Area Teachers Attend School

Six Seminole County reading instructors are among 150 educators from all over the state who are attending a special graduate workshop course in the University of South Florida.

Thirteen persons were reported killed — 12 Vietnamese and one U.S. naval officer. Thirty-seven more were reported wounded, including five Americans. The Viet Cong hurled 24 rounds of 75mm calibre rifle fire in and around the parade route. U.S. military headquarters reported mortar shells also struck during the shelling.

The bombardment hit Saigon's Roman Catholic cathedral, a Catholic school, the John F. Kennedy Square, the Saigon central market and the French-Guillou Hospital, the biggest in the capital.

The bombardment, first of its kind by the Viet Cong against Saigon, failed to interrupt the massive parade celebrating the third anniversary of the overthrow of the late President Ngo Dinh Diem.

For two hours and 30 minutes, soldiers of the South Vietnamese armed forces and the six nations allied with them paraded before tens of thousands of leading Vietnamese and foreign dignitaries.

Watch Lioness Fails To Stop Scared Thief

MESA, Ariz. (AP)—The burglar who cut through a screen to get into Michael Fair's home probably didn't know about Kamou, the watch lioness who was lounging alone inside.

The intruder scooped up \$200 worth of guns, a radio, record player and clothing.

"Then I think Kamou scared him," Fair told police Monday. He left the back door open and also the gate.

Kamou left, too.

Within minutes, startled residents of the quiet northwest Mesa neighborhood were telephoning police late Sunday night.

The barking of his dog aroused H.D. Hedgeth, and he went outside to see his five-pound Chihuahua attacking Kamou, a 40-pounder. The dog was sent rolling with a slap of the lioness' paw.

Hedgeth said, "There was the lion staring at me, its eyes shining in the dark."

Soon after, police had leashed the lioness. They took her to a veterinary hospital, but it lacked proper facilities for an 11-month-old lion, so they allowed Fair to take her home with a warning to keep his pet behind doors.

"It's had all its shots, and Fair has a license for it," an officer said.

Fair, 31, said Kamou had been declawed and her teeth filed. Normally, the lioness stays in a compound behind the house. Fair left her in the house Sunday as a guard.

Because of her size, Fair was planning to give her to the Phoenix Zoo.

"But I'm going to keep her as long as she doesn't give me trouble," he said. "It wasn't her fault that she escaped."

And he is not blaming her for letting the burglar escape with the goods.

Poultry Farm At Geneva Has Latest Methods

Seminole County's most up to date poultry farm began operations in Geneva this May when Feathernest Farms, Inc., owned by Betty N. Schlusemeyer and Dinty Whiting, gave a midnight welcome to some 10,000 DeKalb chickens.

This modern new farm was the result of three months' research by Whiting which resulted in many "firsts" in buildings and innovations. The owners acted as their own building contractors, sub-contracting various component parts.

An entirely new way of construction was introduced in the hen houses in that pre-fabricated trusses were set on the ground and rafters nailed in place after which the complete roof structure was hoisted into position by crane.

There are three miles of chicken cages and Feathernest Farms is the first in the area to have cement floors throughout. Electric feed cart is used and there are four feed tanks which can hold eight tons of feed. The farm is equipped with a 500 gallon gravity flow tank on a deep well pump that will distribute 20,000 gallons of water daily in refrigeration.

The cooler house will hold 900 full cases of eggs and can be set apart from the adjoining brooding room by insulated sliding door, thus preventing drastic loss in refrigeration.

By-product of the farm is an estimated 200 tons of chicken manure annually. Trucks, equipped with vacuum tubes, can withdraw the manure from the pits in four minutes, and with their reverse pumps, can spray to groves or pastures.

Is There Really A Santa Claus? Yes!

NEW YORK (AP) — For every entry he passes out to customers in a certain sales contest, the owner of a gasoline station pays two cents to his supplier.

