## Comprehensive plan clears first hurdle

**SANFORD** — In a marathon meeting that ended shortly before 2:30 a.m. Tuesday, the Sanford City Commission approved amendments to the city's Comprehensive Plan, including two items that drew considerable controversy.

The first was the creation of a land-use designation that classifies 411 acres of property along Lake Monroe from Mellonville Avenue to approximately Rachele Avenue as Waterfront/Downtown Business District (WDBD). The second item change 9.5

acres of land adjacent to Silver Lake in southeast Sanford from residential uses to an industrial designation.

The creation of the WDBD zone would allow mixed uses, including varying densities of residential properties up to 50 units per acre, retail development, and public/semi-public facilities.

Jay Jurie, a Sanford resident and associate professor of public administration

at the University of Central Florida, questioned whether such a broad-based land use designation was appropriate for the city.

"What benefits will accrue from lumping together suburban estates, medium and low density residential, and public/private uses with industrial, general commercial, and central business district land uses?" Jurie asked. "Are they really

compatible, or is this a garbage can model?"

Sanford Engineering and Planning Director Jay Marder said the purpose of the WDBD was to encourage redevelopment and revitalization in downtown and along the waterfront. He said by using a mixed-use designation, the city would have flexibility in attracting both residential and commercial development to the area.

Andrew Kutz, a member of the Sanford Planning and Zoning Commission, which recommended approval of the amendments, said he

## HUD issues written warning to Sanford housing director

### Hudson says he's trying to follow previous directives

**SANFORD** — Tim Hudson, director of the Sanford Housing Authority, has been ordered by the U.S. Housing and Urban Development (HUD) to stop attempting to force residents out of public housing that need repair.

The Housing Authority was told recently by HUD to renovate residences in Lake Monroe Terrace, and portions of Edward Higgins Terrace and Cowan Mouthon Terrace.

Originally, there was a move to have the structures torn down and the land used for other purposes, only a portion of which would be residential. HUD's order was to repair the units rather than demolish them.

To make the units available for renovation however, Housing Authority Manager Timothy Hudson decided to have residents of some of those units seek other housing. They

were given 60 days.

While several dozen units in Lake Monroe Terrace are already vacant and boarded up, others are occupied.

Several tenants subsequently contacted Central Florida Legal Services, and attempted to stop the relocation order. In response the tenants complaint, HUD has told Hudson he cannot force residents to move out. It was also suggested that residents in units which required vacating be relocated temporarily to other units which are vacant and not need of repairs.

Hudson said the only way the units can be assessed regarding the needed repairs is to have them vacant.

"We need to relocate 60 families from Lake Monroe Terrace for about a 12-month period," he said. "We already have 40 families engaged in the relocating process."


He added however that even though HUD is giving orders,

**SANFORD** — Dr. Oswald P. Bronson returned to his hometown of Sanford Saturday to say thanks to former Bethune-Cookman College football players who hail from the Sanford area, during the 75th B-CC Booster Club Rally/Prayer at First Shiloh Baptist Church.

Bronson, B-CC president for 25 years drew a standing ovation when he presented Sanford/Crooms Academy Coach Cornelius B. Franklin, a father of football, with a special award recognizing his 50-plus years of supporting the Wildcat football program. "Ever since I've known him, which has been nearly most of





1-3 Low, 4-6 Moderate, 7-8 High, 9-10 Very High. Values indicate the exposure to the sun's ultraviolet rays.



# Keeping track of all the Debby, Debbie and Debs

Debby fizzed before she could pop. That's the good news. Unfortunately, this hurricane with no pop was wrongly named in many publications. Some editors thought "Debby" was "Debbie."

The reason, we are told, is that "You Light Up My Life" was repeatedly playing in their heads.

A bright little ditty upon its release in 1978, "You Light Up My Life" was played so frequently it made several million people wish they were deaf. "Debby" Boone, who sang it, hasn't been heard from since.

That's the way it is with Debby's or Debbie's. They really don't amount to much. Deborah Kerr is the obvious exception. She's the No. 1 Deb of all time, an elegant woman of enormous talent and charm.

We still catch a glimpse of "Blondie" — Deborah Harry. She's 55, old enough for a dis-

count at Ross For Less. If I were naming hurricanes, I'd have made one, "Blondie."

My heart cries for Debbie Reynolds, who has had more than her share of adversity. I like to play a tape of her singing, "I Ain't Down Yet" from the Unsinkable Molly Brown. The Unsinkable Debbie Reynolds is 68. Her footprints are at Grauman's Chinese Theater.

