## Yeggs Fail At Bank But Hit Night Spot

Burglars were only partially successful in two break-ins reported to Sanford police over the New Year's weekend.

A haul of between \$800-\$900 in cash and receipts was removed from a Commercial Street night spot but the ringing of an alarm thwarted efforts to load a night depository safe at the Florida State Bank.

The loss of receipts occurred at the Lui Club, where a metal safe and cash box were removed by thieves who probably hid inside the bistro at closing time early Sunday morning and later escaped by a rear door, according to police theories.

A small metal safe was removed from its closet hiding place and a box containing cash was taken from under the back bar, according to reports.

Police were notified of the loss this morning when the club opened.

A clanging burglar alarm late Saturday night prevented burglars from getting into the safe for holding bank night deposits but the intruders were able to remove a combination from one safe.

Entry to the bank was made by removing a door from a roof fire escape.

Police believe the yeggs were after the betting receipts from the Sanford-Orlando Kennel Club, which normally use the night depository for usually large deposits.

The alarm sounded shortly after 9:30 p.m. but the burglars eluded police who are headquartered within sight of the bank.

Police Chief Ben Butler this morning advised that Federal Bureau of Investigation agents had joined police in the investigation.

## Expensive Auto Stripped, Burned

Home Furnishings Stolen At Forest City

Car strippers took a motor, transmission and other parts from an expensive sports car Sunday and then tried to burn the remainder of the vehicle in a fire that did extensive damage to a barn belonging to the Patrick Fruit Company.

Deputy Sheriff E. H. Stanley reported a car, believed to have been stolen earlier, was taken to the barn, located near 14 on Lake Emma Road by thieves who utilized a farm tractor found nearby to pull the vehicle from a sand mire into the barn.

After the dismantling, the thieves set the car afire and the blaze is believed to have ignited the barn, which also contained two company trucks.

Only minor damage was done to the trucks, because of the quick work by the Lake Mary Fire Department, which was called to the scene to extinguish the blaze after a motorist traveling I-4 spotted the fire.

In another reported theft, complete home furnishings belonging to Stephanie LeMay were removed from her Forest City home in a Sunday report.

Estimated to be worth several thousands of dollars, the thieves loaded up an entire household of furniture, including television sets, tables, beds, chairs, etc., from the 1223 Floral Way residence.

The theft occurred when the home owner was away for several days.

## Seminole Board To Form

Tomorrow's meeting of the County Commission promises to be brief, following lengthy meetings for the past several weeks. This is largely due to the reorganizational nature of the agenda.

Foremost is the seating of the new commissioners, which include Al Davis, John Kinbrough, Greg Drummond and Sid Viblen, Jr. Only holdover is Edward Yarborough.

The board will subsequently be organized for 1971, with the election of the chairman and vice chairman. Speculation has been that Greg Drummond will be elected as chairman.

Appointments will be made to official boards and committees in the county such as the county insurance committee, board of planning examiners, board of electrical examiners, water control and conservation advisory committee, board of adjustment, zoning and planning commission, board of adjustment and appeals to the building code, commissioners of various fire districts, long range planning committee for recreation, Seminole County Historical Commission, board of building contractor examiners, agricultural advisory committee, and Orange-Seminole Joint Planning Commission.

Appointments also will be made among the commissioners for the custodians of the various county properties.

Final item on the agenda is the establishment of the county fiscal holidays for 1971.

## Father Hurt In Rescue

OVIEDO — The New Year was ushered in by a heroic tragedy in Oviedo last Friday. Herbert Boston, 39, is in Winter Park Hospital in serious condition as a result of burns received when he rescued his two small children from their burning home early in the morning. The two children also were hospitalized. Herbert Boston Jr., 8 months, is listed in good condition while Evie Boston, 2½, is in satisfactory condition.

The blaze, which was reported at 8:30 a.m., destroyed the frame residence located on SR-29, one block inside the city limits. The origin of the fire was believed to have been a faulty oil space heater.

The Oviedo Volunteer Fire Department responded and prevented the fire from spreading to adjoining homes.

## Mayoralty Open

NORTH ORLANDO — Village Council, at a 7:30 meeting tonight, faces the task of filling the vacancy in the office of the mayor caused by the resignation of Mayor Clifford Jordan to run for the County Commission. Jordan's resignation is effective today, so council must make the decision. The appointment will be effective until the municipal elections on March 16.

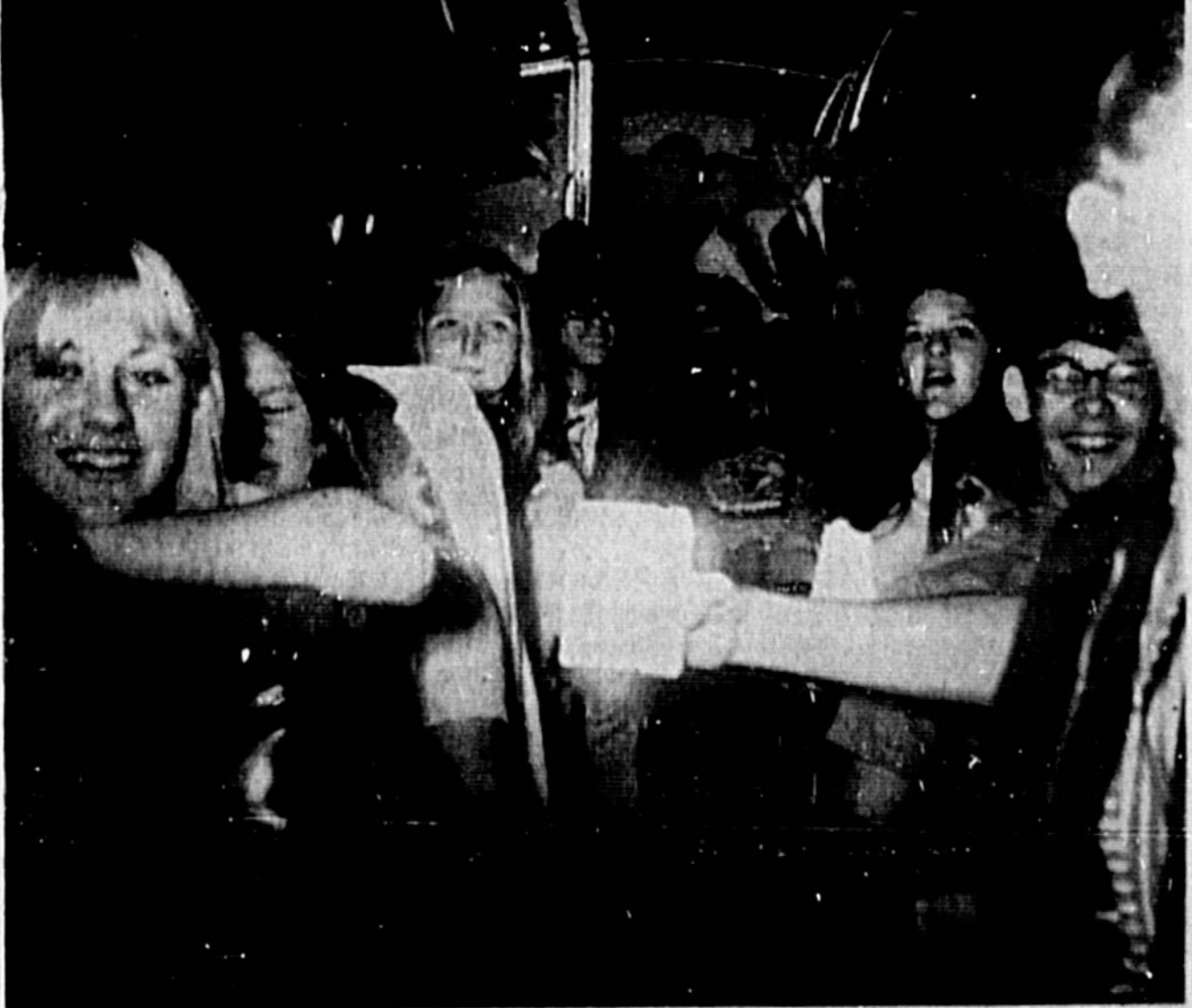
Also to be discussed tonight is the hiring of a new police patrolman. Fred Scott Kenneth has been recommended by the police department, and presumably will receive the stamp of approval from council.

