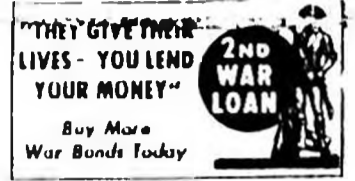

Retail Trade As Essential To War

Quoting from an editorial in the Industrial News Review, the Lake County Chamber of Commerce suggests that a very determined effort must be made by consumers as well as retailers in Lake County to prevent further unnecessary shortages in all lines of consumer goods. This editorial says in part: "It would sound strange to hear Mr. Henry Kaiser argue that ships were essential to the war effort. Fortunately, he doesn't have to. Everyone knows it. But there are industries just as essential as shipbuilding, whose wartime operating difficulties are immensely aggravated because their essentiality has never been adequately recognized."

Lieut. S.V. Hamas Writes Booklet On Toughening Pilots

LOS ANGELES—Lt. Steven V. Hamas, who wrote some thrilling boxing chapters in his career as a professional fighter, has authored a booklet "Stratosphere Stamina" which has been accepted by the Army Air Forces as a program to toughen its flightings and pilots for the strenuous battles ahead.

Stratosphere Steve's specific assignment is keeping pilots in the air. He is in top trim as a physical training officer for the fighter group.

The material in his booklet is presented in the form of a 10 round fight, with each exercise constituting a round. Particular emphasis is placed on the arm, neck and abdominal muscles which take quite a beating when a pilot is streaking through the sky at more than 100 miles an hour.

Hamas said he adapted the exercises from football and boxing. The entire routine of exercises can be performed in less than 20 minutes when practiced because these are busy days for pilots and they have to catch their exercise in between hops.

Hamas said he would like to teach them all boxing because "it instills confidence."

"I don't know how I ever happened to become a boxer," Hamas recalled as he sent a group of five newly aviator pilots to the boxing ring through their paces. "Boxing was farthest from my mind (he was a premed student at Penn state where he won 12 letters in five varsity sports)."

"I wasn't even a boxing fan and I wouldn't go across the street to see a championship bout. But I liked to fight."

Hamas always was the aggressor in the ring. He had 45 professional one draw 33 by knockouts, fought on draw and lost three to men he later defeated. He never was counted out.

His biggest victory was scored over Max Schmeling in 1934 at Philadelphia, where he jabbed and lugged the black Ulfen all around the ring to win 11 of the 12 rounds. The win projected him

HOW TO FIGHT SMALL FIRES



When a liquid burns in a container, aim at the wall of the container just above the level of the liquid. Fire gases are poisonous. Stand where smoke will be carried away from you, not toward you.

As soon as you are sure the fire is out, clear the air of all smoke. Aim the extinguisher stream at what is burning, not at smoke and flames.

Workers Urged To Learn How To Fight Fires Occurring On The Job

Fire Chief Mack Cleveland today urged new workers to learn how to fight the small fires that may occur on the job.

"It is a good rule, whenever fire is discovered to call the fire department, and then fight the fire," the Chief stated. "Your shop rules should be followed in this regard, however, and you will be guided by the instructors of your foreman or supervisor. At home, always send in the alarm first."

"There is a right and a wrong way to fight even small fires," he said. "You can fight fire safely and effectively, if you follow a few simple rules. In most places of employment, the types of extinguishers available are those which are best suited to the kind of fire which may occur at or near a point of hazard."

"For instance," the Chief explained, "near electric motors or other electric apparatus, you are likely to find either vaporizing liquid or carbon dioxide extinguishers. If you are in a department where flammable liquids are used, there will be either foam, vaporizing liquid, carbon dioxide, or loaded steam extinguishers available. Soda-acid, gas cartridge, or pump tank extinguishers will probably be found where you have only ordinary combustibles (wood, cloth, paper and the like), although any type of extinguisher can be used with safety on fires of this nature."