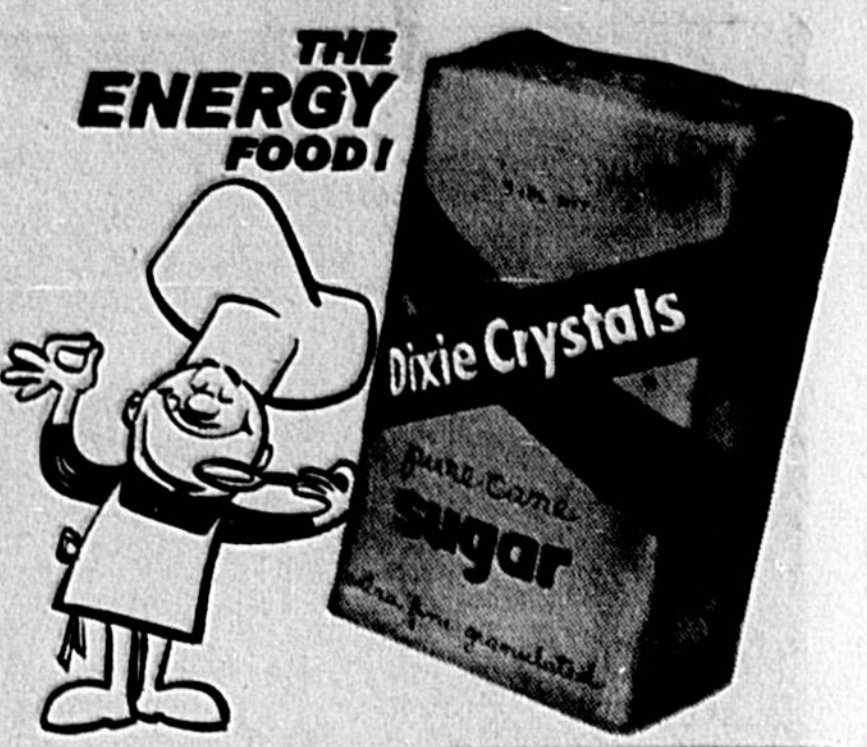
Is it possible, then, that these costs won't, in turn, be added to your bill? The trading stamp companies and contest promoters say these gifts are really free, and that they add nothing to your bill.

Who pays them? Is there really a Santa Claus in all this? The usual answer is that, yes, there is a Santa Claus. It is voluntary. Promotional schemes, as the theory goes, provide so much added volume to a store that they pay for themselves.

The needed increase might be about 15 or 20 per cent. Not only do promotional schemes provide you with a gift and put dollars in the grocer's pocket too — but in doing this they apparently bring profits also.

One sweepstakes promoter says its business has tripled in the past few years. And Sperry & Hutchinson, a trading stamp distributor, reported profits from January through September of \$17,881,000.

Promotion companies offer documentation for their claims that a good sales scheme can more than offset its own cost by means of added volume. This, however, leaves unanswered a big question: Where does the volume come from? Generally speaking, the added sales come at the expense of a competitor. It is difficult to increase the volume of consumer food buying generally. It must come from another store's share.