A report will be given upon meetings of the charter committee by Councilman Richard Allen.

Another report will be given council by B. C. Conklin, city engineer, upon Florida Land Corporation's holdings in North Orlando, first, fifth, and eighth additions.

A contract will in all probability be executed between the Village and H&W Refuse Corporation. At the last meeting of council the present owner, Sam Hodge announced that the company had changed hands, but that he would remain as manager. Rates will remain the same, barring an increase in the commercial rate at the new central landfill. The new contract will be for two years.

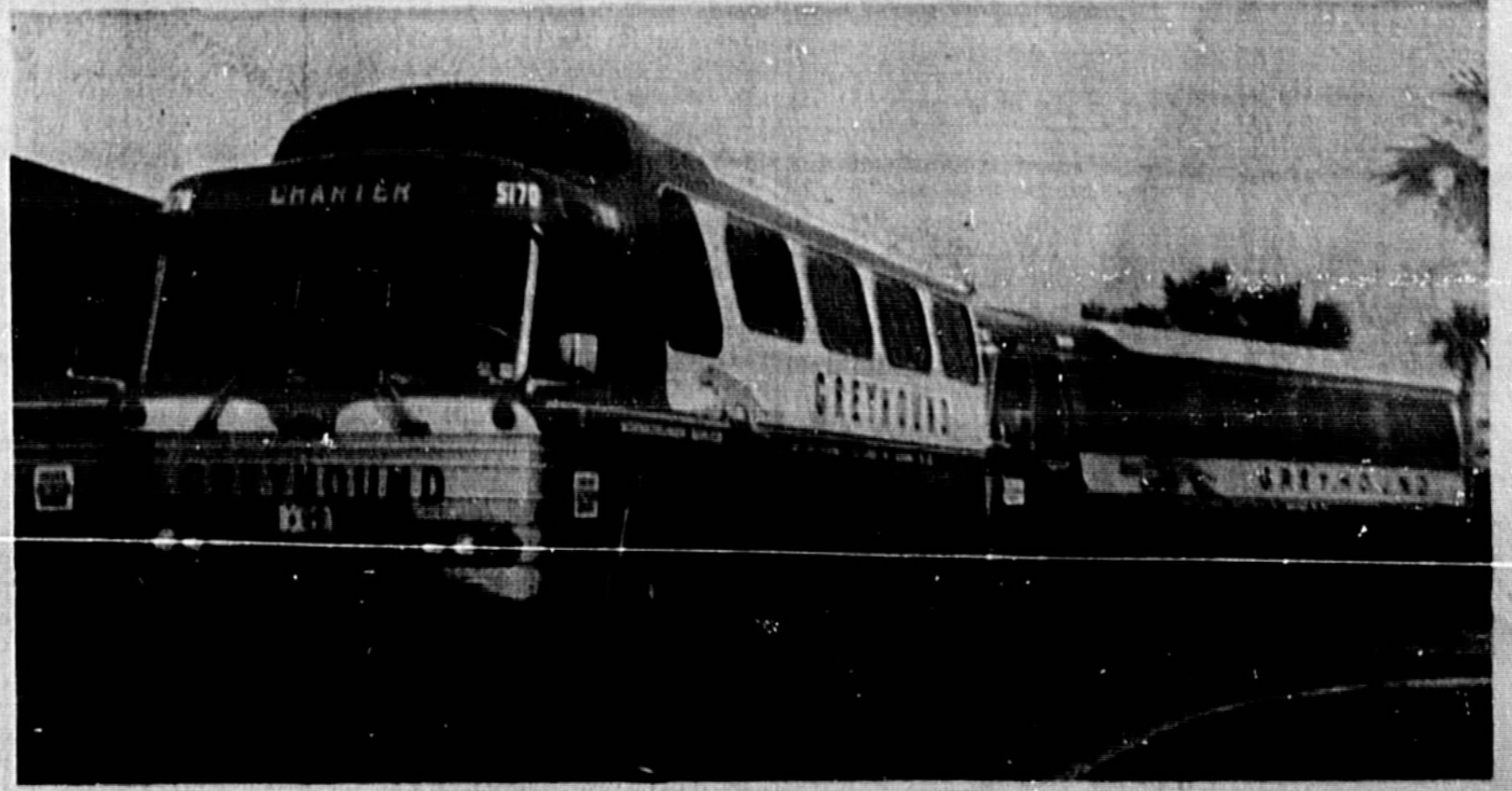
Council will take under consideration the ordinance governing planned unit development (PUD) which is being incorporated in the development of Florida Land Corporation.

