ORDINANCE NO. 287 AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF SANFORD, FLORIDA, ESTABLISHING PARKING METER ZONES IN SAID CITY, PROVIDING FOR THE INSTALLATION OF PARKING METERS IN SAID ZONES, REQUIRING DRIVERS OF VEHICLES DESIRING TO PARK IN SAID ZONES TO PARK THE SAME IN SPACES MARKED OFF FOR SAID PURPOSE AND TO PAY THE

CHARGES HEREIN PRESCRIBED. PREScribing CHARGES TO BE MADE FOR THE USE OF SUCH PARKING SPACE, DECLARING THE PURPOSE FOR WHICH SAID CHARGES ARE MADE AND THIS PURPOSE FOR WHICH FINE IS ASSESSED FROM SAID CHARGES ARE TO BE USED, MAKING IT UNLAWFUL FOR ANY PERSON TO PARK VEHICLES IN SAID ZONES WITHOUT PAYING THE CHARGES HEREIN PRESCRIBED OR TO WILFULLY TAMPER WITH BREAK OR DAMAGE A PARKING METER AND PROVIDING A PENALTY FOR THE VIOLATION OF THE PROVISIONS OF THIS ORDINANCE.

SECTION 1. That the hereinafter described portions of the following named street and avenues in the city of Sanford, Florida, are hereby established and designated as zones in which the parking of vehicles therein shall be regulated by parking meters, to-wit:

That portion of First Street from Oak Avenue to Sanford Avenue.

That portion of Park Avenue from Commercial Street to Second Street, except the portion thereof abutting the gasoline filling station at the southwest corner of Commercial Street and Park Avenue and the portion thereof abutting the gasoline filling station at the northwest corner of Park Avenue and Second Street.

That portion of Magnolia Avenue between First Street and Sanford Avenue.

That portion of Palmola Avenue between First Street and Sanford Avenue.

That portion of the west side of First Street from the east corner of Oak Avenue to the east corner of Sanford Avenue, except the portion thereof abutting the gasoline filling station at the southeast corner of First Street and Oak Avenue and the portion thereof abutting the gasoline filling station at the southeast corner of First Street and Sanford Avenue.

That portion of the east side of First Street from the west corner of Oak Avenue to the west corner of Sanford Avenue, except the portion thereof abutting the gasoline filling station at the northeast corner of First Street and Oak Avenue and the portion thereof abutting the gasoline filling station at the northeast corner of First Street and Sanford Avenue.

SECTION 2. That any person who willfully breaks, damages or injures any of the aforesaid parking meters, shall, upon conviction thereof in the municipal court, be punished by fine not exceeding \$50.00 or by imprisonment not exceeding ninety days.

SECTION 3. That any part or parts of ordinance in conflict with this ordinance be and the same are hereby repealed.

SECTION 4. If a section, part of an ordinance, clause or phrase of this ordinance shall be held invalid, the remaining provisions shall nevertheless remain in full force and effect.


SECTION 5. That this ordinance shall become effective immediately upon its passage and adoption.

SECTION 4. That the parking meter provided for use in the aforesaid parking zones shall be in operation from eight o'clock A. M. until six o'clock P. M., except on public holidays, Wednesday, Thursday and Saturday, and on Saturdays from eight o'clock A. M. until nine o'clock P. M., except on public holidays.

SECTION 5. That any person desiring to park a vehicle in the aforesaid parking zones, shall park the same in a parking meter space, and immediately upon doing so, shall deposit in said parking meter the amount indicated therein for the time the or she desires to have said vehicle parked, and when said time has elapsed, said vehicle shall be immediately removed from said space or another coin for the additional time which it is desired to have said vehicle parked shall be deposited therein.

SECTION 6. The five cent and one cent parking meters as provided herein are hereby levied and assessed as fees to provide for the proper regulations and control of traffic upon the public streets and the cost of supervision and regulation of the parking meter zones created hereby, and to cover the cost of the purchasing, leasing, acquiring, installation, operation, maintenance, supervision, regulation and control of the parking meters described herein.

SECTION 7. That it shall be unlawful for any person to park a vehicle in any one of the aforesaid parking spaces in said parking meter zone, without paying the amount indicated on said parking meter required to be paid, and upon conviction in the municipal court of the City of Sanford of so doing, said person shall be punished by fine of \$25.00 or imprisonment for 15 days, or by both such fine and imprisonment at the discretion of the municipal judge; and likewise any person who shall allow a vehicle to remain in said parking space in said parking zone after the time for which payment has been made has elapsed, without making an additional deposit for further time, shall, upon conviction thereof in the Municipal Court of the City of Sanford, be punished by a fine of \$25.00 or by imprisonment for 15 days or both such fine and imprisonment.