I'll tell you how old I am — I remember the actress, Debra Paget. She was in the 1952 production of *Miserables*. (Debra Does Hugo). Ms Paget appeared in many western movies with Rory Calhoun or Vic Mature. Could be the producers downgraded her because she was a Debby.


You can find Deborah in the Bible — Judges: Chapters 4 & 5. Deborah was a judge and a prophetess. She married Lappidoth. Chapter 5 contains the Song of Deborah. I prefer it

to the song Debby Boone did. "Debbie" Turner, Miss Missouri, was declared Miss America 1990 after she won the swimsuit and spelling bee competitions. "Debra" Maffett from California was the 1973 winner. Incredible as this may be, a Deborah won the pageant in 1966 and a Debra Dene in 1968. Both were from Kansas. That's right, Dorothy, Kansas.

## Gardening tools put to the test

It's been a long, hot summer for some. As it draws to a close, many a mow-weary homeowner may be tempted to fall back in the hammock and just let nature take its course.

Unfortunately, lawns and gardens still require care, even as homeowners' enthusiasm for their upkeep shrivels. To the supposed rescue are three new products that promise to make some tasks easier. One even relegates the caretaker to the role of observer.

— The mow-bot. Indulge for a moment in a wicked suburban fantasy: As your poor neighbor sweats like crazy behind a plodding lawnmower, you loll in your hammock — icy drink in hand — watching a robot mow your lawn.

It may not be just a dream. Meet the new Friendly Robotics RL500, a battery-powered robotic mulching lawnmower that looks like a cross between a canister vacuum and a kiddie car. At \$795, it's comparable in price to a high-end self-propelled lawnmower. Here's how it works:

You stake a perimeter wire around your lawn, which stays in place. Its battery-powered signal prevents the RL500 from wandering off — perhaps to mow your neighbor's lawn. You move the mow-bot out of your garage and onto your lawn using a remote control. (At 78 pounds, including the battery, it's too heavy to carry.) Then, you press a button and — after a digital trumpet fanfare — it's off and running.

There are drawbacks, however: — The robot is s-l-o-w. It took

an hour to mow an area 35 feet by 35 feet, and 2 1/2 hours to mow 50 feet by 50 feet. Using a gasoline push mower, it took us seven and 12 minutes, respectively. You're supposed to keep an eye on your robot as it's mowing, but after the first minute, this can get tedious.

— The mower mows patches — roughly 5 percent of your lawn. If your teen-ager did a comparable job, you'd send him or her back to redo the work. The manufacturer advises you to simply mow the lawn more often with the RL500, but considering the time involved, it could become your second job. Also, it cuts in random patterns — a nit if you like neat rows.

— Its lead-acid battery can supply power for only about 2 1/2 hours and requires a 24-hour recharge. The manufacturer says the RL500 is particularly good for seniors or those who find it hard to operate a regular mower. It's quiet, too. All in all, though, there are better choices, including cheaper push mowers, cordless electric mowers and some comparably priced

self-propelled mowers, such as the John Deere LX75 or the Honda Harmony HRB215K3SXA.

— A cut above. Stymied by thickets or hard-to-reach branches? We tested a couple of pruners with innovative designs that make short shrift of shabby shrubbery.

The Fiskars Goose-neck Swivel Lopper 9131 (\$45) is only 34 inches long, but its extended shaft can reach almost a foot farther than a typical lopper can. And its 360 degree rotating head allows you to work the handles while holding it in the most comfortable position. We found it fairly easy to cut branches up to 1 1/2 inches thick.

— Another Fiskars product, the Pruning Stick 9234 (\$55), is a light, nimble pruning tool that extends your reach by about five feet, allowing you to prune overhead without a ladder and at ground level without stooping. Its adjustable head, which rotates 240 degrees, can cut branches up to 1 1/4 inches thick at just about any angle — a challenge for other tree pruners.

Either of these products would be a welcome addition to any gardener's tool shed. Each comes with a lifetime warranty.

# Don't even think about drinking

**DEAR DR. GOTT:** Can an alcoholic ever return to social drinking?

**DEAR READER:** Many alcoholics dream of the opportunity to return to social drinking. But this yearning is just that: a dream. What marks alcoholism is the inability to control the use of alcohol-containing beverages. Whether this unfortunate tendency is genetic or merely behavioral is unknown but hotly debated. One fact is clear, however: A major part of the alcoholic's recovery process is surrender. This means that alcohol-addicted patients must do more than acknowledge the disease — they must give in to it and believe in their hearts that they are utterly powerless over it.