# B52 Bombers Hit Red Build-Up Points In S. Vietnam

SAYON (AP) — U.S. B52 bombers attacked North Vietnamese positions in South Vietnam today for the first time in a month after intelligence reports of a new buildup in the northwestern part of the country.

Six of the Stratofortresses dropped 180 tons of bombs less than half a mile from the demilitarized zone and the Laotian border, and at the head of the A Shau valley 60 miles to the southeast along the Laotian border.

The U.S. Command said the targets were "infiltration routes, storage sites, bunkers, base camps and staging areas."

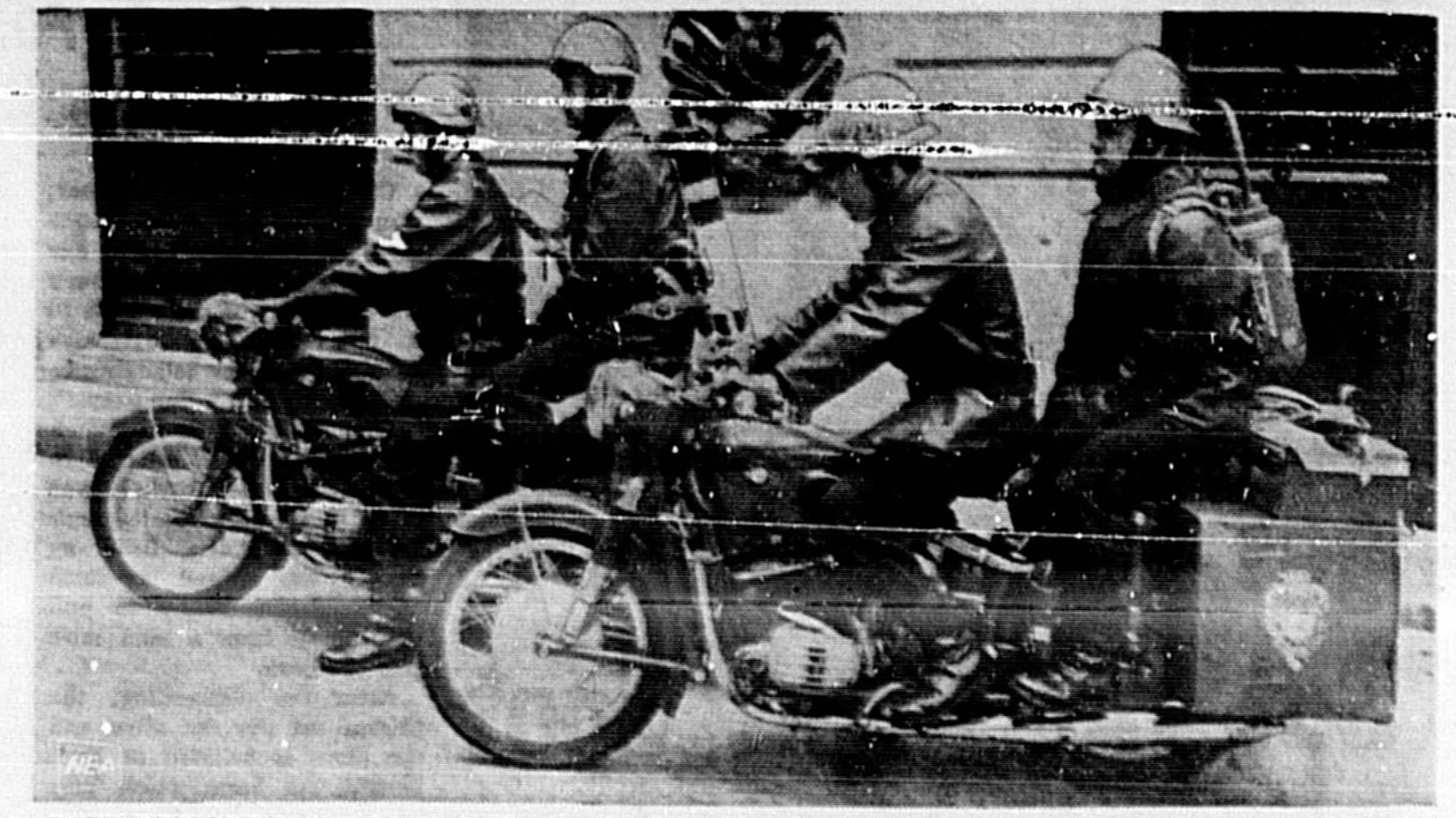
Since last October, the B52s have been used almost entirely against the Ho Chi Minh trail, trying to cut the movement of supplies and reinforcements before they reach South Vietnam. During the past three months, the big bombers have flown nearly 3,000 sorties against targets in Laos, compared to about 100 in South Vietnam. A sortie is one flight by one B52.

each carrying 80 tons of bombs. The North Vietnamese usually move the bulk of their supplies south between October and May, when the dry season prevails over Laos and roads and trails are passable.

On the battlefields, South Vietnamese troops backed by bombers and artillery reported 21 North Vietnamese and Viet Cong killed Sunday in scattered clashes in the U Minh forest deep in the Mekong Delta. Field reports said four South Vietnamese soldiers were killed and 12 wounded.

No major battlefield action involving American troops was reported. But the U.S. Command said three Americans were killed and 14 wounded in a small firefight and in booby trap and mine explosions in various parts of the country.

In Cambodia, government forces sweeping an area two miles south of Prey Totung, on Highway 7 about 40 miles northeast of Phnom Penh, clashed with North Vietnamese and Viet Cong troops.

## Envoys Fly To Mideast Peace Talk

JERUSALEM (AP) — Peace negotiators from Israel and Egypt were flying today to join mediator Guntar V. Jarring at the United Nations.

Israel's ambassador to the United Nations, Yosef Tekuch, left Tel Aviv this morning and said he would meet with Jarring Tuesday. Premier Golda Meir's coalition decided Sunday to send him for preliminary discussions on procedural questions.

Egypt's U.N. ambassador, Mohammed Hassan el Zayyat, met with President Anwar Sadat Sunday after a week of consultations with other Egyptian leaders. He too was to return to New York today.

The third party to the Jarring talks, Jordan, was expected to plan to replace its representative with a more moderate man. Arab sources in Jerusalem claim access to Jordanian government officials said Muhammad H. el Farra, Jordan's U.N. ambassador and a Palestinian, would be replaced temporarily by Jordan's ambassador to the United States, Abdul Hamid Sharaf.

MANILA (UPI) — The Philippines' top federal agent testified today he saw an assassin's dagger strike Pope Paul VI twice on the left side of his chest during the unsuccessful attempt on his life in Manila Nov. 27.

