotten off the jet but left his luggage aboard. Eastern spokeswoman Paula Musto sald Tuesday, Nothing dangerous was found in the search.

Eastern has sent a memorandum to each of its offices. urging employees to "follow security procedures right to the letter," airline spokesman Mark Wegel said Tuesday.

Airline executives are discussing whether to screen all luggage, rather than just hand-held baggage, according to Scott Dennison, a Miami-based Pan American World Airways consultant.

"If we were to do that in the United States, people would have to get to the airport three or four hours early," he

Porsche Theft Ring Broken

MIAMI (UPI) - A Miami race car driver is among eight people arrested by police who have busted up an auto theft ring that reportedly stole nearly 200 Porsche sports cars in the last two years.

Metro-Dade County police said one of the ringleaders was Victor Gonzalez, 28, a race car driver, mechanic and one-time high school wrestling champion. Others are Pedro de Jesus, 25, owner of an auto repair shop, and Jose Carida Fuentes, 26, of Homestead, police said.

Ring members "had a market for the individual cars," said auto theft Sgt. Russell Fischer. "They knew how to get rid of them."

Some of the Porsches were stripped for parts, then dumped in canals. Others were left intact after their vehicle identification numbers were altered, then shipped to cities throughout the United States, Canada and Puerto Rico. authorities said. Police said they had recovered 18 cars.

No Bond For Alleged Nazi

MIAMI (UPI) - Federal authorities, fearful that alleged Nazi collaborator Konrads Kalejs may get out of jail before he can be deported, have reversed a decision that set \$750,000 bond for him.

The Justice Department order overturns a Board of immigration Appeals ruling, and means authorities can again hold Kalejs, 72, without bond at the Krome Avenue detention camp west of Miami-

Kalejs, who co-owns property in Fort Lauderdale, St. Petersburg and a Chicago suburb, is accused of helping the Nazi SS kill thousands of Jews after the German invasion of his native Latvia during World War II.

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) - A lobbyist with the state officials who would become responsible for screening an estimated 130,000 concealed weapons permits.

"Our law enforcement officers risk their lives daily to protect our citizens and visitors," Graham said. "We look to our law enforcement officers to protect us and it is our duty to protect them.

But Hammer called Graham's veto an mault to law abiding citizens who want to carry hidden weapons on the streets to protect themselves from criminals.

I call this veto a 'make the streets safe for criminals act. Hammer said

The bill would repeal a current law that allows local governments to set their own standards for granting concealed weapons permits and replace it with a uniform state-wide standard

The bill would compel the Secretary of State to issue a permit to any person with reasonable cause" to carry a concealed weapon who could prove he or she can handle one safely — unless the Florida Department of Law Enforcement could demonstrate the applicant had a criminal

The bill does not specify what it means by reasonable cause" but sponsors said the term would apply to persons who habitually must walk alone in poorly lighted areas at

night That language is less stringent than ordinances in place in many of Florida's countles - particulary the countles with large urban concentrations. The measure's supporters and detractors agreed the bill would make concealed weapons permits easter to come by.

Top IRA Bomber Caught; Terror Campaign Smashed

LONDON (UPI) - Police who smashed plans for an Irish Republican Army terror campaign this summer also snared an IRA bomber believed responsible for an attempt on the life of Prime Minister Margaret Thatcher in 1984, sources say.

Home Secretary Leon Brittan told the House of Commons Tuesday the arrest of five people in Scotland Saturday led to the uncovering of an IRA plot to plant bombs in southern Britain during the summer to wreck the tourist season.

Only one bomb, a long-term time device defused Sunday in a tourist hotel near Buckingham Palace, was believed to have been planted. But hundreds of police using dogs trained to detect explosives began precautionary searches in 12 southern resorts where the IRA planned to strike this summer.

A total of 21 suspects were arrested over the weekend in Scotland. London and the seaside resort of Brighton. Eight were subsequently released, police said.

Anti-terrorist experts called the action the biggest blow against the IRA, which is attempting to end British control of Northern Ireland, in more



Early Focus Keys Return Of Serve

One of the most inportant aspects of one's game is the return of serve. Even though it is vital it is often neglected (particularly among inexperienced players.

Not nearly enough thought is put into this most important part of your game. The return of serve is really a series of supplementary shots. Your basic forehand, backhand and serve will allow you to play the game, but you must learn a series of service returns to ever really play the game

A description of the things involved in service returns follows. Work on them and your game will improve:

Though you may not regard your service returns as supplementary shots since they occur in every point in which you are the receiver, the technique for them often differs enough to warrant special consideration.