"First of all, play safe," the Chief continued. "Always keep a way of escape open; place yourself between the fire and an exit. Stand as far from the fire as effective use of your extinguishing agent will permit. If the smoke blows in your face, move as to avoid it; fire gases are poisonous."

"Don't direct the extinguisher at the smoke and flames; aim at what is burning. However, if the fire is in a container of flammable liquid, the stream should be directed against the inside of the container just above the level of the burning liquid, not right into it. If the fire is spreading up a wall, fight it from the bottom up. If it is spread over the ground, attack the fire nearest you and sweep it out as you advance."

"Follow the simple rules I have given here, and you should have no difficulty in controlling fires when you start. The training in safety that you receive where you work can be applied to your home. If you have occasion to put out a small fire, make sure it is completely out and then ventilate the room so the smoke and gases will escape as completely as possible; that's the procedure the fireman follows."

TALLAHASSEE, June 4. (AP) The 1943 legislative session ended yesterday, clearing the way for final adjournment of the 1943 session today.

It carried a five percent reduction against one item to project \$157,633 annually for old age pensions.

With virtually no discussion, the House and the Senate adopted a report prepared by eight members of a conference committee named to adjust differences in total and provisions of separate bills the two branches had passed.

Under recommendation of the total of \$27,400 under the specific recommendation of the state budget commission for appropriations of \$21,050,000 although the overall total shows a reduction of \$520,000 because the conference committee knocked off \$342,000 of a \$414,000 contingency appropriation.

TALLAHASSEE, June 4. (AP) The Florida Legislature adjourned today, having passed the budget bill.

Overriding the finance committee which had rejected the bill, the senate put on its calendar bills to levy an added one percent insurance premium tax for \$600,000 a year and to legalize and license punch boards used for trade purposes.

The finance committee endorsed a funded one-cent-a-pint tax on beer. It also produced nearly \$2,000,000 a year divided equally between pensions and public school teachers' salaries.

Even if the bills do not become law, however, there appeared prospects that pensions may be increased, or that the fund may be spread to take in additional recipients. A three-cent cigarette tax enacted by this legislature and now awaiting Governor Holland's signature, will provide \$2,000,000 a year for pensions, substituting for wagering taxation while horse racing is suspended.

Only half as much The pension tax on racing was enacted by the 1941 legislature and it produced nearly \$2,000,000 in the 1941-42 season. The fund was spread over two years by the state welfare board, which suspended last winter because of gasoline rationing.

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Laundry Problem

Now on top of everything else comes the problem of keeping clean, and particularly of getting clothes washed. All New England laundries are going out of business because they can't get help, or because the government won't let them charge what it's worth to wash things.

"What are we going to do to keep clean?" demands the Western, R. I. Sun. The people there are talking of getting together and establishing a public laundry. Some say they could do their washing in the park pond, turning it into a great wash tub. Europeans have done that for ages, women gathering en masse at the local pond or brook, kneeling on the bank and pounding the dirt out of their clothes with stones.

This terrific problem is said to be getting women down almost everywhere. The men don't mind so much. A partial remedy is to wear as little clothing as possible.

The Magic Mold

Newer than the sulfa drugs, and even more effective in some cases, is penicillin, a chemical derived from a mold. It prevents the reproduction of pathogenic bacteria.

The natural protective forces of the body can kill off a great number of germs and let the patient recover, but only too often germs multiply too fast for these protective forces to cope with.

Penicillin seems to do about the same things the sulfa drugs do, but to do it better, and to heal cases against which even the sulfa drugs have been powerless.

Italian Crisis

Reports from Italy are seldom trustworthy, but it is evident that little is left of the nation's resources and fighting power. Important changes are doubtless under way.

As for "abandoning Italy to meet an Allied invasion alone," there might be a show of fight if the Nazis pulled out. But the Italian people, never wanted this war, and have hated it more and more as their sufferings increased.