## U.S. And Japan Ties Strengthened By Laird

WASHINGTON (AP) — Secretary of Defense Melvin R. Laird is moving toward a closer relationship with Japanese defense officials with the expectation Japan will become a key partner in Pacific area security.

Laird's increased interest in Japan is directly related to the progressive withdrawal of U.S. military forces from Asia. Some U.S. defense officials believe Japan—with its population of more than 100 million, its industrial strength and its remarkable economic growth—is the one Asian power capable of filling any vacuum left by dismantling of U.S. military power in Asia.

Laird recently dropped in passing a reference to his hope to "pay particular attention to the coming months to cooperation with Japan."

## SST Left In Limbo By Solons

WASHINGTON (AP) — The expired 91st Congress left President Nixon's supersonic transport project in a legislative limbo, neither airborne nor grounded, neither dead nor forgotten.

One certainty is that the SST will keep the environment an issue and in the minds of congressmen far into the next session.

Less certain is how hard Nixon, faced with an extremely tight budget situation, will fight to preserve federal subsidies for the 1,800-mile-an-hour SST prototype development program.

Sen. William Proxmire, D-Wis., who battled the project to a standoff in the Congress that ended Saturday, has predicted the President may well drop the program entirely rather than face a new legislative defeat.

Republican Leader Hugh Scott and SST backers predict the opposite, saying the new Congress will appropriate SST spending at about a \$21-million yearly spending level.

This inauguration would be a most significant event if it were not for the change-over which is also taking place in the persons and the character of the cabinet.

The approach of the new governor to his task, his awareness of the challenges which confront his administration, his careful pronouncements when the issues are discussed, all contribute to the air of expectation which we confidently hold.

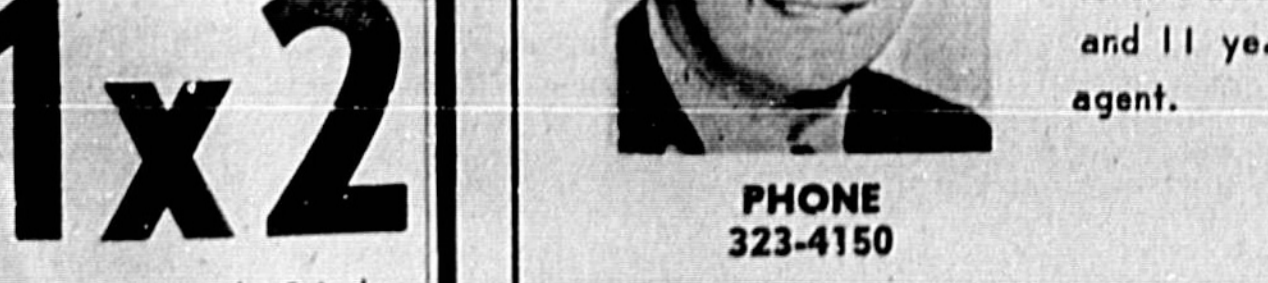

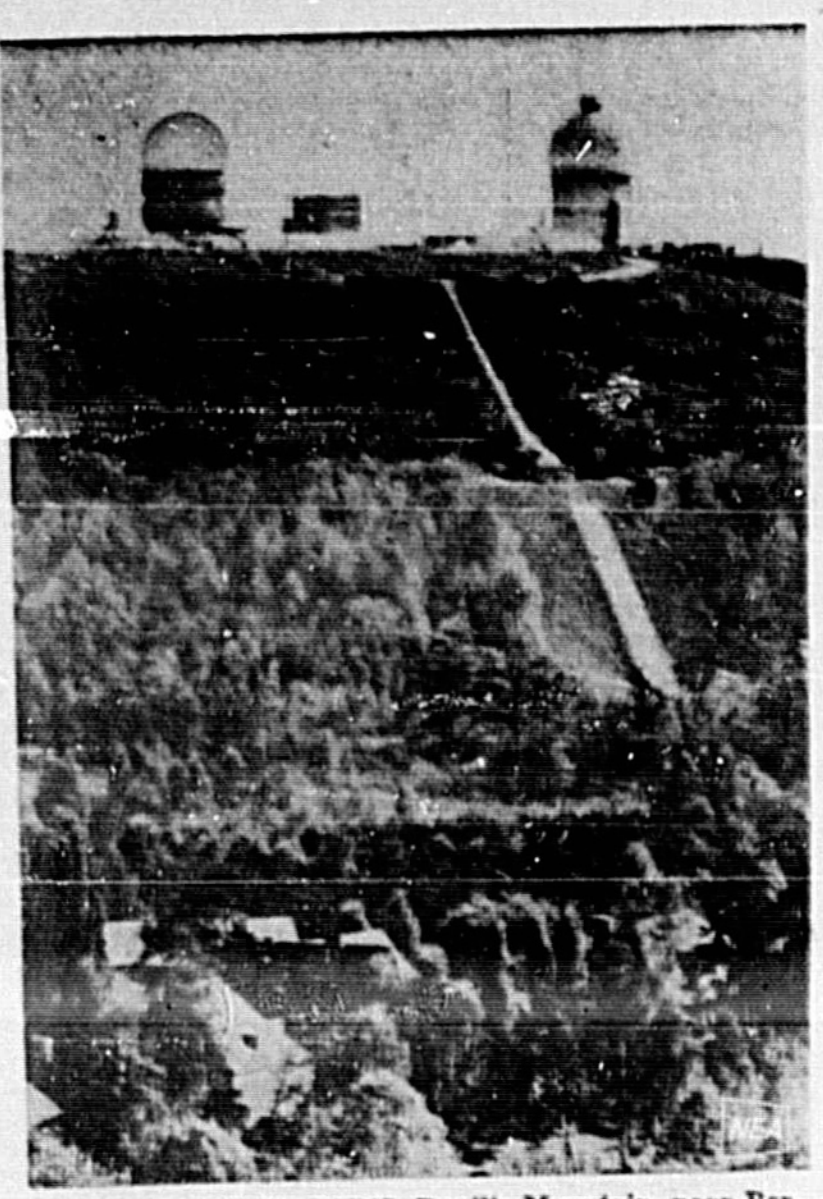

WASHINGTON (AP) — Two long and stormy years of Democratic senators say the 91st Congress—and the big stack of unfinished legislation left when it died—may have been a blessing in disguise.  
Majority Leader Mike Mansfield of Montana and Sen. Warren G. Magnuson of Washington said in weekend interviews the confusion and acrimony of the lame-duck session will give new life to Magnuson's proposed Senate rule changes when the 92nd Congress convenes.  
The proposal is designed to eliminate the last-minute snafus that usually develop when Congress tries to pass controversial appropriations bills necessary to keep the government operating. Magnuson's plan: Separate controversy from the appropriations.