Consistency when returning serves is one measure of your playing ability. Work on your service returns as much as you practive other phases of your game.

A common quality among players who return serves effectively is quickness. They are quick to see the ball, quick to move their rackets, and quick to start in motion. In your practice, strive specifically for improvement in these areas.

Your ability to move quickly depands partly on how well you prepare to move. In the ready position, bend your knees and shift your weight forward to get most of it off your heels. Make yourself feel light, bouncy, and springy. He ready to spring into action



This is called the ready-hop.

the moment you determine the direction of

your opponent's shot. As your opponent's racket goes up to meet the ball, hop up slightly, just barely leaving the ground and land in the ready posture.

As you make your ready-hop, watch the ball as your opponent tosses, and especially as the racket comes into contact with it. Do not look at the total figure of the server and then wait for the ball to come out of the background. Focus on the ball. Concentrate on it. Try to determine its direction as soon as you can.

Besides seeing the ball quickly and making a quick start, you should move yur racket as quickly as possible. Here you may have a problem of grips - grips in the waiting position and grips during the swing. If you can manage a no-change grip, one that you can use for both forehands and backhands, this is well and good; you will not have to worry about having time to adjust your grip during the backswing. But, if you feel you must hold the racket differently for forehands and backhands, experiment to see which change you make faster, (forehand to backhand or backhand to forehand). Use as your waiting grip the one from which you find easter to change.

For maximum quickness on the swing you may find it is best to change your backswing from what you normally use, If you normally pause at the end of your backswing, change that too, "Cannonball" serves don't allow much time for pausing.

Start your backswing with a quick turn of your shoulders. Add a slight amount of arm action (on the backhand add even a little elbow action), but only as much as time allows, reverse your arm action to start your forward swing. And if time allows, bring uour shoulders around in reverse action too-Otherwise, simply block the ball with a short motion of your arm. Keep your wrist and grip firm.

While in the ready stance, hold your cibows in at your sides, and bend your arms to bring your hands and racket closer to your body. With such a short radius awing you will need less force to start the racket in motion, and as a result you'll have more force to start the speed. This adjustment in posture which shortens your swing may be just what you need to gain that extra quickness which lets you bring the racket

around in time to meet the ball squarely. Remember, focus on the ball, carly,

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Attorney: Drop Bribery Charges

NEW ORLEANS (UPI) - Attorneys for two former Tulane University basketball players say they want a state judge to drop bribery charges against the players because the indictments allegedly contain constitutional flaws.

John "Hot Rod" Williams and David Dominique are accused with four others in a scheme to fix two Tulane basketball games last season. Tulane's president abolished the men's basketball program in the wake of the scandal.

Lawyers told Judge Alvin Oser on Tuesday they believed an unauthorized person was in the room while a grand jury considered evidence in the case.

They also claimed the Louisiana sports bribery law is unfair in that it does not require a person receiving the bribe to intend to be committing a crime. Other bribery statutes carry only minor penalties, they added.

Heston Won't Watch McEnroe

WIMBLEDON, England, June 25 (UPI) Unlike many tennis fans who flock to the courts to watch John McEnroe play tennis. screen legend Charlton Heston said he refused a Royal Box seat at Wimbledon because he doesn't want to see McEnroe embarrass America.

Heston, a long-time tennis buff whose acting roles include heroic Moses and Ben-Hur, told the London Daily Mail of his decision.

He added that he sent a scorehing letter May 23 to American Davis Cup coach Arthur Ashe suggesting that the volatile McEnroe be excluded from the Davis team because he "demeans the game that made him a millionaire."

Heston, 60, is in London for what is turning into one of the wettest of Wimbledon tournaments. He's directing and playing the lead in a West End theatrical production of the "Caine Mutiny Court

Heston said McEnroe's reputation for loud

on-court arguments with officials and his lack of manners are setting a dangerous example for millions of young tennis players who might be convinced that "badder is better" in climbing to the top.

Wimbledon Fans Wait, Anticipate 246 Matches

WIMBLEDON. England (UPI) Martina Navratilova called them "the most patient faus anywhere". Due to rain. Wimbledon's notoriously longsuffering spectators have seen just eight matches completed in two days, leaving a mere 246 to go in the men's and women's singles.

But despite the near-washout of the first two days, the attendance figures at the Wimbledon Championships are surprisingly near normal levels.