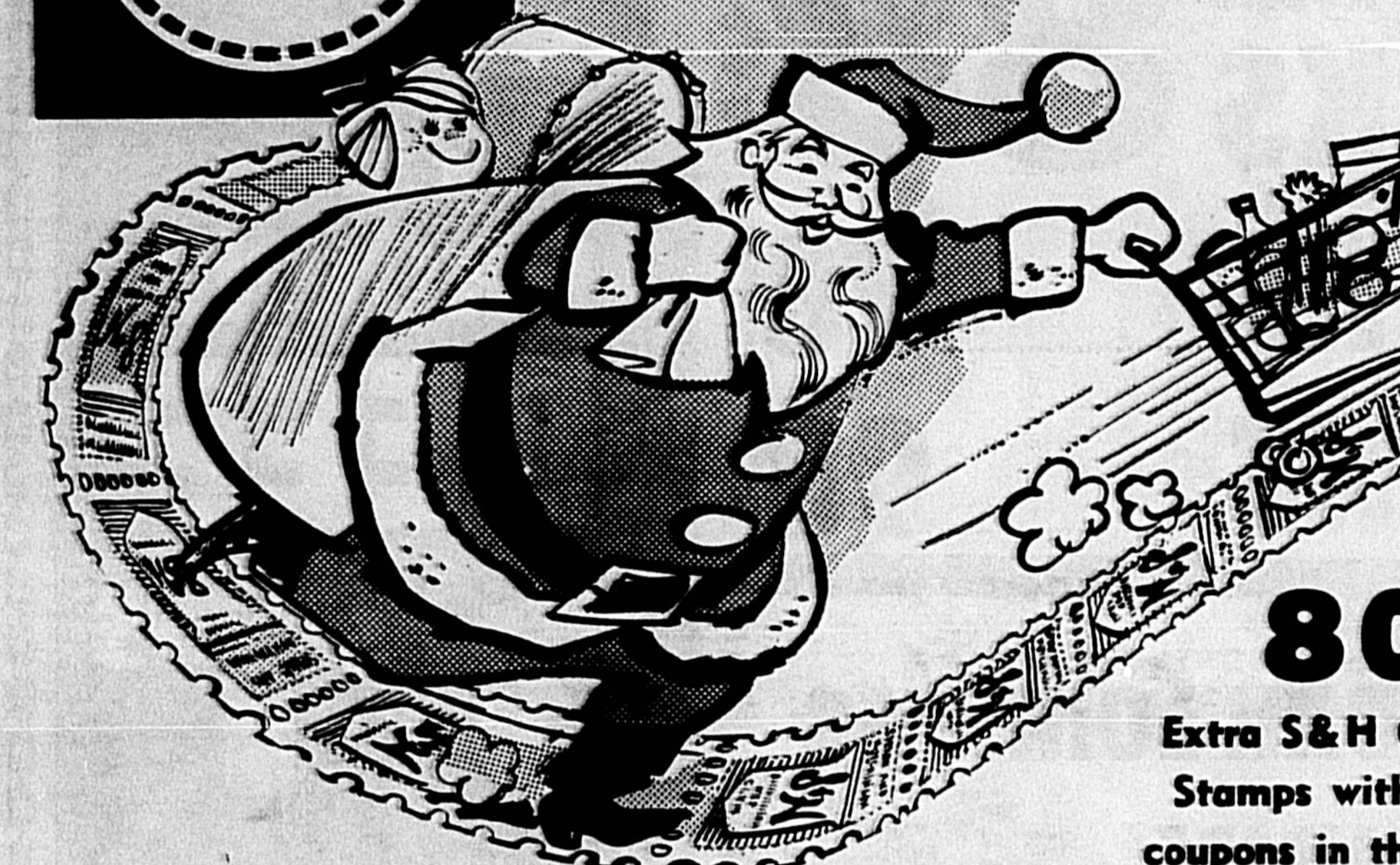

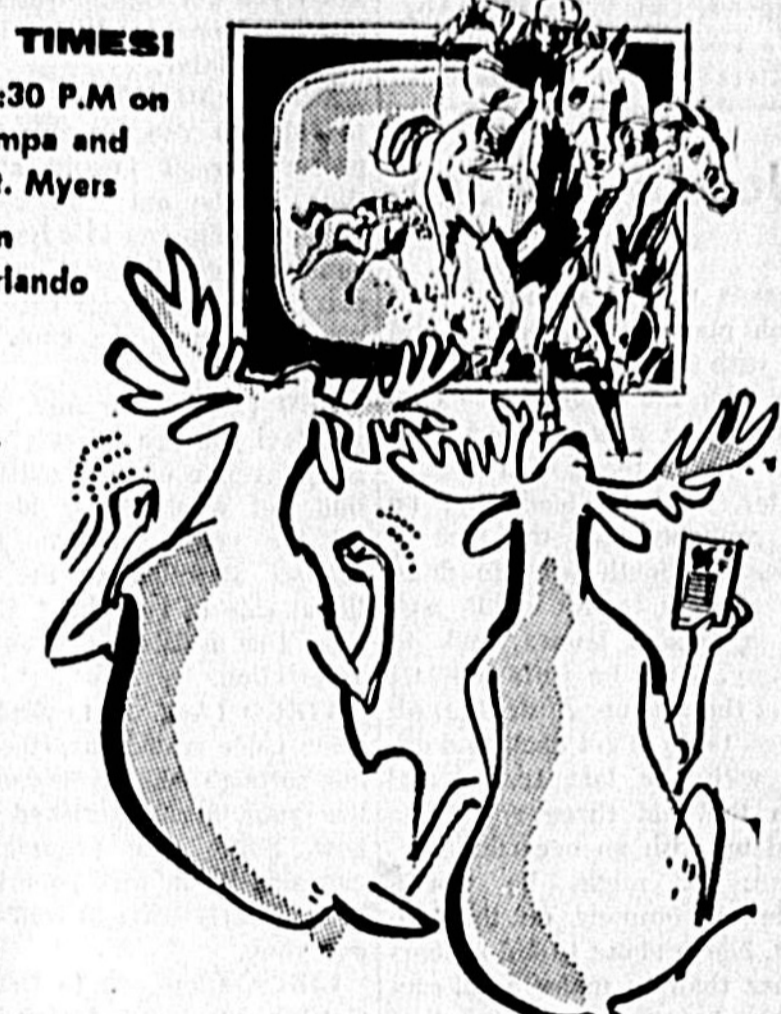

Bitter Cold Stuns State, Area

Freeze Feared

LAKELAND (UPI) - Winter sent its freezing touch into Florida today where the mercury plunged to 27 in Pensacola and 32 at Tallahassee.

At the University of Florida in Gainesville, students bundled against readings in the low 30s.

The freezing temperatures didn't get far enough south to affect tender truck crops and citrus, but the State Great Warning Service here said "look for even colder weather in North Florida to night."

"It will be colder in the north tonight," said Warren Johnson, head of the frost warning service, "and some of the state's so-called 'ornamentals' will be in danger in the northern counties."

The ornamentals are a \$60 million-a-year business in the Sunshine State. They range from little vines to hibiscus which are shipped North and sold in dime stores.

Temperatures dipped into the middle 50s across Central Florida this morning but went up to a mild 63 as far south as Miami.

A 50-degree reading at Palm Beach International Airport at 7 a.m. was the lowest for Nov. 3 since 1954.

With the exception of Miami, however, it was uncomfortably cold in most of the state's big cities this morning. Jacksonville had a 37, Tampa a 43 and Orlando 45.

The order brings total reductions ordered by the commission during its two-year investigation of the utility's rates to \$20,282,644.

Today's order is the second issued by the PSC within the past week in connection with a lengthy investigation into rates of the six major utilities in Florida.