## Horse-And-Buggy Congress Ends

WASHINGTON (AP) — The 91st Congress, its early accomplishments largely overshadowed by frustrations of the post-election session, has passed into history, only 19 days before a new House and Senate take over.  
Procrastination in the earlier months and refusal to gear its horse-and-buggy machinery to the space age created a session-end impasse which long hours and long talk could not overcome.  
Adjournment came Saturday afternoon after the Senate agreed to a House-passed resolution shifting the debate over the supercon transport plane to the 92nd Congress. The compromise allows funding of the

1,800-mile-an-hour plane and continues Transportation Department spending through March 30.  
Some major bills lost in the adjournment shuffle were victory adjustments—cleanups such as over the SST and restrictions on the president's use of troops in Southeast Asia. One talkman lasted almost two months.  
Adding to the crush allowed to pile up for the lame-duck session were long weeks and lengthy holiday recesses earlier in the year and a one-month summer vacation.  
The traditional four-day congressional week just didn't work. Although official records of the two-year session show an elapsed time of about 700 days, the Senate worked only 207 days

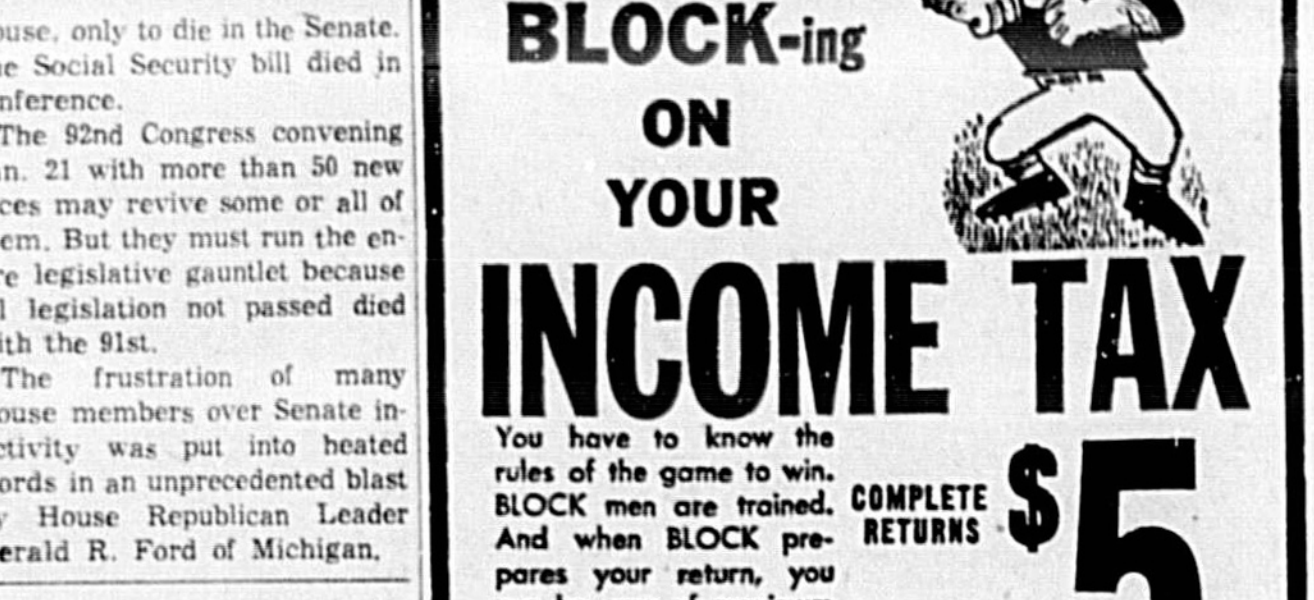

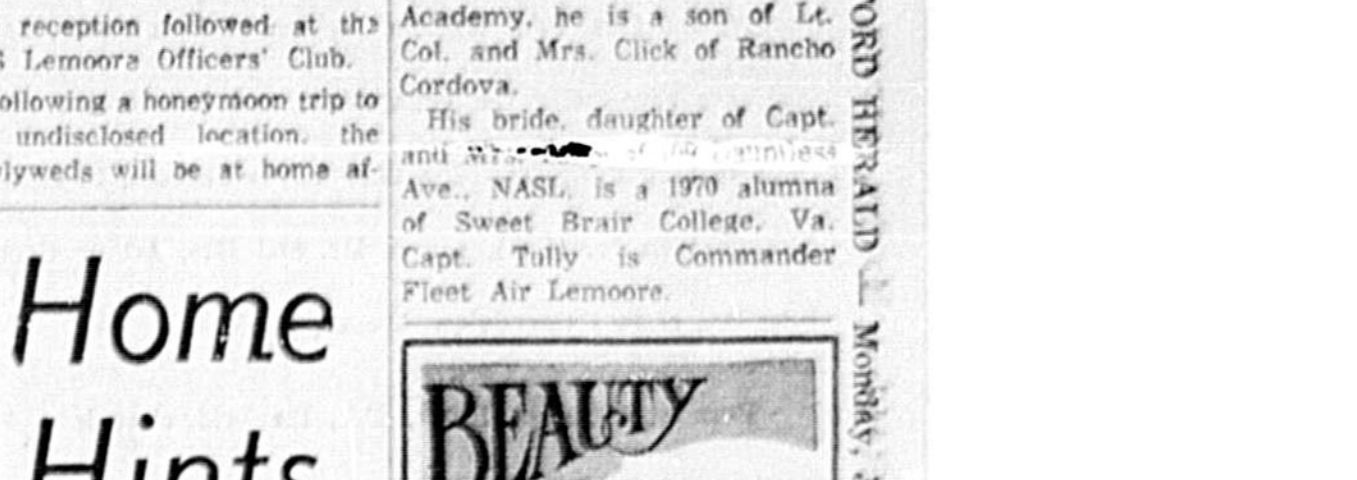

CASE P-337: Alan B., aged 28, is a science teacher at a state university.

In general, we value things on the basis of what they have cost us in our own personal sacrifices, toil and sweat.

Free education, as paid for by taxpayers and generous American corporations, is thus often abused by campus students and the burning of valuable libraries, dormitories and science halls.