More than 57,000 spectators have braved rain and discomfort to pass through the turnstiles. The figure is only 7.670 less than the crowds on the same two days in 1984 when there were no weather problems, and was well up on 1980 and 1982, when rain affected the first two days.

"It's always special here, people are so excited to see some tennis." Navratilova said after crushing Lisa Bonder 6-0, 6-2 Tuesday to begin the defense of her women's singles title.

"It's nice to be able to do something for them, they are the most patient fans anywhere."

The backlog of approximately 130 matches is enough to try the pattence of fans, players and organizers althe. At the current rate of play, the Championships would run for more than two months.

And that's only taking into account the men's and women's singles, let alone the three doubles competitions and junior. senior and first-round losers' events that must be squeezed in.

Tournament referee Alan Mills was not worried at the slow progress.He is confident the whole thing could be wrapped up in nine days, if necessary.

But there was no immediate prospect of the weather improving much Rain was falling again late Tuesday night.

The men's defending champton. John McEnroe, finished off Australian Peter McNamara in straight sets to join second seed Ivan Lendl in the men's second round.

The other men's leading seeds were due on court Wednesday, with fourth-seeded Mats Wilander facing Slobodan Zivojinovic of Yugoslavia in the opening match on Centre Court.

Fifth seed Anders Jarryd of Sweden was due to resume, tied at two sets-all with Italy's Claudio Panatta when what little play was attempted ended Fuesday night.

Third seed Jimmy Connors was scheduled to play the third match on No.1 Court and may have to kick his heels for a long time before finally getting his 14th annual Wimbledon challenge under way.

The situation is even worse in the women's singles, where only two other players Tuesday were able to join Navratilova in the second round.

Argentina's 15-year-old Gabriela Sabatini defeated Briton Amanda Brown in three sets and Virginia Ruzici of Romanta ousted American Amy Holton.

But because of the huge backlog of matches, neither Chris Evert Lloyd - the co-No. 1 seed with Navratilova - third

seed Hana Mandlikova of Czechoslovakia. fourth seeded Manuela Maleeya of Bulgaria nor American lifth seed Pain Shriver was scheduled to play Wednes-

McEnroe, looking for a third successive Wimbledon title, served well but did not have to exert himself against McNamara. who still was not fully mobile after a 21 month recupperation from knee surgery.

As usual, McEnroe had more trouble with British reporters than with his on court opponent.

UTICA, N.Y. (UPI) - Ken Brett was the last one on the bus-

That didn Curatter. He saw the front seat opposite the driver's side was empty and he took it maneuvering easily inside a narrow space and sitting downby the window

Protocol is protocol. No matter whether you're the head man inthe White House, the captain of a ship or a manager in the majors or the minors.

On all bus trips in baseball. long or short, the manager sits wherever he wants. He has his choice and always picks the front seat Everyone knows him and no one else ever takes.

This is the first time I ever sat up here," said Brett, who was beginning his first season as manager of Utica's Blue Sox in the Class A New York-Penn League Actually it's his first season as a manager for any team. You get a much better view from the front seat.

Hrett spent plenty of time in the back of the bus during the three seasons he played in the intnors. Most of those buses he rode in weren't anywhere near as modern or roomy as the one he was getting settled into now - a Canadian built green-and-white 47-seater capable of making coast to coast trips almost as fast as a train-

A few minutes after the bus got under way carrying the Blue Sox to Little Falls, NY first base coach Gene Glynn, sitting across the able, handed Brett an envelope with his name on it



'Call To Glory' Dishes Up Leftovers

NEW YORK (UPI) - The suit assassination of President John Kennedy forms the centerpiece around which a twohour version of ABC's "Call to Glory" is set.

The show was shot as a two-hour episode in the series. intended to give "Call to Glory" - so well reviewed, so poorly watched - a much needed boost. Instead the series died c terminal ratings, and ABC found itself stuck with a two-hour lettover

The network decided to air it Sunday at 9 p.m. as the nightly movie For "Call to Glory" fans. that's good news, as Air Force Col. Raynor Sarnac and his family face personal troubles and national tragedy - in the days from Nov. 19 through Nov. 25, 1963

Viewers who never watched Sarnac (Craig T Nelson) his wife, Vanessa (Cindy Pickett) and their children in the regular series may have trouble picking up the pieces of the Sarnac situation.