In this surrender — which leads to a healthy sobriety — alcoholics gain strength and self-confidence. They really begin to get well. The alcoholic who holds a shred of hope that he or she can return to "normal" or "social" drinking is engaging in a virulent form of self-deception that is not surren-

der but a negotiated truce that will probably culminate in disaster. In short, this sort of "stinking thinking" does not work. For the alcoholic, social drinking is a myth: Such drinking is bound to soar out of control.

Nonetheless, some studies — notably in Britain — have shown that selected alcoholics are, in some instances, able to resume moderate drinking. The reasons for this are not understood, but such patients are decidedly in the minority.

Therefore, my advice to alcoholics is similar to those "don't even think of parking here!" signs posted in special reserved areas:

Give up, surrender and turn your life over to a higher power. Your energies can be put to better use by avoiding a drink today, changing your attitude and committing yourself to a program of personal growth, such as Alcoholics Anonymous. **DEAR DR. GOTT:** I've been told that the can of Coke that I drink for lunch effectively blocks absorption of dietary calcium, even from milk. Is this true?

**DEAR READER:** Most modern soft drinks are devoid of anything but sugar, water, coloring and flavorings; some contain caffeine. Old-fashioned REAL Coca-Cola — the stuff with cocaine and God knows what other unhealthy ingredients — was said to interfere with the absorption of many nutrients, including calcium. However, to my knowledge, this was untrue.

Certainly, today's Coke, which is basically sugar-water, should not affect calcium. Therefore, you're safe to enjoy a soft drink without worrying about the nutritional consequences — except for the unnecessary "empty" calories provided by the soda.

believed the WDBD was good idea, but was concerned there were not enough details in plan.

"I don't think we can continue with broad-based plans," Kutz said. "Sometimes we have to commit to specific details. We've got to say, 'We're going to do some things, and these are the things we're going to do.'"

Kutz recommended the city hire an outside firm to create a detailed master plan for the WDBD area.

"We've got a good planning department, but they're loaded up with all kinds of work," Kutz said. "Let's spend the money to bring in some outside professionals who can help us with this."

Commission approved the creation of the WDBD with the stipulation that the eastern portion of Fort Mellon Park be specifically designated as park land. Resident Millard Hunt and Commissioner Randy Jones raised concerns that unless specifically designated, that portion of the park might be developed. The western portion of Fort Mellon Park is the proposed site for a hotel/conference center.

The second item that drew attention was an amendment to rezone 9.5 acres of land from residential to industrial uses. The property, owned by Abdul Hussein Family Limited Partnership, is adjacent to Silver Lake in the southeast section of Sanford.

The land surrounding the lake is zoned residential, and most of it is used for single-family residential homes, many of which sit on at least one acre of property.

"You're not going to find an environment like this anywhere in Sanford," said Dr. Elvin Barber who lives next to the lake. "It's a spring-fed lake that is pristine. The lake is so clear you can see the bottom. You can even see the fish swimming."

Silver Lake is located near the Orlando/Sanford International Airport, and more and more of the land is being used for industrial purposes, from shipping warehouses to manufacturing.

Residents said they wanted the land to remain an oasis, but city staff, in a report to the commission, recommended approval of the rezoning because the area has "increasingly become an industrial

area" in recent years. Staff also maintained "the need for industrial land in Sanford is expected to increase nearly 30 percent in the next ten years."

Residents disputed those points, saying there are other properties more appropriate for industrial uses.

"Our major concern is the incompatibility of this industrial complex buttressed against a residential neighborhood," said resident Beverly Baird Boothe.

"They say the city needs more industrial land, yet right down the streets there is 180,000 square feet of industrial buildings that aren't being used. They're trying to lease them."

Boothe's neighbor, Linda Baker, agreed.

"What I don't understand why the city wants to take residential land and turn it into industrial," Baker said. "Would they allow someone to buy industrial land and try to rezone it residential?"

"We've watched industrial development grow and grow and grow, and we've opposed it each time," said Richard Fowler, another resident of the Silver Lakes neighborhood. "We've lost each time, and what happens is that the previous approval is used as justification for approving the next industrial development."

"Once these barriers are penetrated, we can kiss our neighborhood good-bye," Fowler said.

By a 4-1, the commission approved the rezoning on first reading, with commissioner Whitey Eckstein the lone dissenter.