Years ago Dean Cutler, of our Northwestern University Medical School, corroborated Alan's suggestion: he merited in having students earn their way through college.

"Dr. Crane," the Dean said, "you may be shocked to realize that there are more preministers in the evening law school here in Chicago, than from both our Northwestern and the University of Chicago daytime law schools."

"For my survey of those included in WHO'S WHO shows that the men who worked by day and then attended law school at night, have exceeded the students who had all their expenses paid!"

Dean Cutler's observation also applies to Medical and Dental College students.

For we often find that the men who drive taxicabs by night or worked in restaurants and at other part time jobs to pay their way through professional schools, often soon head faster when they get out into private practice.

Maybe their grade averages were only "C" or "D", but they meanwhile learned so much about "Human Relations" while dealing with people, that this psychological insight pays off.

### Excise Tax Continued

WASHINGTON (AP) — A bill continuing telephone and new car excise taxes was signed by President Nixon a few hours before the new venerable emergency measures were set to expire.

Nixon's signature on other legislation Thursday allows \$9.7 billion for further work on the interstate highway system, \$2.5 billion for foreign aid, and sets Jan. 1, 1975, as a target date for reducing new car exhaust emissions by 90 per cent.

Though the expiration time for the taxes was midnight, there was no real chance Americans would be relieved of the levies originally passed during World War II.

However, the taxes will be reduced by 1 per cent each year after running two years at their present rates; 10 per cent on telephone calls; 7 per cent on new cars.

The excise tax extensions are worth \$4 billion to the Treasury. The same bill also speeds up collection of estate taxes, making them due within nine months of death instead of 15 months. This represents a one-time revenue pickup of another \$1.5 billion.

# Crucified Skeleton Unearthed

By ZANIER HOLLANDER  
 JERUSALEM (UPI) — The skeleton of a man nailed to a cross about 2,000 years ago shows crucifixion may have been different—and even more painful—than the method depicted by history.  
 Dr. Abraham Biran, director of the Israel Department of Antiquities, said the skeleton was "a very, very important discovery" but said it would be "mere fantasy" to think it might be the remains of Christ.  
 "It cannot be Christ, for the man's name is Yehoshanan and it was chiseled into his ossuary (tomb)," Biran said Sunday.  
 He generally depicted by paintings and historians, crucifixion—including that of Christ—was with the outstretched arms nailed to the crossbar through the palms of the hands and the two feet nailed to the upright with the feet pointed downward and the nail going through the top of the foot.  
 Instead, from the bones found by Israeli scholars, the arms were nailed to the crossbar through the forearms. The feet were placed together and turned sideways, with the spike driven through the two heels and into the wood.