But liberally interspersed with the fictional characters are film clips of Jack and Jacqueline Kennedy - on their way to Dallas, the assassination itself, the swearing in of Lyndon Johnson, with a wide-eyed

There are clips of the dead resident's return to Washington, the incredible televised shooting of assassin Lee Harvey Oswald, the Kennedy funeral, the skittish riderless horse Blackjack, the two little Kennedy children whose father had been killed.

Everyone who was old enough to be aware will be reminded where they were on Nov. 22. 1963. And there are the Sarnacs doing what all of us did for four days - watching television. crying inwardly or copiously, and sharing in national mourn-

The Sarnacs had met Kennedy according to the story line Col. Sarnac was to brief Kennedy on his recent trip to Vietnam on the afternoon of Nov. 22 giving them a chance to express the kind of thing Americans felt that awful Friday

For "Call to Glory" fans, this show is a must. For others, it is a mixed bag but certainly well worth considering.

Preserve Fresh Fruits For Later Use

No wonder freezing is the most popular method of preserving food, for a minimum of time and energy, it pays great dividends. Beyond the benefit of having a year-long supply of delicious produce, freezing helps retain fresh flavors, textures, nutrients and colors, qualities often altered during canning or drying processes

Capitalize on the bounty of fresh fruits available in produce departments, roadside stands, or in your own garden or orchard with the following ideas from the makers of Ziploc heavy duty freezer bags.

PREPARATION

- Select firm, ripe fruits at their flavor peak. Freezing will help preserve, but not improve the quality of fruits. Plan to freeze them as soon as possible after picking to hold fresh flavors.

- Sort, removing blemished and over-ripe fruits. Wash quickly and gently in cold water and drain immediately; soaking In water can make fruits mushy.

- Peel, trim, pit or hull fruits and cut in uniform pieces if

- Select heavy weight freezer bags specifically designed to withstand freezer temperatures. Elpper-top bags will allow you to remove virtually all air - a major source of freezer burn Transparent bags make it easy to identify freezer contents and stack more conveniently than cumbersome plastic containers.

Cookbooks offer several techfiques for freezing; the syrup and loose-pack methods are often preferred because they are quick, easy and result in fruit that is ideal for many uses.

LOOSE-PACK METHOD

This method involves freezing berries and fruit pieces individually in the freezer on cookie sheets or trays. When fruit is nearly solid, transfer into bags and place in freezer. Remove as much air as possible from the sipper-top bags before scaling. It will be easy to remove contents as needed and rescal.

No sugar or other sweeteners are added to loose pack fruits, an advantage for health conscious

SYRUP METHOD

Sugar enhances the taste of most fruits and is a preferred technique for freezing those with bundant juices, or that bruise or discolor easily.

A syrup is made by dissolving sugar in water, thoroughly cooling and mixing with fruit before it is scaled into a freezer bag. The concentration of sugar to water varies; a light syrup (30 to 35 percent solution) has less sugar and is commonly used for sweet berries; heavy syrup (60 to 65 percent solution) has more sugar than water and may be used to freeze tart fruits such as peaches that will serve as filling for ple, pastry or meringue shells.

Whole, flavorful raspberries. frozen with the loose-pack method, are featured in the following recipe for Raspberry-Nut Muffins. The Strawberry-Peach Pudding Pie makes the most of fresh peaches and strawberries frozen in a syrup method in freezer bags.

Cosmic Rays And Coke

SPACE CENTER Houston (UPI) - Scientists aboard the shuttle Challenger will study the sun. ary to learn the cause of cosmic rays and possibly argue over who gets to sample the first soft drink in space on the next shuttle mission in July

Shuttle Commander Gordon Fullerton said a 16 ounce high tech can of Coca Cola will be on board and deciding which of the seven crew members get to sample it "will be one of my major management decisions," he joked

The beverage will be on board to test the first space container for carbonated drinks

Fullerton will be joined on the July 12 mission by co-pilot Roy Bridges Jr., mission specialists Karl Henize Story Musgrave and Anthony England and civilian astronomers Loren Acton. and John David Bartoe

Astronomer Henize a 58-year-old astronaut who has waited 18 years for a mission, will be the oldest American astronaut to fly in space.

There have been moments of frustration, but there's really never been much doubt in my mind that as long as I had a chance to fly in space, I was not going to back out and quit." Henize said. I would regret it for the rest of my life.

Acton of the Lockheed Palo Alto Research Laboratory in California and Bartoc of the Naval Research Laboratory in Washington have been assigned to the mission since 1978 to operate four solar telescopes to study the sun. Their sevenyear assignment is the longest in the space program Fulletton said