## Woman doubts she can find compassion for cruel in-laws

**DEAR ABBY:** I know you have heard in-law horror stories for decades, but I believe mine takes the cake. My in-laws actually threw a second wedding reception for our guests because they didn't feel ours had enough food. It was a catered affair in their home immediately following ours.

Tell her you have a bone to pick with her. If she refuses to rename her dog, consider that a clue about how she prioritizes your feelings.

# Blind mosquitoes are a nuisance to humans

Blind mosquitoes are also known as aquatic midges since their larvae and pupae live in the water. They do not bite, suck blood, or carry disease, but their presence often indicates pollution of aquatic habitats.

They are important to man only when they emerge in such large numbers that they become a nuisance.

**Life cycle:** The adults lay the eggs in a mass, covered by a gelatinous substance, on the surface of the water. The eggs are found usually at the edge of a lake, stream or river, and twigs in contact with the water.

Eggs of aquatic midges usually hatch in 2 to 7 days, then feed on the gelatinous material for about 2 days, then the larvae burrow in to the mud or with their salivary secretions build small tubes and tunnels in which they live. Larval tubes may have one opening, or an opening at each end, to allow the larva to feed.

From the water the larvae extract oxygen and feed on suspended matter in the water and organic matter in the mud. After the first molt, the larvae of most aquatic midges take on a pink color which gradually darkens into a deep red (some are consequently called blood-worms). As the larvae grow, they enlarge the tube periodically to accommodate their increasing size.

The larval stage can last from less than 2 to 7 weeks depending on the water temperature. The larvae transform into

pupae while still in the tubes. The pupal stage normally lasts 3 days after which the pupae leave the tube and swim to the surface a few hours before the adult emerges. The adults emerge and mate during swarming at night. The adults do not feed during their adult existence and can only live for 3 to 5 days. The entire life cycle can be completed in 2 weeks under ideal conditions.

**Interactions with humans:** Residents close to blind mosquito breeding areas experience severe nuisance and economic problems. Blind mosquitoes can emerge in large numbers between

April and November affecting human outdoor activities since the adult midges can be inhaled or fly into the mouth, eyes or ears.

During hot summer days, midges fly to cool shady places. At night, they are attracted to lights around houses and businesses. When large numbers are present, they stain paint, stucco and other wall finishes. Automobiles become soiled, and when headlights and windshield get covered with dead midges, they can cause accidents. Thousands of

dollars are spent on cleaning up the dead bodies of midges from sidewalks and porches the morning after mating flights.

Piles of dead midges up to 3 feet deep have been measured in front of stores. The bodies that are mashed to painted surfaces cause permanent staining. Also, blind mosquitoes will fly indoors as doors are opened and closed. Problems indoors such as ruining laundry and staining indoor walls, ceilings, draperies and other furnishings cause severe annoyance for residents.

Where midges are prevalent, spider webs and spiders abound. Accumulations of dead midges and webs require residents to frequently wash and maintain homes and businesses.

The dead midges have a smell similar to rotting fish as they decay, and the smell can persist in damp weather, even after the insects have been removed.

In Seminole County, blind mosquitoes emerging from Lake Monroe and other nearby bodies of water cause \$3 to \$4 million in business losses annually.

Blind mosquitoes are an important component of the food chain in a lake because fish utilize the larvae as food. It is not surprising then that Lakes where aquatic midges breed, are often our best fishing lakes.

**Control:** Control of blind mosquitoes is difficult since the larvae live on the lake or river bottom, and therefore they

are more difficult to kill than the mosquito larvae.

Control measures against adult blind mosquitoes are effective for short periods of time. Mists or fogs from boat-mounted or truck-mounted sprayers traveling close to the shoreline kill midges resting in grass or other vegetation near the water's edge before they fly to the buildings. Individuals can kill blind mosquito adults by using fogging units.

Blind mosquitoes breed in lakes and rivers in large numbers mainly due to the pollution of the water. Water containing nutrients from food-processing plants, septic tanks, sewage treatment plants, and leaching of fertilizers from lawns and agriculture around lakes, contribute to the production of food for blind mosquitoes. As pollution increases, the available food increase and blind mosquito populations explode.

Blind mosquitoes have been known for years to be indicators of pollution in waterways. But certain lakes in Florida have become so severely polluted that even blind mosquitoes cannot survive in them. Blind mosquitoes have predators, diseases, and parasites that are being investigated as biological control agents. It is possible that one of them will help in controlling the blind mosquito problem in the future.