Guarantees Needed For Free Press

By DAVID LAWRENCE

The unmistakable trend toward totalitarianism which the New Deal has manifested in recent years has developed widespread fears that the freedom of the press and the other precious freedoms related thereto may be in peril. Totalitarianism is supposed to be beneficial to the people when it is exercised by a well-intentioned administration that deems itself capable of determining what is or is not good for the citizens generally.

Thus the Supreme Court, a majority of whose justices have been appointed under the New Deal, now has affirmed the principle that any Governmental agency which confers any license or permits the use of any governmental facilities can control the means of expression in peacetime as well as in war. The radio has been swept from under the protection of the First Amendment by a recent decision of the court.

The answer to such decisions is not to try to remove the justices. That was tried by President Roosevelt in 1937 and strongly disapproved by congress, though a good many rubber-stamped members and many outside members were ready to go along with the theory that when you don't like the umpire all you need to do is contrive some way to remove him from the power to decide.

There is a lawful way to repeal Supreme Court Decisions. It is to amend the Constitution so as to make explicit the guarantees which previously had been believed to be implicit in the Bill of Rights. Not only is a radio, but a statute is every other medium of expression in danger of Federal control today by reason of the support given the New Deal majority by the Supreme Court to the idea of administrative absolutism. The new doctrine is that any broadly phrased language in a statute is a legislative standard and that even the right of review of administrative agencies in the courts should be drastically curtailed.

What means of protection is there for the media of public expression? Was language in the Constitution can protect both the press and the radio and any new means of communication, such as television, so that the excuse of limited facilities shall not be used to interfere with the free exercise of the press and the radio by the Government? 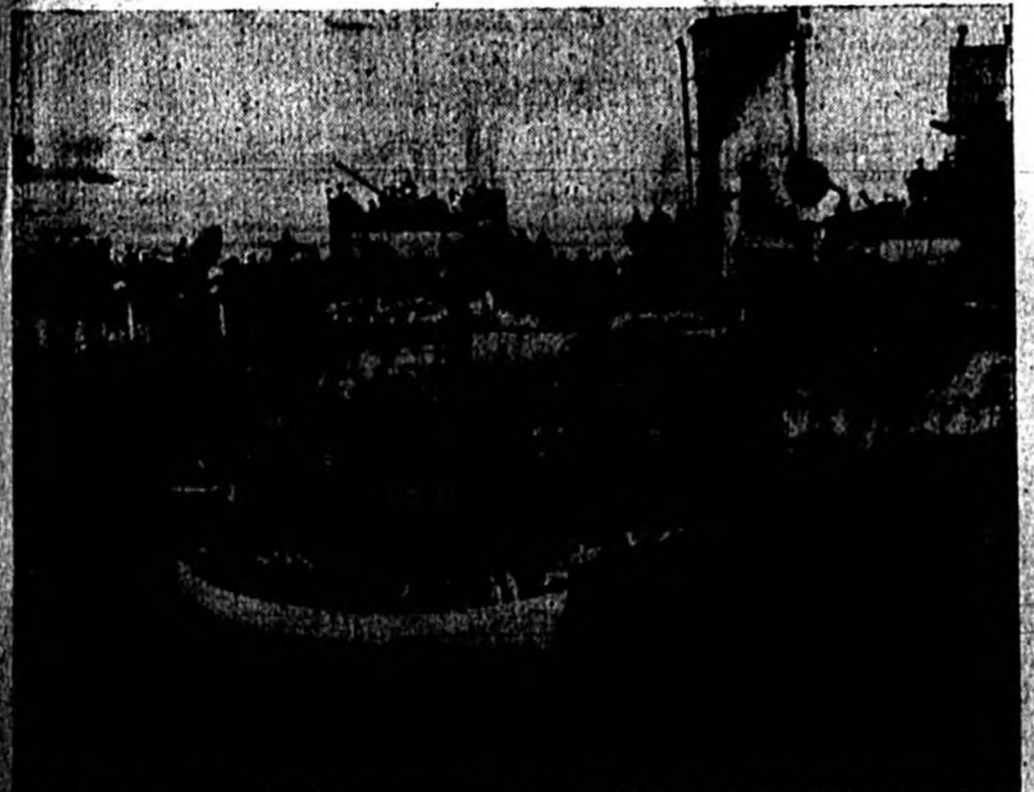

Roosevelt Host To Two Leaders From Liberia

President Barclay Is First Negro To Be White House Guest

WASHINGTON, June 4, 1943.—With the full honors accorded all visiting foreign dignitaries, Edwin Barclay, President of the Negro Republic of Liberia in West Africa, was received officially last week at the White House.