**Back To School**  
Children going back to school this September are going to find differences in their teachers, some good and some bad.  
Many of the old teachers will be back from war service with first hand knowledge of strange parts of the world. Geography will take on a new reality, when the teacher has flown a plane from Pacific islands, served with the Red Cross in England, or fought the enemy from a ship in the Mediterranean. Everything those men and women learned during the war can be turned to advantage back in the classrooms at home.  
Many pupils will suffer to some extent from the shortage of teachers which is general throughout the country. They may be crowded into large classes, and they may have inexperienced teachers not fully qualified for their jobs. Where this is true, it probably won't be much fun for the teachers, who will have to work twice as hard as the students to keep ahead of them.  
However, there's a lot to learn in any American school this year, and the kids who go back full of summer sunshine and play will have a good time tackling their job with the books.

**No Time Wasted**  
Production has been at a standstill in the Pittsburgh plant of the Allegheny Company since last March because of a strike. But the employees who are not involved in the strike and who would be idle as its result have been kept pleasantly and profitably occupied during this period.

The company has sponsored a school for some time, but during this spell of enforced inactivity the courses have been expanded. The students are clerks and supervisory employees of the company. The employees who employ themselves have been drafted as teachers. Many outsiders have been brought in from other firms to lecture and to give instructions in production methods and mechanical processes. Last of all, this tedious endeavor become burdensome, hobby sessions are held at intervals and those who raise pigeons, fly planes, or collect stamps are encouraged to hold forth on extra-curricular activities.

Thus the workers gain in knowledge and their mental interests are broadened by this productive use of their time. They could otherwise be consumed in idleness and discontent.

**Proof By Figures**  
Reports from London on the British employment situation show the variety of interpretations which figures can lead to.

The Ministry of Labor issued a statement for June 1946. It reported that the number of unemployed persons was 1,700,000. Another correspondent wrote that the British working population was 22,000,000 persons lower this June than a year ago. Both figures are based on statistics which are somewhat elaborate.

The whole subject of employment is so complicated that both writers could be right. Shifting factors, such as military service, elderly employees retiring after the war, number of women formerly employed but no longer desiring to work, and demobilized servicemen on terminal leave before taking jobs, make any number of interpretations possible.

Often the same set of statistics, concrete as they seem, can lead to an incredible number of different answers. The British employment figures are a good example.

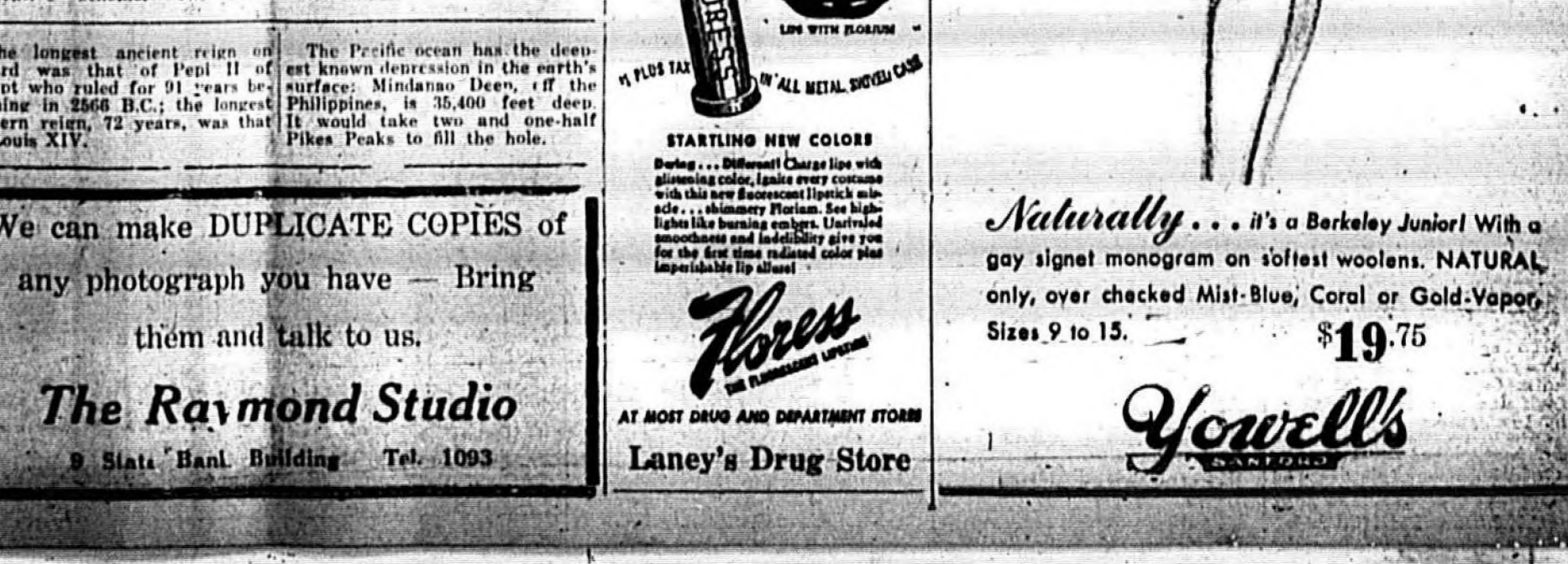

## Union States Tips Vary With City And With The Customer

NEW YORK—What mental gymnastics do you go through while deciding whether to leave the barber a 15- or 20-cent tip? Do you cut the tip to the service? To your pocketbook? To the barber's personality?