## FWC sets September 6th-to-8th meeting in DeLand

DeLAND - The Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission will meet at the Holiday Inn DeLand Convention Center Sept. 6-to-8.

The agenda includes review and discussion of Brevard County manatee protection zones and review and discussion of major regulatory changes to wildlife and freshwater fisheries regulations for 2001-02.

Commissioners also will hear status reports from staff regarding manatees, Florida panthers, the exotic pet trade, sea turtles and the Advisory Council on Environmental Education (ACEE). In addition, Commissioners will consider one appointment and one reappointment to ACEE.

Concerning marine issues, Commissioners will conduct a final public hearing on a proposed rule that would prohibit all import, transport, possession and sale of mitten crabs (a non-native species) in Florida.

The Commission will also review a draft rule that would prohibit the feeding of marine animals — a practice that occurs during the course of certain charter dive tours, and will discuss request to change the October 15-to-May 15 Biscayne Bay food shrimp production season to November 1-to-May 31.

In other marine fisheries actions, the FWC will review staff recommendations regarding possible management changes for gag and black grouper and cobia, exceptions to the prohibition of shrimp trawling within 100 yards of shore in the St. Johns River and management of the commercial pompano fishery.

In addition, the Commission will receive stock assessments for the snook and sheepshead fisheries and a report on the Tortugas 2000 Ecological Reserve issues and will consider various federal matters, including proposed changes to commercial king and Spanish mackerel rules and federal disaster relief for stone crab and spiny lobster fishermen.

Concerning inland issues, Commissioners will consider quota permits for four wildlife management areas (WMAs) in south Florida, acreage changes to WMAs, the bag limit for one species of duck

## Ex-Solar Bear gets new job with IHL franchise

ORLANDO - During a press conference at the RDV Sportplex, RDV Sports Chief Operating Officer (COO) John Weisbrod announced that former Orlando Solar Bears on-ice standout and assistant coach Hubie McDonough has been hired as the International Hockey League (IHL) team's new Director of Hockey Operations.

McDonough's appointment fills the void that was left by the March announcement of (then-Solar Bears, General Manager Weisbrod to the position of COO of RDV Sports.

McDonough served as an assistant to Solar Bears Head Coach Peter Horachek during the 1999-2000 season.

"Hubie McDonough's name is synonymous with Solar Bears hockey," noted Weisbrod. "In addition to the fact that he is the most recognizable player to have ever worn the Orlando uniform, his background and experience in hockey is immense with nearly 1000 professional games to his credit. He made a successful transition into the coaching ranks last season, and we feel that he is the right person to guide the hockey operations side of this organization.

"The tandem of Hubie and Director of Business Operations Kelly Lafferman provide the Solar Bears with an excellent management team to guide the club into its sixth season and many seasons to come."

Prior to joining Horachek's coaching staff for the 1999-2000 campaign, McDonough was one of Orlando's most prolific on-ice performers.

He was acquired by the Solar Bears on October 28, 1995 in a trade with the Los Angeles Ice Dogs and appeared in 280 games during his four seasons on the ice for Orlando. McDonough ranks in the franchise's top five all-time in nearly every offensive category including points (231), goals (108), assists (123), power play goals (40), and shorthanded goals (5).

His Solar Bears teams twice advanced to the Turner Cup Finals (1998 and 1999) and appeared in the IHL playoffs all four seasons.


McDonough's 13-year playing career began in 1986 and spanned 787 games, including 195 National Hockey League (NHL) contests with the Los Angeles Kings, New York Islanders, and San Jose Sharks.

He appeared in 570 career IHL games, was twice named to the All-IHL Second Team (1992-93 and 1994-95), played in two IHL All-Star Games (1994 and 1995), and was selected as Most Valuable Player of the 1995 IHL All-Star Game.

Orlando opens its sixth IHL season on Friday, October 6th at the TD Waterhouse Centre with a 7 p.m. contest against the

# NFC West: Rams replay Super season

It won't be quite so easy for the St. Louis Rams to repeat as Super Bowl champions. They're more likely to dominate the NFC West vs. rising New Orleans and falling Carolina.

Going into the 2000 season, here's a look at the division (with the teams listed in their approximate order of strength):

**1. ST. LOUIS RAMS:** Coach Dick Vermeil retired with his surprise NFL crown. The talent-rich Rams promoted Mike Martz, who hired five new aides.