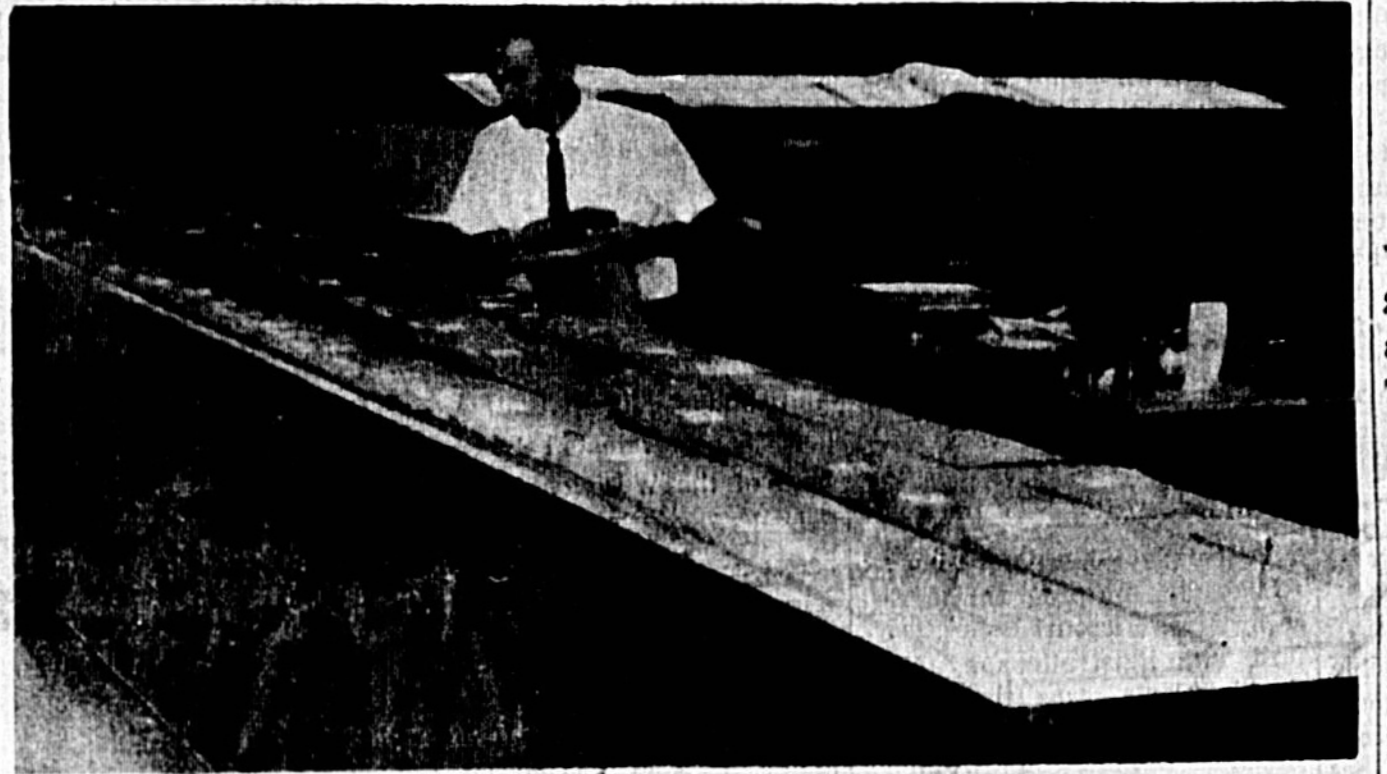
Ships Move In

Crops Jeopardized

The freeze expected to hit Seminole County tonight will have a "disastrous effect on the vegetable crop, cost growers here hundreds of thousands of dollars and have an adverse effect on the economy," local growers told The Herald today.

Temperatures dipped to 40 degrees this morning and are forecast to go as low as 28 to 32 degrees tonight, a near record temperature for this time of year.

Tonight's freeze is expected to completely destroy the many acres of cucumbers, beans, green peppers and egg plant while growth of escarole and chery will be retarded. The freeze will have little effect on the citrus crop, however, as temperatures of 25-27 degrees for at least four hours must be maintained before citrus is damaged.

Growers, who normally plan for freezes in late November or early December, were caught completely unprepared for the early dip in temperature.

"The market has been terrific," the growers said. "This will ruin us."

The economic effect will be that people who had been planning on working in the packing houses, after the near bumper crop was harvested, will not have this employment available to them on these particular crops.

Cleveland, Frederick Say Payoff Charges By Clyde Hart - - - 'Absolutely Ridiculous'

Two Sanford attorneys - a present and a former legislator - pointed to their records this morning and declared "absolutely ridiculous" the charges of a race track promoter that they took bribes to influence racing legislation.

Clyde E. Hart, of Samula, president of Seminole Raceway at Casselberry, in a bankruptcy hearing on reorganization of the raceway Wednesday at Orlando, testified he paid \$25,000 to State Sen. Mack N. Cleveland Jr. and former Rep. Gordon C. Frederick and gave to Rep. E. C. Rowell, outgoing House speaker, \$25,000 in shares of racing company stock.