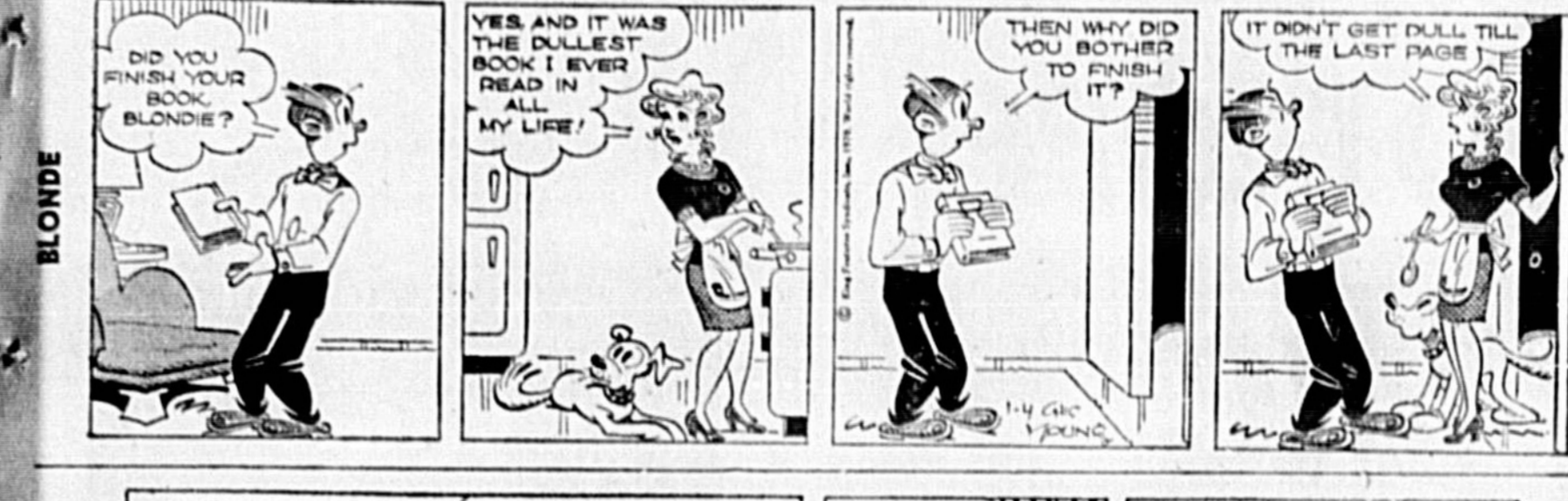

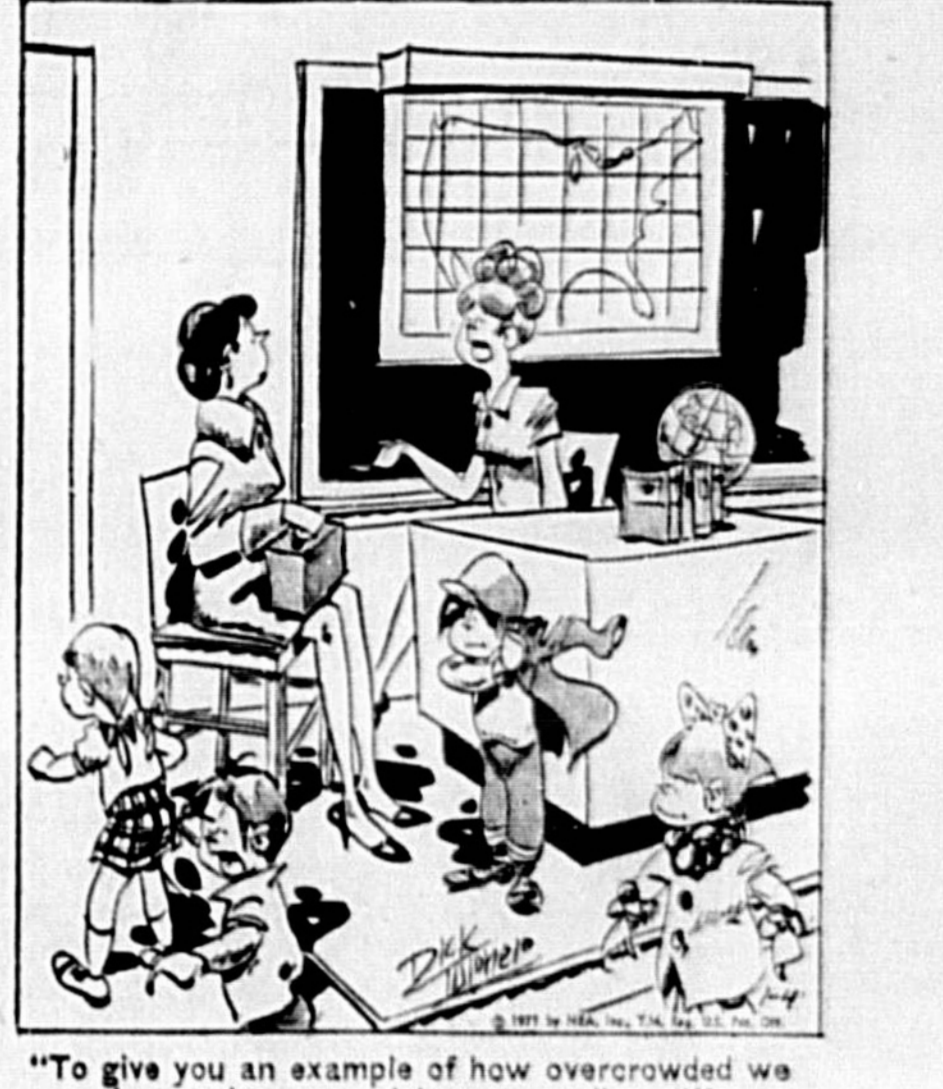

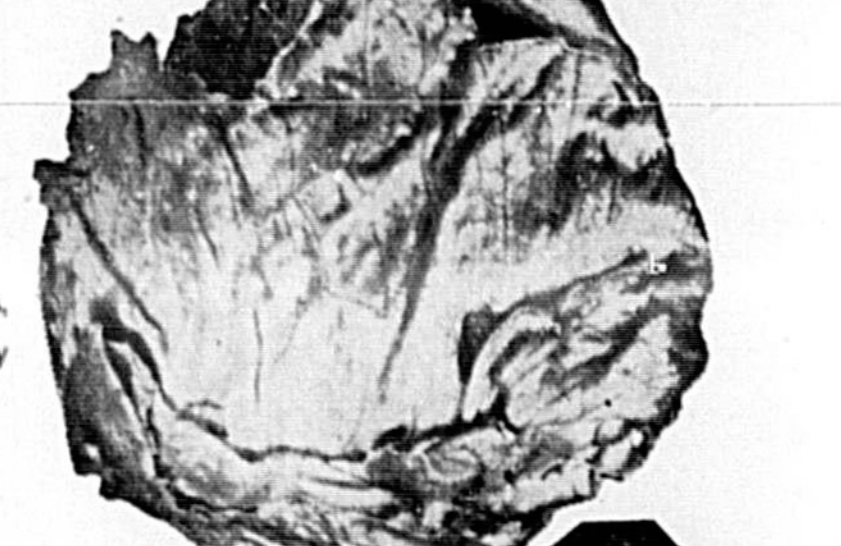

## 7th Judge Named To 18th Circuit

 Gov. Claude Kirk, on his last day in office Monday, gave the 18th circuit district (Seminole and Brevard Counties) its seventh judge. He named Clarence T. Johnson Jr., a Republican from Merritt Island.

Outgoing Governor Kirk named five new circuit judges, three of whom were named as a result of the 1970 census. In filling the judgeships on his last full day in office at the end of a four-year term, Kirk raised to 10 the number of judges appointed because of the census.

Recently appointed to the 18th judicial circuit, but to a U.S. Census-created position was former State Atty. Dominick Staff of Longwood, who Kirk sent on several occasions to other circuits to conduct investigations.

One of Staff's assignments was to investigate alleged corruption of public officials in DuDe County, home base of State Atty. Richard Gerstein, a powerful Democrat who often criticized Kirk.

Seminole County now has two resident judges, Volie A. Williams Jr. and Salti Brevard County has five resident judges, John Tom Waddell of Melbourne, Roger F. Dykes of Titusville, William G. Akridge of Cocoa and Richard Muldrew of Titusville.