For St. Louis, the All-NFL selections are quarterback Kurt Warner (4,353 yards, 41 touchdowns), running back Marshall Faulk (1,381 yards rushing, 1,048 yards receiving), kick returner Tony Horne, offensive tackle Orlando Pace and defensive end Kevin Carter (17 sacks). Wide receiver Isaac Bruce, line-

backers London Fletcher and Mike Jones and cornerback Todd Lyght are stars.

The Rams were first in the NFL in scoring in 1999 and fourth in points allowed. If the team stays healthy, St. Louis can thrive.

**2. NEW ORLEANS SAINTS:** Behind new coach Jim Haslett, the 'Aints come marching in with a lot of new faces. Plus a Big Easy schedule.

The worst team in the NFC last season was 29th in the league in points scored and 28th in points allowed. New Orleans was 28th in turnovers.

Off-alling running back Ricky Williams (884 yards) is the key to success. New Orleans didn't have a 1,000-yard rusher during the 1999s.

The newly acquired players include quarterback Jeff Blake from Sanford, wide receivers Jake Reed and Joe Horn, tight end Andrew Glover, defensive tackle Norman Hand and kicker

Toby Gowin.

**3. CAROLINA PANTHERS:** The Panthers are hurting. Out for the season are kicker John Kasay, wide receiver Patrick Jeffers, corner back Tony Booth and safety Deon Grant.

Coach George Seifert never fielded a loser in San Francisco (1989-96) or Carolina (1999). His Panthers were fourth in the NFL last year in scoring, but just 26th in points given up. So the defense needs help.

Imported pass rusher Chuck Smith might have a huge impact. Quarterback Steve Beurelein (4,436 yards, 36 touchdowns) and wide receiver Mushin Muhammad (96 catches, 1,253 yards) lead the attack, which will miss Kasay.

**4. SAN FRANCISCO 49ERS:** The Super Bowl champs of the 1980s and 1990s are just memories. The eras of quarterbacks Joe Montana and Steve Young have ended.

Wide receiver Jerry Rice (67 receptions) is the lone reminder of glory days.

The tapped-out 49ers were 22nd in the NFL in scoring last season and 30th in points allowed.

Coach Steve Martucci has a lot of work to do.

Running back Charlie Garner (1,229 yards) and defensive tackle Bryant Young (11 sacks) are now the biggest contributors.

Wide receiver Terrell Owens can be a factor. Outside linebackers Ray Brown and Dave Flore know

how to play. But the defensive backs are weak links.

**5. ATLANTA FALCONS:** No team coming off a Super Bowl appearance ever had a worse winning percentage (.313). In 1999, coach Dan Reeves faced injuries to running back Jamal Anderson, quarterback Chris Chandler and linebacker Jessie Tuggle.

No wonder Atlanta did so poorly in scoring offense and defense.

When healthy, Chandler (2,339 yards, 16 touchdowns) can pass. Wide receiver Terrence Mathis

(81 catches, 1,016 yards) is a fine target.

But the Falcons really need a full season from Anderson (1,846 yards, 14 rushing touchdowns in 1998). Only cornerback Ray Buchanan stands out on defense.

(scaup) during duck hunting season and establishment of alligator management programs on private lands.

Commissioners also will consider staff proposals for land acquisition projects.

### SHUPE'S SCOOP

It is a good policy for the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission to review fisheries stocks and quotas on a regular basis, as this allows the group to accurately assess

and monitor the various species of fish within our waters.

### FISHING FORECAST

River action is fair for bass overall, but is very good in the section from Puzzle Lake south. This stretch of river is very narrow, and bass are forced into the main channel by low water levels, where they are easily located and caught. Bream and catfish continue to hit worms and mussels in the deep bends.

Sebastian Inlet has snook, trout, redfish, flounder and a few tarpon. Large live shrimp or small baitfish are the top baits. The outgoing tide still has the best action.

Captain Jack at Port

Canaveral reports that king mackerel are still the main attraction. Kings can be found from just off the beach all the way out to 8 A Reef and Pelican Flats. The top strategy for big kings is to slow troll live bait such as mullet or m menhaden (pogies). Tripletail and kings are in the buoy line, while sheepshead and flounder are reliable inside the Port. Trout and redfish are fair in the Banana and Indian Rivers.

Ponce Inlet has good action with sheepshead, drum, redfish, jack crevalle and a few flounder. Live or dead shrimp is the bait of choice. Trout and redfish are rated as good in Mosquito Lagoon.