He became the first member of his race to pass the night at a

guest in the executive mansion. President Barclay was repaying a visit which President Roosevelt made to him on his way back from a conference with Prime Minister Churchill at Casablanca last January. A state dinner for the visiting chief executive was held at the White House, with high officials of the government present. No women attended the dinner.

President Barclay arrived at the White House late in the day, escorted by Cordell Hull, Secretary of State, and accompanied by W.S. Tubman, President-elect of Liberia. In the spacious south lawn of the White House companies of marines, soldiers and sailors snapped to attention and the Navy Band played the national anthem of Liberia and the United States.

President Barclay and Pres-

ident-elect Tubman entered the diplomatic reception room of the White House, where President Roosevelt was waiting to greet them, along with Mrs. Roosevelt, Vice-President Henry A. Wallace, Postmaster General Frank Walker, Secretary of Agriculture Claude R. Wickard, Secretary of Commerce, Jesse Jones, Secretary of the Treasury Henry Morgenthau Jr., Attorney General Biddle, Sumner Welles, Under Secretary of State, and Sol Bloom, Democrat, of New York, chairman of the House Foreign Affairs Committee.

President Barclay and his party moved the next day to the Blair mansion, where the American government houses all of the top visiting foreign officials. Never before, White House officials said, had a Negro dignitary passed the night at the White

House. The only comparable event took place when President Roosevelt himself entertained at a luncheon for British Ambassador Sir Horace Rumbold, Sept. 19, 1941.

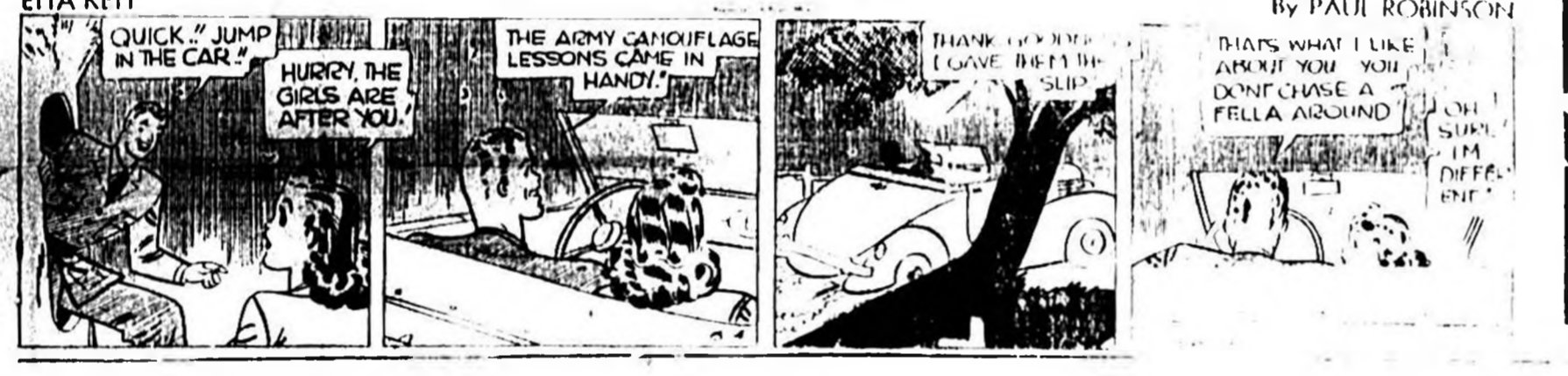