Arne Wolf, the correspondent, writes a small work about the barber's tipping habits.

It's not a very silly question. A series of hearings by the Senate Commerce and Labor committee in the last few months of the year have shown that the tipping habits of the barber are a very important part of the economy. The purpose was to determine employee contributions to union pension funds, but actually the hearings turned into an employees' tipping session on the postwar tip.

From the workers' point of view a high standard tip rate would be a good thing. It would mean a higher standard of living for the barber. tally to do this scientifically) is just costing the barber money. Maincoats should cost 25 percent. Boatloads and other hair-dresser hangerson rate a flat five cents per customer.

At the same time, if you give the bootblack 10 cents, you're probably putting him in a higher income tax bracket.

Tipping habits vary with the customer's business and with the city he's in. The hearings showed. The barbers in New York, for example, insist that garment workers are more generous than brokers. The usual 10 percent is the rate in the financial district, the barbers' union says, but garment workers tip as high as 150 percent. "Maybe because they're union men."

Uptate, hair-dressers, who think the state's estimate of their tip earnings is too high, are to get free employment insurance checks when they're out of work. You see how complicated all this can get.

Take the taxi driver. Anyone who has the courage not to tip him is a "skunk." A quarter or 50 cents crossing his path makes you a "five-center."

The state thinks there are lots of five-centers and estimates the hickies' tips at 12 1/2 percent of their 40 cents. New York drivers on the other hand argue that over the war tips have dropped from 17 percent to about 10. Tip state cubbies think seven and a half is a proper rate.

Hotel chambermaids get the short end of the tipping bargain. Their union spokesmen say that for weeks they aren't likely to think of the job who makes up the bed and leaves a piece of soap to replace the one you swapped.

What you, the customer, are supposed to do about all this isn't quite clear. It seems a traveling man can save a lot of money by keeping tabs on the tip rates of each state. You might ask the waitress or the chambermaid what she's supposed to get and leave it all to her.

As you go right on using 10 percent of the tipping tip-off, which you probably probably make a 10-cent tip, and find out that the customer's always wrong.

## Shaughnessy Will Stick To "T" At University Of Maryland This Year

COLLEGE PARK, Md. — Shaughnessy and football fans can say they like against the formation of a new "T" formation, but University of Maryland Head Coach Clark Shaughnessy still thinks the "T" formation is just about the finest gridiron tactic in the history of the game.

"Shaughnessy chuckles, 'but I like the "T" formation in football because it puts a premium on skill and quick-thinking, rather than brains.'"

"It takes away the drudgery of the hard-blocking game and makes it much more enjoyable for the players."

"Single wing-back, double wing-back, short punt, triple flange, but maneuvering behind an old comparatively modern invention."

"In fact, the "T" formation of offense is a streamlined version of the old attack, with deception requiring accuracy timing and execution as the keynote."

Shaughnessy compares quick opening plays of the "T" to the left jab of a boxer. He adds that the man-in-motion and the faking of the backs might be compared to the feints of a boxer and the fullback's drives to the real punch.

"The pass plays should be used as the unexpected blow," the Old Line mentor explains.

"Speed and deception are the underlying principles of the "T"-offense," Shaughnessy says. "Deception is obtained by the quarterback handling the ball, the faking of the backs and the man-in-motion."

"Thus, the opposing linemen and backers-up are shackled until they are sure who has the ball. As the quarterback always fades back after feeding the ball to the man driving into the line, the defense cannot decide quickly whether he is going to do this or go back and pass."

Shaughnessy declares that quick-opening plays by the halfback or wide plays by the fullback are so constructed that they appear alike at their inception.

"By using the man-in-motion principle with precise timing," Shaughnessy continues, "you can get an unbalanced, kick-off or dicker without the pause required by other shifts."

"When a man starts in-motion, his defense does not dare ignore him. He may be going out to block

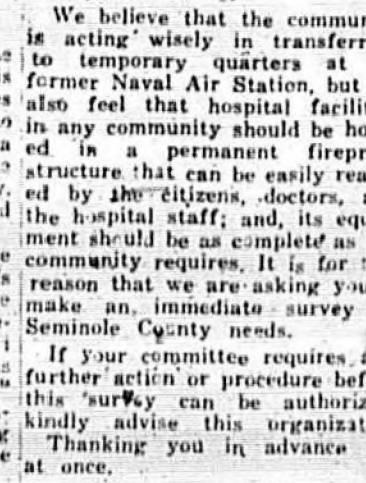