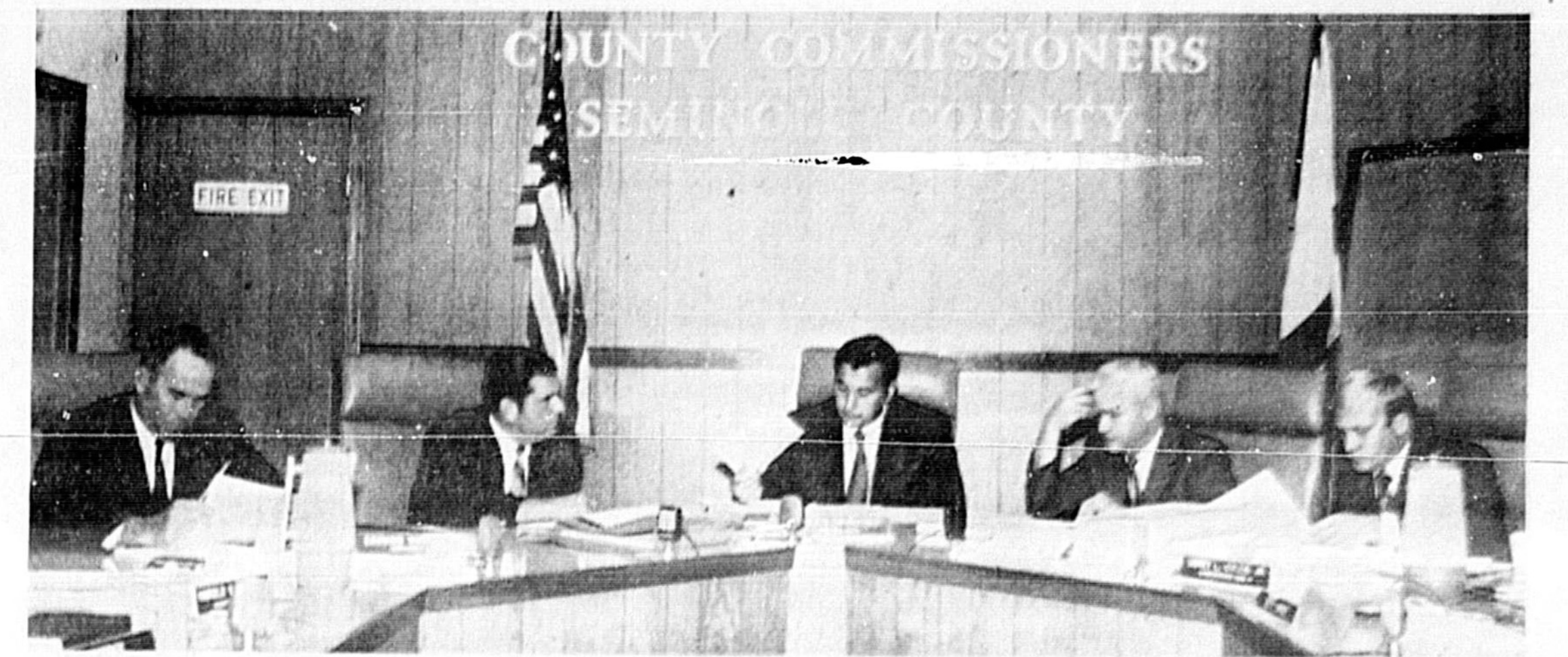

## 'Junker' Plan Launched

 As has been anticipated, Greg Drummond was elected by his fellow commissioners this morning when new commissioners were seated and the board reorganized for 1971. Elected as vice chairman is Edward Yarborough.

Drummond, nattily attired in a forest green suit with lime green shirt, set the pace for the hoped-for dynamic leadership by announcing that he would meet this afternoon with Vern Tipel, scrap metal dealer, to discuss the problem of "junk cars" in the county. Drummond said that Tipel had agreed to haul the junkers away without charge from Five Points south, but that he had stated it was economically unfeasible to haul from Five Points north.

However, Drummond said that following the conference this afternoon a solution could be reached to the problem to afford county-wide service in this matter, Drummond emphasized that this would not be put an operation at salvage sites but also included individual junkers. The new chairman further elucidated that the operation might involve transfer stations for the junkers.

Drummond also has scheduled a work session upon the matter with the county attorney, superintendent of the county landfill and zoning director. Zoning Director Robert Brown told the board that the City of Sanford has indicated to him its complete cooperation in the matter. Brown estimated that there are currently 3,000 junkers in the county but admitted that "this estimate may be low."

Also sounding a progressive note Drummond said that some of the county boards were "functioning in a lesser manner" than had been expected of them. Drummond attributed this to the fact that they had not been sufficiently charged with their responsibilities.

He specifically cited the board of schoolboard examiners and the electrical examining board. Drummond noted that these boards should be upgraded and the county standards "keep pace with the demands."

Drummond went on to say that the water control and conservation advisory committee was performing a "woman task" but that it should consider implementation of controls and standards which have not as yet been considered in the area encompassing ecology. Presently, he cited, the board has only given recommendations in dredging operations.

As one of his first orders of business, Drummond suggested a meeting with this board in the near future so that recommendations may be made to the County Commission. Drummond contended that the other counties are leaving Seminole in the background as they pursue water control and conservation.

## Casselberry OKs Annexation

**CASSELBERRY** — Following a short public hearing last night, City Council agreed to authorize the preparation of an annexation ordinance concerning approximately 60 homes in the Howell Park area.

During discussion before making this decision, Councilman Edith Dierr assured the council that there is no question of continuity to the city as far as these homes are concerned, since the homes make up "two islands" completely surrounded on all four sides by the city.

She also pointed out that "these homes are built to the same specifications as other homes in parts of Howell Park already in the city."

Mayor Curtis Blow commended Councilman Dierr on her diligent efforts in investigating this matter, and in bringing about a speedy public hearing. He cited the strong desire that the entire council has to get rid of unannexed "islands" within the city.

In further action at a continued meeting following this public hearing, the council voted to grant a request for a beverage permit from "The Country Kettle" restaurant on Highway 17-92. This request already had been approved by the state, and the proper requirements met.

Councilman William Grier, stating the fact that the city has a city manager ordinance and has budgeted money for "new islands" completely surrounded on all four sides by the city, the council agreed with this suggestion, and authorized the city clerk to advertise in the League of Municipalities magazine.

Councilman Louis Kirby made a suggestion during last night's meeting that the city consider the second reading of an ordinance abandoning a portion of Third and Branch Street. Information will be given relative to the interim loan withdrawal notice upon the sewer system.

A routine year end audit will be authorized in the general fund and water works.

Council will consider authorization and acceptance of pre payment of the K-Mart Shopping Center for fire protection.

Possibly council will receive a progress report upon Phase II of the sewer construction project.

## Vice Mayor Breaks Tie Vote David Tilson Mayor Of N. Orlando

**NORTH ORLANDO** — Following a merry go-round involving parliamentary procedures, David Tilson was elected mayor to fill the vacancy until municipal elections are held in March 16. The vacancy was created due to the resignation of Mayor Clifford Jordan to seek a seat on the County Commission, for which he was unsuccessful. Tilson previously served as mayor.

Mayor Jordan told council that "I will not seek reelection in March because of the resignation of business interests." However, he said that he would serve until the elections, if appointed. Councilman Charles Kelley moved for the reappointment, but was stymied by the nomination of Tilson by Councilman Charles Kelley. After a hassle in the parliamentary procedure, Rowell and Kelley withdrew their motions, and nominations were called for by the vice mayor, Pat Del Villaggio. Tilson's and the only ones named were the Jordan ones.

Tilson mounted as it was apparent that Del Villaggio must break the tie, and the vice chairman, with all the emotion of a movie scenario, announced, "For the first time in history, a vice mayor will break the tie. I cast my vote for David Tilson."

Relative to the municipal elections, it was stated that there are four council seats and the maximum up for election. A new ruling in effect is that candidates must file the last 19 days in February, beginning Feb. 19.

A vacancy still exists in the seat upon the planning and zoning commission which is due to the resignation of Hart when appointed to council. Jordan announced that no one had indicated any interest in the position.

In another matter, Jordan told the board that there had been 10 applications for the position of maintenance man in the village. These will be interviewed by the mayor and council notified.
